NOTICE OF ELECTION

THE STATE OF TEXAS, }
COUNTY OF HOUSTON }

On this the 17th day of November, A. D. 1917, the commissioners' court of Houston county, Texas, being in regular session, came on to be considered the petition of T. H. Leaverton and more than fifty other persons praying that bonds be issued by the territory hereinafter described and designated as Road District No. Six of Houston county, Texas, in the sum of Twenty Thousand (\$20,000) Dollars, bearing five per cent rate of interest, and maturing at such times as may be fixed by the orders of this court, serially or otherwise, not to exceed thirty years from that date for the purpose of constructing, maintaining and operating macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof; and it appearing to the court that said petition is signed by more than fifty of the resident property tax paying voters of said Road District Number Six, and that the amount of said bonds to be issued will not exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of said Road District Number Six of Houston county, Texas, which is hereby designated and created as such Road District Number Six of Houston county, Texas, and which is described by field notes as follows:

BEGINNING on south boundary line of lower H. Orender survey where the same crosses I. & G. N. R. R. Thence north 75 east with the south boundary line of said H. Orender survey 1650 varas, stake for corner, also H. F. Kirkpatrick southwest corner. Thence north 75 east with Kirkpatrick's south boundary line 1340 varas to his southeast corner, also J. C. Donegan's southwest corner. Thence east 370 varas intersects J. H. Box's west boundary line. Thence north with the Box line 393 varas to his northwest corner. Thence east with Box's north boundary line 4300 varas to E. T. Allen's southeast corner. Thence north 1350 varas with line of E. T. Allen's and R. A. Gilmore survey to the northeast corner of the said Gilmore survey on the south boundary line of the R. Webb survey. Thence east with Webb's south boundary line 850 varas to his southeast corner. Thence north with Webb's east boundary line 630 varas to his northeast corner on Stephen Bennett's south boundary line. Thence east with Bennett's south boundary line 1310 varas to his southeast corner. Thence north with Bennett's east boundary line 3406 varas, corner on E. Gossett's south boundary line. Thence west 40 varas to E. Gossett's southwest corner. Thence north with E. Gossett's west boundary line 1344 varas to Stephen Rogers' southeast corner. Thence north with Stephen Rogers' east boundary line 3622 varas to Rogers' corner on J. M. Percilla's south boundary line 3300 varas, Percilla's southeast corner. Thence north with Percilla's east boundary line 5800 varas to his northeast corner. Thence west with Percilla's north boundary line 850 varas to John Durst's southwest corner. Thence north with Durst's west boundary line 2500 varas stake in the Anderson and Houston county line. Thence South 80 degrees 50 minutes west with said Houston and Anderson counties' line 12,750 varas to stake in the center of I. & G. N. R. R. Thence southward with the center of said railroad to

place of beginning.

It is therefore considered and ordered by the court that an election be held in said Road District Number Six in Houston county, Texas, on the 29th day of December, A. D. 1917, which is not less than thirty days from the date of this order, to determine whether or not the bonds of said Road District Number Six of Houston county, Texas, shall be issued in the sum of Twenty Thousand (\$20,000) Dollars bearing five per cent rate of interest and maturing at such times as may be fixed by the orders of this court, serially or otherwise, not to exceed thirty years from their date, and whether or not a tax shall be levied upon the property of said Road District Number Six of Houston county, Texas, subject to taxation for the purpose of paying the interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof at maturity. Notice of said election shall be given by publication in a newspaper published in said county for four consecutive weeks before the date of said election, and in addition thereto there shall be posted notices of such election at three public places in said Road District Number Six for three weeks prior to said election. Said election shall be held at the regular voting box at Grapeland Box No. One, which said voting box is situated in said Road District Number Six of Houston county, Texas, and the following named persons are hereby appointed managers of said election, viz: J. E. Hollingsworth and E. W. Davis. Said election shall be held under the provisions of Road District Act passed at the first called session of the 31st Legislature, and under the road district act passed by the regular session of the 35th Legislature, and only qualified voters who are property tax payers of said Road District Number Six of Houston county, Texas, shall be allowed to vote, and all voters desiring to support the proposition to issue bonds shall have written or printed on their ballots the words "For the issuance of the bonds and the levying of the tax in payment therefor," and those opposed shall have written or printed on their ballots the words "Against the issuance of the bonds and the levying of the tax in payment therefor." The manner of holding the said election shall be governed by the laws of the State governing general elections, and copy of this order signed by the County Judge of said county shall serve as a proper notice of said election and the County Judge is directed to cause said notices to be published in a newspaper published in said Houston county or in said Road District Number Six of Houston county, Texas, if there be a newspaper published therein, for four successive weeks next preceding said election, and cause to be posted a notice thereof at three public places in said Road District Number Six of Houston county, Texas, for three weeks prior to said election.

MAINTAINING ROADS

President Tax Payers Protective Association Suggests a Plan

To the Voters and Tax Payers of Houston County:

I suppose by this time you have found out what a fix the people of this county are in and what we are up against. We had a road and bridge fund of 15c that was not sufficient to keep up the road and bridge fund under the old law, for it was already over twenty-three thousand dollars behind. Still, under these conditions, your county officers, with the help of some high financiers, took over ten cents out of this fifteen cents and left you with less than five cents to do what fifteen cents could not do: keep up the roads and bridges; besides, you are left with an old debt of over seventeen thousand dollars to pay. Now, the same parties that did this and told you that your taxes would not be raised are trying to put this blame on the new law. Do you believe it? If so, you ought to be worked in the same old way again. The new law is the only one you have had passed for the protection of the tax payer. There is an effort on the part of these same parties to try and get in an amendment to our new law so as to allow our commissioners' court to issue deficiency warrants to pay off the old debt of seventeen thousand dollars. Are you silly enough to think this is the game? No, that is only a wedge to drive in to open the crib door so they can fix you again in the same old way. Now, when this old debt is paid, you still will have less than five cents to keep up the roads and bridges of the county, and it would not keep the top on the bridges. Now, we have to do something. Whether we want to raise our taxes or not, we will have to do so to protect the one hundred and ten thousand dollars we will have to pay. Would it be good business or good sense to let our roads go to waste after spending this much? The new law cuts out the jobs and the grafters. You can vote under the constitution a fifteen cents maintenance tax, and, in future, if the county wants to issue more bonds, she can do so, but under the new law, they can never sign your name to an obligation until you have voted on it. I have put this up to you so plain that a wayfaring man, though a fool, can understand it. The automobile tax, just as I predicted, is worth nothing to the county, only to keep up the Red River to the Gulf road, or other designated roads. You will remember, I called the turn on this over a year ago and before the law was passed. Now, my remedy for this condition is this: Let every commissioners' precinct not already in some special district organize into a road district and appoint their board of management, then vote a fifteen cents maintenance tax so they can keep their own funds in their own district, and at the same election let the county vote enough bonds to retire the old debt and enough more for road superintendent to buy at least six good mules and tools to be used all over the county, to be used with the road hands in every district, each district paying the expense for same while in use in their district. Now, this is a plain, business proposition. Will you ac-

Letter From H. A. Tyer

Milwaukee, Wis., Nov. 14, '17. Editor Messenger.

Some one has truthfully said, we cannot think of the beginning nor ending of time and space. It is said light travels 186,000 miles per second. A scientist tells us there are stars so remote or so far from the earth that a ray of light traveling at the rate of 186,000 miles per second would not reach the earth in a million years. Be that so or not, I do not know, but the fact of the matter is there is absolutely no end to space, and as for time the only definition for time is, time is a necessary relation. Time has always been and will always be. There is positively no beginning nor ending of time as well as space. A few days ago I was very forcefully reminded of the fact that time has always been here, as I stood on the bank of the granite quarry at Montello, Wis., and saw the workmen drilling, chiseling, blasting and hoisting granite out of that quarry. They have been quarrying there for nearly 50 years. They work a great number of men and they have dug or quarried quite a hole in this granite hill. The granite is in layers 8, 10, 30 ins. to 5 feet thick, and is as fine grade as one need wish to see, but the point I was trying to make is, how long did it take nature or time to arrange this and the answer came back, "I do not know, have no idea." The workmen have dug or quarried down well over 150 feet and over quite a big space, and the deeper they get the harder the granite. They have good tools to work with. I saw them drill a half inch hole in solid red granite 2 in. deep in 50 seconds. I saw them take a block of solid granite 4 feet thick and by drilling 4 or 6 little holes 2 inches deep and putting in small wedges and tapping the edges with a hammer cut or break these blocks just where they wished. Wonderful indeed, was the sight of these granite quarry men working, and as above stated, this quarry was opened up nearly 50 years ago, and from the looks of things there is enough granite there to keep 75 or 100 men working for the next 100 years or more. They are getting out grave stones, paving blocks, building stones, crushed granite for concrete work and crushed granite for making hard roads, and have all the orders they can possibly fill, and after summing it all up the story is it is the work of nature that put this mountain of granite there. But with reference to writing the story as to how long it has been there, time alone will have to wield the pen.

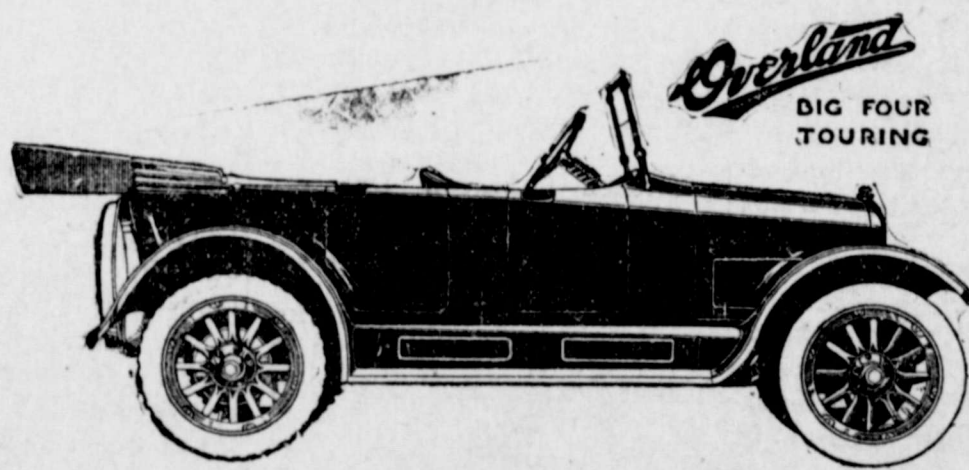

More About the Peanut Situation

By R. R. Claridge, State Department of Agriculture.

In getting a line on the supply of peanuts to the greatest extent possible in Texas, as well as by coaching the growers to cooperate in making up car shipments from less-than-car-lots in the hands of individual farmers, the State Department of Agriculture seems to have stirred up an exceedingly important matter.

Judging by correspondence received, the work is regarded as timely by farmers with less-than-car-lots of peanuts for sale, and who, by reason of inability to offer the trade in carloads, would be left only the alternative of selling, if sold at all, either to local buyers at much under carlot value, or wastefully feeding to stock, if they should have the stock. Even at \$1.50 per bushel, and present indications are that clean, heavy goobers will be worth more, there is great waste in feeding the entire plant.

As the crop is barely ready for market, there is yet time, by working through the agency of some one in town, for the growers to get together to load and sell; and when they are about it, they should see about peas in less-than-car-lots, because to a great extent, the situation as to peas is very much the same as it is with regard to peanuts. This reminds me that when there shall be a live working Farmers' Institute at every shipping station with a secretary paid to attend to such business, it will be better attended to.

Even when there is a local market for less-than-car-lots of peanuts, potatoes, peas, pigs and other farm products, the difference between carlot and less-than-car-lot prices would pay the cost of a business agent for the farmers and leave a profit. Besides, too often less-than-car-lots are not sold at all, the value to a great extent being lost to town and country. I am further reminded to say that right now it is not necessary to hunt for carlot buyers of peas or peanuts.

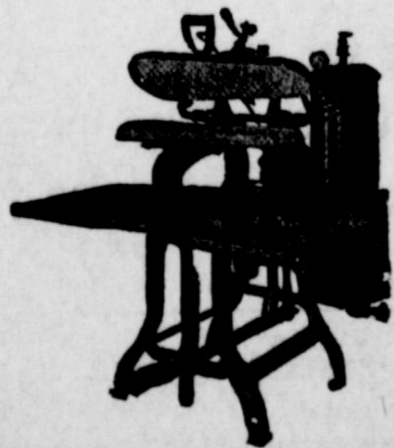

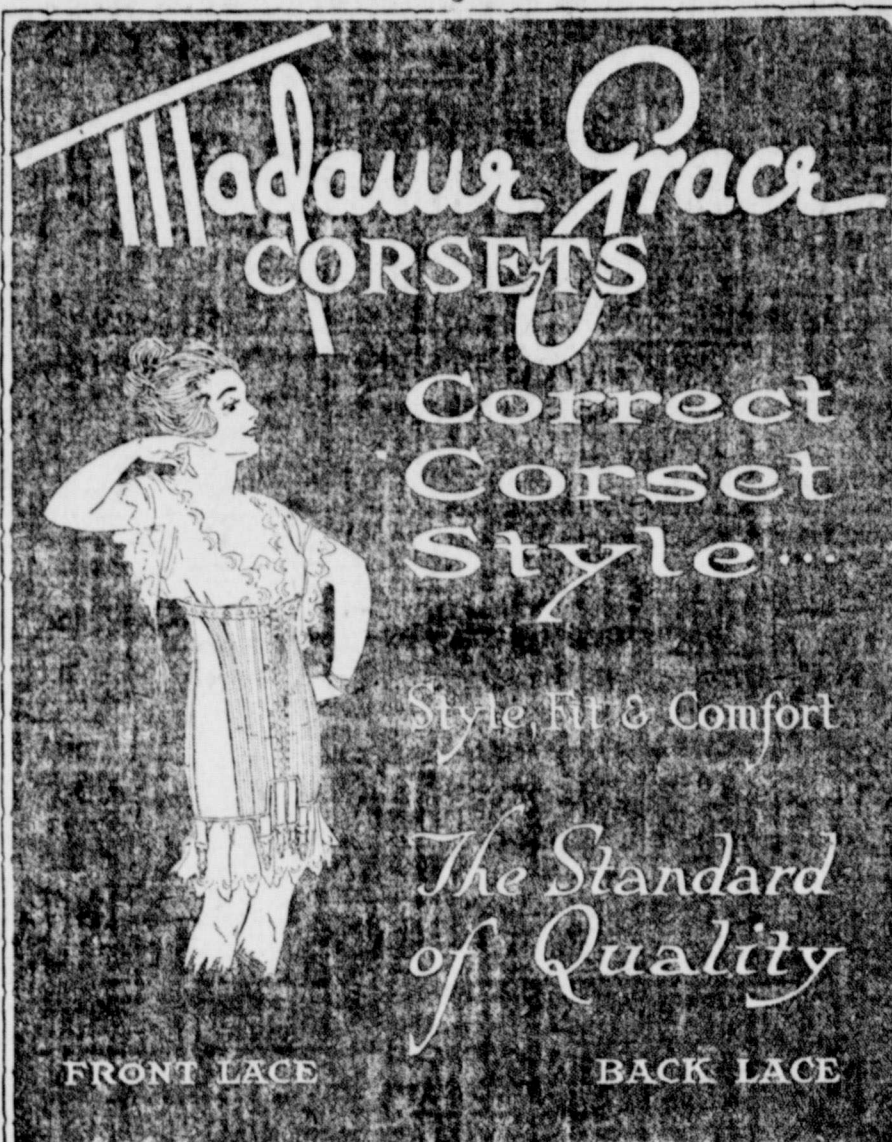
