PEACE NOT NEAR
The unofficial report that Germany has made suggestions for a peace conference to the Spanis government is followed by a statement of Germany's alleged basis of negotiations.
Whether the imperial governmont has made such suggestion 3 is not a matter of the slighest importance, for the simple reason that the entente allies can not negotiate for peace upon any basis of compromise.
The sacrifices have been too great to admit of anything less than proceeding to a definite conclusion and reaching the peace of an unconditional surrender by the Teutonic alliance. The entente allies have the power to reach a complete decision, and they are committed to that task. The babies of today must not be called into the field, under less favorable circumstances, perhaps, a quarter of a century hence to repeat these sacrifices.
The Hohenzollerns and Hapsburgs, by which is meant autoc-
racy, must pass from the earth racy, must pass from the earth
forever before the entente sword forever before the entente sword
can be sheathed. The militaristic spirit in Prussia must be crushed out and the proper measures taken to prevent the recrudescence.
The restoration and rehabilitation of Belgium and Northern France is imperative. The vandal hand that destroyed them must restore them
The restoration of Poland complete automony is a sine qua non of peace. Not one inch the territory of any other pooplo can
clutches.
As for the future of the Balkans, it will be decided by the friends of the Balkan peoples. Germany will not be permitted to sit in conference upon any matters except those relating directly to her
The Russian and Rumanian peace treaties, signed by the victims of German brutality under pressure, will not be permitted to stand, but both countries 3 will be released to pursue a constructive policy of rehabilitation and self-determination.

No better illustration of his belief that it is going to be a long-drawn out struggle could be asked for than the provisions of the new fortification bill. It con templates an ordnance program far beyond anything that most civilians have conceived. It calls for several billion dollars to be for several billion dollars to be

be light field pieces. These, it is expressly stated, are to $b$ used on German infantry while a number of 10,12 and 14 -inch cannon will be used in battering down German fortifications on the frontier and along the Rhine

There is no doubt we shall come to that task, and master it. When? Nobody knows. The guns will be produced as The guns will be produced as
rapidly as possible, though it is not expected that some of the orders will be filled for two years. But mo matter when, it gives the Kaiser two big facts to put in his pipe and smoke. One is the unprecedented speed with which we have rushed more than a mi:lion men to France - the beginning of our war. The begre is ning of our war. The other is the ordering of these seige guns for delivery next year and the year after that and the year after that-and more years if necessary, until the last German defense is battered down and the American flag flies in Berlin.

The man or woman who believes that the world is growing better are the ones who are helping to make it so.

## GERMANS ARE STILL

PURSUED BY ALLIES
London, July 29.--The German etreat is continuing along the whole line, the allies closely in pursuit, according to news from the fighting area in the Sois-sons-Rheims salient received up to noon.
The Germans have succeeded in checking to a certain extent, but not in stopping, the French advance.
The French are on the north bank of the Ourcq and to the east they have secured the whole road between Rheims and Dormans The Germans are stubbornly re isting and are burning vill reHeavy fighting is Heavy fighting is still in pro gress to the south of Soissons, in the neighborhood of Buzacy. So far the French have made no progress there. Villages beween Soissons and Bazoches, about fourteen miles to the east, are on fire, leading to the belief that the Germans may intend a further retreat.
Since Sunday the allies have dvanced between allies have miles on a 20 -mile front.
The enemy has definitely abandoned the line of the Ourcq and here is little doubt now that he will go back beyond the Vesle to the line 30 miles long between Soissons and Rheims, which is probably well entrenched and has good lines of communication. The German retirement has been quite orderly and deliberate. So far the taking of only four guns has been roported
The Americans, particularly in the Fere-en-Tardenois sector, are pressing the Germans very vigorously.
