

## "MY TURN"

NANCY REAGAN has written a book of her memoirs which will be published next fall. The title will be "My Turn." Well! Humph! She didn't even ask permission to use my title!

Since the Exxon oil spill in Alaska, some irate citizens have begun boycotting Exxon stations and have been destroying their Exxon credit cards.

Certain U.S. oil companies have recently been authorized to renew their oil operations in Libya. Conoco, Marathon Oil and W.R. Grace and Co. are perhaps giving financial support to Col. Muammar Quaddafi and his terrorist regime. So we may actually have more cause to boycott these oil companies than we do Exxon.

Another outcome of the Alaskan oil spill has been that we have recently seen renewed interest in alternative energy sources such as ethanol which can be distilled from grain crops and even from feedlot manure. Goodness knows, we've got plenty of both of those commodities right here in Parmer County.

Ethanol blends have been extensively tested for over 500 billion proven miles and are known to increase octane and reduce carbon monoxide emissions. The current higher cost of manufacturing these alcohol fuels is probably the major roadblock in getting the switchover to ethanol use.

Today, almost 40 per cent of the oil we use for our cars and for generating the electricity to run our country, comes from foreign sources. In 1986, oil imports cost the U.S. \$27 billion, and the cost is even higher today.

In 1975, the petroleum industry made an almost overnight switchover from leaded to unleaded fuels, so the switchover to ethanol use cannot be perceived as impossible to accomplish.

I hope that our area's agribusinessmen will be studying upon these possibilities so that they can be in on this budding industry from the start.

Another commodity which is in great abundance in the Panhandle of Texas is wind. Windpower is somewhat less reliable than coal, oil or natural gas as an energy source and is also more expensive to produce.

I was glad to learn of the recent efforts of Sen. Teel Bivins to get funding for West Texas State's wind energy research program.

Officials at the Electric Power Research Institute in Palo Alto, California say they are looking forward to a day in three or four years when we will have a five-cent or even a four-cent kilowatt-hour wind machine. They report that in areas where there are good winds, this energy will be reliable and compatible with the utilities' needs.

## Homes Destroyed By Muleshoe Tornado

(From the Muleshoe Journal) A tornado destroyed two homes on the outskirts of Muleshoe last Saturday evening, and several residents of the Bailey County seat watched the funnel cloud for up to 25 minutes before it broke up.

The J.D. Cage home, just east of Muleshoe on U.S. Highway 70, was severely damaged when the new-formed funnel hit the residence.

A witness said "The Cage home looked like it exploded. We saw the roof go up into the air, and a large tree was sucked 100 to 150 feet into the air, and stuff was flying everywhere."

The twister traveled west to the Bill Jim St. Clair home, taking off the roof, destroying a number of large old trees on the property, and doing other damage.

At the Cage residence, three vehicles were completely destroyed.

Fortunately, no one was injured in the storm. The Cage family was entertaining out-of-town guests at their ranch south of Muleshoe when the funnel cloud hit their home. The St. Clairs were out of town at the time.

However, Muleshoe EMS personnel, not knowing that both of the homes had been empty of residents, spent some anxious moments searching the nearby fields among the debris for victims, until it was determined

that the families from both homes were gone at the time.

After hitting the St. Clair residence, the funnel changed directions, and started moving to the northeast, hitting the Rex Black residence. A large antenna was destroyed, gas tanks, windows and the home's attic were damaged.

A DPS patrolman, Lacie Kirk, tracked the funnel as it crossed the Y-L pavement, tearing up fences, barns, electric lines, trees, sprinkler systems, and hitting a vacant house just west of the Roy Atchison home in the Y-L community.

The tornado finally lifted back into the cloud some 20-25 minutes after it was first spotted.

Andy Moore, along with his step-father, Jeff Smith, watched the funnel cloud form at about 6:30 p.m. Saturday.

Andy said he had started out to feed his pigs, and Smith was working in his garage, when Andy spotted a "strange-looking whirlwind" forming in the front yard.

He called to Smith, and they watched the "whirlwind" grow larger and larger as it moved to the northwest. Then, when it was about over the Randy Johnson home, the whirlwind started upwards, and a funnel came down to meet the dust portion of the young tornado.

The funnel continued its northwest path, and Smith and Moore watched as the Cage home virtually exploded.

Ingle Gatewood, a former Muleshoe resident visiting his brother, was able to get some striking footage on a video tape that was shown on area TV stations, and Evelene Harris, an employee of the Muleshoe Journal, took a picture of the funnel cloud at about the time it struck the Cage residence.

Mrs. Cage said Monday that most of the family's furnishings inside the house were salvaged. "We feel really blessed that we were gone and no one was injured," she said.

Miraculously, delicate cups hanging on hooks in a china cabinet, were still intact, in spite of the portion of the roof being removed by the storm.

Another funnel was reported on the Joe Haseloff farm in the Oklahoma Lane community Saturday afternoon, but Mrs. Haseloff said that there was no serious damage. The funnel was spotted at about 4:45 p.m., and was on the ground just a short time.

The Haseloffs heard a roaring sound before they actually saw the funnel. Several other residents of the area also saw this funnel.

## Blind Girl Passes "Test"

Janet Rector, a ten-year-old blind student in the Friona school system, recently completed the fifth grade in local schools.

Miss Rector, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Larry Rector, also completed the "Life Skills" training in her special education unit, where she has been instructed by para-professional Linda Griffin, by preparing a complete meal that she served to her family and to members of the special education department.

During the past year, Mrs. Griffin has taught Janet to cook, demonstrating the use of recipes, including how to measure ingredients.

She began with simpler dishes, such as cookies and candy, and progressed during the school year.

For her "final test" in the Life Skills class, Janet prepared a complete meal, consisting of Mexican casserole, homemade ice cream and iced tea. She not only prepared the meal, but served it to her parents, along with Mrs. Griffin, Charles Turner, head of Parmer County Special Education, and Chris Hull of Amarillo, technical consultant for the visually handicapped for Region 16.

The results of Janet's "test" were most gratifying, according to Mrs. Griffin.

In addition to the Life Skills class, Janet attended all of the regular classes expected of a fifth grader, and passed her work with flying colors. She will be in junior high next fall when classes resume.

In addition to learning cooking skills, the youngster has also learned to use an electric steam iron. "She has ironed mostly flat items, but enjoys this very much," Mrs. Griffin says.

The special education instructor said that it has been a gratifying experience teaching the blind youngster these special skills, but that it also presents a challenge.

"When she has trouble locating something, your first impulse is to jump in and help her. But I have had to back off and let her find things and do them for herself," Mrs. Griffin said.

At one point while learning to iron, the youngster burned herself, and Mrs. Griffin said it was hard not to be overly sympathetic. "But I assured Janet that other children burn themselves when learning to iron, whether they are sighted or not, and that you just have to learn

from your experiences and go on," she said.

Turner said that the progress of the ten-year-old is just typical of several youngsters in the local special education section. "We like to call them our handy-capable students," he said.

## Area Receives Some Welcome Rainfall

Showers returned to the Friona area Thursday evening and Friday morning, as nature made some motions toward easing the long-term drought that has gripped the area for the last eight months or more.

A total of .56 inch was measured in the official Friona gauge up to 7:30 a.m. Friday.

A slow-moving system began spitting a light shower on the area just before 10 p.m. Thursday evening, and continued intermittently through the night.

As of 6:45 a.m., the measurement was .44 inch locally, but a boisterous thunderstorm which moved through the area left another .12 inch in the city.

Friday morning's measurement added to the .60 inch that had been measured here late last week, bringing June's total moisture to 1.16 inches, with most of the month still in front of us.

The rainfall appeared to have been heavier in the Hub area. "It looks like we averaged about an inch in this area. The farmers are reporting from three-quarters of an inch to an inch and a quarter,"

said O.L. "Mac" McMurtrey at Hub Grain.

McMurtrey said the Thursday night rain was fairly general. "We should have gotten the benefit of every bit, as it came in two or three different showers and fell slowly," he said.

There was no hail at all reported with the latest round of showers.

In the Rhea area, the rainfall was about the same as that received in Friona. "It was .5 to .6 inch in most places," said Joe Allen at Shirley-Anderson's Rhea Elevator.

Allen said that while the rain was far too late to benefit the wheat crop, which was virtually a total loss this year, it would help the young milo.

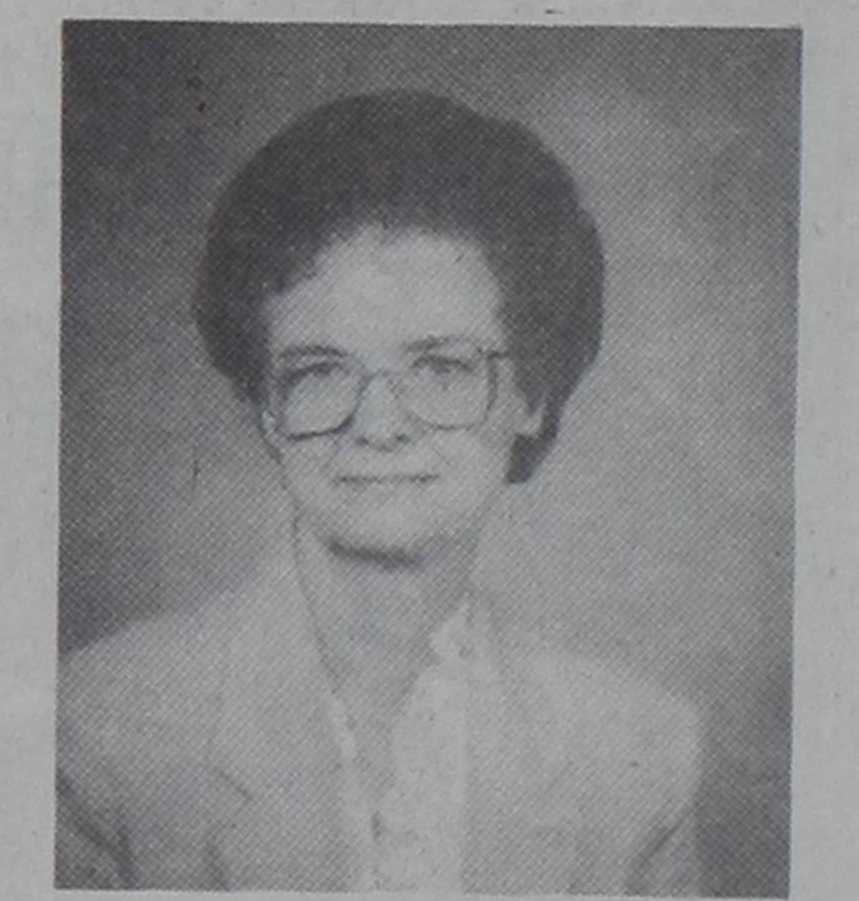
## Kathrine Blackburn To Be Honored

## 60 YEARS AGO--JUNE 5, 1929

## 30 YEARS AGO--JUNE 4, 1959

W.O. (Bill) Wright, 39, drowned sometime Friday night following an unexplained accident at Lake Conchas in New Mexico.

Hail cut a destructive swath through Parmer County, in the shape of a new moon from Rhea to east of Hub. Hail was stacked up a foot deep next to buildings on some farms following the storm.

## 25 YEARS AGO--JUNE 4, 1964

Peggy McNair, who is the reigning "Miss Wool of Texas," paid a visit to the Otho Whitefield sheep ranch this week. Whitefield is an official in both the Columbia Sheep Breeders of America and the Texas Columbia Breeders.

## 20 YEARS AGO--JUNE 5, 1969

Our legislators in Austin just passed an amendment giving themselves a 300% pay raise.

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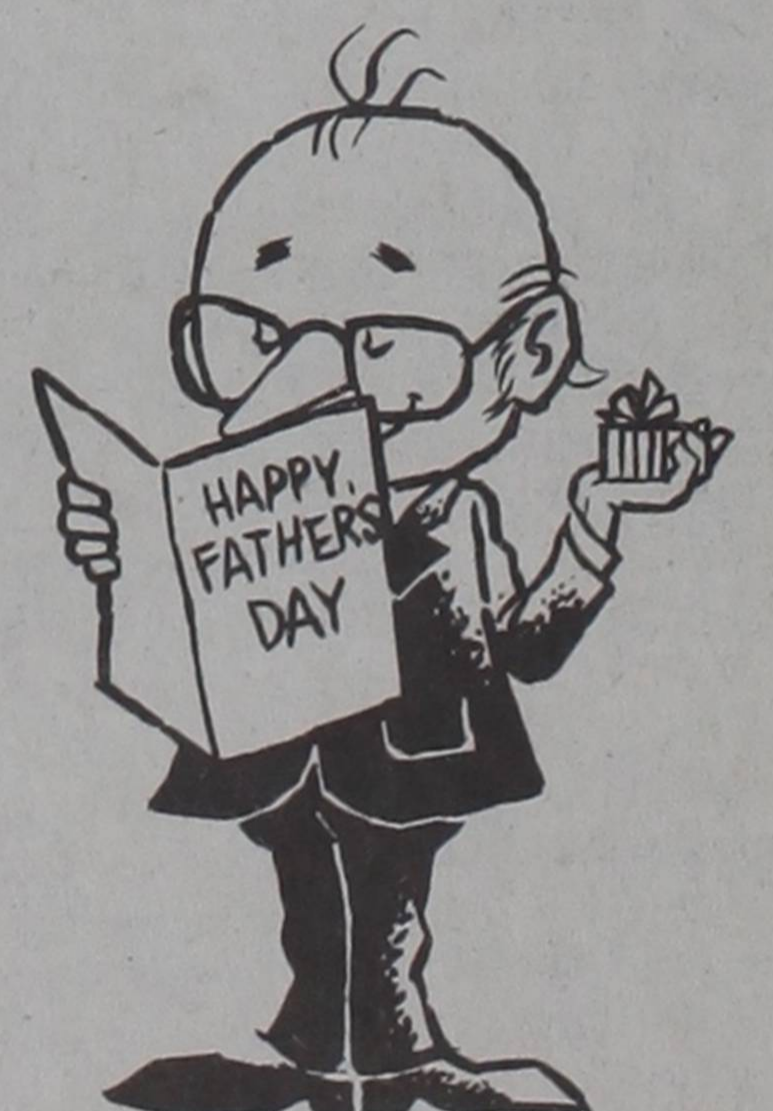

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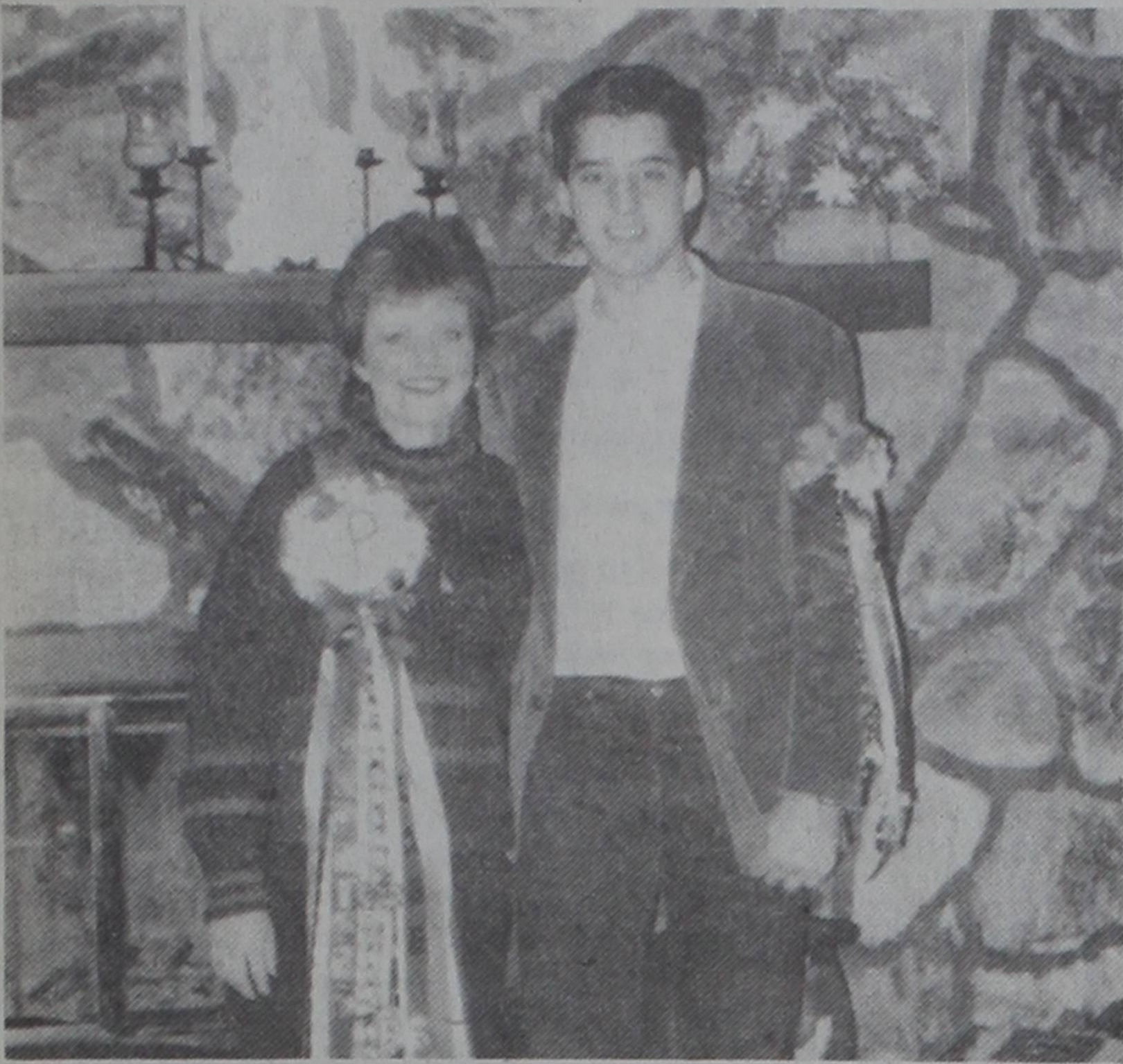

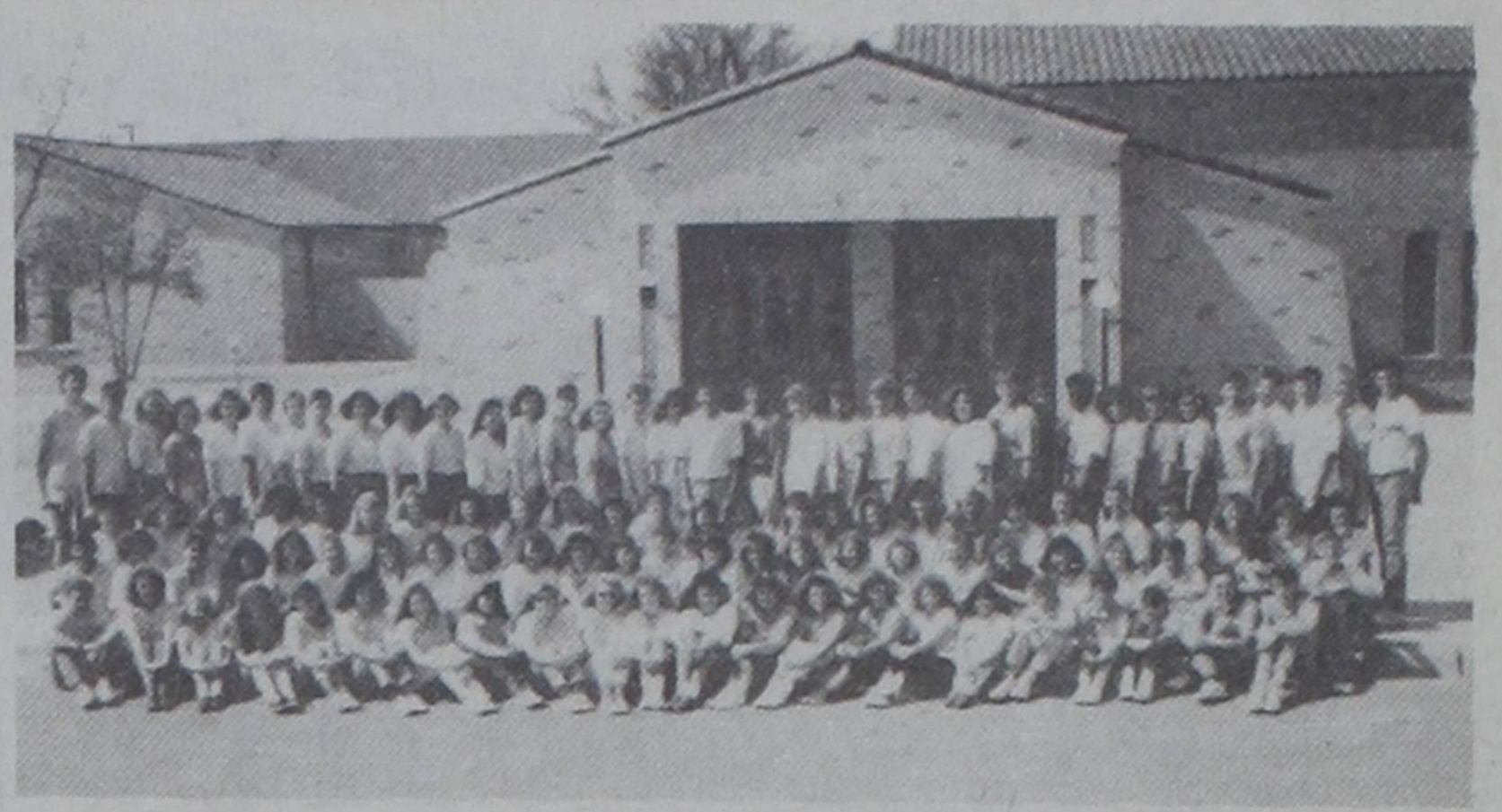
Mandi Seaton was chosen Young Homemaker of the Year.

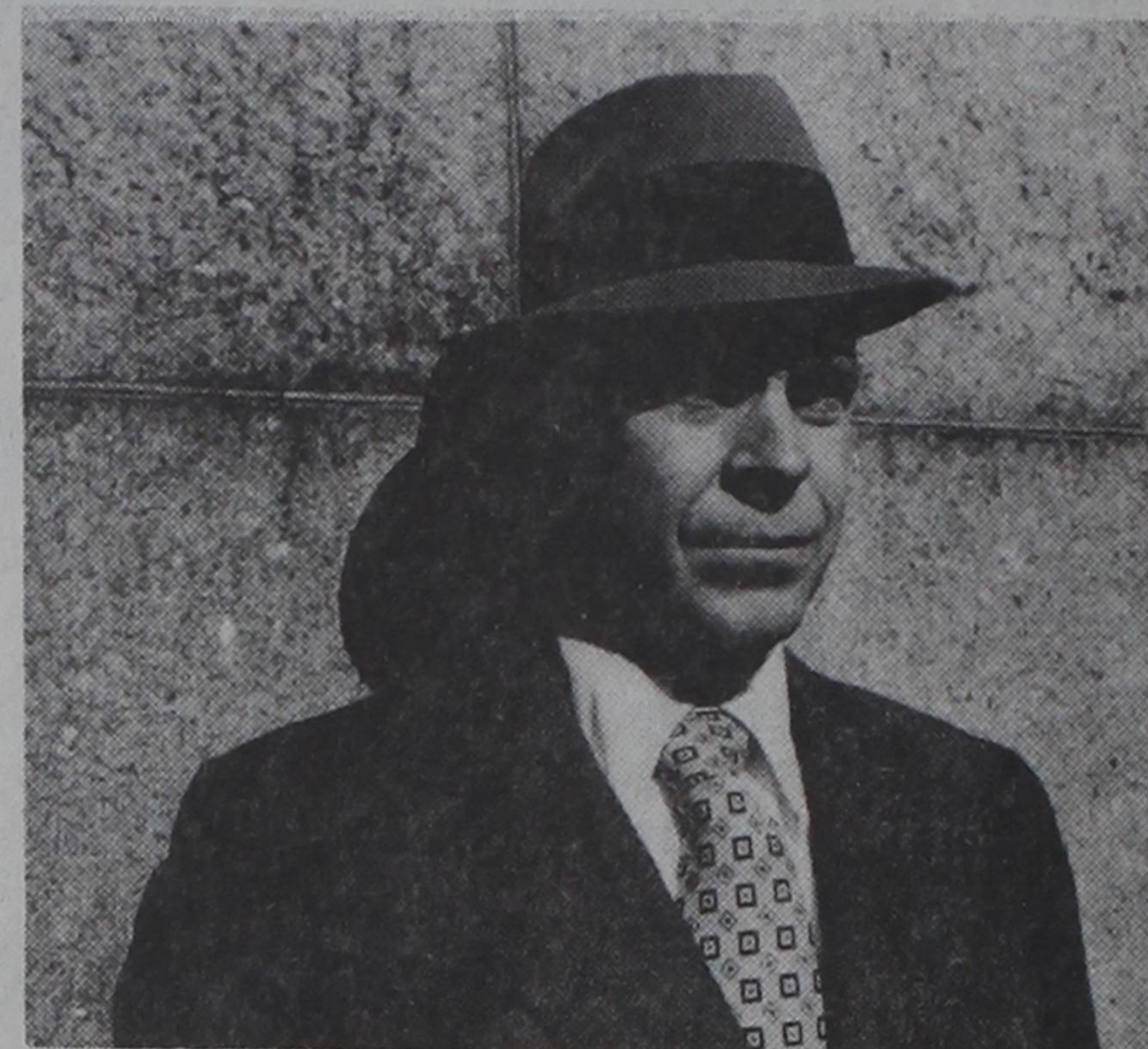
# Salesman Confesses

## Claims newspaper is best salesman

On Monday, Jules Wintner, owner of a local retail establishment, confessed his job as a salesman was obsolete due to the impact of newspaper advertising. Wintner, in an exclusive interview, said sales were made in the local paper instead of in the store.

"Sure, we get a chance for additional sales," Wintner commented, "but the newspaper has become our best salesman." Wintner reported that consumers name the local newspaper as their usual source of "Best Buy" information, 10 times more than radio or television. This conforms with a recent Consumer Data Service report that indicated 60% of the consumers seek "Best Buy" information from the newspaper versus only 6% for radio and 7% for television.

Wintner later remarked that because the newspaper is read by all Texans, regardless of income, his business was able to sell both upper end products as well as value priced items. "No matter what we're selling, we get good response in the newspaper," he said. "In fact, the more expensive the product, the better our response seems to be." This fact is substantiated in a survey by the Texas Newspaper Advertising Bureau that documented readership of the newspaper increases as income increases. In the survey, almost 75% of Texans with incomes exceeding \$50,000 a year read
