Temp Drops Below 32°

The temperature finally dropped below the freezing level on two mornings during the past week, although a killing freeze has not been experienced generally in the area.

When the mercury dipped to 31 degrees on Saturday, November 5, it was the first sub-freezing temperature since last April 11, which meant a growing season of virtually seven months for 1988.

Local Voters Give Edge To Republican Candidates

Friona and Parmer County pretty well followed the voting trend for the rest of the region on Tuesday, giving an overwhelming edge to the Bush-Quayle ticket in the presidential race.

The local precincts also gave margins to Teel Bivins, Larry Combest, Beau Boulter and Kent Hance in their races.

Parmer County went for Bush-Quayle by a 73-27 per cent margin, 2061 for Bush and 764 for Dukakis.

In the three Friona voting precincts, the Bush ticket carried, 751 votes to 241 for Dukakis, a 76-24 per cent landslide for the new president-elect.

In the race for the state senate, pitting Teel Bivins against Mel Phillips, Parmer County gave Bivins about the same margin that he won the race by area-wide. His margin here was 1660-1079, or about 60-40.

Phillips' only precinct win in Parmer County was in the Black precinct, by a 25-24 margin.

Parmer County voters also gave a good margin to former Dimmitt neighbor Kent Hance in his race for the Railroad Commission. Hance polled 2050 votes to 662 for

Clint Hackney, a margin of 75.6-24.4 for Hance.

Hance, who has always run well in Friona and Parmer County, was given a 747-197 win in the three Friona boxes, a whopping 79.1-20.9 edge.

County voters also went for Larry Combest in his successful reelection bid, 1511 votes to 1254 for Gerald McCathern. McCathern scored wins at Black, 32-16, Friona-2, 86-76, Lazbuddie, 140-100 and Lakeview, 57-25.

The county also went in favor of Panhandle native Boulter in his bid to unseat Lloyd Bentsen in the U.S. Senate race, by 1490-1286, 53.7-46.3 per cent.

In the Friona precincts, Boulter won, 566-400, or 58.6-41.1.

Parmer County gave Railroad Commissioner Jim Nugent the majority in his bid for re-election over Ed Emmett, 1521-1051.

Tom Phillips was favored for Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, 1821-793 over Ted Robertson. Paul Murphy, GOP candidate for Supreme Court Justice, place 1, was favored, 1462-1153 over Lloyd Doggett.

Nathan Hecht received the county voters' backing for

Supreme Court Justice, place 2, over Bill Kilgarlin, 1411-1118. Charles Ben Howell, GOP candidate for Supreme Court Justice, place 3, won over Raul Gonzalez, 1405-1083.

Jack Hightower, former state senator, was given the edge in his race for Supreme Court Justice, place 4, over Barbara Culver, 1483-1210. Eugene Cook, candidate for court justice, place 5, won over Karl Bayer, 1427-1020.

Mike McCormick, Democratic incumbent for presiding judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, won over David A. Berchermann, 1276-1150. Charles Campbell, judge of the court of criminal appeals, place 1, beat Egon Tausch, 1552-43.

Tom Rickhoff, GOP candidate for judge of the court of Criminal Appeals, place 2, won over Chuck Miller, 1240-1112.

In the race for member of the State Board of Education, District 15, GOP candidate Monte Hasie, who received backing from the local school board, won in the county, 1369-1079, and in Friona precincts, 546-310, or 63.8-36.2.

County Democratic candidates were elected without much opposition. Commissioner Robert

In the race for grand prize, Eddie Mann scored a 15 for the week and continued to pace the standings with a score of 147 points with three weeks remaining.

Jerry Bentley and Charlie Morgan are next with scores of 144, followed by Jack Clark, Dianne Morgan and Mitchell Smiley at 143.

Thursday, November 17.

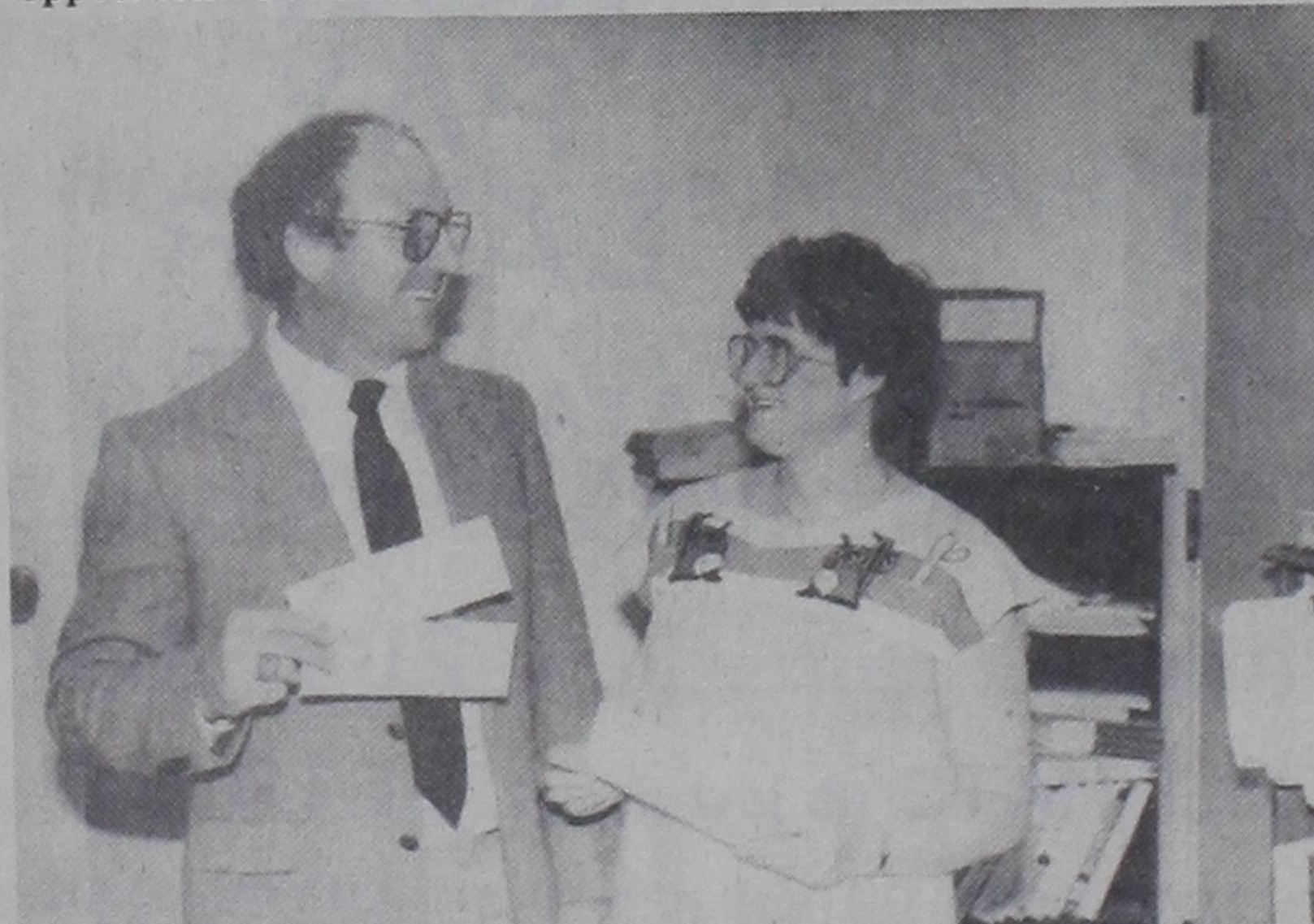
All 25 appointments for the Wednesday visit by the MBIC have been filled, and officials with the mammography program said that the unit would stay an extra day if enough appointments are secured.

"Apparently there have not been many people write letters or contact the officials at St. Anthony's Hospital, in regard to termination of the program," Ms. Hart said.

It was hoped that a public outcry might carry some weight in getting the MBIC program continued even though St. Anthony officials announced that the service would be discontinued as of December 2, 1988.

Ms. Hart indicated that a number of women have been referred to physicians for further examinations as a result of taking part in the mammography program.

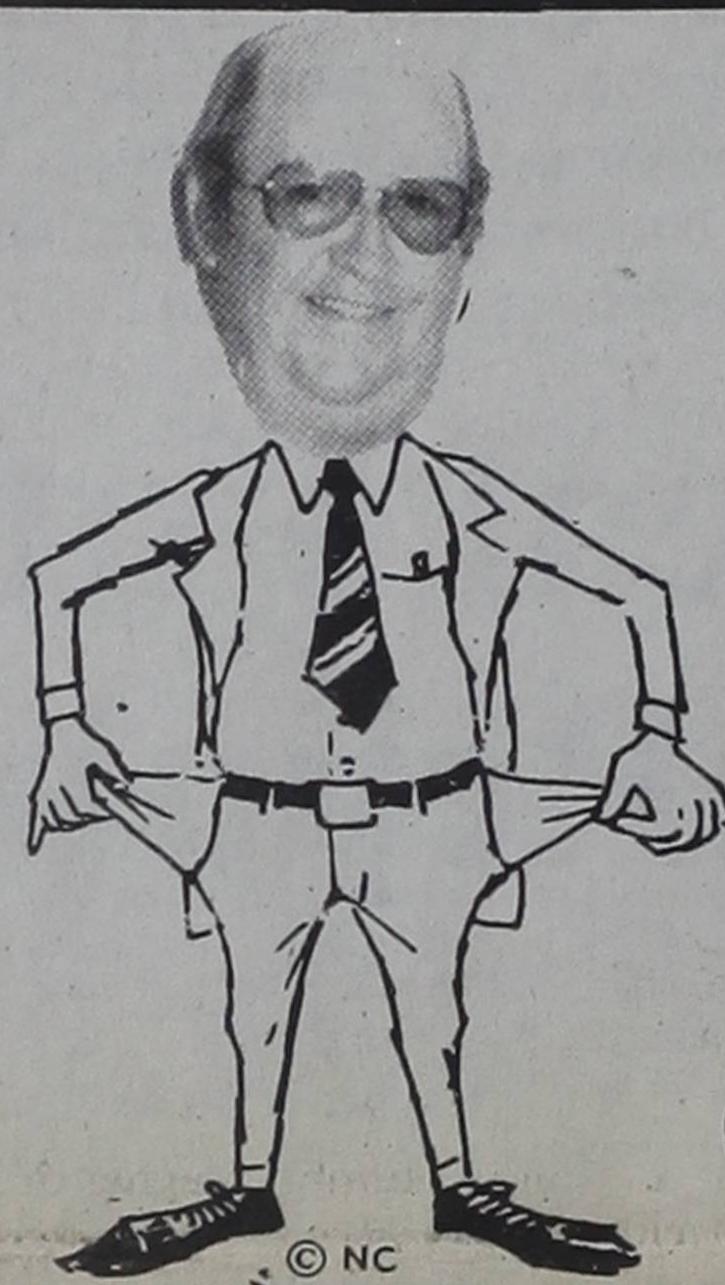

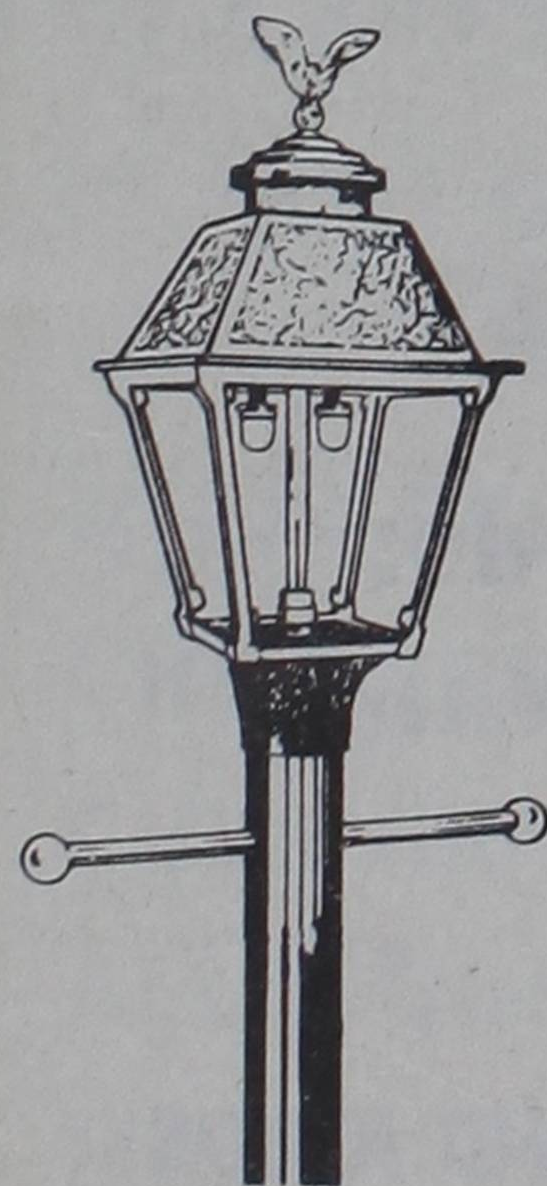

Outland has attended school locally since kindergarten. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Hank L. Outland, Jr.

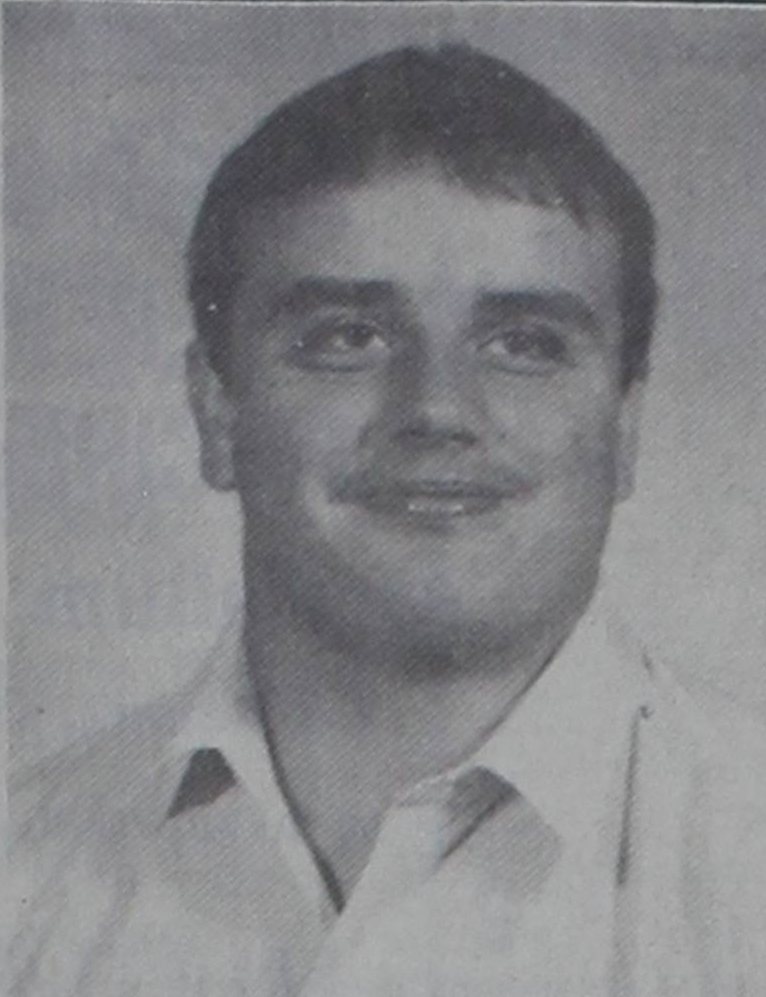

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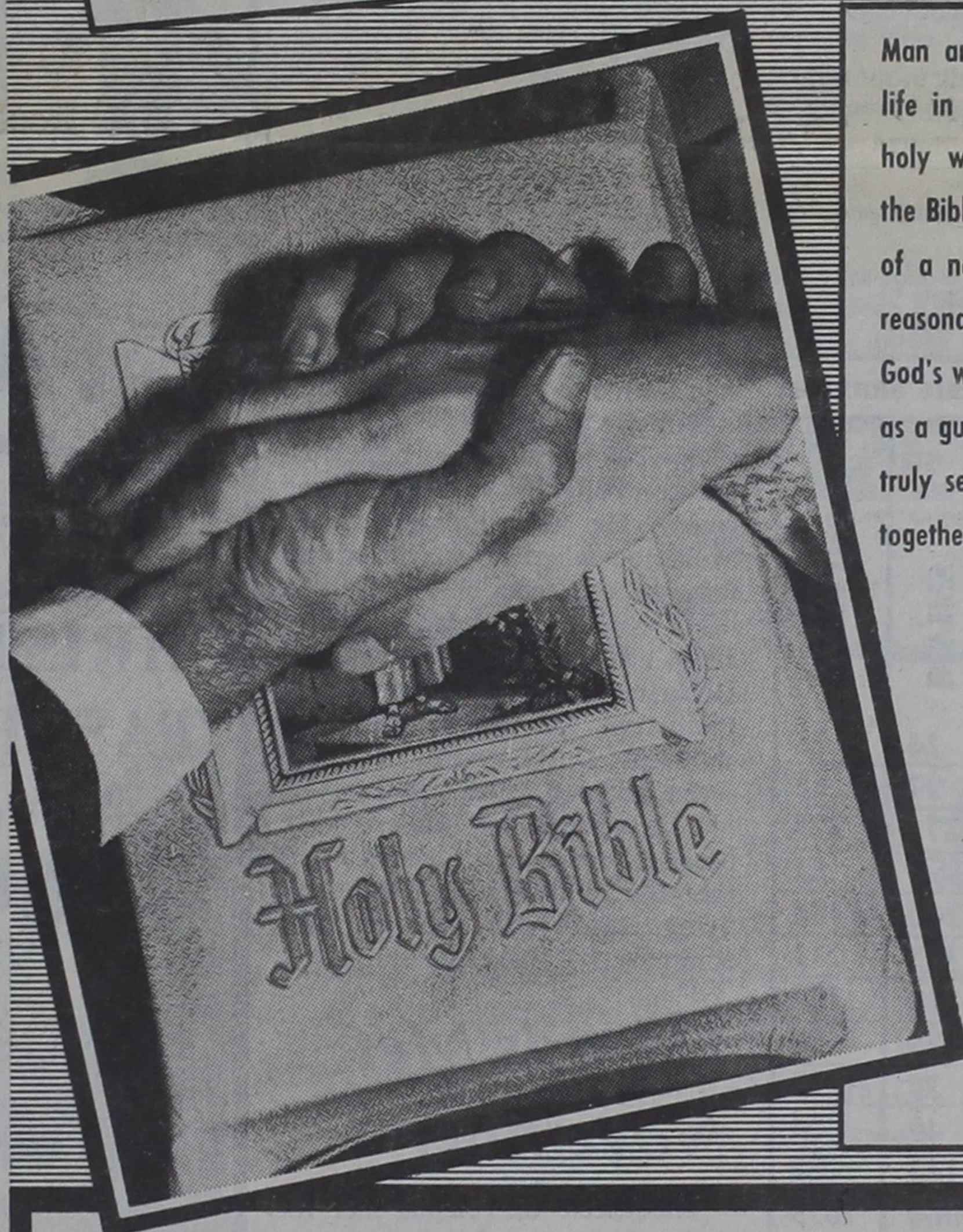
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The TIE that Binds...

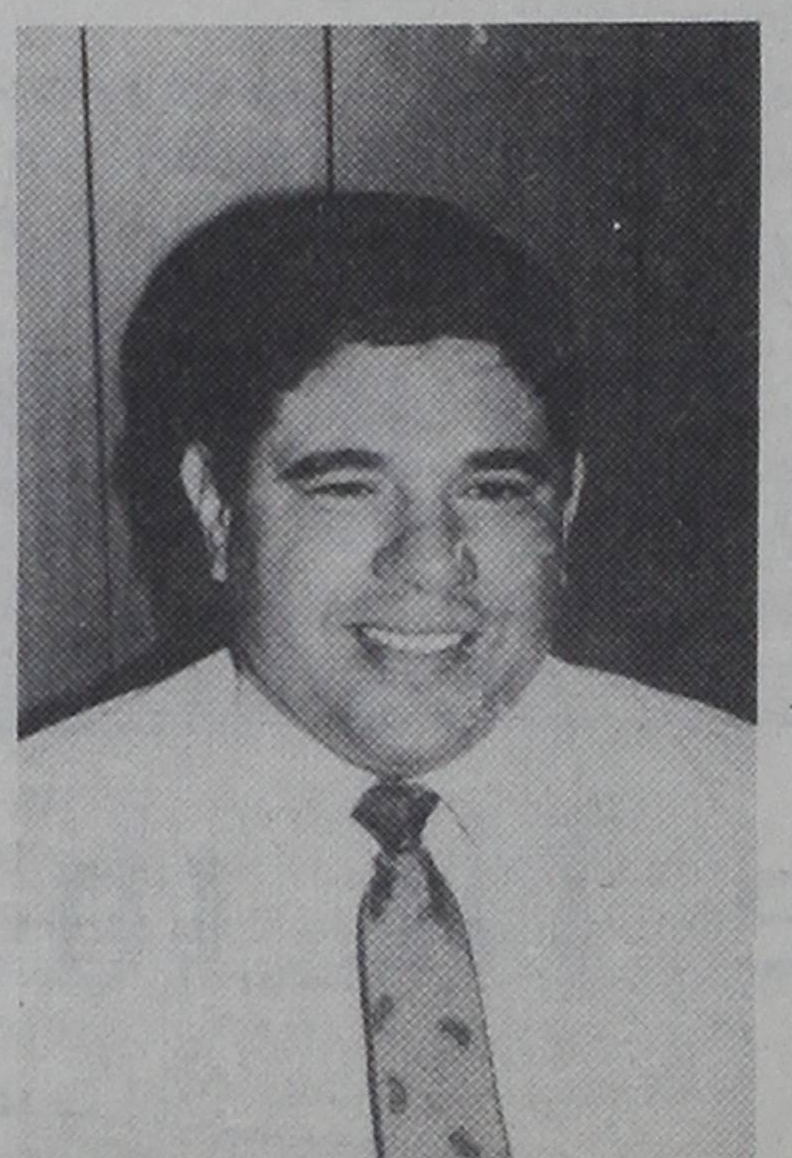
The first one read: "Don't fret! Look up. Take Courage!"

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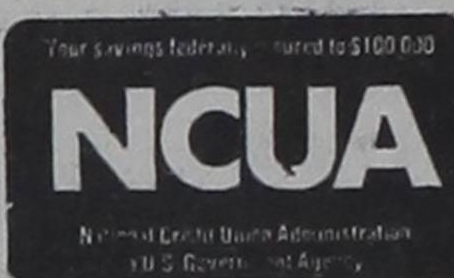

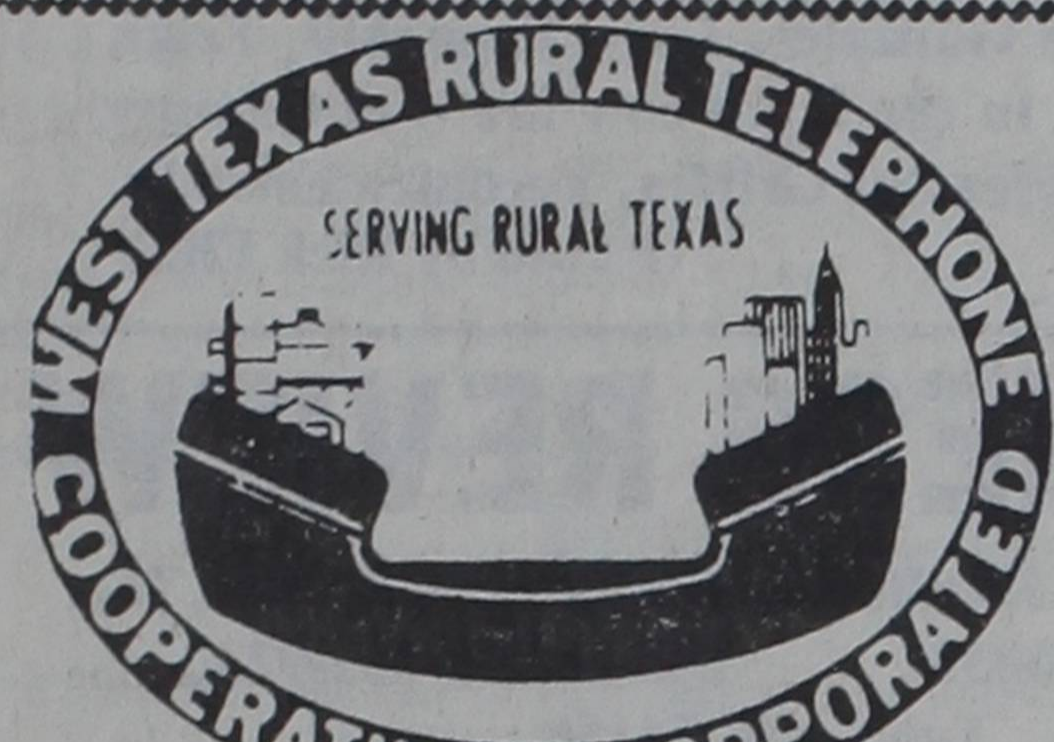

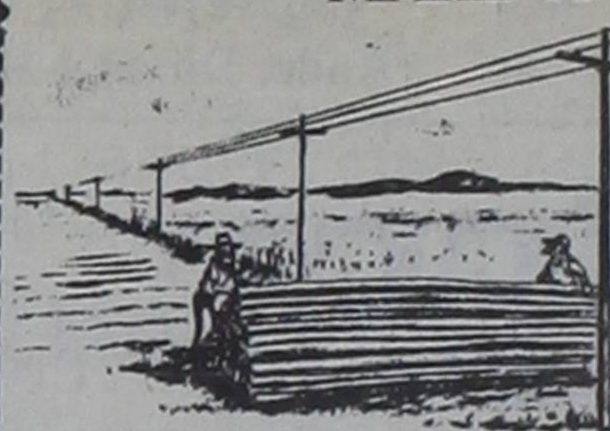

Chieftains Fall To 'Winds In Finale

Friona's Chieftains played on even terms with the tough Floydada Whirlwinds for a half, but the 'Winds finally put it to the Chiefs in a big second half to score a 30-6 win in the final game of the 1988 season at Floydada last Friday.

The Chieftains had held the Whirlwinds scoreless until only four seconds before halftime, and Floydada only scored then after a fluke pass play with eight seconds left. But Floydada broke out of their shell in the second half.

"They finally wore us down. That was the hardest-hitting game we have played all year," stated Coach Tommy Moss, and illustrated his point by showing the writer the game film where fullback Ben Osborn had the earpiece knocked out of his helmet, he was hit so hard by the Floydada defensive man.

Floydada was playing the game with their number one quarterback for the first time since district play began. Chad Quisenberry missed the first four district games with an injury, and Coach Moss said that definitely caused the Whirlwinds to miss the playoffs.

In Floydada's loss to Tulia, for instance, both Floydada's first string and backup quarterbacks were hurt.

Friona moved the ball well in the first half, but only once was able to put together as many as two straight first downs.

And the Chieftain defense was denying the potent Floydada offense. Floydada was held to only ten net yards in the first quarter and not a single first down.

In fact, the Whirlwinds still had only had 27 yet yards and only one first down when they put together a frantic rally before halftime.

Floydada got a 41-yard run, where Cody Bracken saved a touchdown with a tackle.

But on fourth down, the 'Winds hit a lucky pass that carried down to the Friona eight with only eight seconds left on the clock. Frank Suarez booted a field goal to give the home team a 3-0 lead at

halftime.

Floydada then took control of the game in the second half. A 70-yard run by Jesse Suarez on Floydada's fourth play in the third quarter, plus a 25-yard touchdown pass three minutes later helped Floydada open up a 16-0 lead.

The Chieftains struck back when Cody Burney returned the kickoff to the Chieftain 33 and Floydada got a 15-yard penalty for a personal foul.

On third down Burney rifled a pass toward the speeding Jacky Lafuente who was running up the right sidelines. Lafuente caught the pass at full speed, and went in for the touchdown. The play covered

48 yards.

Burney tried a pass for two points which fell incomplete, but Friona had made the score 16-6 with 3:51 left in the quarter.

Floydada answered with touchdown runs of 38 and 17 yards in the fourth quarter to nail down the victory.

When Suarez made his 70-yard run in the third quarter, Friona had limited the Whirlwinds to only 70 yards on the ground to that point.

Osborn paced the Friona offense with 101 carries on 23 attempts. That pushed the Chieftain running back to 1,027 yards for the season.

Linebacker David Bugg, along with Paul Trimmell, Louis Dunnam and Bennie Trevino played outstanding defense for the Chieftains, especially in the first half when they surprised the favored Whirlwinds by giving them everything they wanted and then some.

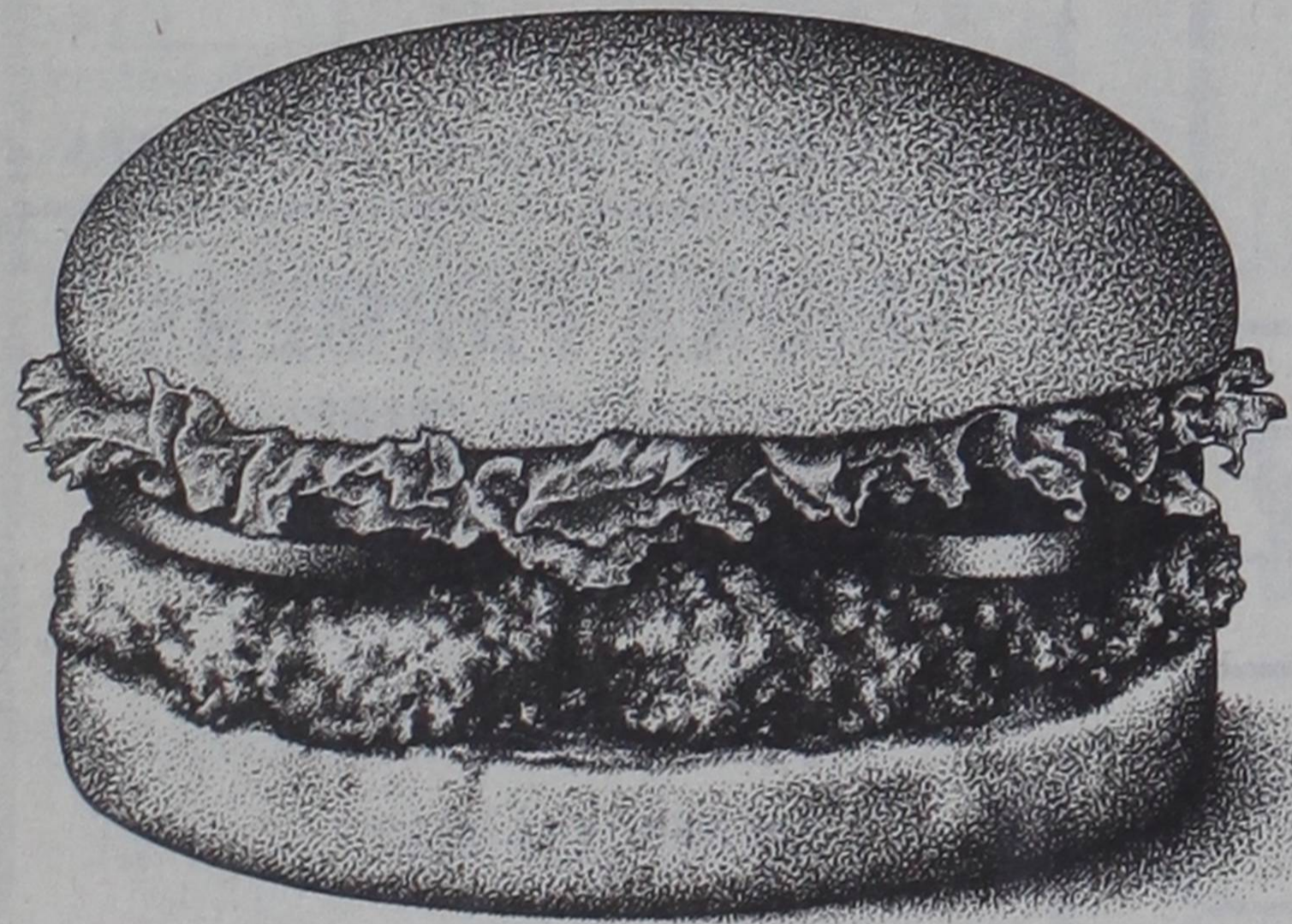
