## Methods For Relief of Unemployment Taken Up

Washington, Oct. 1.—Methods for initiating the emergency measures for the relief of the nation's involuntary idle adopted by the national conference on unemployment were being considered Saturday by Secretary Hoover and executive officers of the conference.

One plan under consideration was said to contemplate a message to the governors of States and the mayors of all towns with a population of 25,000 or more setting forth the action of the conference and asking immediate co-operation to put the recommendations into effect.

In addition it was suggested that President Harding might, by some official word from the White House, call upon the various federal, State and municipal authorities to combine their efforts to relieve the situation under the conference program.

## K. K. K. Sends \$100 to Aid Colored Methodist Church

Palestine, Texas, Oct. 1.—The cornerstone for a new church building being erected by colored Methodists here has been laid. In a published statement showing contributions, acknowledgment is made of the receipt of a letter containing \$100 from the local Knights of the Ku Klux Klan.

## Inmate of Asylum Says Governor Neff is Imposter

Austin, Tex., Oct. 1.—Governor Neff is an impostor and should be kept from fooling the people any longer, according to an inmate of the North Texas insane asylum. The inmate insists that he is the rightful governor of Texas, according to the report of Dr. C. W. Castner, a physician of the institution, who is in Austin on business.

The inmate keeps account of every bill passed by the legislature, blue-pencils appropriations, vetoes and approves bills, and fills appointments whenever the occasion arises. He carried on the business of the state in a dignified and impressive manner unless asked about Governor Neff, when he immediately flies into a rage and denounces the governor in no uncertain terms.

The inmate evidently does not approve of the manner of the present administration, for he issues pardons and proclamations in profusion, and in general controls the policy of the state.

## Congress to Take up Investigation of Ku Klux Klan

Washington, Oct. 1.—After a conference with Attorney General Daugherty, Chairman Campbell of the house rules committee, announced today that public hearings by the committee on resolutions to investigate the activities of the Ku Klux Klan would be held Tuesday, Oct. 11.

While Chairman Campbell declined to discuss the nature of his talk with the attorney general and also with William J. Burns, head of the department of justice bureau of investigation, it was indicated that Mr. Daugherty was not interposing objection to the plan of having congress look into the affairs of the organization.

William J. Simmons, imperial wizard of the order and its proponents, of pending investigations calling for an inquiry by the house, to attend the hearings, with such witnesses as they might desire to present. In telegrams to senators and representatives Simmons asked for a sweeping investigation of the klan.

Some opposition has developed among house members, it is said, to an investigation on the ground that if one was deemed necessary it should be made by the department of justice. The rules committee will decide, however, whether action shall be taken by the house.

## The Senatorial Contest

Interest in the senatorial contest to be staged next year is already manifesting itself. Seven candidates have already definitely entered the race, and there are a number of others who may do so. The announced candidates are:

Cullen F. Thomas, Dallas; Oscar B. Colquitt, Dallas; Sterling P. Strong; Dalas; Thomas B. Love, Dallas; Clarence Ousley, Ft. Worth; Earle B. Mayfield, railroad commissioner, Austin; Lucian W. Parrish, Henrietta.

It is almost certain that Senator Culberson will be a candidate to succeed himself.

Others prominently mentioned for the place are Cone Johnson of Tyler; Robert L. Henry of Waco; Thos. L. Blanton of Abilene; Thomas M. Campbell, of Palestine; W. P. Hobby of Beaumont.

The voters should have no difficulty in choosing their man, as every assorted brand of democracy known is included in the above line up.

**The News Boiled Down**

Major General Leonard Wood has applied for retirement from active service in the army, under the thirty-year service law.

Russia anti-Bolshevists leaders in Paris have sent a message to Secretary Hoover expressing gratitude for this country's relief work in Russia.

In the last fifteen years the Italian Government has spent \$44,600,000 for repairs in provinces and towns which have suffered from earthquakes.

Participation of army flyers or army flying machines in exhibition flights, except as may be arranged by the Government, has been prohibited by the War Department.

More than one hundred anarchists are at liberty in this country under bond. On account of the refusal of the Soviet government to accept them it has been impossible to deport them.

**WHY THEY QUIT**

The Wellesley, Ont., Maple Leaf has ceased publication. In its farewell notice the publisher said:

"After a struggle of over 21 years, the Maple Leaf goes the way of most small country papers during the past four years. During these four years the cost of production has increased from 200 to 300 per cent while the income is practically the same. This has caused the suspension or amalgamation of over 200 newspapers during the past few years.

"The reason the newspaper graveyard is so full is shown by an editor who has been investigating the cause of the high mortality. He figures out that in 1907 wages were at 100. In 1914 they had advanced 178 and in 1921 the figure was 393. News print from 100 jumped to 177 in 1914 and to 623 in 1921. Newspaper postage which cost the normal of 100 in 1907 was 147 in 1914 and 337 in 1921. Ink was 100 in 1907, 200 in 1914 and today stands at 331.

"Editorial expense advanced from 100 in 1907 to 120 in 1914 and 241 in 1921. Miscellaneous expenses went from 100 in 1907 to 125 in 1914 and to 244 in 1921. By taking the average of all newspaper costs it was found that while the average or index number of 1907 was 100, in 1914 it was 159, and in 1921 it reached the high mark of 411.

"More than 4000 newspaper publications have thus gone out of existence in the United States and a corresponding number of them in Canada."—Houston Post.

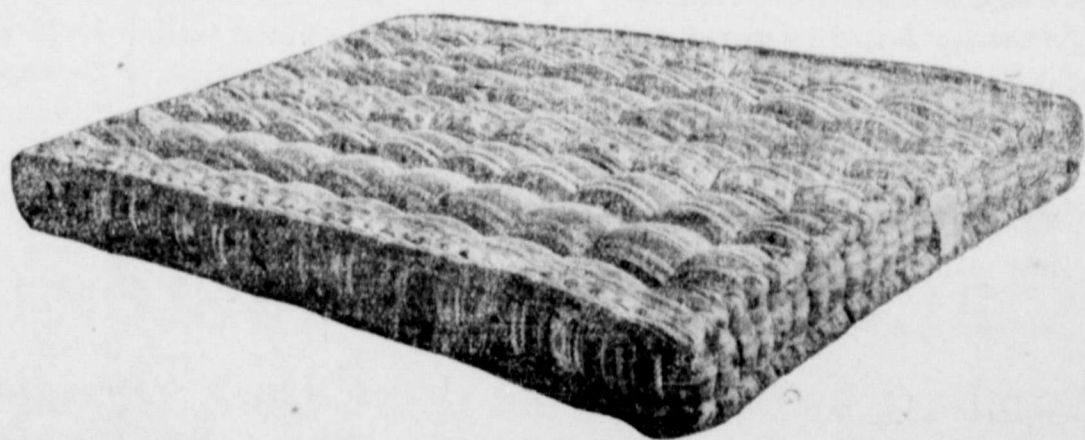
