A FEW WAR RECIPES
Compiled by the Snake Editor for Messenger Reader3
The papers have recently been pretty well filled up with various recipes for wheatless, meatless and eatless war menus, and the "snake editor" feels called upon to provide a few for the columns of the Messenger which, he trusts, will be tried by many of the paper's readers, and he guarantees that they will be found as appetizing as many of the recipes with which our contemporaries have been burdened.
Trench Mortar Pound Cake
One teacup full wagon-grease, one-half teacupful of sweeping compound, two teacupfuls yellow pine sawdust, one tablespoonful of vasaline, salt, pepper, mustard and ginger to taste. Cream together the wag-on-grease and the sweeping compound, sift together the other ingredients and mix. Bake one-half day in hot oven.

## Aviation Soup

Boil one pair of old boots until tender, add a pair of leather gloves minced fine, boil together for thirty minutes. Before removing from the fire add onehalf pint whale oil. Serve hot. This deicate dish has esteemed by several arctic exploring expeditions.

## Apparition Soup

Hang a beef bone from which the meat has carefully and completely been removed in such a position that the shadow will fall on a kettle of cold water for at leastfifteen minutes. (If an unusually rich soup is desired it may be permitted to hang for thirty minutes.) Then heat the water to a temperature of about 95 degrees, being careful that, it does not get too hot, season with garlic and Chile pepper, let it get somewhat cool and serve. This is an old time boarding house favorite.

Not only is there a flock of poultry on nearly every farm in the country, but in towns and cities flocks are not rare. With the present high price of eggs even a more general interest should be taken in poultry raising. Too frequently the home flock consists of a mixture of breeds. Pure-bred poultry are more profitable.

## A MESSAGE FROM FRANCE

## Spirit of This War Pictured by French Schoolgirl in Letter Received by John H. Finley.

$T$ HIS letter is one of the many messages which have been received from the schools of France in response to the messages from American universities and schools, carried to them by John H. Finley, Commissioner of Education and President of the University of the State of New York. It is reproduced here and comes from a pupil in the Lycee Victor Durny in Paris, which he visited last May, and there heard the pupils singing "The Star Spangled Banner" in French and crying in chorus, pression of that which separates the men in the opposing trenches or of that which brings America and France together.
"It was only a little river, almost a brook; it was called the Yser. One could talk from one side to the other without raising one's voice, and the birds could fly over it with one sweep of their wings. And on the two banks there were millions of men, the one turned toward the other, eye to eye. But the distance which separated them was greater than the stars in the sky; it was the distance which separates right from injustice.
"The ocean is so vast that the sea gulls do not dare to cross it. During seven days and seven nights the great steamships of America, going at full speed, drive through the deep waters before the lighthouses of France come into view; but from one side to the other hearts are touching.'
