When they arrive at the factory they are washed and rewashed and then ground into small bits and the juice is pressed out and the juice is boiled and from process to process it goes and after so many changes it is at last converted into sugar. At Menomenee Falls, Wis., is quite a beet sugar factory. I have seen inside quite a few factories, shops, etc., but I never saw a house of any kind filled so completely full of machiney as

this one.

It is a building about 100 feet wide and 400 feet long; part of it is two stories and part of it three stories and part of it four stories high and it is full of machinery from top to bottom, just little passways around in it.

I do not know how much sugar a ton of beets yields but some of the growers figured 250 to 300 pounds, but it requires a world of work after the seed is planted in the spring before the sugar is ready for use in the fall.

There is good money in raising sugar beets at \$8.00 per ton. I know one man who raised more than 400 tons this year besides his other crops and he had only one hired man to help him do the work. It seems to take a special soil to grow sugar beets successfully. Yours truly,

> War-savings stamps can be purchased for \$4.12 during the months of December, 1917, and January, 1918, but will cost 1 cent more for each succeeding month in the year 1918. They are redeemable on January 1, 1923, on 10 days' written notice after January 1, 1918, such certificates will be redeemed by postmasters at their cost to the purchaser plus 1 cent a month on each war-savings stamp. The thrift stamps do not bear interest.

The stamps and certificates can be obtained from postoffices, banks, or trust companies, at most railroad stations, stores, factories, and many other public places.






