It will all have to be done over, and a petition is being circulated this week asking the board to call another election in conformicall another election in conformity with the new law. No doub the board will order the election within the next few days. It is expected that both measures will carry by heavy majorities as they did before.
The vote in the previous election was as follows
For the bonds 142; against 57. For the tax 138; against 59.

## Household Hints

Before attempting to polish dark wood furnitüre, carefully wood furniture, carefully wash article with vinegar and water mixed together in equal proportions to remove all traces of dirt; then apply polish.
