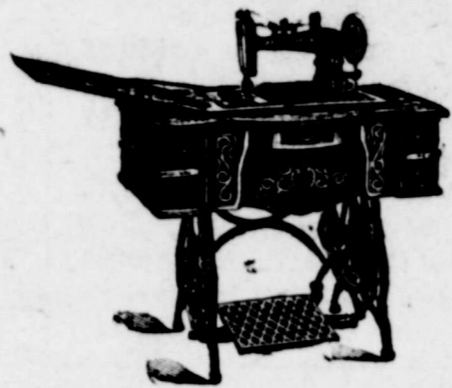

#### Christian Church Co-Operative Campaign

Tuesday, October 28, over 200 ministers and laymen of the Christian Church in Texas met at 12:15 o'clock in the roof garden dining room of the Adolphus Hotel in Dallas to attend the luncheon given by the Central Executive Committee of the Co-operative Campaign. S. J. McFarland, business man of Dallas, and chairman of the Central Executive Committee, presided. Addresses were made by a number of prominent ministers and other professional and business men, including Dr. J. L. Anderson Fort Worth; Dr. Graham Frank and Dr. J. G. Slater, Dallas; Dr. J. L. Keevil, Wichita Falls; Pres. Cephus Shelburne, Carr-Burdette College, Sherman; Pres. J. T. McKissick, Midland College, Midland; and Pres. E. M. Waits, Texas Christian University, Fort Worth. The spirit of unity, optimism and service was manifest throughout the whole meeting.

The \$350,000 which is to be raised during the ten days' campaign, beginning Nov. 16, will be divided among the colleges, missionary society and orphans home, as follows: Texas Christian University, \$190,000; Carr-Burdette College, \$25,000; Midland College, \$25,000; Texas Christian Missionary Society, \$75,000; and the Juliett Fowler Orphan Home and Home for the Aged, \$35,000. These amounts are simply to meet the present needs of the various institutions. Later there will be a campaign, as Mr. McFarland stated, to raise two million dollars for endowment purposes.

Much enthusiasm has been created by the announcement that Rev. and Mrs. A. C. Parker of Dallas have given \$80,000.00 to build a church at Texas Christian University and that some of their friends have pledged \$45,000 more with which to furnish the church, thus making the total cost of the building and furnishings \$125,000, and that the Breckenridge folk have given over \$15,000 to complete the Orphans Home building in Dallas. These gifts are exclusive of the \$350,000 to be raised during the campaign, but will doubtless give a great impetus to the campaign workers.

The state is divided into ten districts and each district is apportioned a certain amount to raise. The 5th district, of which Rev. A. L. Clinkinbeard of Palestine is district chairman, is composed of the following counties: Anderson, Angelina, Cherokee, Houston, Jasper, Nacogdoches, Rusk, Tyler, Panola, Shelby, Smith and Walker, and is apportioned \$14,670. The apportionment for Houston County is \$580, as follows: Augusta, \$80; Crockett, \$250, and Grapeland 250.

There is to be a District Conference at the Christian church in Palestine Saturday, Nov. 8, to which every church in the fifth district is to send delegates. Leading men in the Campaign will be at the Conference to help plan the drive in this district that the Campaign may be concluded successfully.

In the same ten months 495 new steel ships were delivered to the Shipping Board by other American yards, and accepted. Their deadweight tonnage is 3,185,240.

### Campaign Inaugurated Against Cotton Pests

Colege Station, Texas, Oct. 31, 1919—The ravages of insect pests in the cotton fields and the consequent loss has been an expensive lesson to the Texas cotton farmer. It would be futile to attempt to express the extent of the damage in monetary terms, but it is a safe prediction that much more consideration will be given preventive measures in the future.

Through the medium of publication and the efforts of specialists and county agents much information has been distributed on this subject during the past few years, while the cooperating newspapers of the state have rendered every possible assistance. At a meeting of the District Agents and Specialists called by T. O. Walton, Director Extension Service A. and M. College of Texas, for the consideration of farm problems, it was disclosed by reports from every section of the country where season permitted and proper precautionary methods had been carefully observed that from one fourth to one-half bale to the acre would be made, whereas, in neighboring fields where such precautions had been neglected or improperly observed the yield was practically nothing.

In discussing this matter Mr. T. O. Walton said that after consultation with W. B. Lanham, Assistant Director in Charge of Specialists, M. T. Payne, State Agent in Charge of Demonstration work, and A. P. Swallow, Entomologist, it has been decided that since cotton is the largest and most extensive crop in Texas that the work of the entomology department should be devoted in a large part to cotton insects during the coming year. In carrying

out this work it has been decided to start at the base of the insect control measures by inaugurating a State-wide fall clean up campaign. It is estimated that nearly two million boll weevils are produced by one pair of boll weevils from early spring until October 1st. This fact indicates the necessity of destroying all hibernating weevils possible. This clean-up campaign has been started through the community councils and through the farmers interested in insect control measures. We feel that a county wide demonstration of this kind will not only show great results in the reduction of insect pests during the coming year, but will also increase the yield considerably and permit the farmers of the community to see for themselves the results of such demonstrations when properly conducted, and learn something of the difference in results as contrasted with methods practiced in a careless slipshod manner. In fact the success of any method depends upon its correct application. The measures recommended as fall insect control methods are practically the same as those demanded by good farming, such as fall plowing, destruction of the remnants of old crops, cleaning fence rows and corners, destruction of weeds, etc.

It has also been considered advisable to establish demonstrations in dusting for the boll weevil. This work will be carried on under the direction of A. P. Swallow, Extension Entomologist, in the same manner it has been conducted in Mississippi, Louisiana and Texas. Ten counties have been chosen with one demonstrator in each county, who must be a farmer raising a pure strain of cotton, who will furnish the necessary machines and poi-

son as well as keep the required records on the demonstration. Up to the present time it has not been deemed advisable for the service to encourage work of this kind until the U. S. Department of Agriculture and the experiment stations have proved the possibility of success under Texas conditions. This has been clearly demonstrated and we are now able to give the farmers the benefit of this information. In addition to these projects this service has reserved forty per cent of the time of the specialist to be devoted to emergency work and we hope to be able to render a great deal of assistance this year should the emergency arise.

### What Baptists Will Do With 75 Million

Here is how each dollar contributed to the Baptist 75 Million Campaign apportioned among the several denominational interests will be expended by the Campaign Commission, except in those cases where the donors designate that their gifts shall go to a specific purpose. Foreign missions 26 2-3 cents; home missions 16 cents; state missions, 14 2-3 cents; Christian education, 26 2-3 cents; Orphanages, 6 1-3 cents; hospitals, 6 1-3 cents; and ministerial relief, 3 1-3 cents.

In 1903 Southern Baptists raised for all purposes \$5,000,000, and \$714,000 for missions. Sixteen years later they are raising four times as much for all objects and eight times as much for missions. The membership of the churches has increased rapidly during that time, but missionary gifts have increased six times as rapidly as their members.

Among small associations and churches doing large things in the Baptist 75 Million Campaign

it is announced that Sunflower Association in Mississippi has assumed a quota of \$225,000, while the First Baptist church at Mansfield, La., will raise \$125,000.

Two-thirds of the women of the world are locked in prisons of illiteracy, it has been declared by those who have made a close study of the situation. The Baptist 75 Million Campaign seeks to bring enlightenment to women in all parts of the world to whom the doors of knowledge have been closed heretofore by sending missionaries, both religious and medical, and Christian schools and hospitals into all the lands of the world.

### Prominent Alvin Couple Are Married

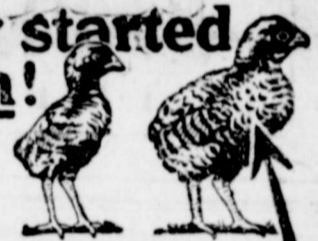

**San Jose Scale May Be Driven From Fruit Trees**

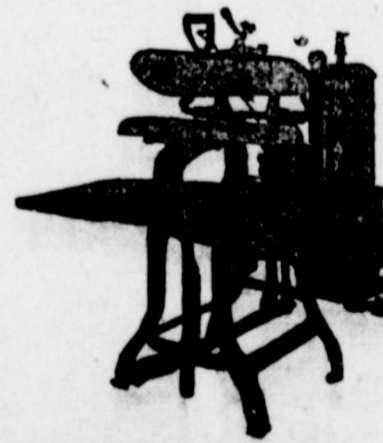
"The San Jose' Scale and its Control," which is Farmers Bulletin 650, just issued in revised form by the United States Department of Agriculture, contains a description of the insect, its natural history and habits, means of distribution, food plants natural enemies and, most important of all, ways of controlling it. Attacking, as it does, practically all deciduous fruit trees, this minute insect is one of the most generally dreaded pests with which the fruit grower has to contend.

The bulletin says that the insect can be kept well in check by thorough annual treatment during the period when the plants are dormant, and full instructions are given as to how treatment should be applied. The various washes are discussed and conditions outlined under which one may be preferable to the others. Full instructions are given too for making the washes at home, including the materials and the equipment necessary. Various kinds of spraying apparatus are also discussed.
