WITH TUESDAY being the day for the General Election, we reflected back this week to how far our state has come toward having a true two-party system.

It used to be that the Democratic party controlled politics in Texas, to the extent that there rarely were any Republican candidates on the ballot, local, district or statewide.

When it came time for the General Election in those years, the presidential race was about the only one in which voters had any choice in November, since the Democratic candidates in other races were mainly unopposed.

Winning the Democratic primary was termed "tantamount to being elected."

This has changed radically, and as you will note (or have noted), there are Republican candidates all the way down the ballot.

The GOP has not made too many inroads into the county courthouse, however, but some of the defeated Sheriff's candidates from last March's "Super Tuesday" primary are undoubtedly wishing they had run on the Republican ballot. Then they would still be in the running and they could have hoped for some help from Bush's coat-tails.

Most of the candidates being fielded make for some bona-fide races, too. So, there is added reason for voters to take part.

ONE OF THE MOST momentous decisions which a U.S. President must make is the appointing of judges to the Supreme Court. Three Supreme Court Justices will be in their eighties when the next president takes office. A conservative president would naturally be expected to appoint conservative or moderate judges to those posts, should the occasion arise.

Vice President Bush is not as conservative as President Reagan has been, by any means. But still, if Bush is elected president on Tuesday, we have the possibility of breaking the traditional left-wing slant of the Supreme Court on such issues as the death penalty, affirmative action, abortion, etc., at some time in the next four years. This is just one of many reasons why your vote in this election is so important.

Closer to home...when you vote on Tuesday, you will find a long list of judges' names on the Texas ballot. Many of these will be names you have never heard before. It is difficult to know how to vote for these men whose legal decisions will touch our lives in the near future. How can you know how to mark your ballot? We recommend that you talk to someone you trust, such as an area judge, lawyer or congressman; asking their advice on these judges races before you vote.

After questioning some "experts" in this area, I have found the following judges to be recommended as somewhat more conservative than their opponents: Tom Phillips (R) for Chief Justice of Supreme Court of Texas; Paul Murphy (R) for Texas Supreme Court Place 1; Nathan Hecht (R) for Texas Supreme Court Place 2; Charles Howell (R) for Texas Supreme Court Place 3; Jack Hightower (D) Texas Supreme Court Place 4; Eugene Cook (R) Texas Supreme Court Place 5; Mike McCormick (D) for Presiding Judge of Court of Criminal Appeals; Chuck Campbell (D) Court of Criminal Appeals; and Chuck Miller (D) Court of Criminal Appeals.

Elda Hart, administrator of Parmer County Community Hospital, revealed this week that she had been advised that the mobile breast imaging center (MBIC) service would be discontinued as of December 2, 1988.

This means that the mobile laboratory's last visit to Friona will be on Wednesday, November 16.

"We have been devastated to learn that this program will be discontinued. During the time that it has been offered, a number of ladies were examined who had questionable reports. Many have commented that if the service had not been available here, they would never have had it done. Who knows how many lives have been saved because of the mobile unit?" Ms. Hart commented.

Weather Continues Balmly

The beautiful fall weather continued to hold sway in the local area during the past week, with only one day, Sunday, October 30, coming anywhere close to normal.

Last Saturday registered a high of 80 degrees, and Thursday, November 3 rang in with an official high of 79 degrees.

There has still been no threat of a freeze, as the lowest temperature during the week was a 39. Cotton farmers say they are needing it to freeze so their cotton can be stripped.

While some cotton has been ginned, the crop is by and large too green, unless it has been defoliated.

San Angelo Man Wins Weekly Event

Eddie Mann of San Angelo was the winner in the ninth week of the Friona Star football contest.

While the presidential races have gained the most attention through the media, there are several other races which will draw voters' interest in Parmer County.

The race which has perhaps generated the most interest is the state senate race between Democrat Mel Phillips and Republican Teel Bivins. Both have campaigned in the county, especially Phillips, who has been seen locally several times since his announcement.

One is the U.S. Senate race, where challenger Beau Boulter is taking on incumbent Lloyd Bentsen, who is on the ballot twice, both in the senate race and as vice-presidential runningmate for Michael Dukakis.

Also, the U.S. Representative's race pits Larry Combest, the incumbent, against Gerald McCathern of Hereford. McCathern is expected to run well especially in Parmer County.

Of the state races, one with more than passing interest is that for Railroad Commissioner, unexpired term, where former Congressman Kent Hance of Dimmitt is opposed by Clint Hackney.

There are three propositions on the ballot. Number one would dedicate federally reimbursed highway funds for the purpose of acquiring right-of-way and constructing, maintaining and policing public roadways.

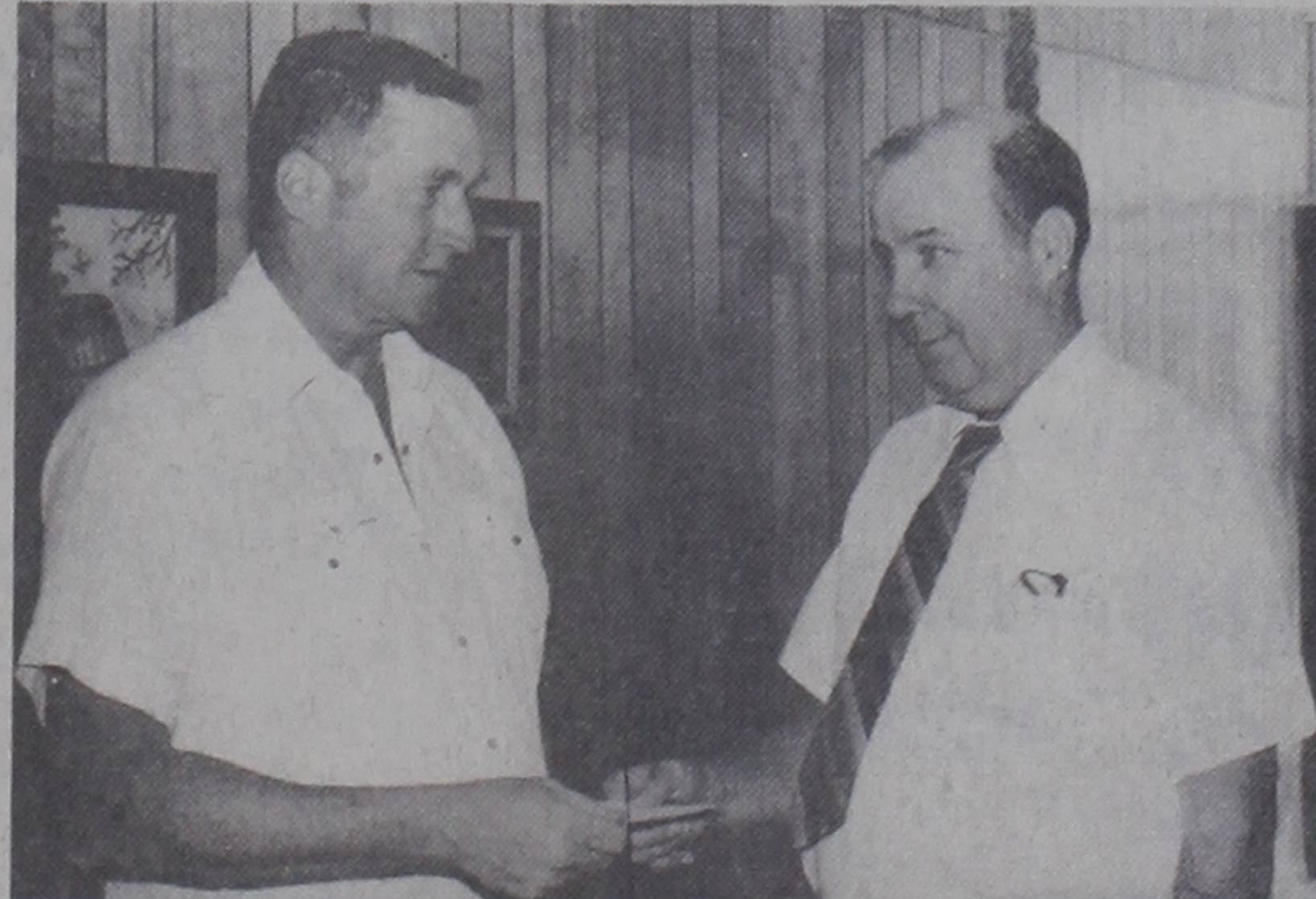
The second is to establish an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury to be used to offset unforeseen shortfalls in revenue.

The third proposed amendment would provide for the investment of the permanent university fund, the permanent school fund and public employee retirement systems in the Texas Growth Fund created by the amendment, to create, retain and expand job opportunities and economic growth.

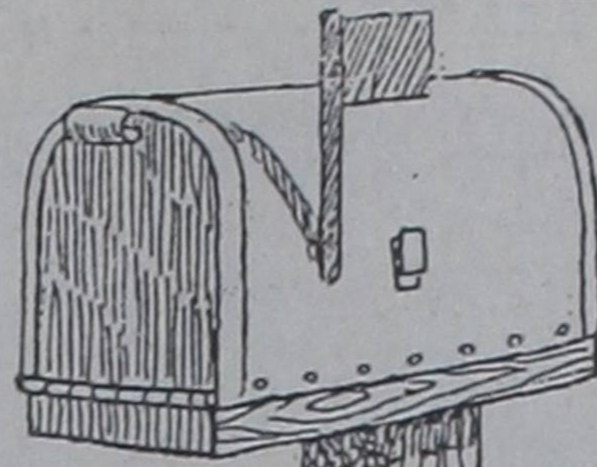

Letters To The Editor



Dear Editor,
In 1985, a farm bill was passed and designed to benefit the big commodity traders and merchants at the expense of farmers. This farm bill is also a Combest farm program. In 1985, on eight different occasions, Larry Combest voted against higher market prices for farm commodities and he voted for the current program.

Since the passing of the 1985 bill, U.S.D.A. figures show that over 2500 farmers have gone out of business per week. Figures also show that for every five farmers gone that one agri-business has gone.

The 1985 farm bill is government control of the farming industry. When we sign up in the program, all information goes into the government computers. U.S.D.A. has reported that the 1985 program has the largest

percentage of farmer participation of any previous program. Farmers are forced to participate to receive government payments.

On June 21, 1972, the U.S.D.A. gave a report before the 92nd Congress. It was published in Vol. 118 No. 101 in the Congressional Record. The report was titled "New Directions for U.S. Agricultural Policy." It recommended that farm policy disregard the incomes of farmers and be concerned only with assuring production. It planned a \$6 billion decline in farm income and speculated on the number of farmers dropping to 600,000 from 2.7 million of 1972.

The report stated that non-recourse loans would be reduced to a "disaster price" level for feed grains and wheat and to zero for all other commodities. It also stated that eliminating the parity ratio would be a major

improvement. The report further stated that given these conditions, agriculture cannot and should not be expected to provide employment opportunities sufficient to preserve the nations rural towns and communities. When this report was made in 1972, no one ever thought that the plans would ever be followed or implemented.

The under Secretary of Agriculture served as chairman to the committee that made and recommended this report. His name was Richard Lyng. Today, as Richard Lyng serves as the Secretary of Agriculture in 1988, he must feel very successful in watching the 1985 farm bill reach the goals of the U.S.D.A. young executives committee of 1972.

Let's all vote for a change in direction and vote for Gerald McCathern for Congress.

Gerald McCathern for Congress

Gerald McCathern's roots go deep in the 19th Congressional District. He and his wife Bonnie, were married in 1947 in Lubbock and moved to Midland after earning his degree in Petroleum Geology at Texas Tech. He worked as a geologist on wildcat oilwells throughout the Permian basin before moving to Hereford, buying a farm and establishing a long and successful career as a farmer and stockman. J. Osborn's Rites Held In Muleshoe

Memorial services for Jesse M. Osborn, 94, were held Monday at Muleshoe's First United Methodist Church, with the Rev. Richard Edwards, pastor, officiating.

Burial was in Bailey County Memorial Park, under the direction of Ellis Funeral Home.

Osborn died Thursday, October 27 in an Amarillo nursing home.

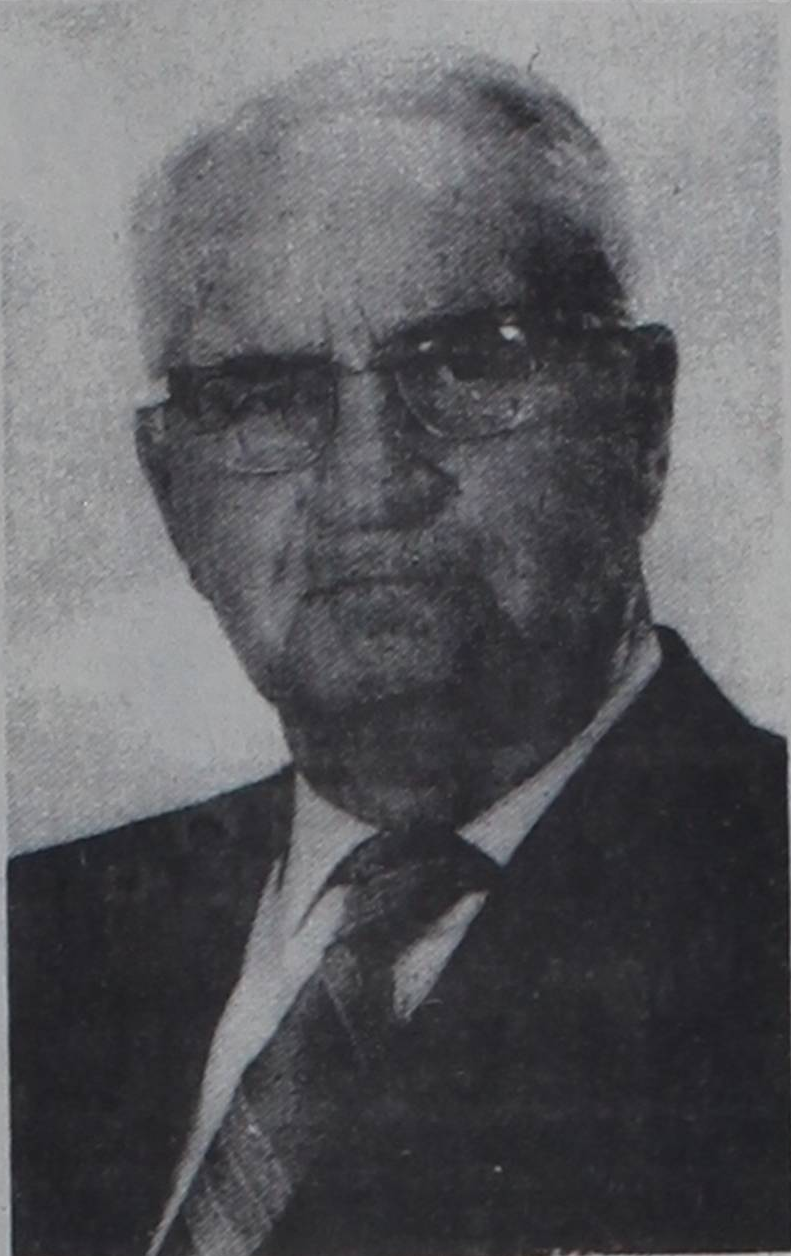
He was born August 4, 1894 in Okolona, Arkansas. In 1921, he came to Parmer County with his brother, Claude, and bought land near the New Mexico state line, where they engaged in farming.

Osborn was the first city commissioner for the City of Friona, and was employed by Friona State Bank during the 1920s. He moved to Muleshoe in 1931, where he was associated with Muleshoe State Bank, serving as its president from 1941 to 1963.

When a new state representative's district was created in 1952, composed of Bailey, Lamb, Parmer, Castro and Deaf Smith counties, Osborn was elected as the first representative, and served until stepping down in 1963, at which time Billy Clayton was elected.

Osborn married Grace M. Golden February 11, 1919 in Clark County, Arkansas. She preceded him in death January 7, 1978.

He was a member of the Texas Board of Mental Health and Retardation, and was instrumental in developing community-based centers for the retarded and

mentally ill.

He was a veteran of World War I, serving in the U.S. Army. He was a member of the Masonic Lodge at Muleshoe for over 50 years, was a member of the Khiva Shrine Temple in Amarillo and the Scottish Rite Masons. He was a life member of the American Legion.

Survivors include two daughters, Mary Sue Coleman of Portales, N.M. and Norma Lee Mayben of Houston; two sisters, Mrs. Ray Vickers of Hot Springs, Arkansas and Mrs. Floyd Kizzia of Delight, Arkansas; one brother, Clyde Osborn of Hope, Arkansas; four grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

He was preceded in death by two brothers, Sloan Osborn and Claude Osborn of Friona.

The family suggests memorials be made to the Jesse and Grace Osborn Endowment Fund, West Texas State University, P.O. Box 909, Canyon, Texas, 79016.

The program closed with the club sextet singing "Mary Stewart's Club Collect," music by Pearl Boyce Brown.



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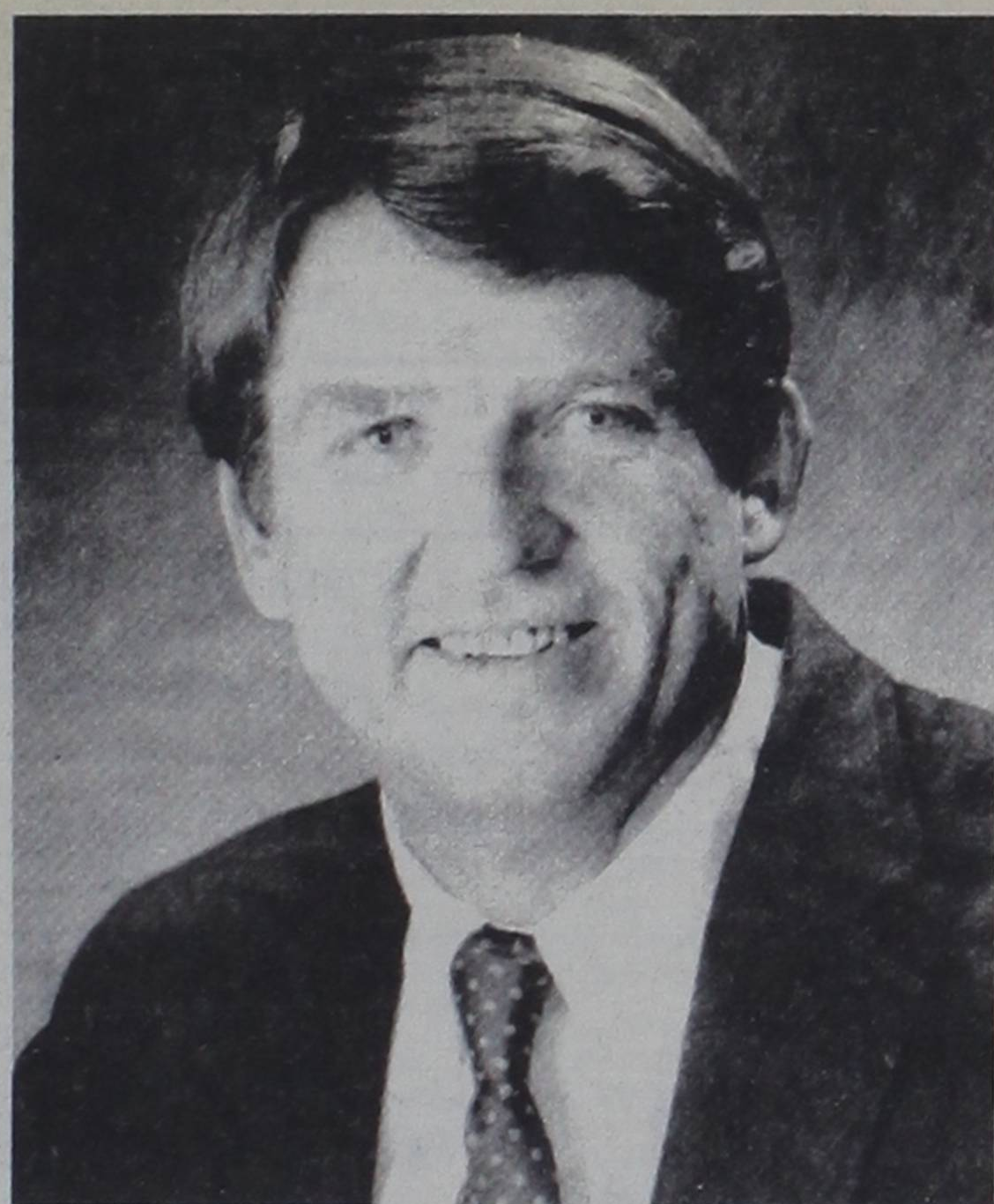

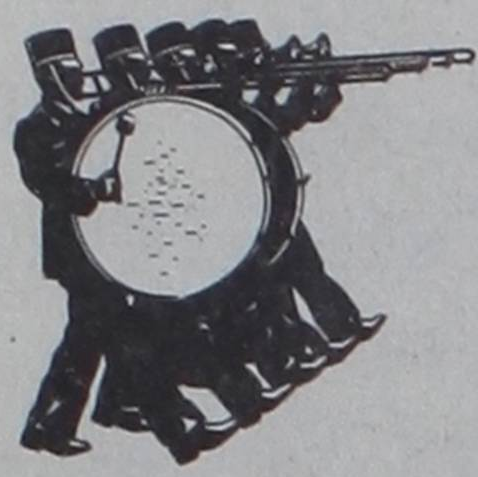

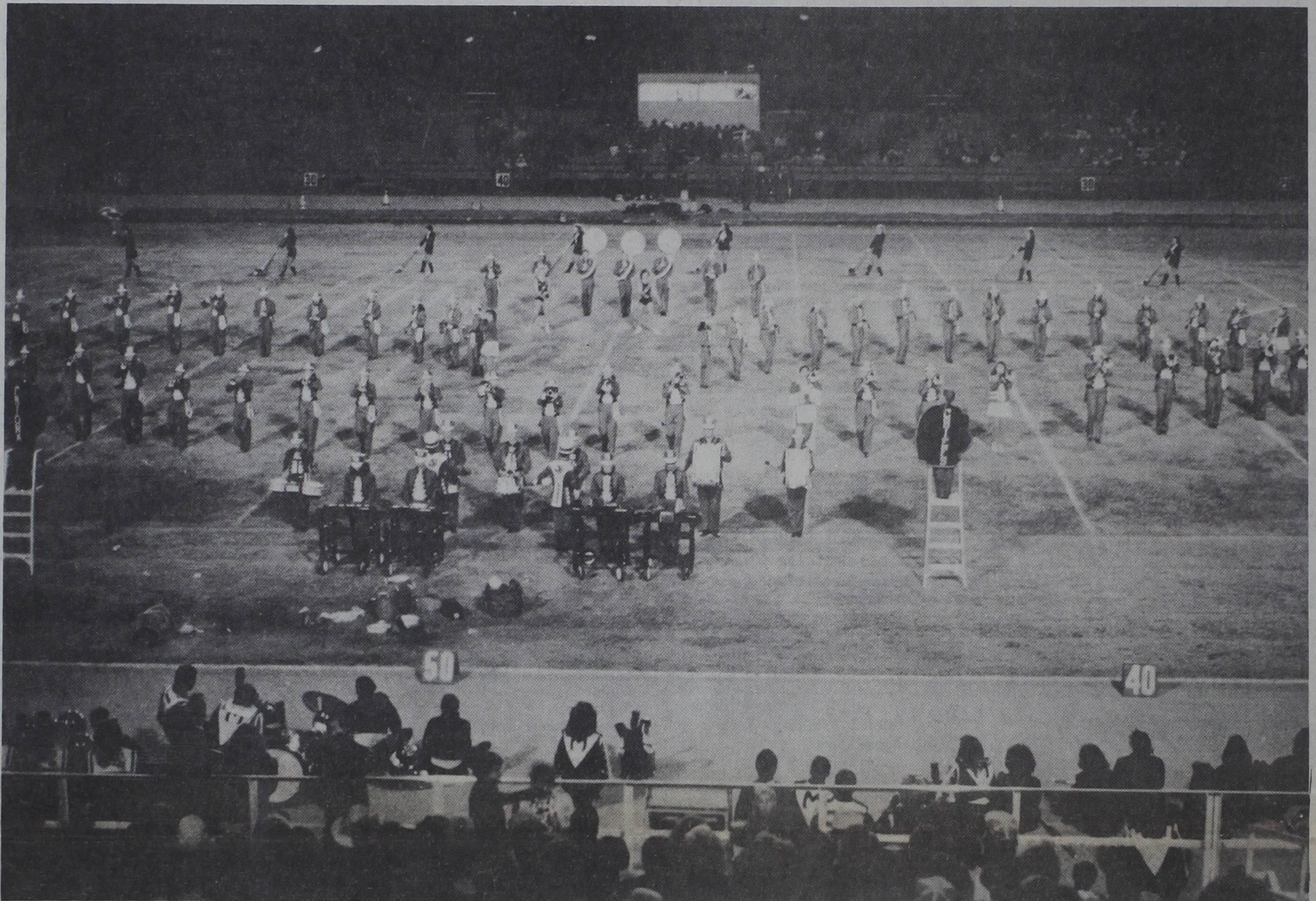
