### Togo Ray of Cisco Gets 25 Years in Prison When Found Guilty of Robbing Ovalo Bank; Trying Pal

ABILENE, June 3.—Togo Ray of Cisco was convicted in forty-second district court here today of robbing the First State bank of Ovalo on March 26, to which he confessed and was sentenced to 25 years in the penitentiary. The jury deliberated only a few minutes. The defense introduced no evidence after Judge Milburn S. Long had denied a motion for continuance presented with a certificate from a physician that Ray has amnesia and was in no condition to attend the trial. Ray sat in the court room as the motion was read. Aubrey Ray, cousin of Togo Ray, will go to trial here on a charge of robbing the bank. Currency totaling \$4,000 was taken in the robbery.

### Togo Found Sane

A jury found Togo Ray to be of sound mind, after a hearing as to his sanity consuming all of Wednesday afternoon. Letcher King, Matt Blanton and Milton Lawrence of Eastland for the defense placed a number of witnesses on the stand who testified concerning Ray's sanity. Lawrence is not assisting in the present trial, having returned to Eastland. Dr. Grady Shyles of Abilene classified Ray as a "temporary epileptic." Dr. Ned Snyder of Brownwood, who treated for alleged mental and physical ills, said he is "unsound in mind." Dr. J. M. Estes, Abilene, declared that "he is weak-minded but not insane."

### SECOND EXTRA SESSION DUE AT ONCE, SAYS

AUSTIN, Texas, June 3.—The prediction was made Thursday by Representative A. P. C. Petsch of Fredericksburg, who is close to the governor, that a second called session of the legislature will be held immediately after final adjournment of the present special session on Tuesday. Petsch, however, admitted that Gov. Dan Moody had not expressed himself concerning the matter, "but in submitting so many additional subjects the governor has clearly indicated that another session is to be held on the heels of the present session," he said.

"I am certain all the appropriation measures will be disposed of at this session," said Petsch, "but there will be a raft of unfinished business on the calendars when final adjournment is taken June 7. There are many important bills that need attention and it is my opinion that the governor should convene that for another 30-day session in order that all proposed legislation be considered."

Senator A. E. Wood and Representative Claude Teer, both of Granger, chairmen of the money committee and intimates of the governor, disagree with Petsch and predict the second called session will come about October and that this session will end Tuesday. They point to the need of a session to vitalize any constitutional amendment that may be carried at the special elections Aug. 1.

### FLOOD BLAME PLACED UPON ARMY EXPERTS

CHICAGO, June 3.—Secretary of War Dwight Davis today wanted the flood control conference against hasty action in formulating a plan for harnessing the Mississippi river and its tributaries. "The necessity for adequate flood protection is so essential, the magnitude so large, and involves the obligation of spending such large sums," Davis said, "that hasty action would be extremely ill advised. I believe the logical plan of procedure can be summed up in three general principles. First, do all the facts; second, based on those facts, adopt a sound, practical project; third, push this project to completion as rapidly as possible."

### NEW BILL REGULATES FOREIGN CORPORATIONS

AUSTIN, June 3.—A bill by Representative Harman of Waco, requiring out of state corporations doing business in Texas to keep adequate records of their business in Texas for a period of three years, was passed today. Such corporations must keep such records at their Texas office so that the state can determine whether they are paying the correct amount on gross receipts.

### Rock Island Train Conductor Killed

FORT WORTH, June 3.—Nick Harris, 55, a freight conductor for the Rock Island railway, was killed near Bridgeport, a short distance from here early today when he fell from a moving freight car. He was not missed by the train crew until some time later, and when a switch engine crew found him, two other trains had passed over him.

### U. S. Senator Declares Opponent of Dry Laws Can Never Receive Nomination; Wants Flood Control

"There are lots of men talking about running for the senate. Some of them will run and some of them will not. But as for me, I am certainly in the race, and in fact have never stopped running." This was the declaration of United States Senator Earle Mayfield Friday while he was here en route to Breckenridge to make an address during the morning. Senator Mayfield is on a speaking tour of all Texas, and he declared he had never before received such a cordial reception as he has been tendered on this trip.

WILKES BARRE, Pa., June 3.—Search for slayers of Jennie Monica and Edith Fono, 20, cousins, whose battered bodies were found in a lonely field near Milton, Pa., yesterday, today centered on efforts to learn the identity of two youths with whom the two girls are believed to have spent Memorial Day.

### Lindbergh Flies Back to Paris From London and Receives Membership in Famous Lafayette Escadrille Today

PARIS, June 3.—Capt. Charles Lindbergh, hero of the skies, arrived back in Paris today. He landed at Le Bourget flying field at 10:02 o'clock after a battle with fog that delayed his flight from London, which he left at 6:20 o'clock, but had to descend on the English side of the channel at 6:58 and remained there an hour and a half until the fog cleared over the channel. In view of the fact that this visit is unofficial, there was no ceremony. Immediately after his arrival, 12 French planes went into the air in formation in his honor.

### PRISON BILL PASSES HOUSE BY HUGE VOTE

AUSTIN, June 3.—Without any further opposition, the penitentiary rehabilitation bill was passed finally in the house today 114 to 3. The bill as finally passed carries the Satterlee amendment which prohibits the prison board from selling or buying any Brazos river farms of the system without legislative approval. Governor Moody had urged that the sale be left entirely to the prison board.

### Road to Abilene Ready by Sept. 1

ABILENE, June 3.—An all-paved road from Abilene to Dallas will be achieved by September 1, State Highway Commissioner W. R. Ely said Thursday on his return from Austin.

### PRESIDENT TO SPEND MUCH TIME WITH LINDY

WASHINGTON, June 2.—President Coolidge plans to spend all the time possible with Capt. Charles Lindbergh when he comes here June 11. He will be the guest of President and Mrs. Coolidge during his stay in Washington. President Coolidge today sent a letter to Mrs. Evangeline Lindbergh of Detroit asking her to be a white house guest during Lindbergh's stay. The flyer will receive the distinguished flying cross from President Coolidge at a gigantic ceremony Saturday afternoon at Washington's monument shortly after Lindbergh's arrival. The president will entertain Captain Lindbergh with dinner at night, and then make a brief speech to the national press club. Sunday he will accompany the president and Mrs. Coolidge to church and later place a wreath on the tomb of the unknown soldier. He will then visit the Walter Reid hospital.

### NOTED CLASS OF '97 PLANS FOR REUNION

AUSTIN, June 2.—With announcement of the first reunion of the University of Texas law class of '97, one of the most famous ever to graduate from the school, to be held here on June 5, memories of how March 2 came to be a state holiday are revived. This class is directly responsible for recognition of Texas Independence Day as a state holiday. A few days before the anniversary of Texas Independence in 1897, members of the class decided that it should be a holiday.

Accordingly, not a member of the class attended the university when March 2 rolled around. In a body they marched to the capitol building, where they secured the two cannon relics of Civil War days—the "Twin Sisters"—and transported them to the university campus.

With ammunition previously obtained, 21 rounds were fired. The first shots brought all students and instructors from the school buildings, and before the cannonade was finished, streets leading to the university were blocked by curious throngs.

Speeches were made by members of the law class of '97 following the shooting. In which they expressed their opinions of a people who did not commemorate the deeds of Texas heroes. As a result of the unofficial celebration, the legislature made the day a state holiday.

The rolls of the class of '97 include many of the foremost figures in the state today. Some of them are: Pat M. Neff, Thomas A. Blanton, Tom Connally, Morris Sheppard, R. B. Hubbard, C. C. Saner, Judge J. W. McClendon, Will C. Hogg, Harry Painter, W. J. Hancock and R. L. Batts.

The first reunion is dedicated to the faculty of 30 years ago.

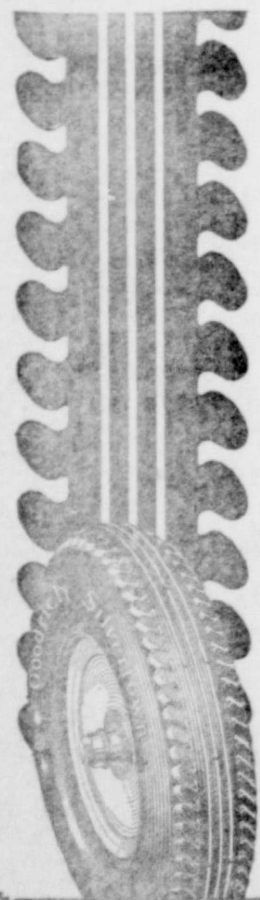

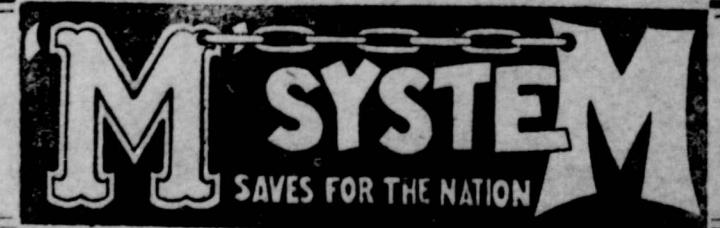
