Compulsory School Law to Go Into Effect November 1st.

It has been agreed by the Trustees of the school districts of Houston county that the first Monday in November would be
the most suitable date for the the most suitable date for the
Compulsory School Law to go Compulsory School Law to go
into effect in the school districts of Houston county. This agree ment was reached after due congathering of crops, scarcity of labor and the number of days that law would have to be en forced this school year. The
trustees in convention passed the trder unanimously, and since the order unanimously, and since the
convention of all of the separate boards of the various districts of the county have issued an order to the same effect, putting the law into effect in their districts a copy of this order has been filed with the county superinten dent. It is very necessary that a uniform date be set for the whole county, if this were not done each district would have a separate provision of its own which would cause much confu
sion throughout the county. I is also very necessary that we set a date for the law to go into effect each year, for if we were
to neglect to do so the law proto neglect to do so the law pro-
vides that the law shall go into vides that the law shall go into
efiect on the very first day of school, which would have bee more than a month in effect in some districts as their schools open in the month of September This would cause the children who are very necessary to the
harvesting of the crops to be taken out of the crops at the very time when they are needed most
The time required this year is provided by the law to be 80 con secutive days. The law going into effect in this county on the 5th day of November and con tinuing for 80 consecutive days will make the time out on the Ist day of March, 1918, allowing dae days for the Christmas holi tween the ages of eight and four teen, and who are not exempted by proper authority must attend every day, unless excused by
proper authority. The County proper authority. The County
Superintendent, County Attend ance Officer and the head teacher of each school are empowered to see to the execution of the law mate mandatory; it is no ficers and teachers as to whether the law is executed or not. A eacher failing to perform his uty as would very likely result in the cancellation of his con tract and certificate; the County Superintendent and Attendance Officer would be subject to im. peachment for failure to comply
with the laws governing their ac with the laws governing their ac tion in the matter.
The law provides that all children who are of the proper age and who do not live over two and one half miles from the schoo by the most direct traveled route and who are not exempted mus ttend. A child may be exempt ed for the following reasons; fo any physical condition that would interfere with his going to and from school and that would make it impossible for him to perform
his duty as a pupil, and a menta his duty as a pupil, and a mental
condition that would make it impossible for him to become student in school, any child who is over twelve years of age and grade of a standard the fourth school of seven ard elementary it is shown that he is needed at
