THE SPHINX'S RIDDLE

Do you know the riddle of the Sphinx and the answer? And the word, by the way, is pronounced sphinx, not spinx.

When one speaks of the Sphinx one naturally thinks of that great work of ancient Egyptian art located near the pyramids of Gizeh. But that is not the only sphinx.

Greek mythology pictures a very much alive Sphinx which had the head of a woman, the body of a lion, the wings of a bird and the tail of a serpent. This amiable creature was supposed to hang around the ancient Egyptian city of Thebes and propound a ente little riddle to those who came her way, and kill them because they could not answer it. Finally the Thebans in despair offered the throne to anyone who would solve the monster's riddle. A young chap by the name of Oedipus did the

trick, whereupon the chagrined Sphinx committed suicide. The riddle of the Sphinx is generally supposed to be how the great Sphinx—which lies in the Egyptian sands near the second pyramid—came to be there. That creation is a sight to behold. It is fashioned somewhat after the monster that made things interesting for the Thebans. It has the head of a man and the body of a re- nument lion.

The sculptor who conceived this Sphinx had large ideas. The image is 66 feet high and 172 feet long. Its forelegs are 50 feet in length. The head is 30 feet high and 14 feet wide. Originally the features were painted up like those of a flapper, but time has removed most of the coloring, as time will do, as any lady with a rouge pot can testify.

This Sphinx of Gizeh is cut partly from solid granite and made partly of masonry. What kind of masonry the Lord only knows, but it is not the kind of masonry that modern contractors put into our street curbing and the like, for it has stood the test of time.

Why was this Sphinx created? Some authorities declare that the colossal carving typifies the mys- tery of life and that the face of the Sphinx wears its sardonic grin to indicate that none can solve the mystery. Others hold that the Sphinx represents one of the Pharaohs and was ordered by him as a monument to himself. Others say, and with considerable reason, that this Sphinx is a relic of heathen idol worship that it por- trays Harmachis, the guardian sun god, and is placed where it is to protect the nearby tombs from evil spirits.

But the riddle which the Sphinx of Thebes gave to the luckless passersby is this:

What creature walks in the morning on four feet, at noon up on two, at evening upon three?

The answer is Man. In the morning of life he crawls on all fours; at the noon of his life he walks on his hind legs; in the evening of his life he goes with a cane.

EASTLAND CO. JURY WHEEL BILL VETOED

AUSTIN, June 15—Two bills that would have placed Navarro and Eastland counties under operation of the jury wheel law, and made the accompanying penal act conform to the revision were vetoed today by Governor Moody because of a conflict. One bill would have corrected a codification error failing to extend the jury wheel law to counties containing cities of 10,000 population or also several towns aggregating that much population. The bill named the county tax assessor as one of the officials responsible for drawing the jury list. The other bill seeking amendment of the penal code to parallel the other

amendment, failed to mention the assessor as responsible. For that reason, Governor Moody said, "I veto both of them."

The regional gathering scheduled to convene here promises to be an outstanding event for the section. 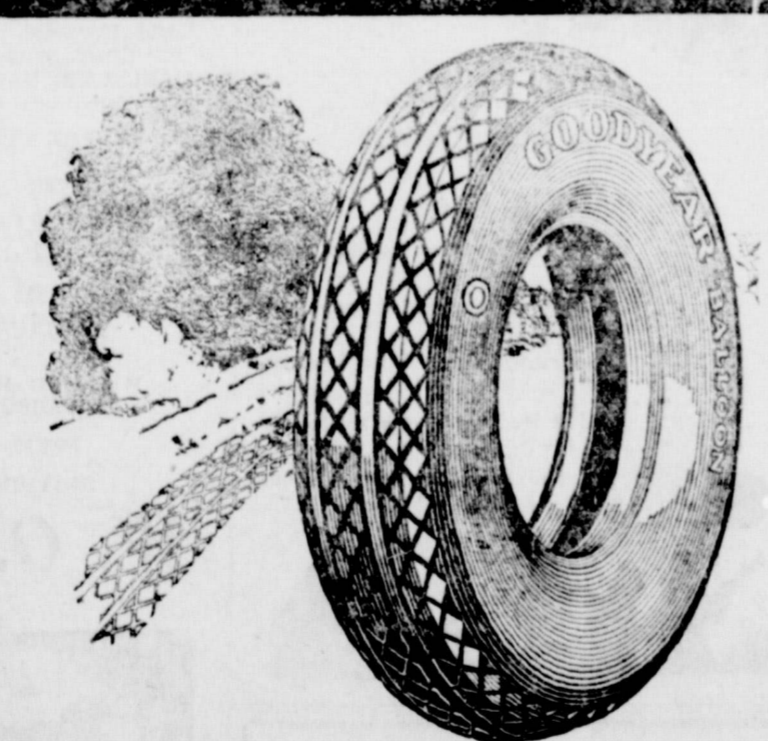

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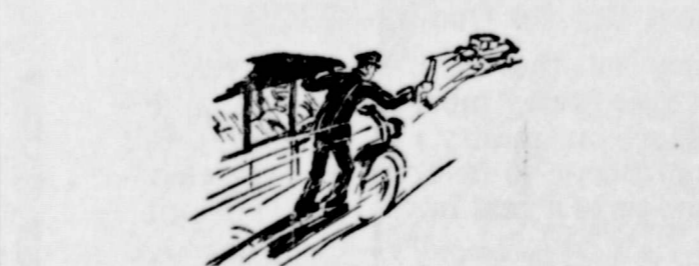
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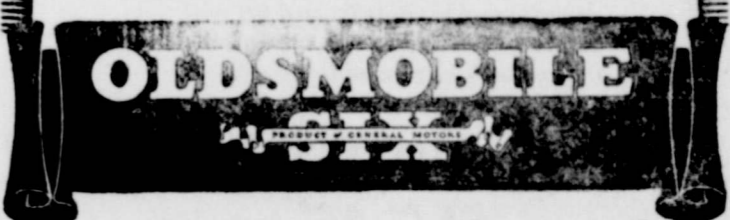
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
