OLD HOME TOWN

In an effort to provide a collection that will show to the world the kind and size of fish that can be caught in Lake Cisco, the chamber of commerce Wednesday issued an appeal to fishermen to save the heads of all big fish of five pounds or better, and give them to the organization. These heads will be preserved and placed on display for the benefit of visitors here who may be skeptical as to claims of Cisco fishermen.

Mr. and Mrs. Ben Young have returned from Adabel, Oklahoma, where Mrs. Young was called on the death of her father. Mr. Young says that he made more than a thousand mile trip going through part of three states and returning a different route, but no where did he see such spirit of progress and prosperity displayed as in his own town of Cisco. "Cisco certainly looks good after seeing other places," he said.

The chamber of commerce has received a request from the U. S. Coast and Geodetic survey to locate a magnetic station established here in 1888. The letter states that since the surveyor's compass changes from year to year in its direction of pointing, it is now difficult to locate boundary lines as established years ago. The department, by use of the old magnetic stations, is seeking to compile data valuable in retracing old boundaries. The magnetic station here was said to have been located on a vacant lot west of the Wilson hotel on Sixth street where F avenue, if extended, would intersect it. The marker was a flint rock, four inches square, located 32 feet from the intersection of the northern edge of Sixth street and the western edge of A avenue. The chamber of commerce asked that any one willing to help locate the magnetic station should report to the organization.

TUCKER WINS FIRST SUIT ON POLLUTION

AUSTIN, June 8.—The first conviction ever gained in Texas against an oil company for pollution of streams has been reported to Will J. Tucker, game and fish commissioner by Judge Richard Dyess of Shackelford county.

Suit was filed several weeks ago against the Phillips Petroleum company of Albany on charges involving pollution of Hubbard creek, a tributary of Brazos river. The company entered a plea of guilty to the charge, according to the telegram from Judge Dyess.

"A number of other suits have been filed by the department and a vigorous campaign will be waged to prevent the pollution of Texas streams," Commissioner Tucker said.

"While authority was given to the game and fish department in 1923 to enforce the pollution law, it has restricted its efforts to educational methods, and this suit is the first to be filed under the direction of the department," the commissioner stated.

FRANCE ASKS NEW TREATY AGAINST WAR

WASHINGTON, June 8.—France has made overtures to the United States as to the desirability of negotiating a treaty between the two countries definitely outlawing war. Through Ambassador Herrick at Paris, Foreign Minister Briand has addressed an informal note to the state department calculated to elicit a reply from Washington whether this government would consider such a treaty. While the president indicated he did not wish to discourage the peace move, he pointed out there is now in existence between France and the United States the Bryan arbitration treaty which provides for settlement of almost every conceivable dispute that might arise.

JOSEPH, Mich., June 8.—Betrayed over her alleged betrayal by King Ben Purnell, leader of the House of David, Eliza Murphy drank camphor and killed herself, Mrs. Ruth Wade testified today at the state's suit to dissolve the colony. Mrs. Wade, a former official and preacher for the colony, described revolting details of Purnell's alleged relations with cult girls under guise of religion.

DALLAS, June 8.—Funeral arrangements were being made here today for A. L. Tipton, 32, disabled war veteran, who was burned to death in a fire which destroyed a chicken house at his home here last night.

Unidentified Man Killed at Ft. Worth

FORT WORTH, June 8.—Richard Gest, 40, died today after being struck by an automobile on the Dallas pike last night. Police are trying to establish identity of the driver of the automobile. Relatives of the dead man, believed to be a local citizen, have not been located.

Postal Law Broken, Contracts With Government Exorbitant, Charges Made as Flyers Are Being Feted

WASHINGTON, June 8.—Government investigation into activities of Charles Levine, flying companion of Clarence Chamberlin from New York to Germany, began today from two sources, the postoffice department and the department of justice. Postal officials are investigating Levine's carrying a packet of air mail from New York to Germany, while department officials are continuing their study of Levine's contractual obligations with the war department. There are said to be irregularities in Levine's salvage contracts with the war department out of which he is said to have made enormous profits. Beyond asserting that his agents were investigating the salvage case, Attorney General Sargent had nothing to say today.

COLD WEATHER HURTS ROTARY CONVENTION

OSTEND, Belgium, June 8.—Cold rainy weather has brought an epidemic of colds and minor discomforts to delegates to Rotary International conference here with the result that many delegates are leaving. A statement issued today said 37 of the 47 nations having Rotary clubs are represented here.

CHAMBERLIN AND LEVINE MAY FLY BACK HOME

BERLIN, June 8.—"Our plans have not been determined," said Clarence Chamberlin today when asked concerning reports he and Charles A. Levine would fly back to New York in their Bellanca plane. "I would like to fly back to America was Levine's comment.

PRESIDENT OF GERMANY RECEIVES AMERICANS

BERLIN, June 8.—Clarence D. Chamberlin and Charles Levine, who made a non-stop flight of 4,000 miles from New York to Germany, were received today by President Von Hindenburg. Although the journey from the American embassy to the presidential palace, the crowds made it impossible for the pair to make much progress in the presidential car. Police held back the crowds who attempted to get as close as possible to the Americans shouting their "sochs."

WASHINGTON, June 8.—Creation of a trust fund for Col. Charles A. Lindbergh and his mother during their lives has been halted at the request of Lindbergh, the war department announced today.

WASHINGTON, June 8.—The capital's celebration of "Lindbergh Day" next Saturday grew steadily in proportions today. There is no question but what the Atlantic flyer will receive the greatest reception ever accorded any visitor to Washington in history. Business houses generally will close at 12:30 o'clock Saturday, giving thousands of employees opportunity to participate. All government employees will be turned loose at noon, and to these thousands will be added many other thousands from over the country.

Telephone Service to Mexico Planned

LAREDO, June 8.—With the completion of work which will connect the telephone systems between the United States and Mexico here, telephone conversations between the two countries will be a possibility within a short time, according to officials of the Southwest Bell Telephone company.

State Court Upholds Irrigation Districts

AUSTIN, June 8.—Impetus to the creation of irrigation districts in Texas probably will be given by the decision of the supreme court of the state, which upholds in all details the present laws providing for the creation of such districts. The decision was handed down in a case originating in Runnels county, and was written by Chief Justice Cullen. It contains 38 pages and is one of the most elaborate and extensive opinions handed down by the court in recent years.

U. S. MOURNS WITH CALLES AT FUNERAL

MEXICO CITY, June 8.—Impressive funeral ceremonies were held today for Senor Calles, wife of the president. The entire staff of the American embassy and other diplomatic missions as well as the cabinet attended.

2500 IN SUMMER SCHOOL AT DENTON

DENTON, June 8.—With an initial enrollment of more than 2500 students at the North Texas State Teachers' college here Monday, when the summer school classwork began, and with additions coming in daily, it is expected that 3000 more students will be registered before Wednesday afternoon, when registration is closed, according to college authorities.

WATCH OUR CAPTAIN.

Captain Lindbergh is in danger; he is in more danger than when winging his plucky way in the dead of night over the dark, ominous, lonesome ocean.

Captain Lindbergh performed an incomparable feat and the whole world is honoring him for it. But the captain must take care! He is standing on the slipperiest spot on which mortal man can plant his feet, the pedestal of unbounded public adoration.

Now, as then, a single misadventure, a small misconception, a solitary wrong move would hurl him from the heights, and great would be his fall.

Remember Lieutenant Richmond Pearson Hobson; recall his magnificent exploit—how under the guns of the enemy he scuttled the collier Merrimac in the entrance of San Juan Harbor to bottle up Cervantes' fleet. When this young hero returned to the states, the whole country acclaimed him. Honor after honor was showered on him. Then at a certain reception, as he stood in the receiving line, a demure young miss blushingly asked him to kiss her.

Also remember Admiral Dewey, the hero of Manila Bay. When he came back after destroying the Spanish fleet, we wanted to give him the country. We made him a present of a nice home in Washington; and we wanted to make him president; then because the admiral saw fit to deed that home we had given him to his bride, we turned on him. We hissed his name in public places. We figuratively tore him to pieces. The admiral was shocked and grieved beyond expression. He had thought the people loved him; and he had loved their gift and loving it, had given it to his love.

We are famous for slaying our heroes. The fuss and palaver and kotowing and praising and petting are no guarantee of our fidelity. The captain must watch us. He must watch us as carefully as he watched while he was driving the Spirit of St. Louis from hemisphere to hemisphere. He must watch us more carefully, because we are less to be trusted than his doughty plane.

And the captain must watch himself. He must watch his every gesture, his every act, his every thought, he must consider every thing he does in the light of its being used against him. He must not relax his vigilance a moment, for he is liable at any instant to drop into a public opinion air pocket. Captain Lindbergh is a young man, a very young man. And he is now in a position that could easily turn the head of a very wise old man.

Yes, we kill our heroes. The bigger the hero, the sooner and harder we kill him if he offends us. And we are very easily offended. To list a man in a day and a half from comparative obscurity to being the most luded, most talked of individual in the world, is to place a terrific strain on human nature. If

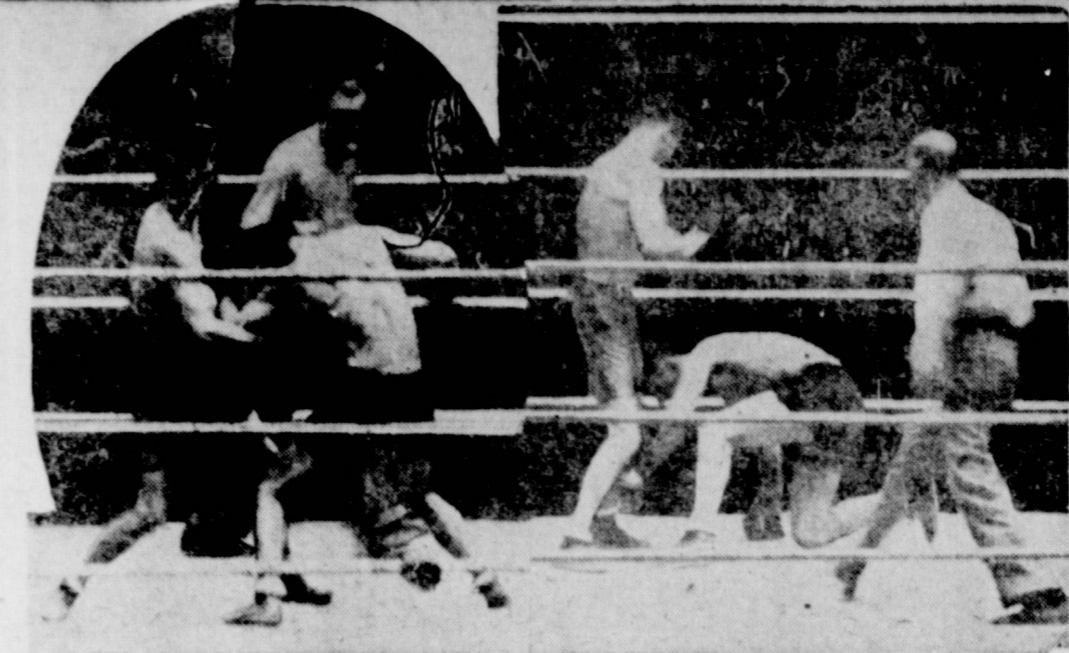
