





First Bale of 1920 Cotton Received Last Wednesday

Grapeland received the first bale of 1920 cotton Wednesday, August 5. It was raised by Henry Brown, colored, on Henry Dailey's farm near Daly's.

The bale weighed 425 pounds, was ginned free by A. B. Spence and sold to W. H. Long & Co. for 35c per pound. A premium amounting to \$18.00 was given to Brown.

The second bale followed the next day, Thursday. It was brought in by Henry Tryon, another negro farmer of the Reynard section.

Grapeland Defeats Crockett

After defeating Grapeland 5 out of 6 games, Crockett came back last Saturday with the expectations of "mopping up" again, but they were sadly disappointed. Day pitching for Grapeland, held the visitors down to five hits, but they were bunched in the fourth inning and accounted for Crockett's three scores. He had perfect support from the team, only one error being recorded against Grapeland, while the visitors played a loose game and "blew up" in the third inning.


Suffrage Hopes Hang on Session in Tennessee
