In the third place, nearly all of the best breeders use segregated gins, that is, no other seed but their own passes through their gin mixing with hrough their gin, mixing with inferior seeds cannot occur. In
the fourth place, the greatest work of the breeders is selecting and every year's crop which these men produce is the offspring of the finest selected plants of the year before, whereas other men rarely think of carrying on this hard, tedious work.
