A LIGHT AND ICE PLANT FOR GRAPELAND

That proposition is squarely up to the citizens in this community. From time to time the Messenger has stressed the need of such an institution, but it seems that up to now our appeals have fallen upon deaf ears. But the question has been again brought into discussion, and those behind it now say they are going to bring it to pass. It is proposed to organize a stock company with local capital, and many prominent citizens have signified their willingness to take stock in such an enterprise.

We badly need it. If Grapeland is to push forward and grow and be the town it can or should be we must have modern and up-to-date conveniences. We have no statistics available as to the amount of ice consumed here in a season, but it is considerable—enough we are sure, to justify the erection of a plant. Another factor in favor of a local plant, is that ice could be manufactured and distributed cheaper than by shipping it in here by the car load. Hence, consumption would be greater.

There is no use to call your attention to the convenience of electric lights in your home, and the many uses to which electricity can be put. The three gins here, which consume almost an unbelievable amount of wood each season, could probably be induced to use power from a light plant.

We hope those who are agitating such a proposition will "keep grinding" and be successful. It will mean much in the advancement of our community.

CAVALRY INSPECTION

Notice has been received at headquarters of Troop M, 7th Texas Cavalry, that they will receive federal inspection at 9:00 a. m., February 21, Col. S. B. Arnold, Federal Inspector.

This inspection is prepatory to this Troop's receiving their full complement of uniforms, guns, pistols and sabres and one pltoon of horses, thirty two horses in all, which will be kept in Crockett. All towns of any note in Texas will maintain a National Guard Company and Crockett will be one of them.

The matter of discharge for those desiring it will be taken up at this meeting, immediately after the inspection.

U. S. EMPLOYMENT AGENCY

Department of Labor as Employment Agent for Houston County to get jobs for returned sailors and soldiers, services of the department being FREE. I will be glad to find you your own kind of job, either in Houston County, Texas or the United States if you will merely register with me, stating your needs. Employers needing labor are invited to phone, write or tell me their needs.

I have had a call from a Houston County saw mill man who wants forty saw mill men, wages from \$2.00 to \$5.00 per day. He also wants fifteen men with teams to haul logs. If this kind of job suit you, let me know and I will put you in touch with him.

I will appreciate it if everyone in Houston County will help me register returned sailors and soldiers. Those that already have jobs will confer a favor upon the Department if they will register also, as the Department is anxious to know the condition of the labor market.

Highway construction was held up all over the country while the war was in progress. With more trucking tions of Respect, Obituaries and Cards and motoring and hauling than ever of Thanks are charged for at regular before, and with repair work scarcely kept up, the roads in most places have deteriorated.

There is growing dissatisfaction with the old policy of piecemeal road construction. Pennsylvania has voted for a bond issue of \$50,000,000 for highways, and Illinois for one of \$60,000,000. There is a movement in Montana for a \$100,000,000 bond issue. The question has come up in the present legislature for a bond issue of \$75,000,000 for highway construction in Texas. These sums are enormous and alarm many conservative tax payers, but at the old rate of road building the present generation will be dead before a comprehensive system is built.






