HALF OF STATE PROPERTY IS FREE OF TAXES

AUSTIN, Texas, May 30.—Practically half of the taxable property of the state is escaping taxation, according to a report filed with Governor Moody by F. S. Weibert, state commissioner.

Weibert says tax remission has been to such an extent that practically 7 per cent of the total tax valuation is now remitted to favored families for their own use and benefit. "That is an evil which at first is a public benefit," he says.

A report comments with favor on the action of the 40th legislature in shortening a tax survey of this year's states. He points out that these have benefited by such a survey.

Specifically he urges relief of agriculture from some of the tax burden particularly as it has no means of shifting this burden to the consumer. Agricultural lands now pay 3 per cent of the taxes, including stock. City and town lots pay 3 per cent or a combined total of 3 1/2 per cent. Banks pay 2 per cent and railroads 9.4 per cent.

The report shows an addition of \$4,281,578 to the intangible assessments against railroads this year. The increase, Weibert says, has been accepted by the roads. The total is \$79,462,701. It will produce \$600 revenue to the state and \$100 through which the roads

Something should be done, the report urges, about tax redemptions. It proposes that all bond issues be made payable in annual installments to prevent the hazard of investment of sinking funds at lower interest than the bonds bear.

Taxes for the support of the state government should be levied entirely on intangible values, including those of railroads, bridges, ferries, telegraph and telephone companies and "all other character of properties that have an intangible value."

That real estate be taxed solely for county and local purposes. That the state adopt some means, as the gasoline tax, to retire local bond issues authorized by various localities to build state highways.

One-Cent Fine Assessed Dallasite

DALLAS, Texas, May 30.—One cent will be the fine assessed by Judge W. H. Atwell in federal court here against O. T. Lindley, farmer, charged with possession of liquor. Lindley did not have the amount in change and an attorney sitting near him produced the copper which gave the defendant his freedom. Lindley had been in jail 30 days before his case came up for trial unable to make bond. Judge Atwell explained in assessing the minimum amount that he thought the man had been punished enough.

DALLAS CROOKS POSE AS RED CROSS WORKERS

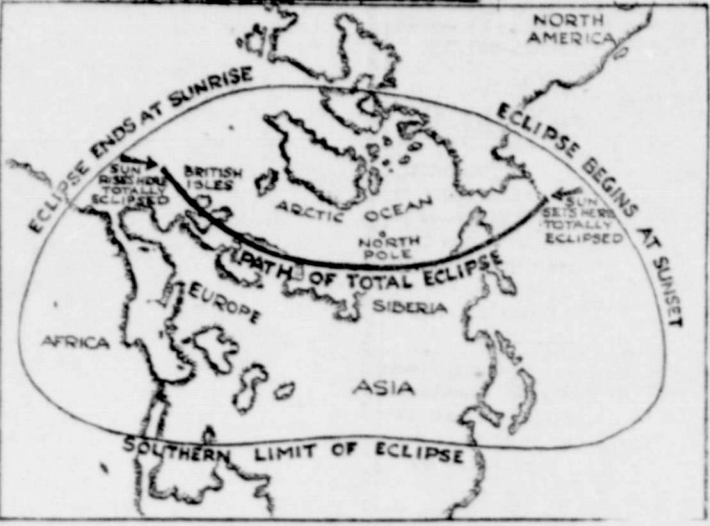
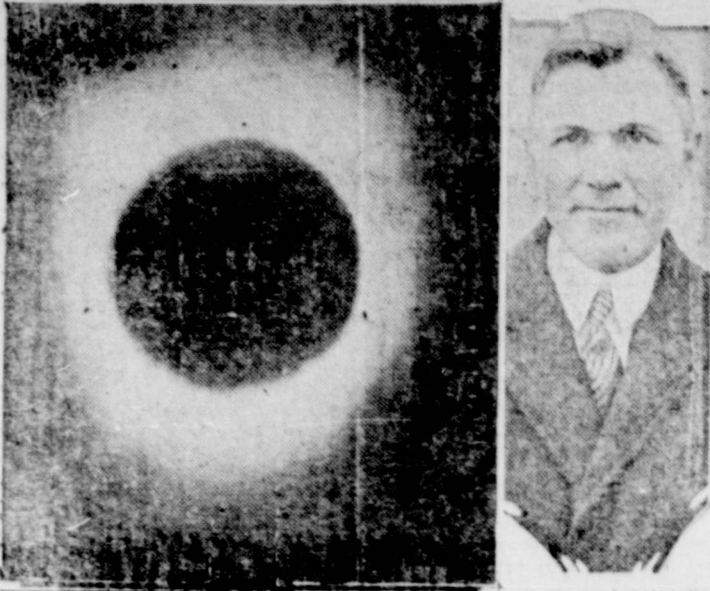

Will Next Eclipse Help Explain Weather's Pranks?



The eclipse of the sun on June 29 is expected to throw new light on many scientific problems, because only during an eclipse is the chromosphere of the sun visible. Perhaps the relation between the sun and the series of Mid-West storms may be explained. Above are shown the sun as it will appear during the eclipse with the chromosphere visible. Professor S. A. Mitchell, leader of the McCormick-Chaloner expedition, the most noted American expedition to study the phenomena, and a map showing the extent of the eclipse.

WASHINGTON (I-I-N).—Steps toward determining what relation the sun has to the series of floods and disasters that have struck the United States this year may be determined this summer.

On June 29 there will be a total eclipse of the sun, visible in Great Britain, Scandinavia and Siberia. Eclipse conditions offer aspects of the sun unobtainable in any other way. Information gained may throw new light on the theory that the forty storms, tornadoes and floods that have affected almost every section of the great Middle West in the last two months are traceable to ramifications of Old Sol. During eclipses only is it possible to make a deep study of the "flash spectrum," the name given to the spectrum of the chromosphere, the true solar atmosphere, that lies within 10,000 miles of the surface of the sun. In this region huge jets of incandescent elements play. Under normal conditions the light of the body of the sun swarms a full study of the chromosphere, but during the eclipse the sun itself is blotted out for a few seconds, leaving only the "flash spectrum" visible. These jets have been found to vary in dimension. Some scientists profess to see a close relationship between the condition of the chromosphere, sun spots, and weather on earth. Charts are being kept showing this relationship, and photographs made during the eclipse may confirm or disprove the theory. But this is not the only problem that the eclipse seems to offer a possible solution for. Other scientists expect to find an explanation of the structure of the atoms and others hope to learn more about the element coronium, which appears only in the sun's corona as far as is known.

The eclipse may be best studied in the path of the total eclipse, a strip about thirty miles wide running from Wales to Seaboard Heights in Great Britain, and along the southeastern coast of Norway. 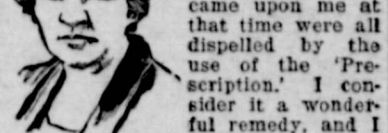
Car of Buffaloes Shipped From Albany
