## EAST TEXAS HOGS

There is no part of the state where pork can be produced so cheaply as in East and South Texas. Yet these are not today the sections of the state where the most herds of the best hogs are to be found. True there are many herds where breeding, size, conformation and other points are kept up to standard, and the number of such breeders is con-
stantly increasing section where such points can be kept up most cheaply. The main trouble comes in the fact that the average hog raiser does not grow feed other than corn for his hogs. Corn is easy to grow, the traditional hog feed, and he thinks that plenty of corn means plenty of hogs. It does not. Nor does it mean cheap Corn is not a complete feed for hogs. It will put the fat on them when they are ready to be fattened, and it should be fed to some extent, even if very small quantities, all the time. But there are other feeds that must be provided to grow hogs cheaply And for the growing of these peculiarly adapted.
The feeds needed are the legumes, clovers, beans and peas Bermuda pasture is a standard and no man should think of growing hogs without providing a good Bermuda pasture for them. Nor is there a farm where a little attention will not provide good Bermuda pasture.
Bur clover, lespedeza, crimson clover for winter and crimson and alfalfa, where it can be grown successfully. For summer and fall peas and beans These things in plenty for pasture, and then corn as needed for fattening purposes and a small grain feed at all times, will keep mpthe standard of type and able.-Southland Farmer.
