### THEO. ROOSEVELT DIED LAST MONDAY

Oyster Bay, N. Y., Jan. 6. Colonel Theodore Roosevelt died in his sleep early today at his home on Sagamore Hill in this village. Death is believed to have been due to rheumatism which affected his heart.

The colonel suffered a severe attack of rheumatism and sciatica on New Year's day, but none believed his illness would likely prove fatal. The former president sat up most of Sunday and retired at 11 o'clock last night. About 4 a. m. Mrs. Roosevelt, who was the only other member of the family at Oyster Bay went to her husband's room and found that he had died during the night.

The immediate cause of Colonel Roosevelt's death probably was pulmonary embolism or lodgment of the lung of a clot from a broken vein, it was stated by ne of the physicians.



Dear Papa:

I received your letter of October 21st and was real glad to hear from you once more and to know that everything is still getting of them. There are a great along alright at home. You have no doubt read a great many descriptions of this place and it fills all descriptions I have seen of it. It is a gigantic house built on the slope of a picturesque hilly plateau and at one time was the home of a grand duke of France. I heard while I was there that the owner had returned and he must be about a billion-"franc" aire to keep us such a majestic estate for it is complete in every detail from servants' quarters to a great golf course. It is temporarily the home of his excellency, the "American Doughboy." It was one of the most strategic points of the coming drive and of course, the Fifth Division took it. It was, by the way, an objective for the French who failed to take it and so the Fifth took it for them. In fact, the "5th" has been cited several times, and if I can, I will send you a copy of our citations from G. H. Q. and you can see then what you think of us and our work.

### NO IMMEDIATE DIS-CHARGES GRANTED

No men of the 18th, or Cartus Division, or usual Camp units, such as Quartermaster Corps, Utilities, Base Hospital, etc., stationed at Camp Travis, Texas, are being discharged from the service at this time. This statement comes from headquarters of the Camp owing to the fact that hundreds of letters are being received by the Commanding General seeking release of soldiers.

The false impression appears to have spread that the army was to be immediately demobilized following the signing of the Armistice. It is not the intention of the War Department to include men serving in Divisions from the 8th to 20th, inclusive, in the general demobilization plans. These soldiers, and those of the Camp Units, it is pointed out, have as important duties to perform as those in Pershing's Army of Occupation in Germany.

About 11,000 soldiers at Camp Travis have been discharged to date, but these are nearly all from the 165th Depot Brigade, Independent and the Camp Units mentioned are likely to have several months service ahead of them .- From Camp Publicity Officer.

The department of justice, it is stated at Washington, will recommend to congress that most of the enemy aliens now interned be deported after the war. It is a suggestion that will meet very general approval.

Many of these enemy aliens did everything in their power to injure America and to aid Germany. They outraged the nation's hospitality, made themselves a public menace and tried to ruin the country that had given them a haven and a living. The nation's safely demanded their internment and if any criticism is due to authorities for the manner of their treatment it is that these enemies were handled with altogether too great leni-

The ending of hostilities does not detract anything from the guilt of these interned offenders. They were confined because they were dangerous, but internment has not lessened their guilt. In most cases their release would mean the turning loose upon their respective communities of men whose offenses were too grave to be erased by a few months' confinement.

These offenders have canceled whatever obligation the country might otherwise feel toward them. They have forfeited the nation's respect by violating its confidence. By word and deed they demonstrated that they preferred another country to America. Now let them be sent back to the country of their love where they belong.-Cleveland Plain Dealer.
