### GERMANY ANGERED BY SLIGHT FROM LINDBERGH

BERLIN, June 1.—While New York and Washington are reported fighting for the opportunity of welcoming Captain Lindbergh, Berlin is expressing considerable chagrin that Lindbergh will not visit here, and attention was brought to the fact that he visited only countries which were recently enemies of Germany. Newspapers declare that political wire pulling has prevented Lindbergh from continuing his European tour, and directly charges Ambassador Herrick is responsible. It charges Herrick is "more French than the French themselves" and that he did not wish Germany to participate in expressions of friendship. Other papers declare Lindbergh is angry because he was not permitted to visit Germany.

### COOLIDGE DENIES POLITICS INFLUENCED HIS PLANS

WASHINGTON, June 1.—President Coolidge took upon himself to ask Captain Charles Lindbergh to re-enter the United States via Washington, it was said at the White House today. Lindbergh's officials were invited to a luncheon at the White House to discuss the matter. Lindbergh is expected to arrive in Washington on Saturday, June 11.

### FLYER ACCEPTS OFFER TO RIDE CRUISER HOME

LONDON, June 1.—Captain Lindbergh today accepted "with thanks" President Coolidge's offer of the U. S. Cruiser Memphis on which to return to the United States. The Memphis will pick up the flyer from the Cherbourg and come straight to Washington where he will be honored on the afternoon of Saturday, June 11.

### FORD OFFERS LINDBERGH AVIATION MANAGERSHIP

LONDON, June 1.—Capt. Charles A. Lindbergh was informed today that a cablegram was awaiting him in Paris offering him the general managership of the airplane division of the Ford Motor company and an interest in the airplane works said to be worth \$10,000,000. 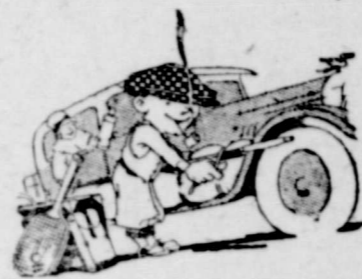

TEXAS LOSES CLAIM TO 225,000 ACRES

WASHINGTON, June 1.—The appeal of Texas to enforce its claim to 225,000 acres of land in Travis county, acquired by David Faskan, a Canadian, was dismissed by the supreme court Tuesday for want of jurisdiction. Texas sought to obtain the land under the alien land law which prohibits foreigners from acquiring land in the state. NEW YORK, June 1.—Inspired by the spectacular achievement of Captain Charles Lindbergh in flying from New York to Paris without a stop, aviators in this country are now seeking new air worlds to conquer.

What will be the next air exploit? This question is being asked on all sides in view of the seemingly easy manner in which "Slim" Lindbergh winged his way across the expansive Atlantic to the French capital. Yet, strangely enough, there are not a great many new flights left—that is, flights that would appeal to the imagination as has Lindbergh's and that would go down into history as epoch-making accomplishments.

New Air Adventures

- 1. A flight from the Pacific coast to Honolulu.
- 2. A flight from the Pacific coast to Japan.
- 3. Pacific coast to Philippine Islands.
- 4. Pacific Coast to Australia.
- 5. A non-stop flight over the North Pole, between Spitzbergen and Alaska, in a heavier-than-air machine.
- 6. A flight over the South Pole.
- 7. A transcontinental non-stop flight to lower the record of Macready and Kelly, established in 1927.
- 8. An attempt to break the endurance flying record recently established by Chamberlain and Acosta.

Byrd to South Pole  
Commander Richard E. Byrd, who last year flew over the North Pole, is contemplating making the trip over the South Pole this year. Lindbergh has indicated he would like to break the world's endurance record.

like to break the world's endurance record.

Army and navy fliers have been turning a speculative eye toward Hawaii. The flight was attempted twice and each time resulted in failure. There is rivalry between both arms of the service to see which branch will make this 2,100 mile jump first. Other fliers, too, are interested.

Linton Wells, holder of the world's speed record, has suggested a speed flight around the world to break the record he holds of 28 days, 14 hours and 36 minutes, 5 seconds. Wells established this record last year, covering 8,500 miles of the distance by airplane.

Outlining a route around the world of approximately 22,000 miles he said it was possible, in his opinion, to make such a flight in 15 days. He had contemplated a trip in which he and Lieut. Leigh Wade would leave New York on July 1 and circle the globe in half a month. Several months ago he made an unsuccessful attempt to raise money to finance such a hazardous journey.

Made Big Plans

He and Wade planned to jump off at New York for San Francisco without a stop; make changes in his plane there and, after a rest, hop off for Hawaii; then after another brief rest head for Midway Island, 1,200 miles northwest of Honolulu; refuel and set forth on the great adventure of flying 2,500 miles from Midway, Island to the Japanese archipelago, arriving at Kasumigaura naval station near Yokohama on July 67, six days out of New York. The next hop would be to Harbin, Manchuria, 1,000 miles, and then over a route including stops for oil at a few of the following points: Chita, Irkutsk, Tomsk, Omsk, Kurgan, Kazan, Moscow (all in Siberia) and Russia; Kovne, Lithuania, Keoningsburg, East Prussia, Berlin, Paris and London.

"With luck we would be in London on July 13, and then hop off for New York," he said. "Arriving in New York on July 15, we would have circled the world in fifteen days and smashed a number of records in doing it."

### Big Producer Finds Best Market Can Be Obtained Through Efforts of Co-Operation by Producers

### CONTRACT ON ABILENE ROAD WORK HELD UP

ABILENE, May 30.—An unexpected delay has arisen in connection with receipts of bids on surfacing State Highway No. 1, east of Abilene to the Callahan county line.

Judge W. R. Ely, state highway commissioner, returned from Austin and was advised by A. R. Losh, director for Texas of the U. S. Bureau of Good Roads, that specifications on the six-mile strip east of Abilene were being returned to Austin "for substantial corrections."

While Losh's telegram did not say so, it is assumed that his office has found unreasonable the specifications covering bituminous asphaltic topping. As finally completed for his approval the specifications called for receipt of alternate bids on brick, concrete and asphalt. Specifications for asphalt called for an eight-inch base, three inches of asphaltic concrete filler, and a two-inch topping or 13 inches in all.

In competition with brick and concrete, asphaltic bids are usually low, but it is said that under the Taylor county asphaltic specifications, contractors would have to bid higher on the 13-inch basis than on either brick or concrete. Among others, the West Texas Construction company found itself "let out" on the 13-inch requirement. This concern had expected to put in a bid and if successful, lay Warrenite bitulithic and go into the road building game on a large scale.

### TEXAS POSTAL EMPLOYEES PLAN ABILENE MEET

ABILENE, Texas, May 30.—Over 2,000 employees of the federal post-office department will gather in Abilene on July 4, 5 and 6 for a three-cornered convention of mail handlers. It is highly probable that this number will be increased by several hundred if the Texas branch of the National Association of Postal Supervisors selects this city as their meeting place.

### TO START NEW DORMITORY AT RANDOLPH

The Texas Rural Letter Carriers and the Post Office Clerks of Texas selected Abilene as their meeting place in convention last year at Nacogdoches. The League of Texas Postmasters, composed of executives of third and fourth class mail dispensaries in the state recently named Abilene as the 1927 convention site and selected July 4-5 and 6 as the dates. Efforts are being made to have one or more officials of the postoffice department attend the convention.

Many notable Texas men will form the "all Texas special," among them being Governor Dan Moody.

### OKLAHOMA HAS RECORD DAILY OIL OUTPUT

TULSA, Okla., May 31.—Led by increased production in the Seminole field, Oklahoma broke all previous high marks in daily average oil output for the week ending May 28, according to figures released by the Oil and Gas Journal.

The average production for the state last week was 747,545 barrels, an increase of 10,910 barrels over the previous week and 2,665 barrels over the week ending May 7, high average at that time.

The greater Seminole reached a high average of 359,805 barrels daily average, as against 351,430 barrels for the week before, and 2,455 barrels above the record for the week.

Pierson pledged the full resources of his organization in helping the south recover from the disastrous flood.

### PRESIDENT URGES CREDIT FOR FLOOD SUFFERERS

WASHINGTON, May 31.—President Coolidge today appealed to the United States Chamber of Commerce to aid rehabilitation work in the southern flood areas. In a letter, the president said funds were needed at once to launch credit corporations to make loans to farmers and others who have been wiped out by the disaster.

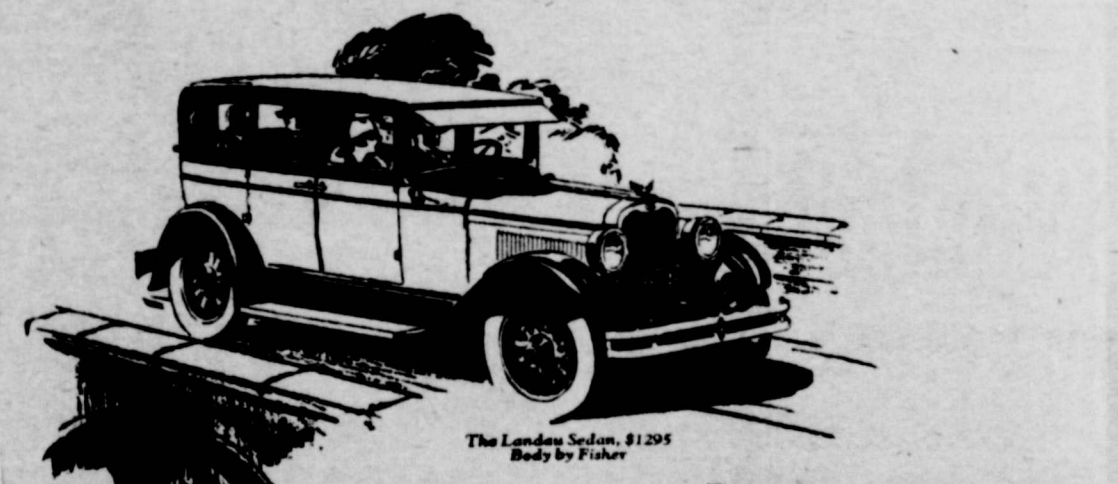

# STATE PROPERTY IS FREE OF TAXES

AUSTIN, Texas, May 30.—Practically half of the taxable property of the state is exempt from taxation, according to a report filed with Governor Moody by F. S. Weinert, state tax commissioner.

Weinert says tax remission has grown to such an extent that practically 7 per cent of the total tax valuation is now remitted to favored localities for their own use and benefit. "That is an evil which at first was a public benefit," he says.

The report comments with favor upon action of the 40th legislature in authorizing a tax survey of this and other states. He points out that 14 states have benefited by such surveys.

Specifically he urges relief of agriculture from some of the tax burden, particularly as it has no means of shifting this burden to the consumer. Agricultural lands now pay 43.8 per cent of the taxes, including livestock. City and town lots pay 28 per cent or a combined total of 70.8 per cent. Banks pay 2 per cent and railroads 9.4 per cent.

The report shows an addition of \$44,281,578 to the intangible assessments against railroads this year. The increase, Weinert says, has been accepted by the roads. The total is now \$79,462,791. It will produce \$11,800,000 revenue to the state and counties through which the roads pass.

Something should be done, the report urges, about tax redemptions. It proposes that all bond issues be made payable in annual installments to prevent the hazard of investment of sinking funds at lower interest than the bonds bear.

Taxes for the support of the state government should be levied entirely upon intangible values, including those of railroads, bridges, ferries, telegraph and telephone companies and "all other character of properties that have an intangible value."

That real estate be taxed solely for county and local purposes. That the state adopt some means, as the gasoline tax, to retire local bond issues authorized by various localities to build state highways.

ABILENE, Texas, May 28.—Automobile race fans of West Texas are assured of the best lineup of drivers ever together in the south-west, on July 4 at the West Texas Fair track in this city, for annual Independence day classic, according to D. H. Jeffries, official representative of the American Automobile association. The races will be held under the supervision and with the sanction of that organization.

# New Air Worlds to Conquer Sought by American Aviators as Lindbergh Receives Ovation Over Whole Earth

NEW YORK, June 1.—Inspired by the spectacular achievement of Captain Charles Lindbergh in flying from New York to Paris without a stop, aviators in this country are now seeking new air worlds to conquer.

What will be the next air exploit? This question is being asked on all sides in view of the seemingly easy manner in which "Slim" Lindbergh winged his way across the expanded Atlantic to the French capital. Yet, strangely enough, there are not a great many new flights left—that is, flights that would appeal to the imagination as has Lindbergh's in this country are now seeking new air worlds to conquer.

But, just the same, new air adventures are being conceived and at no distant date one, several or all of the following may be attempted:

- 1. A flight from the Pacific coast to Honolulu.
- 2. A flight from the Pacific coast to Japan.
- 3. Pacific coast to Philippine Islands.
- 4. Pacific Coast to Australia.
- 5. A non-stop flight over the North Pole, between Spitzbergen and Alaska, in a heavier-than-air machine.
- 6. A flight over the South Pole.
- 7. A transcontinental non-stop flight to lower the record of Macready and Kelly, established in 1927.
- 8. An attempt to break the endurance flying record recently established by Chamberlain and Acosta.

Byrd to South Pole  
Commander Richard E. Byrd, who last year flew over the North Pole, is contemplating making the trip over the South Pole this year. Lindbergh has indicated he would like to break the world's endurance record.

Army and navy fliers have been turning a speculative eye toward Hawaii. The flight was attempted twice and each time resulted in failure. There is rivalry between both arms of the service to see which branch will make this 2,100 mile jump first. Other fliers, too, are interested.

Linton Wells, holder of the world's speed record, has suggested a speed flight around the world to break the record he holds of 28 days, 14 hours and 36 minutes, 5 seconds. Wells established this record last year, covering 8,500 miles of the distance by airplane.

Outlining a route around the world he said it was possible, in his opinion, to make such a flight in 15 days. He had contemplated a trip in which he and Lieut. Leigh Wade would leave New York on July 1 and circle the globe in half a month. Several months ago he made an unsuccessful attempt to raise money to finance such a hazardous journey.

Made Big Plans  
He and Wade planned to jump off at New York for San Francisco without a stop; make changes in his plane there and after a rest-stop off for Hawaii; then after another brief rest head for Midway Island, 1,200 miles northwest of Honolulu; refuel and set forth on the great adventure of flying 2,500 miles from Midway Island to the Japanese archipelago, arriving at Kasumigaura naval station near Yokohama on July 6-7, six days out of New York. The next hop would be to Fuybin, Manchuria, 1,000 miles, and then over a route including stops for oil at a few of the following points: Chita, Irkutsk, Tomsk, Omsk, Kuznan, Kazan, Moscow (all in Siberia and Russia); Kovne, Lithuania, Keoningsburg, East Prussia, Berlin, Paris and London.
