SAN ANGELO, May 31.—No trace had been found tonight of Tom Freeze and Luther Anderson and Misses Inez Fondren and Edna Williams, their girl companions, all of San Angelo, who have been unheard from since leaving here early Sunday afternoon by auto with the announced intention of exploring a cave on the J. D. Sugg estate ranch in Irion county.

Search through the deep caverns was under way despite definite information that the car was not found near the cave as first reported. Examination inside the cave entrance also revealed no footprints. The couples, upon leaving Sunday, announced they would return in the evening and their relatives are at a loss to account for their disappearance unless some mishap has befallen them.

The only clue today was a report by a resident near the cave that he saw two young couples in a light touring car in Mertzon Sunday afternoon and that one of the girls wore striped coveralls. This corresponded to the description of the machine and of Miss Williams' costume.

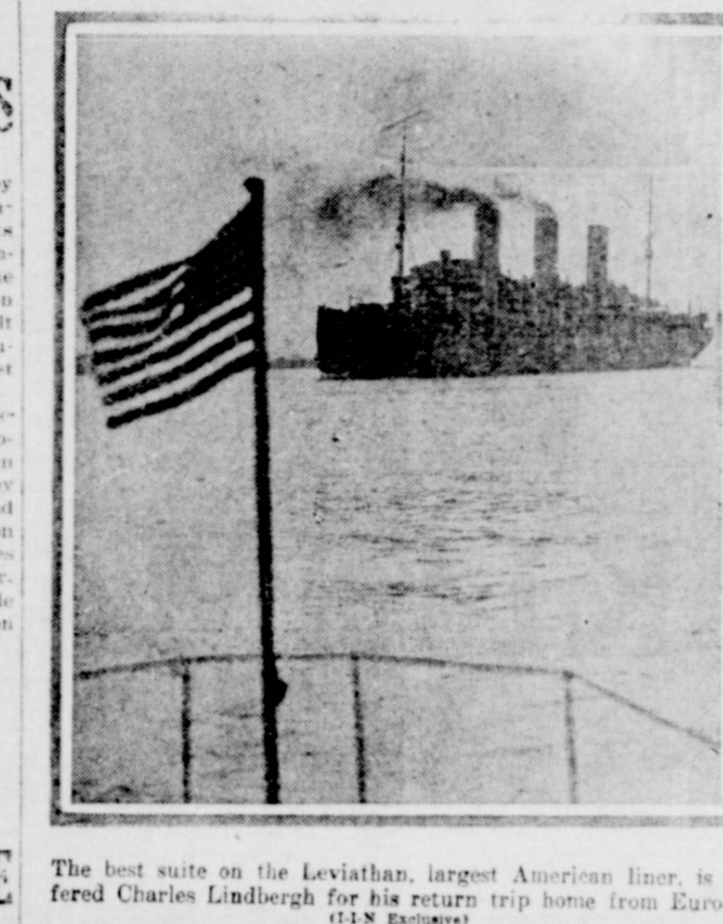
Injured Racers May Recover

RANGERS HOLD SUSPECT IN BANK HOLD UP

AUSTIN, May 31.—Texas Rangers at Berger are holding a man who has been identified as a member of the gang who held up and robbed the Beggs, Okla., bank a few weeks ago, according to information received by Adjutant General Robertson from Ranger Captain K. S. Sterling at Berger. The telegram stated the suspect was arrested May 26 and held for investigation. He was identified by employees of the Beggs bank May 29. Sterling wired.

OKLAHOMA HAS RECORD DAILY OIL OUTPUT

TULSA, Okla., May 31.—Led by increased production in the Seminole field, Oklahoma broke all previous high marks in daily average oil output for the week ending May 28, according to figures released by the Oil and Gas Journal. The increase came despite efforts of oil companies to curtail production. Daily average production for the state last week was 747,545 barrels, an increase of 10,910 barrels over the previous week, and 2,065 barrels over the week ending May 7. The greater Seminole reached a high average of 356,805 barrels daily average, as against 351,730 barrels for the week before, and 2,455 barrels above the record for the week.

RANGER SENDS THREE TO EAST ON SPECIAL

RANGER, May 31.—On June 19 the "all Texas special" will start on its good will tour of eastern cities, with one object in view, to sell Texas to the east.

Walter Murray, Le Roy Pearson and Hall Walker of Ranger will join the special in Fort Worth, and will do their part in selling Texas, especially Ranger and Eastland county to the people whose cities they will visit.

Wentz Starting Scranton Test

L. H. Wentz, operator of Ponca City, Okla., is starting his first well in this county. Heretofore his activities in Texas recently have been chiefly confined to Brown and Tipton counties where he has been remarkably successful.

C.-C. Directors Meet Tonight

Directors of the Cisco chamber of commerce will hold a meeting tonight at which several matters of importance are to be considered. A check up on finances of the organization is to be made, since the first six months of the current year are drawing to a close and plans for the remainder of the year are to be projected.

Cabinet Meeting Decides Official Celebration for Young Trans-Atlantic Aviator

WASHINGTON, May 31.—President Coolidge and his cabinet decided today to hold a national celebration in honor of Capt. Charles A. Lindbergh. The nature of the celebration will be determined by a cabinet committee comprised of Secretary of War Dwight Davis, Secretary of the Navy Wilbur, Secretary of Commerce Hoover and Postmaster General New. The committee will hold its first meeting late this afternoon.

TWO CHANNELS WOULD PREVENT MORE FLOODS

CHICAGO, May 31.—Robert Isham Randolph, director of the Mississippi Valley Association and the National Rivers and Harbors congress today announced a plan for a double channel to prevent further disastrous Mississippi floods. The plan will be submitted to a meeting called by Mayor Thompson of Chicago and Mayor O'Keefe of New Orleans which convenes here Thursday.

KING GEORGE DECORATES AMERICAN HERO

LONDON, May 31.—Captain Charles A. Lindbergh will leave Cherbourg, France, Saturday morning for New York aboard the United States Destroyer Brock, it was officially announced Tuesday.

CREDIT GIVEN FLOOD AREAS BY BANKERS

WASHINGTON, May 31.—Credit facilities sufficient to rehabilitate the flood areas of the south have been arranged by northern banking houses, Secretary Hoover announced today. The plan calls for loaning powers of local financing corporations in the south. Hoover explained following a conference with Louis Pierson of New York, president of the United States Chamber of Commerce, Pierson pledged the full resources of his organization in helping the south recover from the disastrous flood.

RED CROSS FUND REACHES \$14,531,000

WASHINGTON, May 31.—The Red Cross flood relief fund reached \$14,531,000 today.

PRESIDENT URGES CREDIT FOR FLOOD SUFFERERS

WASHINGTON, May 31.—President Coolidge today appealed to the United States Chamber of Commerce to aid rehabilitation work in the southern flood areas. In a letter, the president said funds were needed at once to launch credit corporations to make loans to farmers and others who have been wiped out by the disaster.

Moody's Civil Service Bill Now Appears Doomed in Senate; Road Funds Appropriated for Laterals

AUSTIN, May 31.—The civil service bill, one of Governor Moody's pet measures, will be defeated in the upper house it was indicated today when the senate refused to take up the bill on a point of order. Members said privately the bill was unlikely to pass the upper house. Senator Fairchild introduced a resolution providing for investigation of living conditions of a tribe of Alabama Indians said to be living in Polk and Tyler counties. "From a humane standpoint," Fairchild said, "it seems the people of Texas should take some interest in the condition of this tribe." Three senators, Lewis, Triplett and Fairchild, and three women, Mrs. L. R. Cadem, Mrs. Preslock and Mrs. J. E. Glenn of Beaumont were named members of the committee. The investigation will be conducted at the expense of the committee. A bill to appropriate \$10,000 for a survey of the Davis Mountains to determine feasibility of building a state highway was passed.

The senate passed the Fairchild bill today appropriating \$3,000,000 out of the highway fund during the biennium for improvement of lateral roads. Opponents declared this bill would cripple the plans of the highway commission to work out a program of road work.

"I want to pull the farmers out of the mud and improve the country roads so that the rural people can get to the highways. I am not surprised at the present commission getting in bad with the people because they are not helping the farmers," said Senator Fairchild. In the house the first hour was devoted to debating whether to pay the expense of the committee that codified the school laws of the state. The civil service bill was then taken up. This bill provides that employees of the state must pass examinations given by a committee selected by the board of control.

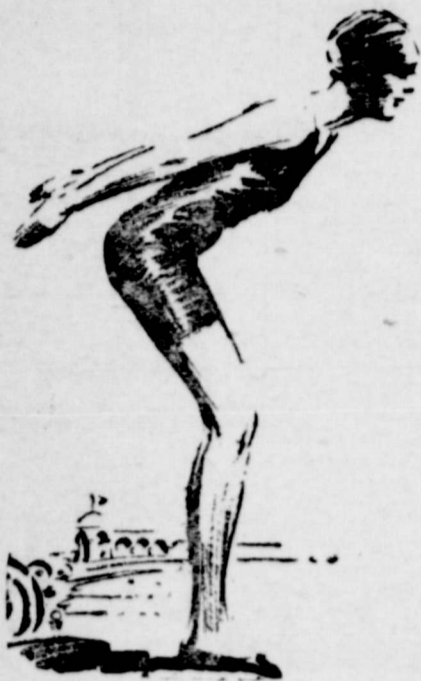

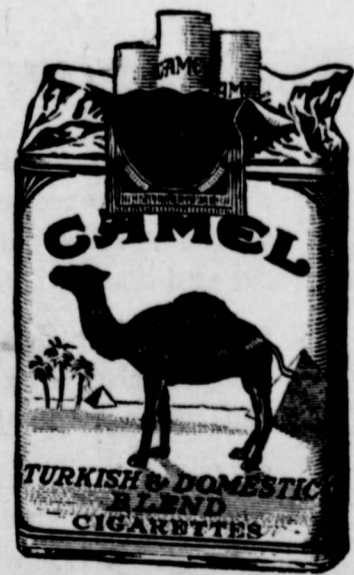
