

Eastern Texas Railroad the right to abandon its track, and can utter the glowing patriotism What kind of spokesman will is worth 330 marks today and the state of Texas, through its railroad commission and attorney general, successfully contested that order in the supreme court.

The highest court having held the state law superior to the order of the interstate commerce commission, the Eastern Texas Railroad recently contended before Judge West for the state to compel the operation of the road was to violate that provision of the constitution forbidding the taking of property without due process of law; that its operation would be at a loss and require the owners of the roal to put up their money to sustain its maintenance. This contention has evidently been upheld by Judge West, though his opinion in the case will be filed later. His reasons were not known today.

The railroad commissioners, Attorney General W. A. Keeling, the Cotton Belt Lumber Company and others are enjoined and restrained from commencing suit of preceedings against the railroad company for the recovery of damages, fines or penalties, under the provisions of the laws of Texas, or any other provisions of law, which would prevent or tend to prevent the railroad compeny from abandoning the operation of its railroad or dismantling same.
