GOVERNOR IS GIVEN VOTE OF CONFIDENCE

Pope's Resolution Blocked by Prompt Action of the House and Senate

Austin, Texas, July 7 .- If Representatives Pope of Nueces desires a line upon the possible reception of his resolution calling upon the governor and two of the prison commissioners to resign he may get it from the action of the senate Monday morning, when by unanimous vote of those present a resolution of confidence in the governor was adopted. In the afternoon the house adopted the same resolution with two negative votes. During the course of the debate on the resolution, which was introduced by Hertzberg, in the senate, the statement was made without the use of Pope's name, that his intended resolution is merely a bit of partisan politics; and this was accepted without dispute by all the senators, for there was no dissent to the pro-






