

A formula that will kill the boll weevil and keep a field clear of them until August, when the migratory weevils are in action, is being used this year by Dr. W. B. Taylor of Dexter, Laurens county, who has been growing cotton in Laurens for the past three years in spite of the boll weevil. Last year he made 139 bales on 150 acres, in spite of the weevil, wet weather and other hindrances.


