



Retail Dealers Will Sell Clothes at Cost

Chicago, Ill., Oct. 18.—Retail clothing dealers throughout the country will sell clothes at cost this fall, Andreas Burkhardt of Cincinnati, president of the National Association of Retail Clothiers, said tonight in a statement.

"Rightfully or wrongfully, the public is determined to get lower prices," said Mr. Burkhardt. "The public is not interested in the increased cost of products. It cares nothing for our added expenses. So both manufacturers and retailers have determined to give the public what it wants."

#### Prehistoric Inhabitants of Texas

Prof. J. E. Pearce of the Uniconcludes that the region was in- ple. habited in prehistoric times by a race of men different from the Indians whom the Europeans found when they reached the new world. They evidently were nomadic in their habits, roaming from one part of the wilderness to another and killing animals and humans for food, using rude stone weapons.

They had arrows and spears tipped with flint points, chipped but not polished, says Prof. Pearce. They did not engage in any form of agriculture. However, they were apparently skillful skin dressers, as flint scraping tools have been found. The fact that they were cannibals is shown by human bones found in thier rubbish heaps, split open so that the eaters could get at the marrow.

The kitchen middens of these prehistoric Texans are believed to be the only things of the kind in America, although such remains have been found in other parts of the world. They are made up for the most part of kitchen refuse. At these sites camps were located. In the center was a great fireplace with huge slabs of limestone laid over it to serve as a primitive kind of stove on which these prehistoric people cooked their meat.

After concluding the work of exploring these mounds it is planned to investigate the "funeral mounds" in eastern Texas. These, according to Prof. Pearce, were left by an entirely different race of people who lived at a different period.—The Pathfinder.
