

One tutoring camp which prepares girls for fall entrance exams at eastern colleges costs almost \$1,000 if a girl goes in for two or three subjects and horseback riding besides. Motoring trips arranged by the camp are extra. This is no fluffy and luxurious place, either. The girls lead a sound and simple life with study and play well mingled. At the other end are camps managed by the Y's or by local philanthropies, where the expenses are very little, and in some "fresh air" charity camps, nothing. The great mass of children go to camps of moderate prices in between these extremes. This is a normal reaction from city life. With schools closed, the city has no place for children. Their instinctive activities become mischief and menace. In the woods they learn the primitive processes now lost from the home. They get in touch with the big rhymes of the universe, and life loses its jazzy aspect. Perhaps one day whole families will take to woods life again, making solid the strands of family life loosened and frayed by winter frets. Meantime. the good children's camp helps physical, moral and mental well-being.


