It is quite customary on the farm to give a child an animal and tell the child that the animal belongs to him.

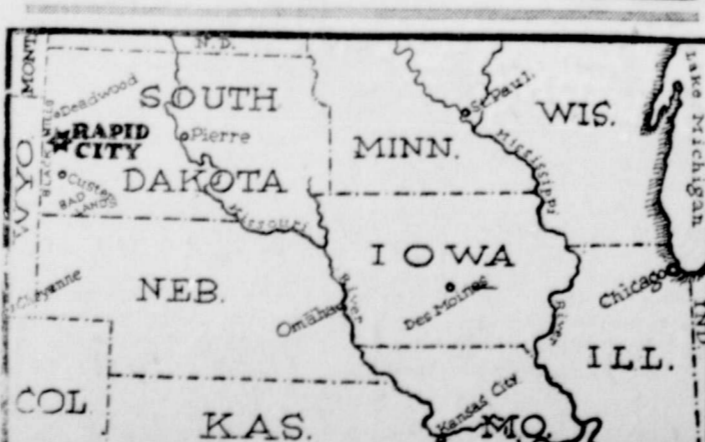
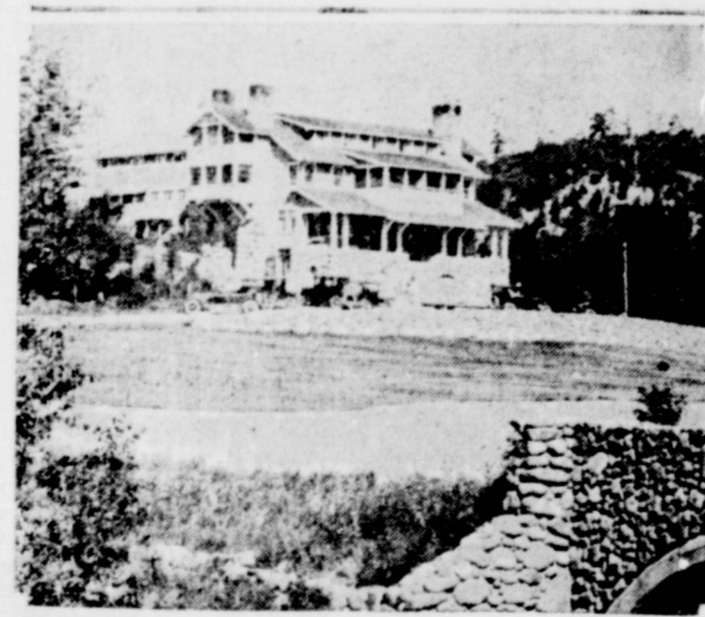
Billy or Sally will be given a calf or a kid or a chicken and told that it is his or hers.

West Texas Chamber of Commerce Has Busy Year

Report of Manger Made At Meeting. Here Shows Much Progress Made In Last Twelve Months By Organization

Report of activities of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce for the last year was filed with the executive board of the organization Monday by Manager Homer D. Wade. The report showed twelve months of activity on the part of staff managers of the organization, assisted by various public-spirited West Texans, which has increased the prosperity of this section, and saved it from threatened increases in freight and insurance rates. Widespread publicity has been given West Texas, both at home and abroad over the country, and development of this entire part of the state has been stimulated, the report revealed.

Following is the report: My financial report will be presented separately. I am presenting, however, a short report of a general nature. Thinking the same would be appreciable. Some of the major accomplishments of the organization are recorded as follows:

1. The continued and successful efforts to prevent the horizontal raise of 5 per cent on freight rates in that territory west of the Mississippi river.

2. The organization and successful opposition to the application of the fire insurance commission of Texas for an adjustment that would have resulted in a raise of 5 per cent on all insurable property in Texas. This means an annual saving of at least two million dollars per year to the property owners of West Texas.

3. Successful opposition to legislative matters that would have been harmful to West Texas, including an effort to double the gross production tax on oil.

Cooperated with the state educational institutions located in West Texas in securing appropriations that were necessary in the successful administration of these institutions.

Cooperation with other agencies in the passage of a law requiring commercial motor vehicles to be placed under the supervision of the Texas railroad commission.

Successful efforts in securing appropriations for the destruction of predatory animals in West Texas.

These, I regard as important, but perhaps the outstanding legislative effort was the passage of a joint resolution providing for a scientific tax survey of the state, with the idea of securing a more uniform and equal taxation in Texas. This commission is functioning at this time, and West Texans represented on the citizens' group are, Former President Arthur P. Duggan, Littlefield; J. A. Kemp, Wichita Falls; James Galien, Menard.

4. Winning the high reward and gold medal prize for the best agricultural exhibit at the Sesqui-Centennial Exposition at Philadelphia. This will be further reported on by the exhibit manager.

5. Adjustment of differentials in territory in the Panhandle country, that resulted in the saving of \$250,000 annually for that section. Full details of this will be shown in the report of the traffic manager.

6. Fullest activity in the hog importing campaign, in which we have the cordial cooperation of the Fort Worth Stockyards company, through the efforts of its industrial manager, Col. C. C. French. In this connection the organization has been very helpful in the prevention of hog cholera in West Texas, and has given thorough and active cooperation to the state live stock board generally.

7. Broadening constructive publicity has added thousands of good citizens to West Texas and millions of wealth. More details in this connection will be given in the report of the publicity manager.

8. Continued campaign on diversification.

9. Conducted nine district meetings during the year, which have been attended by an average of four hundred people.

10. Officiated at the christening of the steamship "West Texas."

11. Gave service to local chambers of commerce in every possible way. Cooperated with the extension department of A. & M. college, Texas Tech and other institutions that are doing extension work. The manager and staff have attended approximately one hundred and fifty meetings, banquets and luncheons in various portions of West Texas. Conducted four good will trips in which the former president, Arthur P. Duggan joined. The manager, personally, has traveled more than fifty thousand miles in West Texas during the eleven months he has officiated as manager, and each member of the staff has covered thousands of miles in conducting various activities of the organization.

12. Moved into new building, established a permanent exhibit therein.

13. The successful promotion of the ninth annual convention, at Wichita Falls, May 16-17, which is believed by all observers as the most successful in the history of the organization.

It would entail too much time to go into details of the work of the organization during the past year. It is a pleasure to say that the staff of the organization has been energetic, loyal, conscientious and intelligent. This statement includes the entire office

forces, and the manager feels that he is especially fortunate in having associated with such men and women who have all these necessary qualities to the fullest extent. The work of President Duggan was very constructive, ideal and unselfish. He gave of his time freely and unselfishly, and the organization as well as the people of West Texas should feel grateful for his services. It is a great delight to say that the members of the executive board have shown greater interest in the work of the organization, have given more cooperation, and have been, I think, more helpful this year than ever before. I would be untrue to my feelings, if I did not express gratitude for the cooperation received from local secretaries of chambers of commerce in West Texas, and the press as well.

These agencies have been invaluable in the work of the organization, and as manager, I feel a lasting indebtedness of gratitude to all who have given such wonderful assistance and cooperation.

We are facing the future with problems as usual. One of outstanding importance is the recent decision of the interstate commerce commission in which the common point rate structure in West Texas seems to be seriously menaced. The organization has great responsibilities in this regard.

Another problem is that of utilization of the waters in the streams of West Texas. The Texas Conservation association, an auxiliary of this organization, has been most active in its efforts to safeguard these interests, both through propaganda and the legislature. But, even with these efforts, important phases present themselves that challenge the most thoughtful and earnest consideration of this executive board.

The continued efforts in legislative matters is of great importance, especially that which relates to the question of the equalization of taxes and proper recognition of West Texas interests at both Austin and Washington.

Another problem is that of the exploitation, conservation, utilization and production of the oil and gas industry.

Still another, is the constructive exploitation of the resources of West Texas, and with the hope of securing greater development, both agriculturally and industrially.

There are many others, but these will suffice to show that the West Texas Chamber of Commerce not only has a mission, but a greater sphere for useful, cooperative and coordinated effort than ever before. To these matters, I feel that the organization should dedicate itself with more vigor and increased enthusiasm, for the challenge is to the officers, executive board, staff and members of this organization.

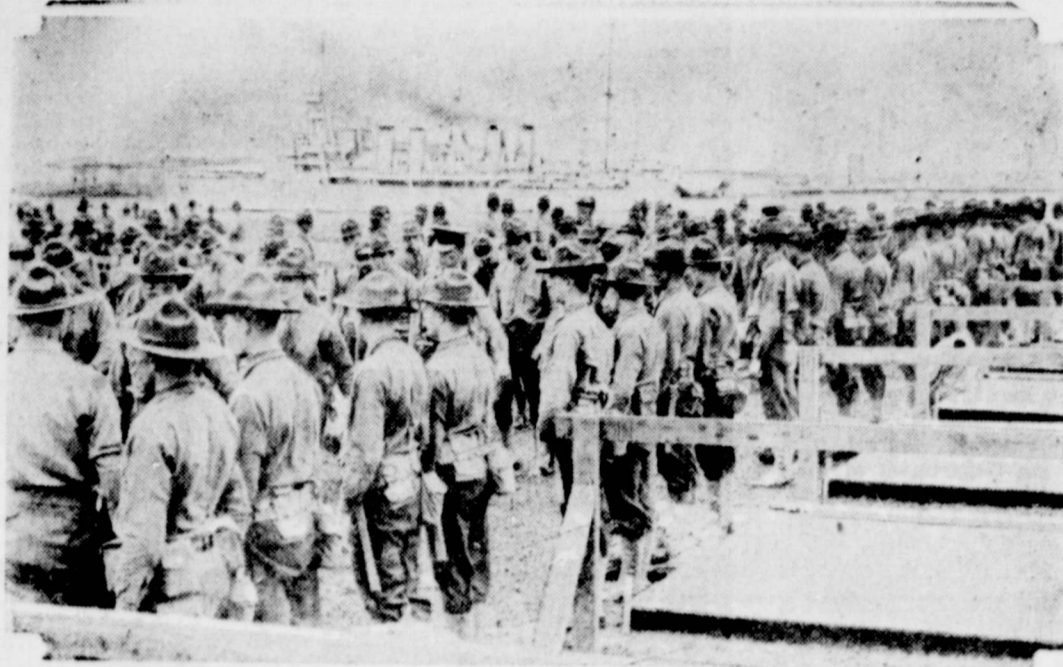

RAIL STOCKS PROVE LEADERS IN SECURITIES

WALL STREET, NEW YORK, June 13.—So strongly has public attention been directed to the rails within the past few months, and so buoyant and vigorous a tone have their stocks exhibited, that not a few observers are inclined to speak of the present as essentially a railroad market. While opinions differ as to the most immediate causes of this situation, practically all are agreed that the railroads are now at a turning point in their career, from which they may be expected to start a new era of development as factors in the securities situation.

In all the current discussion of mergers and purely temporary or

speculative factors affecting the market standpoint is found in the fact that railroads of the country are by no means a completed industry as many have been in the habit of regarding them, but that, on the contrary, they represent a business which must necessarily undergo great expansion in the near future. During the period when railroads were being badly hampered and crippled by congressional action, and later of course during the period of government control, enlargement of the mileage was unavoidably slow and the general increase of transportation facilities did not keep up with the growth of the business of the country. Business itself, however, has greatly expanded as a result of growing population and larger foreign trade, as well as of higher consuming power, and it is now normally fully 20 per cent larger than it was at the close of the war. The growth of railroad mileage has not kept pace with this expansion and must now be made up for. For of expansion, perhaps the best time it was forced by railroad thing in the entire situation from a men that other forms of transpor-

ation, such as the motor truck or motor bus would interfere with their natural development, but they are now at work in the effort to harmonize themselves with these new systems of transportation and are using them as auxiliaries. This involves the construction of mile-

age here and there upon a new plan of transportation service.

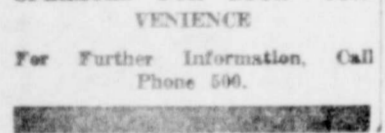
