Bond and Tax Measures Will Have to be Revoted

Some time ago voters of the Grapeland Independent School District voted upon and carried by a large majority the propositions of raising the tax rate not to exceed \$1.00 on the one hundred dollars valuation and to issue bonds in the sum of \$25,-000.00 for a new high school building. It now develops there was a flaw in the election in that only twenty days notice was given, when the new law calls for thirty days. This flaw prevents the board from selling the bonds or enforcing the collection of the new tax.

It will all have to be done over, and a petition is being circulated this week asking the board to call another election in conformity with the new law. No doubt the board will order the election within the next few days. It is expected that both measures will carry by heavy majorities as they did before.

The vote in the previous election was as follows:

For the bonds 142; against 57. For the tax 138; against 59.
