## October Postal Law Broken, Contracts With Government Exorbitant, Charges Made as Flyers Are Being Feted

WASHINGTON, June 8.—Government investigation into activities Charles Levine, flying companion of Clarence Chamberlin from New York to Germany, began today from two sources, the postoffice department and the department of justice. Postal officials are investigating Levine's carrying a packet of air mail from New York to Germany, while department officials are continuing their study of Levine's contractural obligations with the war department. There are said to be irregularities in Levine's salvage contracts with the war department out of which he is said to have made enormous profits. 
