Auto Death Rate Appalling
What was once considered a hightoned means of transporting oneself about in persuit of pleasure is now turned into an instrument of death. When formerly in the horse days automobiles
were as scarce almost as hen's were as scarce almost as hen's
teeth, they were targets of envy and admiration. They are now as common as fleas on the proverbial dog, and those who do not ride in autos are about as safe in the streets of a large city as was a Teuton in
trench in the war.
trench in the war.
A war is now on to make the streets and roads of this country safe for pedestrinancy. Auto-
mobilists should mobilists should hereafter
watch their step or they will watch their step or they wil
find themselves fined, de-licens ed and perhaps jailed without alternate of fine.
In 1919, the census bureau reports were 3,800 persons who were killed in automobile accidents or who died as a result of injuries. This represents over 14 perons to every 100,000 population. Back in 1916 the rate was only one person to every
$2,000,000$ population, which goes $2,000,000$ population, which goes
to show the enormous increase in the number of automobiles in the last years. On the other hand steam railway fatalities decreased from 17 out of 100,000 in 1916 to 10 out of 100,000 in 1918. Street car mortalities have likewise decreased during this period.
