




The two most important questions before the American people today are: 1 How much can I get out of the good will of my business which I have so mercilessly abused? 2 When I get going again, what speed can I establish and maintain in order to be ble to take the hills? Starting and stopping again is an expensive process.

Twenty years ago one of the best known names in national advertising was Pyle's Pearline. which had advertised continuously since 1873. In 1907 the concern passed into the hands of trustees who thought they could save hundreds of dollars by cutting out advertising. In 1914 Pearline spent \$150,000 in advertising-a sum that would make a comfortable dent on the market for a new product. But Pearline sold to the Procter-Gamble Co. for the worth of the machinery as junk, and the stock on hand as raw material.

Hart Schaffner & Marx have shown by charts what it cost a retail clothing house to start advertising, stop and start again.
