

#### GRAPELAND POULTRY AS-SOCIATION ORGANIZED

Last Saturday afternoon at the High School Auditorium a number of ocal poultry fanciers and farmers met and organized the Grapeland Poultry Association.

Purposes of the organization were outlined by Earle Porter Adams of Crockett, for several years an ardent fancier and breeder of fine poultry and by Jno. R. Owens. Mr. Adams was made temporary chairman of the meeting and the following officers were elected: W. D. Ferguson, president, Mrs. L. D. Anderson, first vice-pres., Mrs. C. M. Streetman, second vice-pres., and Jno. R. Owens, Sec'y-Treas.

Mrs. W. W. McConnell, county Home Demonstration Agent was present at the meeting, and stated to the assembly that her work in the county included poultry work and that her services were available to any one who desired them in culling their flocks, selecting the best stock for freeding,

The chief objective of the association will be the improvement of the breeds of poultry and increasing the farm flocks, keeping systematic records of the cost and production of flocks and in fact, developing the poultry industry into one of the major pursuits of this territory.

Twenty-two men and women joined the association last Saturday and each was appointed a committee of one to bring as many new members to the second meeting next Saturday at the



#### LYNCH DAVIDSON OPENS CAMPAIGN FOR GOVERNOR

Groesbeck, Texas, Feb. 9 .- Lynch Davidson, former lieutenant governor of Texas, officially opened his campaign for Governor here today at the Methodist Church.

Mr. Davidson made a clear and concise statement and at the close of his speech summarized his position in approximately the following language: "I am for fewer and quicker justice.

I am for less taxes and fewer state jobs. I believe the state should be put on a cash basis. I believe there is 25 per cent waste in the operation of the state government and that \$10,-000.000 can, and should be, saved every two years, and that this \$10,000,000 should not be taken from the pockets of the tax payers. It should be left in the avenue of business and for the comfort and prosperity of Texas' homes.'

"When I say that I believe in less laws and and quicker justice, I mean that I favor the revoking of every unnecessary law now on the statute books of Texas. We are law ridden and law driven people. This maze of law puzzles and paralyzes business and destroys initiative. If we can clear Texas statute books of even one-half of the ten or twelve thousand laws which now puzzle and confuse us, our life would be simpler and our conduct far more law abiding than if we passed additional laws to make it so.

When we as a state are forced to. confess insolvency; when our employees must wait five months before the payroll for their services are available, am I presumptuous in stating that the paramount need of Texas is that someone of her citizens, skilled in business, offer himself as the helmsman during this financial storm? All other issues I consider secondary to these fundamentals."




