Now, what can we common grass-roots folks expect from the dawning of the new 90s decade? It is certainly shaping up like good old America is going to end up being colonized by Japan. I understand that Japanese is a very difficult language, so we'd better start teaching it early in those taxpayer-funded day care centers while the kids are very small.

Those of us who live in West Texas already know how to talk through our noses and we can already pronounce the sissy-sounding names of all those Japanese autos such as Mitsubishi, Isuzu, Nissan, Toyota, Daihatsu, Hyundai, Subaru, Yugo, etc.

But, frankly, I still prefer good old American-sounding cars like Ford, Buick, Olds, Chevy and Dodge, even though a good many parts of these autos are currently being made in other countries. Many of us in the 90s will be riding bicycles instead of driving around in those sissy-sounding cars, so that should help out the country's problem of obesity, as well as curtail any future fuel shortages.

In our newly colonized Japanese America of the 90s, the stars and stripes will have a big sun in the center and Mom's apple pie will be replaced with a bowl of bamboo shoots. For Thanksgiving in the 90s we may have to carve up a slab of raw fish with a bowl of bean curds on the side.

Taking off our shoes at the door will save a lot of vacuuming, but I'm not sure I'll enjoy sitting on the floor all the time. Past age 50, getting up off the floor is quite a chore. And sleeping on the dirty, drafty floor on those little mats is going to be difficult to get used to. Sounds to me like we may spend most of our winter months with a bad case of Asian flu.

But look on the bright side. Our kids will be smarter and more respectful of their elders. They will be more concerned with scholastic endeavors and less with establishing a tough, macho image. Kite-flying contests may even replace football as the popular interscholastic league sport in the school system.

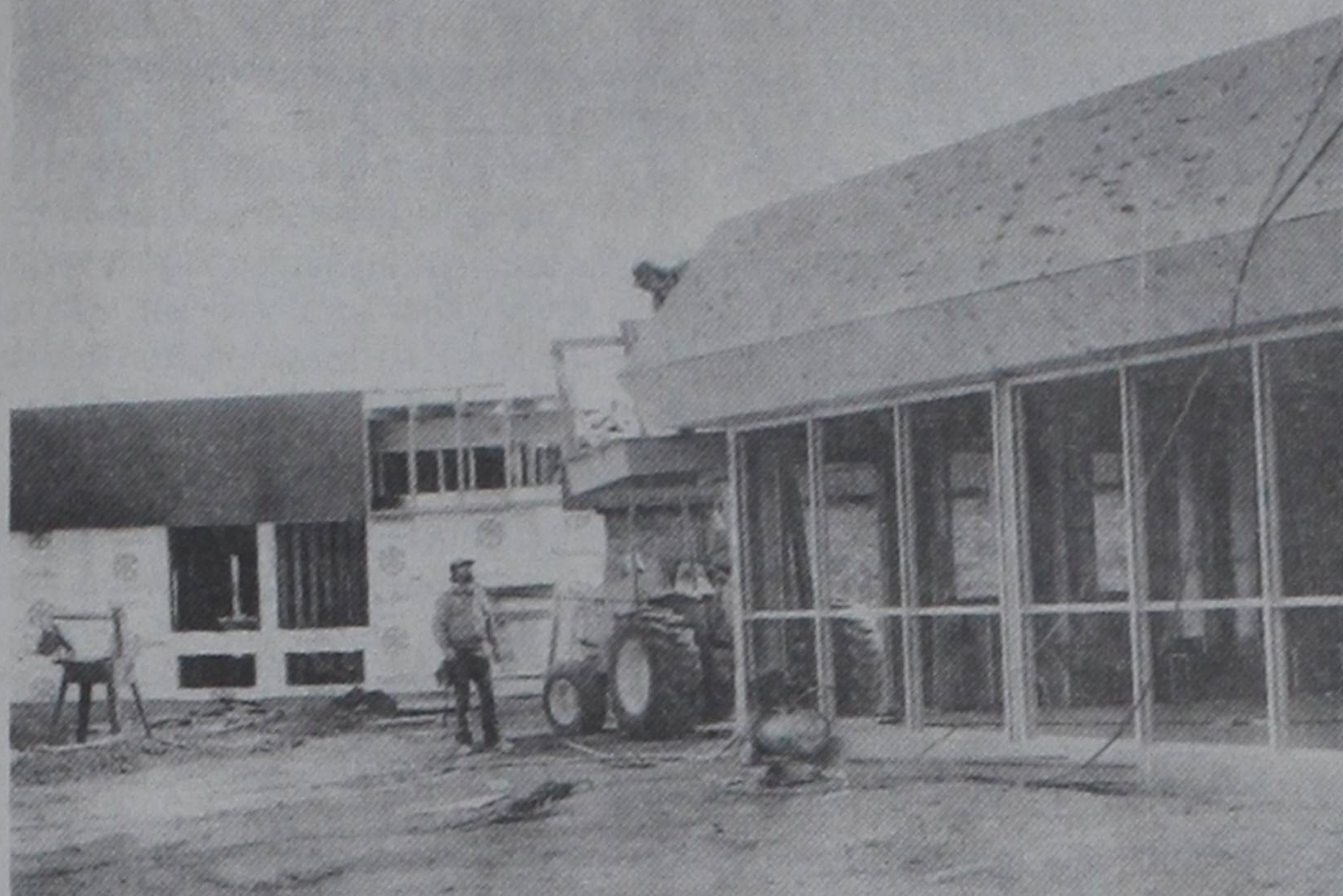
Perhaps there are some things we could learn from the Japanese. We blame over-crowding in our large cities for poverty, crime and drugs, while Tokyo, the largest city in the world with a population of over 25 million people, has almost no crime. The police of that city spend most of their time unsnarling the city's terrible traffic jams.

Japan's most recent American investments have been in the entertainment industry, acquiring large office buildings, New York City's Rockefeller Center, etc.

However, you might need to know that they are also making inroads into the cattle industry. Between 50 to 100 million dollars have been invested in U.S. cattle ranches, feedlots and packing plants since 1987. Shipments of domestic beef to Japan have risen sharply in the last two years.

At the end of last year, foreigners controlled about 12.5 million acres of this country's privately owned farmland and timberland. Still, that is only about one per cent of the real estate and farmland in the U.S. We have invested far more in other countries than this.

But we need to be on the alert for any future political influence these foreign investors may wield with their new American dollars, lest we someday end up with rice-burgers in place of the Big Mac. Sayonara, y'all!

Blood Drive Set

A blood drive is scheduled in Friona on Thursday, November 30 from 3-7 p.m. at the Friona State Bank's Community Room.

Shanna Avery, Coordinator of Volunteer Services for Coffee Memorial Blood Center, says that a good response by local donors is needed.

Coffee Memorial Center supplies all of the blood and blood components to 21 hospitals encompassed within a 26-county, 100-mile radius of Amarillo.

The Blood Center needs to collect 400 pints of blood each week from volunteer donors to meet the needs of sick and injured hospital patients.

Blood is available from the Center for anyone in the Panhandle Service Area upon the request of a hospital or qualified physician.

Coffee Memorial Blood Center was founded in 1950 and is sponsored by the Potter-Randall County Medical Society. The Center is governed by a board of directors appointed by the medical society.

A non-profit organization, the Center is licensed by the federal government and is accredited by the American Association of Blood Banks.

CMBC has become one of the outstanding blood centers in the country, with the most modern techniques and services. Its laboratories and equipment make possible the latest treatment of blood diseases with the modern use of blood components.

"We need blood for the upcoming holiday season," said a Blood Bank spokesman.

Weatherley moved into third place with a score of 137. Charlie Morgan, Mike Schueler and Don Max Vars are tied for fourth with scores of 136.

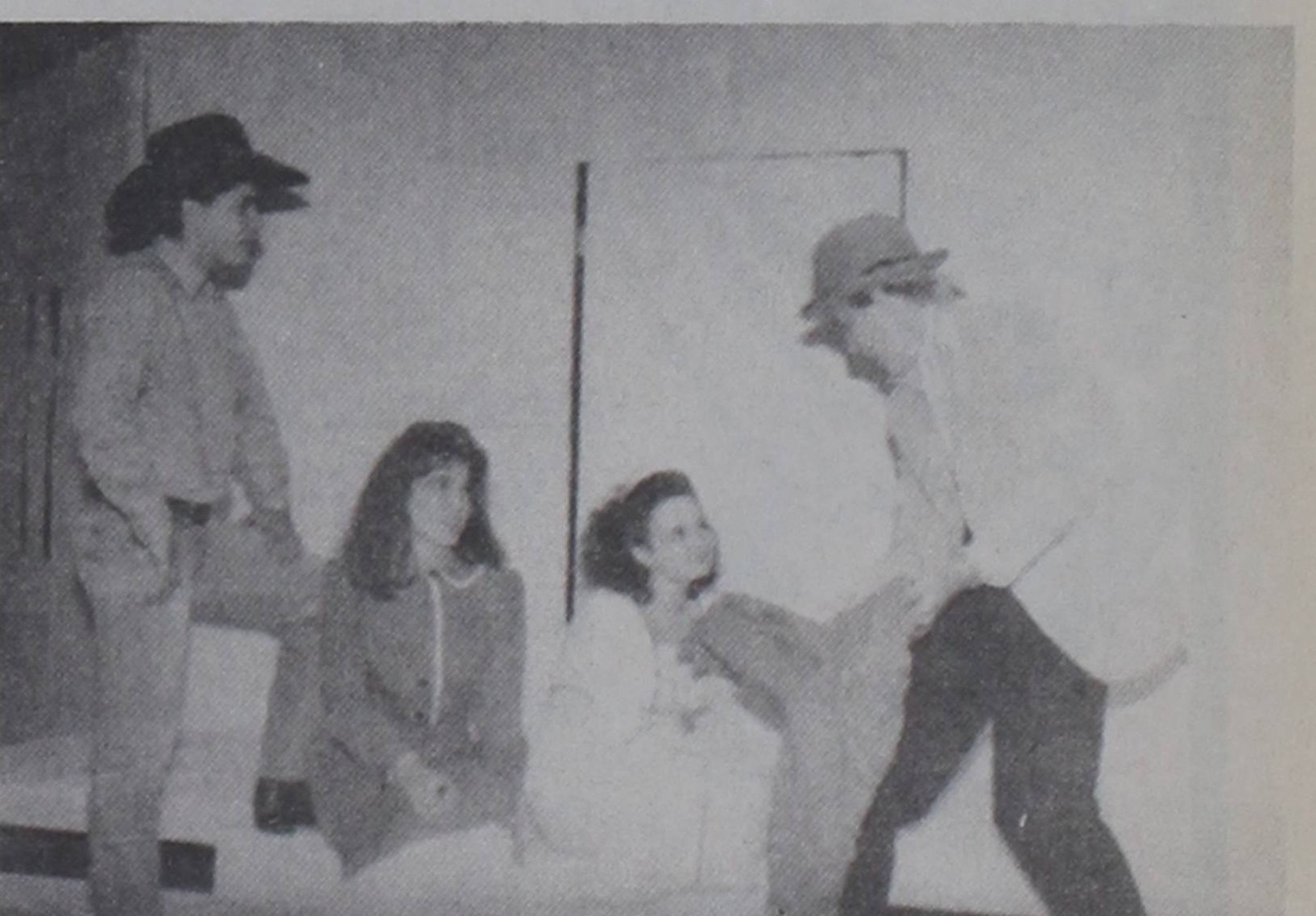

"Emotions"

This I Believe

You might not want to read this column because I wrote it for me. I wanted to know what I believed. Rather than read my beliefs, it would be best for you to think for yourself. Unless you're curious, of course.

I believe in a living, loving God who encourages us and wants for us an abundant life. God has established a grand order of the universe, beyond our comprehension. Occasionally we get glimpses into this order, but mostly we are in the dark.

The law that God has established, I think, has to do with the law of compensation, that is, we get back what we send out. What we sow, we reap. There's a difference between the farmer and the Christian sower. The farmer sows a seed and wishes for a bountiful crop, but the sower sows the seed purely from joy. If we sow goodness in the expectation of a good return, we might get elected most popular, but we're not going to experience the divine. To reap bountifully, we must sow goodness because we feel gratitude for God's love.

God demonstrated His love by sending His son to inspire us, to comfort us, to teach us. Christ came so that we could participate in the divine plan and experience a life of abundance.

We have one grand task in our earthly lives--to move toward God through love. Love means not judging ourselves or others. Love means forgiving ourselves and others when we behave wrongly. Love means understanding that all of us are bound together in God's great divine plan. When we condemn others we condemn ourselves; when we love others we love ourselves.

Now this would all be great and glorious if it weren't for one thing--evil. Evil constantly serves to turn us away from God's harmony. Thankfully, love conquers evil and regular prayer strengthens love. Prayer enables us to communicate with God, giving us energy and inspiration to do good and to resist evil. When we fail to pray, we are vulnerable to evil's influence.

Now there's one other great scheme that helps us--The Holy Spirit. This is a spirit of love, come

directly from God. We can feel this Holy Spirit at times--in the presence of great music or art, when we have a profound insight, when we are at one with nature, or when we are moved by another person. The more we pray and meditate, the more we become aware of God's Holy Spirit.

Perhaps Heaven is a part of God's goodness. When we seek the virtuous life, when we experience the Holy Spirit, we are experiencing what it is like to be a part of Heaven, a part of God's divine love. Perhaps when our souls leave our bodies, we join God's love force.

I think Hell is a product of our own self-condemnation. Anyone who has experienced anger, or frustration, or disappointment or despair, or lust, or jealousy, or envy understands that to feel these feelings enough is to know one's own Hell. When we die, perhaps we die to these feelings and become a part of these negative feelings, a part of evil.

Why formulate our beliefs? Why put them down on paper? Recording our beliefs requires us to think and encourages us to stay on track. If we clearly understand what we believe, we can better act in ways that confirm our belief systems. It's too easy to drift toward evil without a solid philosophy of correct living. For example, if we fully grasp the law of compensation, we'll be more careful about what we sow. If we comprehend God's love and divine plan, we will be more loving and have "a peace that passes all understanding." Recording our beliefs gives us the courage to pursue our convictions.

I don't write this to convince you to believe my way. I'd like for this column to stimulate you to think for yourself and record what you believe--that kind of discipline will help you live better. I want you to read the Bible, to pray, to think, to feel, and to come up with your own concept of God and life. The truth is not given to you by a particular doctrine. Rather, it is through seeking your own answers and your own truth that you can grow closer to God.

Diana sustained a laceration on her forehead and nose which required 36 stitches to close. She was taken to the Hi-Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo for the surgery.

15 YEARS AGO--NOV. 10, 1974

In what was considered a good turnout due to the lack of contested races, Friona and Parmer county voters went to the polls in ideal weather Tuesday to elect leaders for the next four years. The local voters went to the polls to give Friona's Paul Fortenberry a big sendoff by electing him as the next county judge. 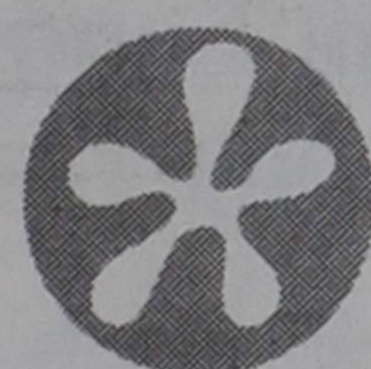

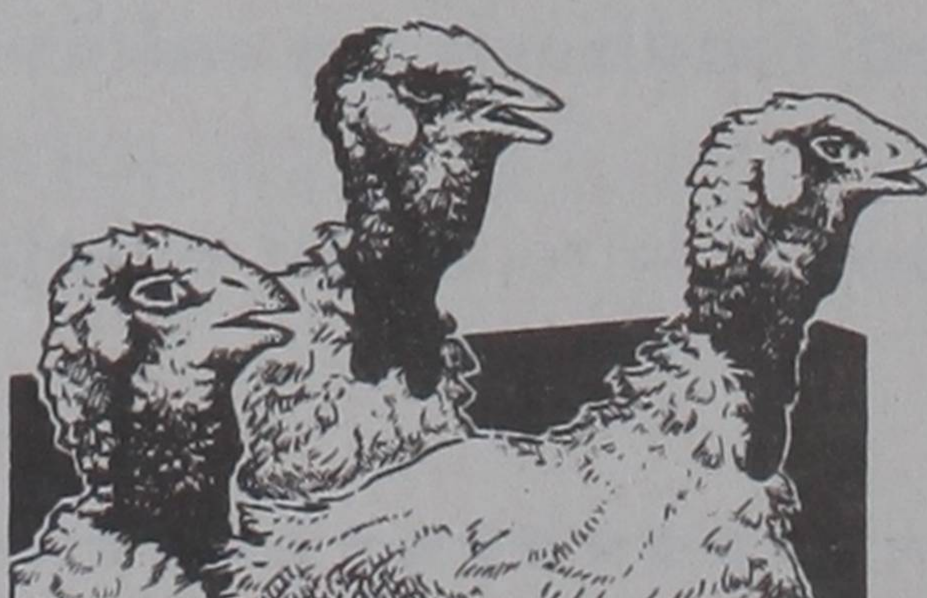

He was born June 25, 1922 at Clarksville, Texas. He had lived in Parmer County since 1953.

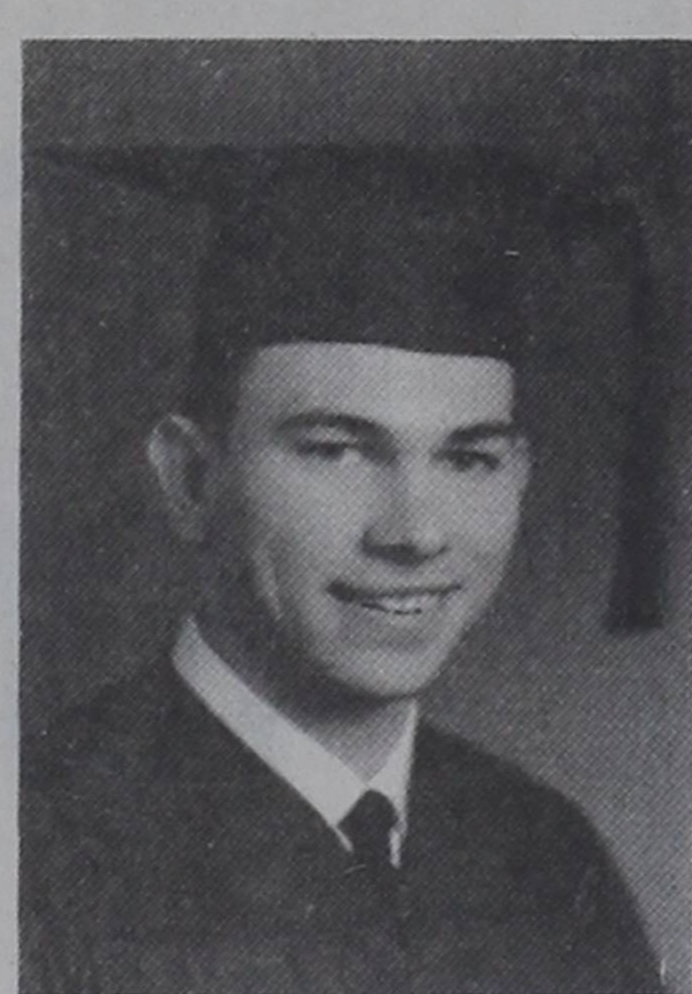
He was a retired farm implement mechanic.

Champ Whirlwinds Terminate Season

The district champion Floydada Whirlwinds added injury to insult as they blanked the Chieftains, 42-0, in a game at Chieftain Field last Friday night. The game closed out Friona's football season, with a 1-9 season ledger.

You might say that Floydada used Friona's kicking game to their advantage, as the Whirlwinds scored touchdowns the first three times that the Chieftains punted.

Friona took the ball to begin the

game. Ismael Rocha's six-yard gain was all the team had to show after three plays, and it was punt time.

Floydada's Victor Chavarria broke through the Chieftain line to block the punt, and returned it 30 yards for a touchdown. The kick gave the Whirlwinds a quick, 7-0 lead.

Andre Duran gained two yards following the kickoff. But a fumbled handoff resulted in a ten-yard loss back inside the Friona 15, and another yard loss brought up a second punting situation.

This time, Jaime Suarez of Floydada charged through to block Duran's punt, and fell on the ball in the end zone for another touchdown. Frank Suarez' kick made it 14-0, Floydada, and fans weren't settled down good.

Friona had a little offensive flurry on their third possession. Duran ran 21 yards for Friona's initial first down of the game, and two plays later Brian Brogden connected with Ismael Rocha on a 22-yard gain, but Rocha fumbled as he was tackled and Floydada recovered.

This time Friona held and forced a Floydada punt as the Whirlwinds gained only five yards in three plays.

Rocha ran for six, Duran for two, and Rocha again for one, and it was once again punt time.

Friona must have felt somewhat relieved when Duran was able to get the kick away, but what followed was about as bad as a blocked kick.

Collins returned the kick 70 yards for Floydada, to the Friona ten-yard line, and Frank Suarez took a five-yard TD pass from Grant Stovall, as the visitors hiked their lead to 21-0.

The Whirlwind express slowed down somewhat in the second quarter, as Frank Suarez ran four yards for a touchdown and Floydada led at halftime, 28-0.

Friona never could get anything going on offense, and never could put two first downs together back-to-back until the fourth quarter.

Jeff Stowers ran a yard on

fourth down for one first down, and Duran ran 15 yards for another. However, a personal foul penalty against the Chiefs stalled the drive, and with 4:47 left in the game, Floydada got its third blocked punt.

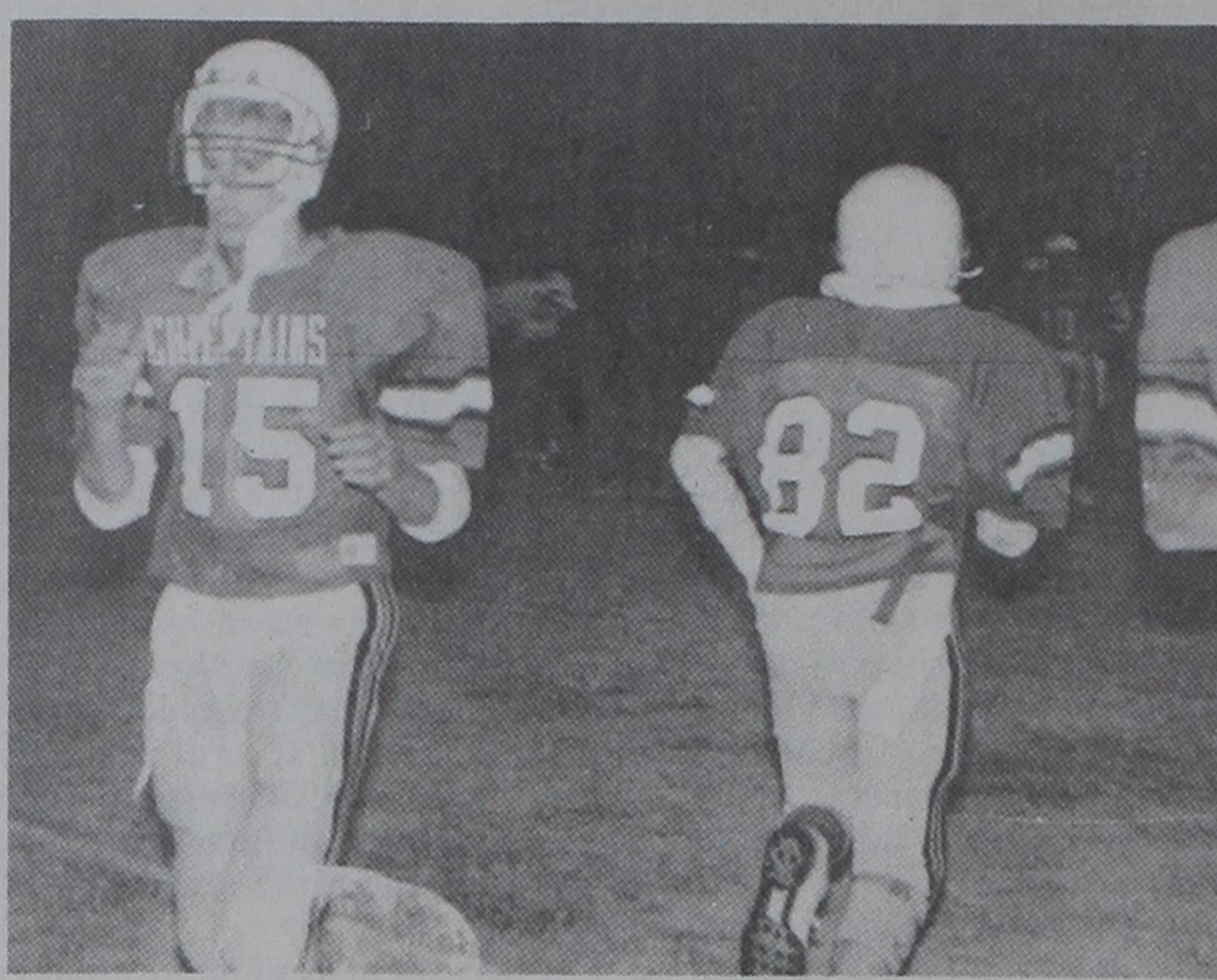
Fortunately for the Chieftains, this block didn't result in a touchdown as Shannon Cochran got his second pass interception at the Friona four-yard line with 3:11 remaining, to prevent any further damage.

Dustee Gee ran 13 yards and Rocha 17 for Friona in the last two minutes, but that was about it.

Several Friona players were sporting injuries after the game. Jeff Stowers and Berny Trevino were taken for X-Rays. Stowers suffered a badly sprained forearm, and Trevino had a badly bruised shoulder.

Rocha also was bruised from head to toe, and several other players had bumps and bruises. Coach Tommy Moss had to move David Rejino, regular linebacker, to defensive tackle for the second half, due to several injuries to regular linemen.

"I appreciate the hard work these kids turned in this year. I never judge a team by their worst records, and this bunch has done everything I've ever asked of them," said Coach Moss regarding the season.

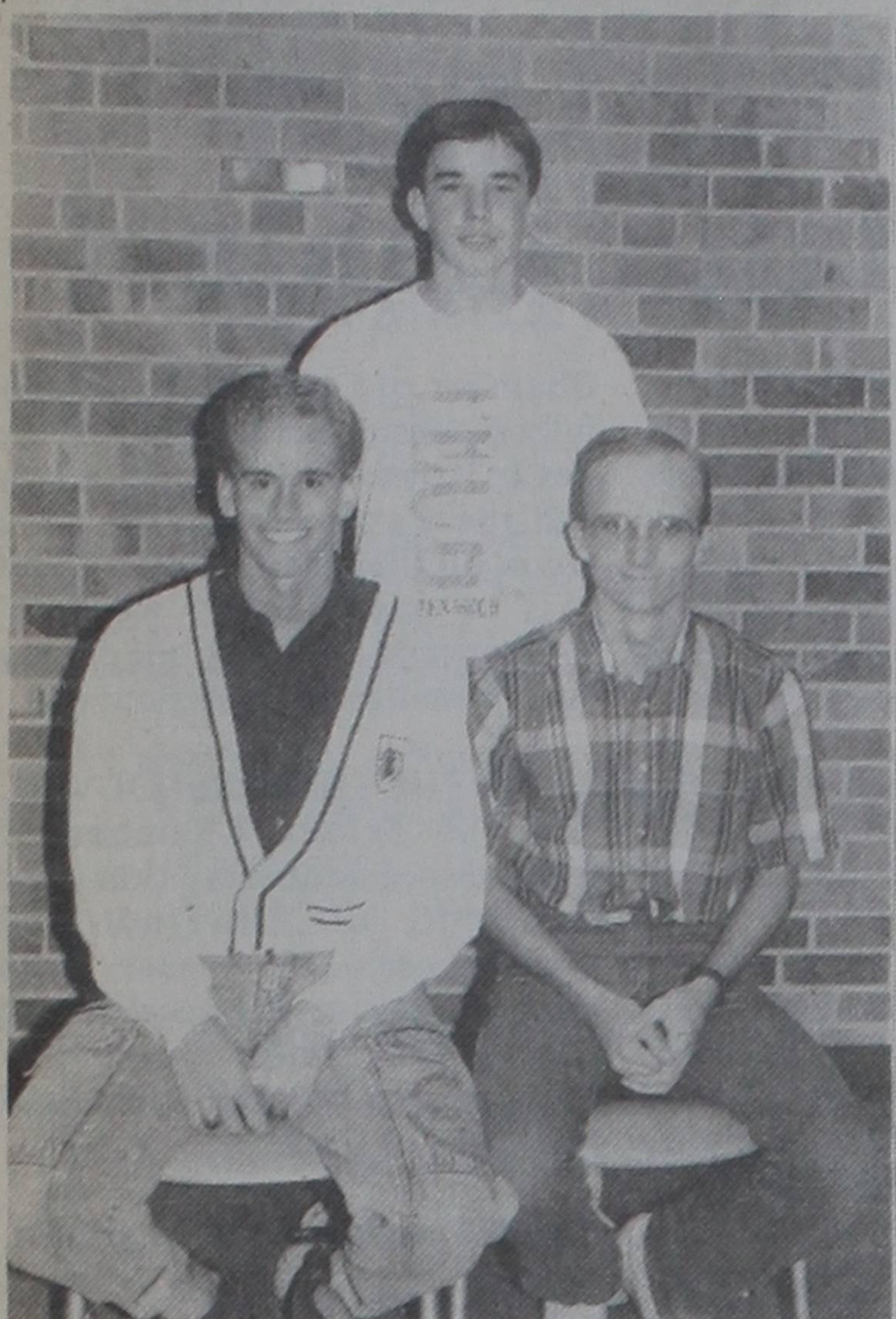

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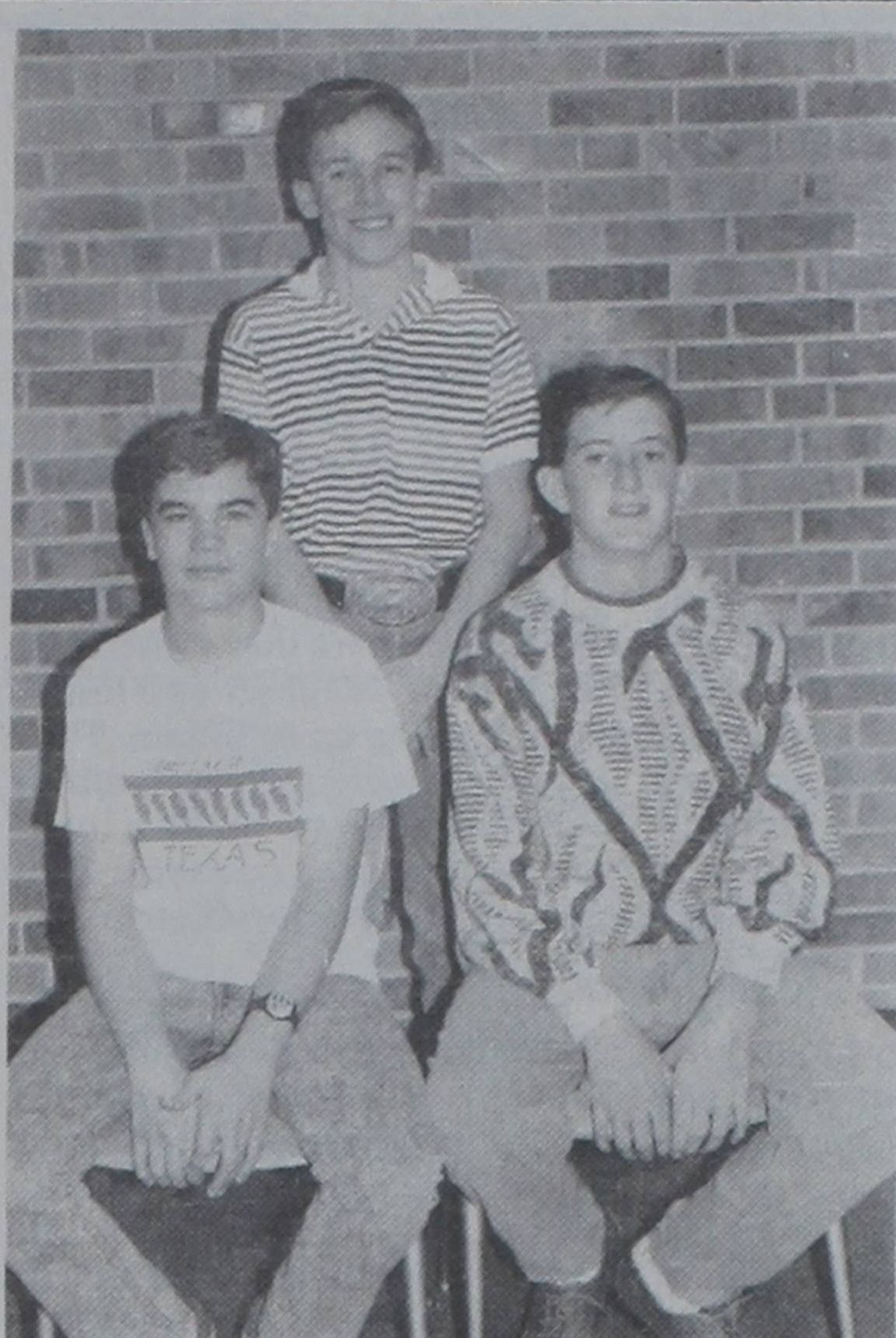

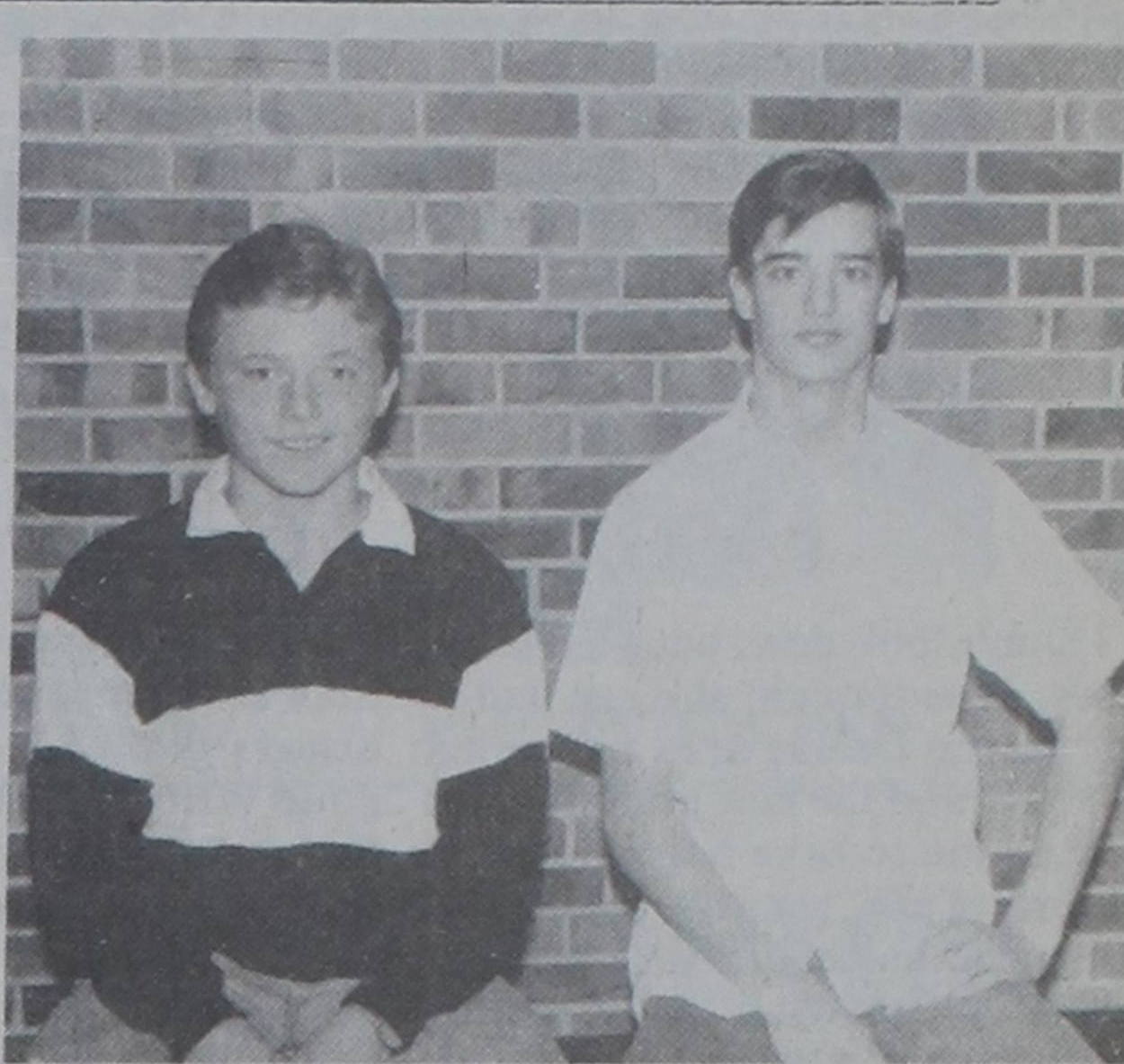

Bazaar Underway Locally

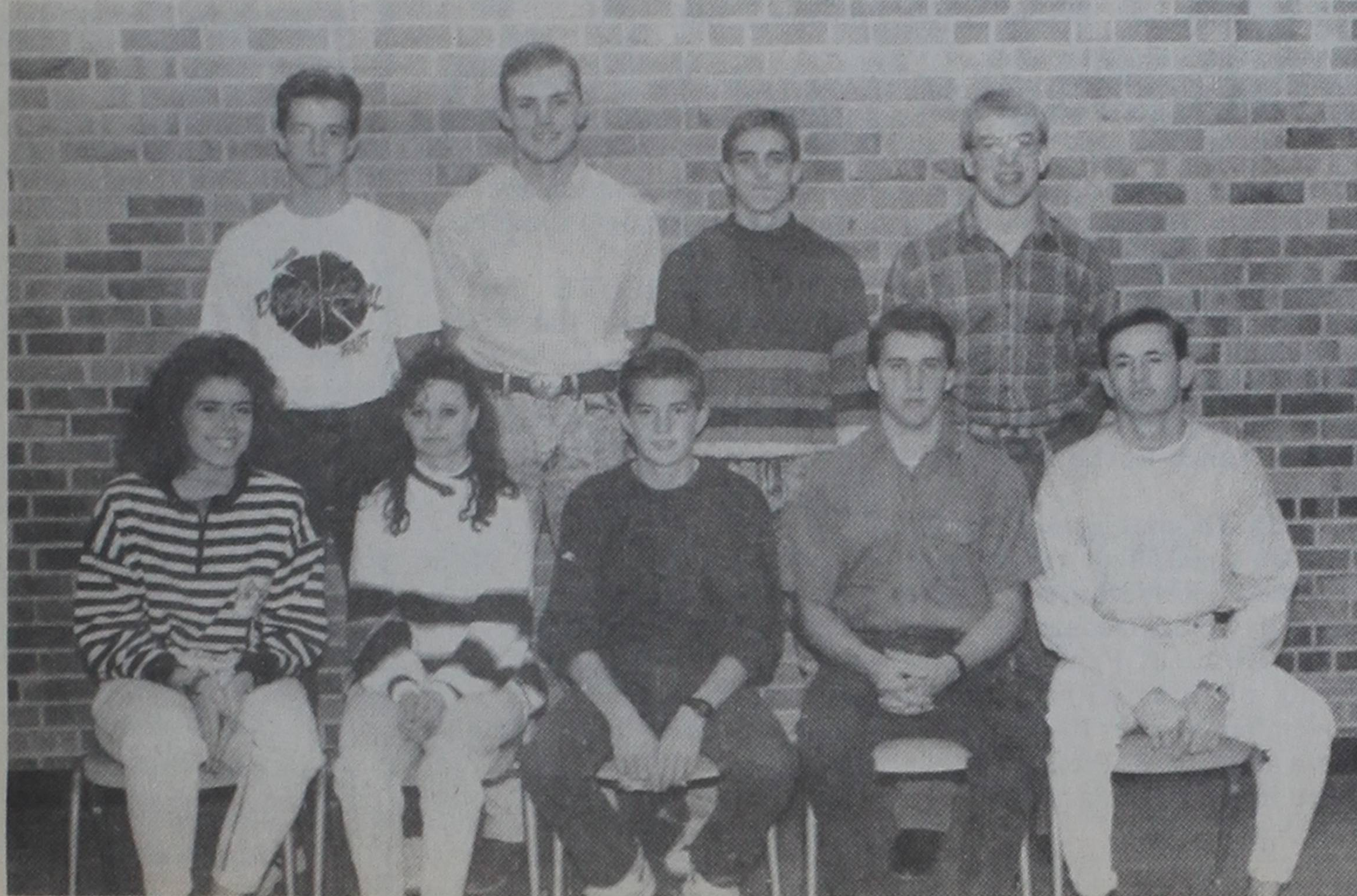
Christmas is right around the corner, and you can get a head start on that shopping list this year by attending the Friona Christmas Bazaar.

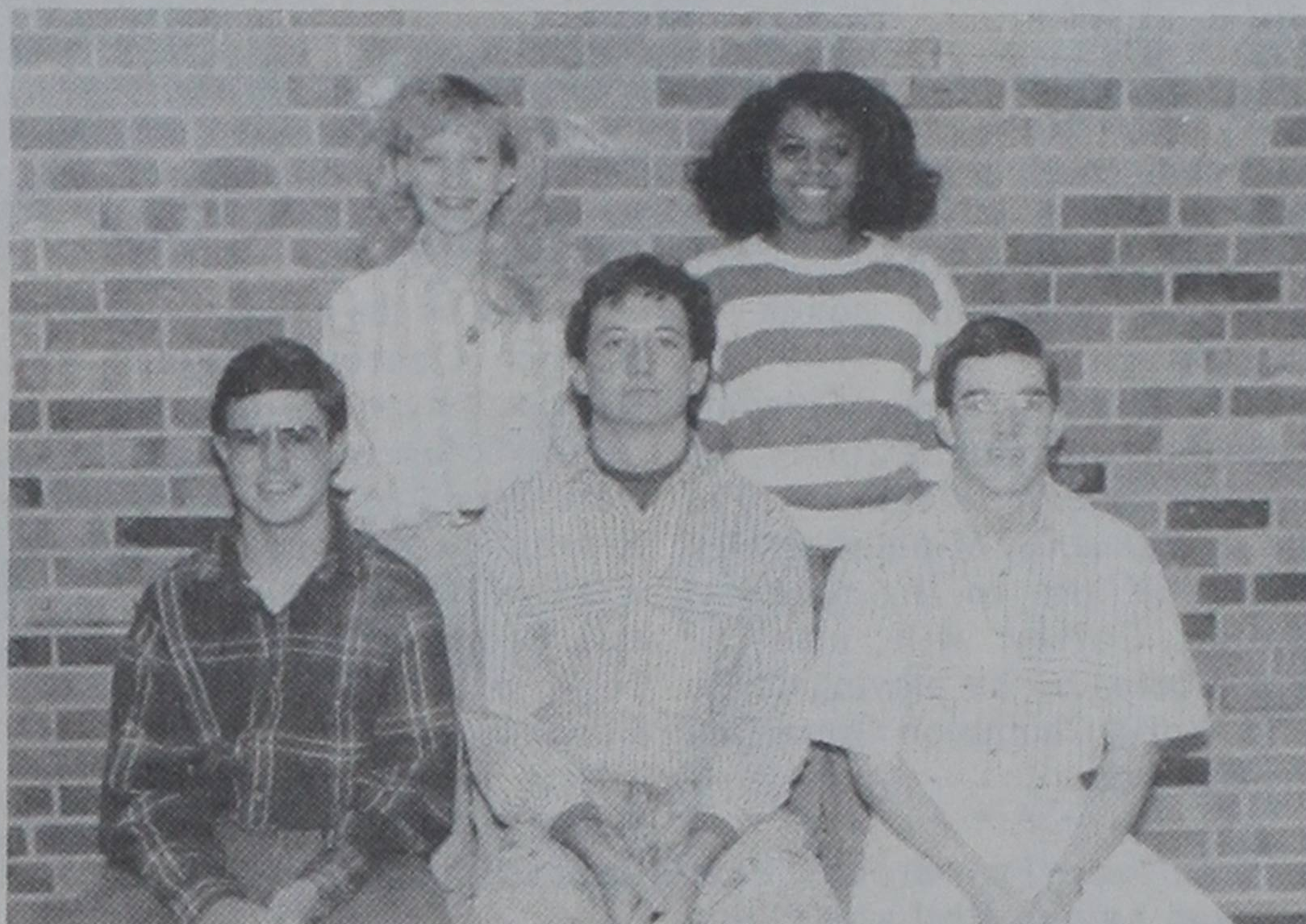
The Parmer County Home Economics Committee, in cooperation with the Parmer County Extension Service, is sponsoring this activity.

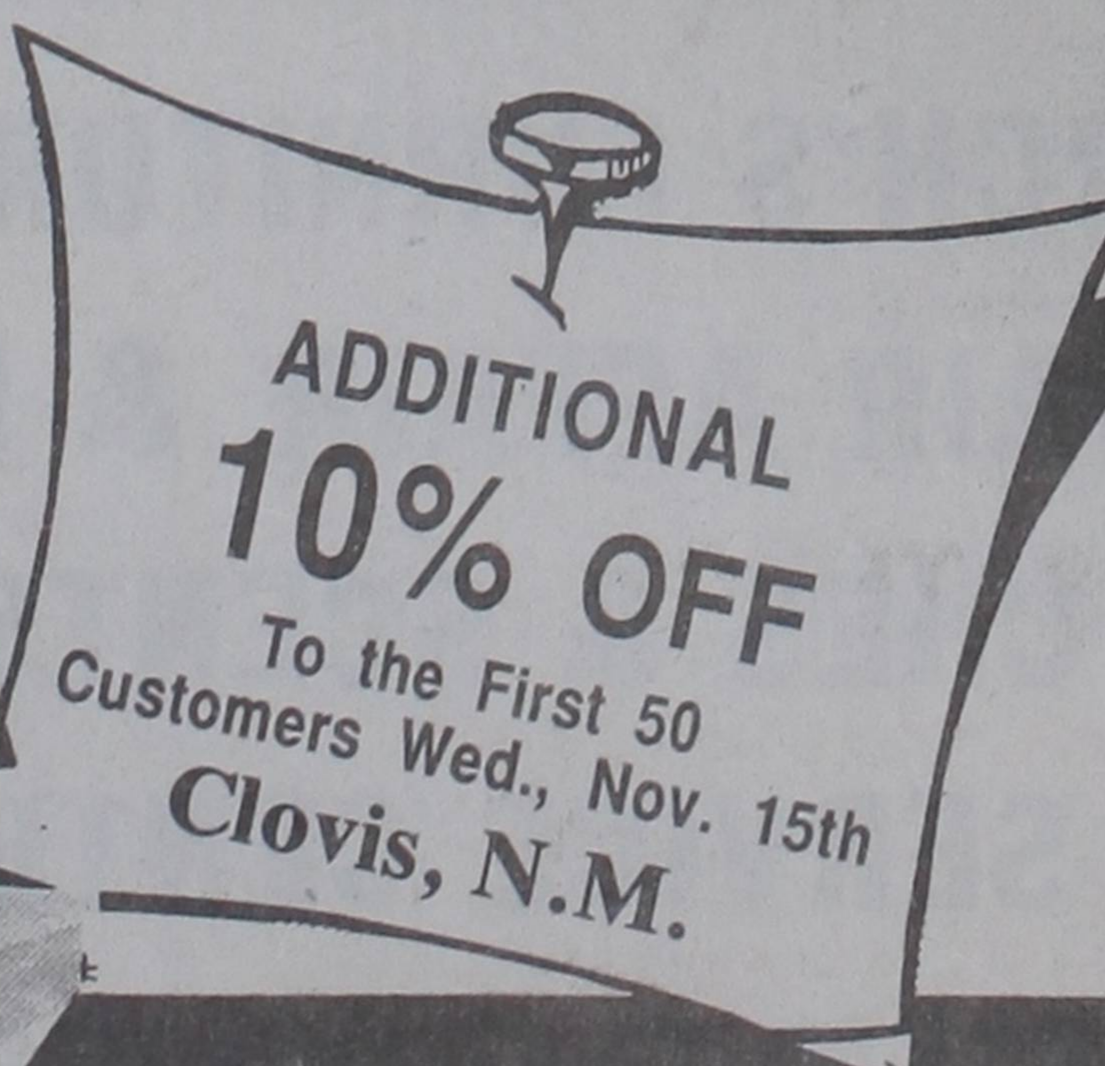

SCIENCE and GOD

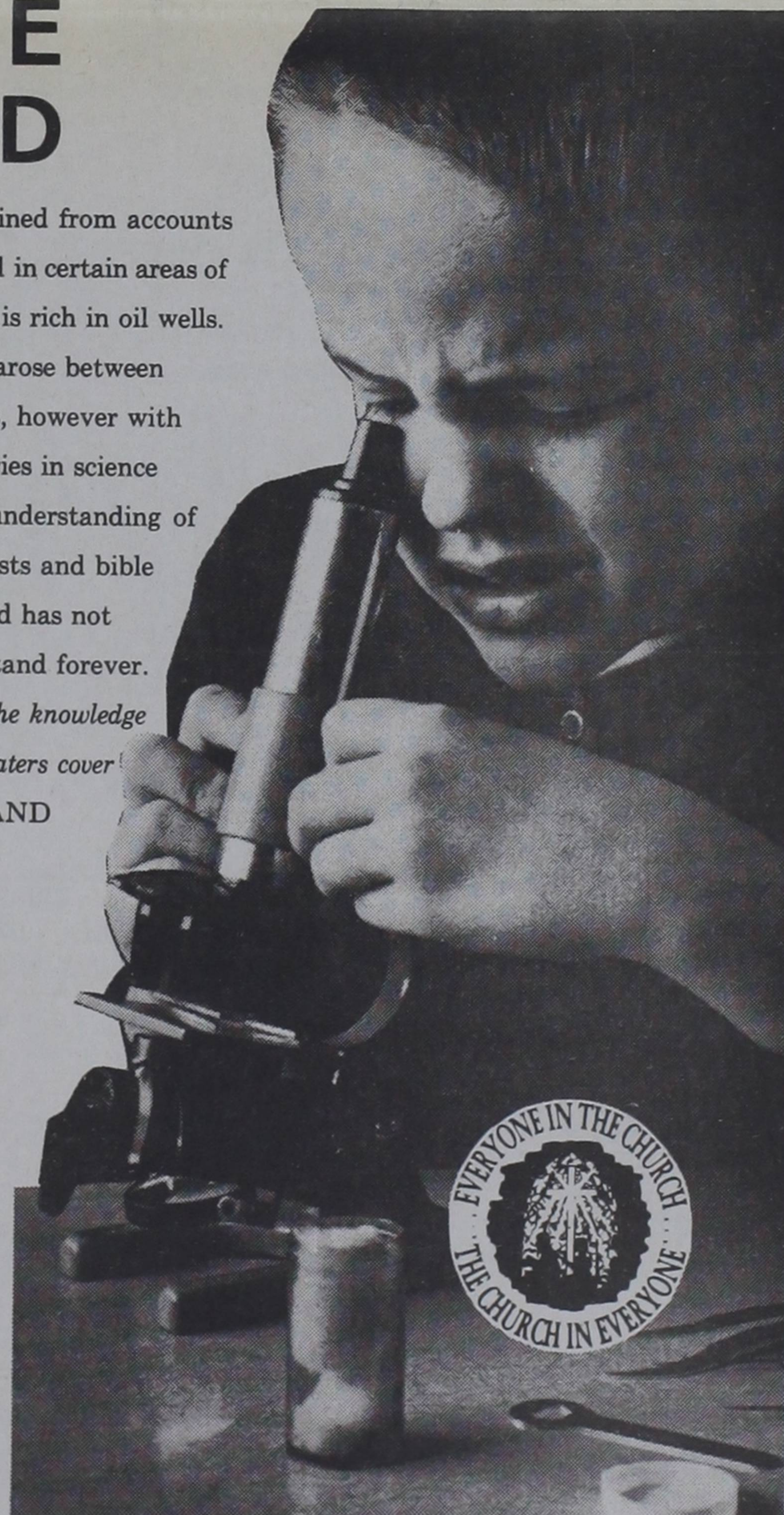
Not too long ago, a man determined from accounts in the bible that oil could be found in certain areas of bible lands . . . now this country is rich in oil wells.

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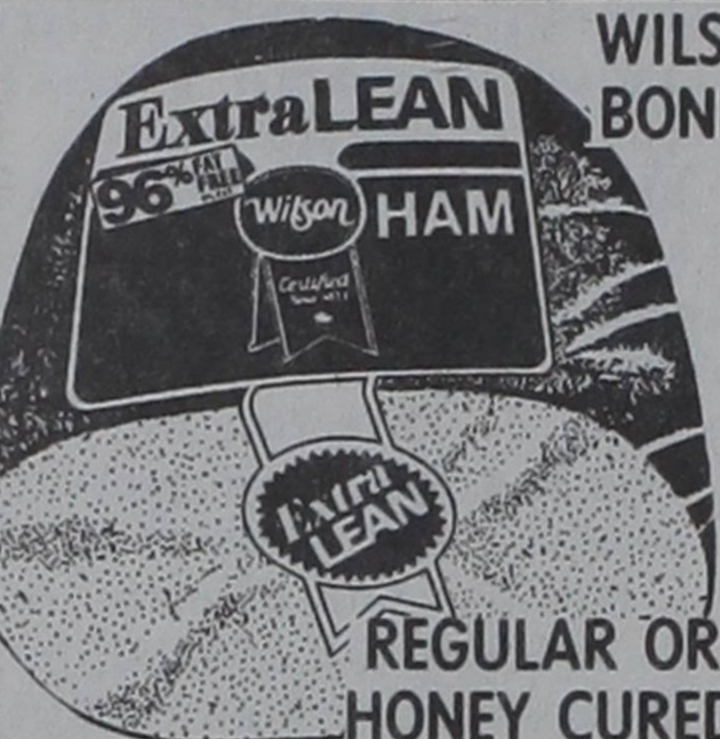
