Callahan County Junior Livestock Show Draws Over 250 Entries

CROSS PLAINS —The annual Callahan County Junior Livestock show ended Saturday with over 250 entries judged during the 2-day show. Individuals serving as superintendents during the show were: Jimmy Roppolo - rabbits; Larry Allen - poultry; Edwin Schaefer, breeding sheep, fat lambs and goats; Jimmy West - swine; Lloyd Barr Jr., - dairy cattle; Don Harris and Herman Glueck - beef cattle.

Judges for the show were J. I. Moore, poultry; Byron Wilson, rabbits; Bill Scott, sheep, goats and swine; Bobby Lemmons, dairy and beef cattle.

General superintendent was C. Lee Smith of Clyde.

Despite the winter weather, the show was termed a success.

Cody Golson brought home a victory for the host, Cross Plains with a 1st place crossbred heavyweight lamb. From there on out, the championships belonged to Charles Key for market lambs, and that meant honors to Clyde FFA Key took the reserve champion crossbred, exhibited the champion finewool lamb, and polished it off by winning reserve champion finewool. Key is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Key of Clyde.

The medium wool Hampshire mutton winner was Joe McNeil, Baird FFA, and son of Mr. and Mrs. Bob McNeil. Terry Neal of Baird exhibited the reserve champion. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Neal.

David Ratliff, Clyde 4-H'er, had both champion and reserve champion Southdown ewe.

Key was back in control of the goat show. He won all classes of does and had the champion and reserve champion and took 1st in the mutton and buck classes.

The poultry show was judged by J. I. Moore of Abilene. Jimmy Davis took honors in the poultry division, winning both champion and reserve champion. Jimmy is a member of Eula FFA Chapter.

Mark Davis of Cross Plains had the champion hen and Ricky Smith exhibited the reserve champion.

Richard Bade, Clyde FFA, won 1st with a turkey hen and opposite turkey.

In the rabbit division, Greg Henson of Clyde FFA had the champion and Donald Bowman of Eula 4-H exhibited reserve champion doe.

Henson was winner again with his champion buck rabbit, but a Eula FFA member, Mark Sharp took honors with his reserve champion buck.

In the barrow show, Diehl Estes scored big with champion red barrow and Dennis Tarrant came through with the reserve. Estes, a Clyde FFA member, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Word Estes, and Tarrant is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Jess Tarrant of Clyde.

Ricky Long had the champion white barrow. The Clyde 4-H'er is the son of Mr. and Mrs. LaWayne Long.

Saturday the show was cattle, from dairy cattle to English and French breeds of beef cattle.

Andy Vestal, Baird FFA, took home the big honors in Brahman competition. Andy won 1st in the steer lightweight competition and showed on to the champion honors of the division. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Dick Vestal of Baird. Steve Rhoton, son of Mr. and Mrs. Rex Rhoton of Baird, took reserve champion.

A Clyde 4-H'er, Tami Stone, came through with the champion in the French steer exhibition with his heavyweight 1st place winner. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Tim Stone of Clyde.

Another Clyde youth, Kim

Straley, took the reserve champion French steer in medium-weight competition. Her parents are Mr. and Mrs. C. T. Straley of Oplin.

Jury Duty Exemptions Available by Filing

BAIRD — Any person summoned as a juror who is exempt by law from jury service, may establish his exemption without appearing in person by filing a signed statement of the ground of his exemption with the clerk of the court, at any time before the date upon which he is summoned to appear.

A person may claim exemption because of the following reasons: All persons over sixty-five (65) years of age, or all females who have legal custody of a child or children under the age of ten (10) years.

An exemption form must be filled out, signed and returned to Albert Lovell, Tax Assessor-Collector, Callahan Co., Baird, Texas 79504.

State Sets 55 M.P.H. Speed Limits; Effective at 12:01 A. M. Sunday

AUSTIN — The Texas Highway Commission today set a statewide maximum speed limit of 55 miles per hour, effective at 12:01 a. m., Sunday, Jan. 20.

The action was taken in keeping with the law passed by the recent special session of the Texas Legislature, empowering the Commission to set lower speed limits to comply with federal energy saving actions.

Under the terms of the Emergency Highway Energy Conservation Act signed by the President Jan. 2nd, a state not establishing a 55 m.p.h. maximum speed limit would not receive its share of federal highway construction funds.

Federal taxes on items related to the operation of motor vehicles - notably a four cents per gallon levy on gasoline - go into the Federal Highway Trust Fund. These funds are apportioned back to the state for the federal government's share of highway construction.

Texas' share amounts to some \$240 million annually which would be withheld if the lower speed limit were not set by early March.

Today's action is subject to review within eight days by Governor Dolph Briscoe. The lower speed limits will apply to all highways in the state, including highways under the control of the Texas Turnpike Authority, cities and counties.

New speed limit signs replacing the old 70-m.p.h. maximum speed limit on the State's major highways, will be in place by the effective date. The Highway Department will begin immediately the task of making and posting the new signs.

The Commission also directed the Highway Department to monitor and document circumstances "which might relate to the establishment of speed limits and to report to the Commission on a monthly basis."

REGISTRATION RULES EXPLAINED -

BAIRD — Albert Lovell of Baird, Callahan County Tax Assessor-Collector who is also in charge of keeping voter registration polls, has offered the following explanation of registration regulations.

He noted that if a person registered after October 1, 1971, he is eligible to vote through 1974. Additionally, it was explained, that if a person votes in a primary or the general election this year, 1974, he will automatically be pre-registered for another three years.

Lovell further advised that if a person does not vote in the primary or general election this year that he will need to re-register. He pointed out, however, that his office would notify those who do not vote this year that re-registration is necessary.

The tax assessor-collector also stated that if a person has moved into Callahan County from elsewhere in Texas or from out-of-state, he must register at least 30 days prior to an election to be eligible to ballot.

Federal Land Bank Sets New Record in Volume of Loans Closed

COLEMAN — Leslie Bryant, Manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Coleman, announced today that the Federal Land Bank of Houston closed during the year 1973, \$254,130,000 in loans, the largest volume of loans closed in the Bank's 58-year history.

The previous record high for loans in a single year was in 1972 when the Bank closed more than \$164,000,000 in loans.

The increased demand for long-term credit is attributed to an increase in number of sales of farm and ranch properties.

Museum Board Reports 740 Visitors

BAIRD — The Pioneer Museum Board is proud to report that 1973 was a very successful year. During the year there was a total of 740 visitors in the Museum. The visitors came from 80 different towns, and 17 different states.

Aliens To Report During January

SAN ANTONIO - According to Joe F. Staley of the San Antonio Immigration and Naturalization Service office, the information furnished by aliens in reporting their addresses has been declared confidential by statute.

These reports must be submitted during January each year by all aliens in the United States, with few exceptions. Forms on which to submit the reports are available at any Post Office or office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Persons who are unable to pick up a form because of illness, or other reasons, may have a relative or friend obtain a card for them.

The card should have an 8 cents postage stamp affixed and placed in the mail.

Parents or guardians of aliens under fourteen years of age submit reports for such children.

1. For savings on energy, set the thermostat on the temperature setting that provides adequate comfort (the President suggests 68°). Don't continually switch it up and down. Remember, the lower you set the thermostat in the winter the more money you save on energy.

5. Some wall heaters have fan-forced circulation. To clean, turn the unit "OFF". Blow dust out of unit with vacuum exhaust attachment. Clean the grill cover with a vacuum or warm detergent water.
6. Proper insulation and weather stripping will make your home more comfortable. It will help keep dust and dirt from blowing in, and will help to eliminate cold drafts in the winter time, thus saving money on your heating bill.

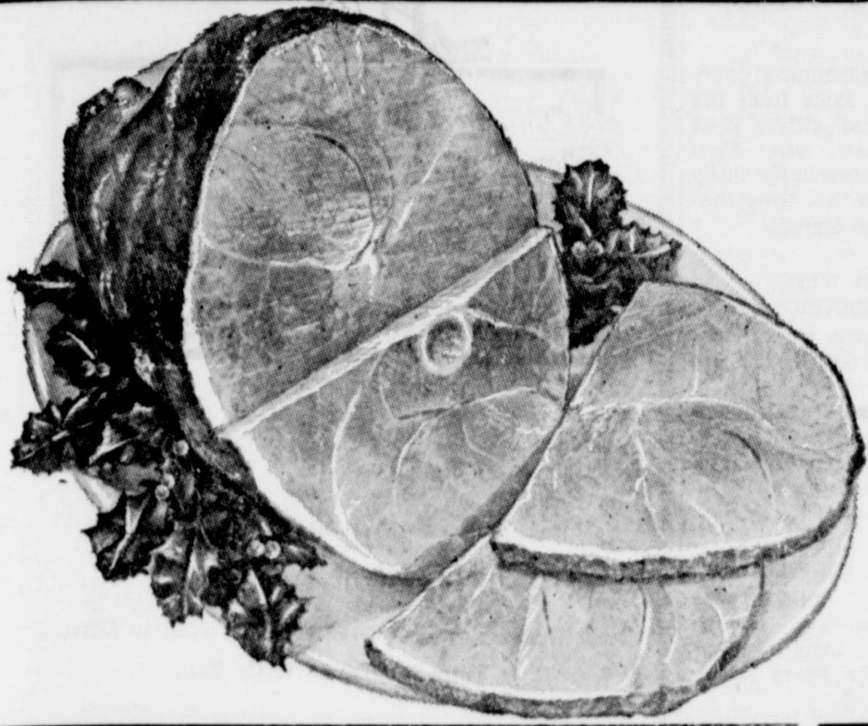

The B team girls won a close victory over Merkel by a score of 19-17.

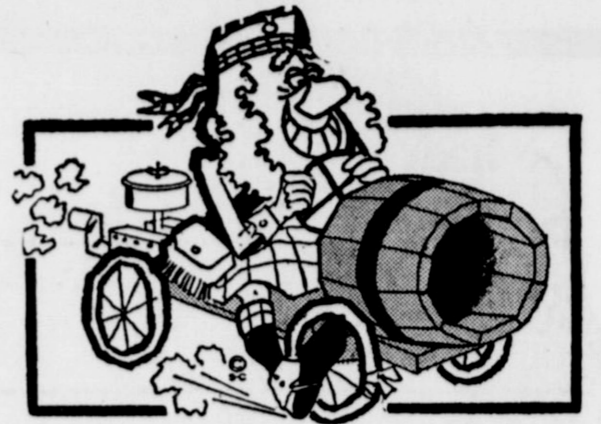
Leading scorer for Baird was Trina Hatcher with 10 points. Bowen and Cochran of Merkel tied with 7 points each.
