

## INDICTED AS BROWN BANDITS

### Oil Test To Be Drilled Near City Limits

### Farmers Near Zephyr Charged With Holding Up Bank But No Trace Found of \$1,000 Taken

#### OLD HOME TOWN

Mrs. Eva Murray, sentenced to the state penitentiary on a charge of writing bad checks, has received an extension of 60 days on her parole. It was announced Saturday following a trip she made to Austin to see the prison board. She had already received the stay of 60 days, and has not yet begun to serve her sentence.

"I wish you would please state that I did not file the charges against Mr. George in the gun carrying case," declared J. W. Vanetta Saturday. "I merely appeared in the case as a witness. The charges were actually filed by the peace officers."

"I'm going to Hamlin for the week-end and am sorry I won't be able to hear Rev. Lenox continue a series of talks on the court records regarding the trial of Jesus Christ," declared G. W. Collum Saturday. The talks he referred to are being given before the men's class of the First Christian Sunday school. "The talks are among the most interesting I have ever heard, and the subject matter is entirely new, so far as my knowledge is concerned."

"The general feeling around Cross Plains is that the worst of the oil depression is over, and that better times are just ahead. 'We'll get it all,' declared Thomas DeWitt, Cisco pastor, who was in Cross Plains Friday. "They told me drilling was being resumed to a large extent throughout that section. More men are being put on the job, and the outlook is more favorable than it was two weeks ago."

"I just got back from a trip to Austin, by way of Waco and Temple," said Constable C. S. Looney Saturday. "Crops in that section are looking the finest I ever saw them. They have had plenty of rain around Waco, where last week one downpour of six inches occurred. Farmers are in good spirits, and are looking forward to a good year."

H. C. Wippera, "Dutch" Bryant, J. J. Collins and C. O. Pass returned Friday night by automobile from San Antonio where they attended the state firemen's convention. The quartet got off the road at Goldthwaite and were headed back toward Austin for some time before they discovered their error, and as a result they were late in getting into Cisco, arriving about 11 o'clock Friday night.

Cisco merchants have no complaint to make on June trade. That was evident Saturday when an angler of those large Saturday crowds for which Cisco is fast becoming famous was in town. Trading was reported brisk all day, and at night the streets were crowded with automobiles, many of which bore out of town license plates. Practically all Cisco merchants report a continuance of their record-breaking spring and early summer trade, which has shown a steady growth in spite of the oil situation. The local agent for one of the millways here said that the business of his company for the first half of June has exceeded that of any other similar period this year. Many merchants have attributed their increased business to the fact that this year they have gone out after the business in a more aggressive manner than in the past, particularly through regular, continuous newspaper advertising, especially every progressive merchant in Cisco is now under contract to use the columns of the News at least three times a week, and most of them have decided they are receiving unusually good results from this steady kind of advertising in place of the hit or miss sort they formerly employed.

#### REVIVAL IN DRILLING IS EVIDENT HERE

Tom Bacon, representing the Peer Oil company of Texas, announced Saturday that he had completed a block of 2,500 acres of leases just southwest of the city limits of Cisco, and that a 3,500-foot test for oil will begin at some point on the tract within 60 days. The Texas Pacific Coal and Oil company have an interest in the block, and will drill the well, Mr. Bacon added. Actual drilling must be under way within 90 days, according to the contract, and continue to a depth of 3,500 feet unless oil or gas in paying quantities is struck at a lesser depth.

Expect Shallow Pay  
The area under lease is just southwest of the city limits, and extends north and east of the Reich school house. The block is just southwest of the Luse oil well just south of the city, and is in an area so far unexplored. It has been zoned over by a number of competent geologists, and the consensus of their opinion is that the Putnam sand will be struck at a depth of 800 to 900 feet, although the contract calls for four times that depth.

Mr. Bacon, who got up the leases, is well known in Cisco where he was connected with the Cisco Banking company until 1912. Since that time he has lived at Willis Point and Abilene, the latter place being his home now.

Mr. Bacon's announcement came on the heels of reports that the derrick had been skidded over 75 yards from the Luse Estate No. 1 of the Associated Petroleum company a short distance northwest of Cisco, and that drilling on a second test would begin at once. The No. 1 well was ruined by a heavy shot of nitro-glycerine after a good showing had been encountered, and it was found impossible to get it back into condition.

The Moody corporation's Dyer well north of Cisco near Pueblo continues to make a huge gas flow, and a gasoline plant is now being erected to care for this well. In the same area, the B. F. Weddington well has increased its gas flow 5,000,000 feet a day, and will add greatly to the production of the gasoline plant.

Shot Spencer Well Today  
To the northwest, the Gordon pool continues in the limelight with several new wells nearing the pay zone. For several producers have been brought in by several companies, while to the southeast, a great play is being given the Morgan, McAllister and Spencer pools. Cranfill & Reynolds' No. 2 J. E. Spencer made a flow Friday night, sending the oil over the top of the derrick, and it will probably be shot this Sunday with 150 quarts of nitro at a depth of 3050 feet. The Prairie company's T. J. Pe No. 1 is being brought in, while the Chestnut & Smith well at Romney is reported making 50 barrels a day, and a large amount of gas. Thus, it is seen, drilling is being pushed rapidly in every direction in the immediate vicinity of Cisco, with sensational results in some areas. The revived activity in drilling has brought many new people here, and the chamber of commerce reports that many have been applying there for information regarding rooms, apartments and rent houses.

There is apparent a belief among local oil men that the worst is over, so far as the oil market is concerned, and there is a gradual resumption of drilling in all fields surrounding Cisco. Leasing is reported active in all sections, and oil men generally are reported getting set for a renewal of activity on a large scale.

U., that merchants are violating the law who sell devices which can be used in the manufacture of home brew. The sale of such articles was denounced by Mrs. Watts, who added that it is a violation of the law and quoted the statutes. Many show windows in the State are filled with bottle caps or crowns, while others display "mash crocks," cappers and even ingredients. This is declared to be a plain violation of law by Mrs. Watts.

#### LINDY NEEDS COMPLETE REST, ST. LOUIS SEES

ST. LOUIS, June 18.—Captain Charles Lindbergh today was welcomed back to the home town of his choice by the people who knew him before he gained the heights of immortality as the lone eagle of the Atlantic. He faced the ceremonies with the same radiant smile that won him friends throughout the world. It was a dead-tired, though happy, Lindbergh who was greeted by the homefolks. It was apparent, however, he needs a complete rest in the early future. The "one man parade" was probably the greatest of its kind ever given in the mid-west. People lined a path eight miles long in which Lindbergh passed in a procession of twenty cars, American and American Legion flags gave the only military touch to the parade.

The dinner tonight at Hotel Chase was formal. There "Slim" was welcomed home by the City of St. Louis, the state of Missouri, and government officials. The spokesman were Secretary of War Dwight Davis, Senator Hawes, Governor Baker of Missouri, Mayor Victor Miller of St. Louis and Harry Bixby, president of the St. Louis chamber of commerce. They showered praise upon the youth before a gathering of two thousand social, industrial and business leaders.

The baseball celebration was wilder than the other celebrations. Lindbergh went to the field to help the Cardinals raise their flag, and 40,000 persons hailed him with cheers of "Lindy."

Lindbergh was presented many medals from the city and various organizations.

#### 10,000 BARREL WELL COMES IN

TULSA, Okla., June 18.—The largest gusher yet brought in in the Earlboro pool of Seminole county today was reported by the Empire Gas and Fuel Co. in its No. 1 Edison. The well flowed 5,845 barrels in 13 hours, and if the increase is steady, will exceed 10,000 barrels steady.

#### BROWNWOOD, Texas, June 18.—Jim Garvin and Chalmers Jasper were indicted by a special grand jury here this afternoon in connection with the robbery of the First State Bank at Zephyr near here this week. A third man, believed implicated in the robbery, is being sought. In the robbery, \$1,035 in cash was taken by a lone bandit who held up Assistant Cashier D. A. Johnston. A second bandit waited outside in a Ford touring car, and the two sped away in it after the hold up. Arrest of Garvin and Jasper followed. Patrolman Cy Thippen and City Detective Carl Adams making the arrests.

Principal evidence on which the indictment was based, is said to be identification by Walter Elliott, dry goods clerk of the two men as a pair to whom he sold two suits of overalls and caps similar to those worn in the robbery. The clothing had been found in a pasture near Zephyr. Marvin Bady, a farmer living near a pasture owned by Jasper, said early Tuesday morning he was in Jasper's pasture looking for his turkeys, and came upon a Ford touring car. Thinking the car had been stolen and hidden, there Bady examined it, and found it had no license numbers. He then took down the engine number. After finding his turkeys and while driving them home, Bady said he again came upon a car at the spot where the touring car had been, but this time it was a Ford roadster. This aroused his curiosity, and he took down the license numbers. After he heard of the bank robbery, he gave the information to officers. After a comparison, it was found that the engine number of the Ford touring

car seen by Bady was the same as that of a touring car found in Jasper's pasture that afternoon, and that the license numbers were identical with those of a Ford roadster in which Garvin and Jasper were riding when arrested.

#### Engineers Stop Lake Cisco Beach Opening Today; Order Concrete To Set Longer Before Water Turned In

Lake Cisco Bathing Beach will not be officially opened today as planned. This decision was reached Saturday at a conference of engineers who inspected the pool and asserted that to fill the pool without letting the concrete set at least one more day would be unwise, and likely to endanger the entire project. It had been expected that all the concrete would be poured by Friday, but rain the first part of the week and trouble over getting a supply of water the latter part of the week slowed up the work until it was impossible to get the first section in proper condition for use today. The first 400 feet of the pool was practically completed Saturday, and after the pool is cleaned up and the walls have had a little more time to set, the water will be turned in and opened for swimming.

#### MOODY LOPS OFF \$712,225 FROM BILLS

AUSTIN, June 18.—With signing today of the miscellaneous claims bill today by Governor Moody, all appropriation measures passed by the recent called session of the legislature have been disposed of. From the total biennium appropriations of \$47,687,153, as provided for in measures passed by both houses, \$712,225 were lopped off by the governor by veto, leaving for actual expenditure, only \$46,974,928 for the next biennium, beginning September 1.

#### WISE COUNTY MAN TO HEAD BUS DIVISION

AUSTIN, June 18.—Mark Marshall, business man of Chico, Wise county, was unanimously elected chief supervisor of the motor bus division of the railroad commission this afternoon, according to announcement by Chairman Clarence Gilmore of the commission. Marshall assumes his duties Monday at a salary of \$4,500 a year.

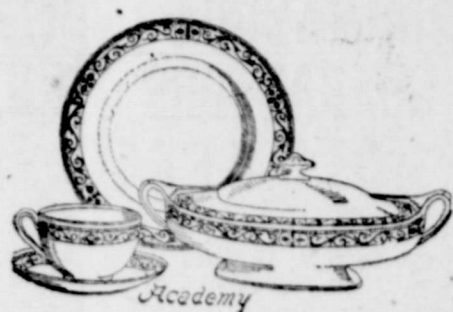

# LINDBERGH PRESENTED BOOK ON SELF

NEW YORK, June 18.—Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh carries back to St. Louis a volume containing 150,000 words in dispatches by International News Service concerning his flight.

Mr. Koontzberg, president of International News Service, presented the handsomely bound record of Lindbergh's exploit to him at Lindbergh's apartment before the flyer's take-off for St. Louis.

Mr. Koontzberg told Lindbergh that no single individual ever could do many words to be sent over press association wires within so short a space of time—a record that perhaps Lindbergh did not know he held. He told the famous flyer the volume was presented out of "gratitude to the maker of the perfect news story."

The volume contains an exact reproduction of the dispatches carried over International News Service wires from the day Lindbergh hopped off from San Diego until his triumphant return to New York. It is entitled, "The Sign of Colonel Lindbergh."

"From the day you prepared in San Diego to hop off for New York until the sun set last Monday upon New York's greatest day of celebration—everywhere you went were International News Service men," Mr. Koontzberg added.

"They watched you narrowly, with cold and distasteful eyes, used to finding cracks in public life. They looked for flaws in you. To their amazement they found none. They all love you."

"They wrote of you with freedom from reservation that I have not seen equalled in my time, and that is a tribute you may prize as coming from the hard-boiled, whose fondness it is to be dispassionate and analytical."

Lindbergh replied: "Reporters are hard-boiled all right."

He added quickly: "But they certainly have cooperated with me. I guess they are only hard-boiled on the surface."

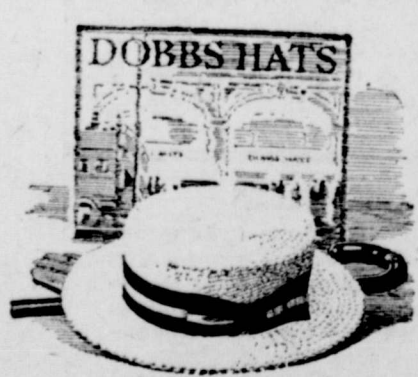

# WELL OPENS VIRGIN SAND IN CALLAHAN CO.

### Drilling 25,000,000 Feet Seven New Locations Made New Cross Plains Field in Week

CROSS PLAINS, June 19.—Seven new drilling locations made in the new Cross Plains field within the past fortnight, added to the excitement created by the discovery of the big deep wildcat gasser of the Empire Gas and Fuel company on the Johnson tract in survey 146 Callahan county, 15 miles west of the Cross Plains field, has not only supplied a quick revival of general activity, but has also served to center the attention of many of the fraternity to a twenty mile strip of territory embracing the extreme south part of Callahan county.

#### Huge Gas Well

The Empire well not only carries the distinction of being the deepest production so far reached in this section of the state, but is probably also the largest gasser ever drilled in local territory. The pay is reported to have been topped at 4132 feet and has been penetrated eight feet to a total depth of 4140. The present output of gas can not be determined, but an increase in volume is evident, and the general estimate of experienced operators places the present volume at figures varying from 25,000,000 to as high as 40,000,000 cubic feet.

A light spray of oil has colored vegetation for a long distance from the well and led to a general rumor early in the discovery that the showing was also for several hundred barrels of oil.

The pay is generally considered to be the Ranger lime, and the present showing of oil is but negligible in quantity, though it has served to greatly increase interest in adjacent territory, and is accepted to indicate that an oil bearing section of the structure is not far distant.

At the present time two strings of tools are lost in the hole and fishing is reported to be making little headway due to the tremendous pressure of the gas. An effort was made early in the week to cap the flow but the gas is said to have forced its way under the five inch pipe, escaping between the 5 and 6 inch casing and it appears doubtful if the effort will prove successful. Just what can be done toward saving this production is a matter to be determined by later efforts.

#### May Be Virgin Sand

According to all records of local well logs this is the first well in Callahan county to be drilled below 4100 foot level and probably explores a pay horizon absolutely virgin in character, though some operators believe it may be the same as the pay of the old Vestal well northeast of Cross Plains, found at 3740 feet, with the difference in depth accounted for by the natural dip of structure over the twenty miles of intervening territory. This gives the local section a total of eight sands varying from 300 to 4140 feet in depth that are proven productive.

The many new locations in the new Cross Plains field are apparently the result of a decision of most operators in that section to resume a limited amount of work in the way of general exploration of various properties and in most instances are for the purpose of testing territory rather than any intense property development, and the large number is due to the wide scope of untested acreage.

At the extreme northeast edge of the new field the test of Hill & West on the Waller land has again resumed drilling and is now cleaning up after a fishing job at a depth of 450 feet.

This well was spudding when the big cut came in the crude market several weeks ago and was shut down waiting more favorable conditions. The location being in

outside territory has lately brought a decision of these owners to resume drilling as a test of these outside leases.

Offsetting this well to the north L. G. Bradstreet is now rigging up a machine for another test, also on a lease out of the Waller tract, and in the same vicinity the Mook-Texas company and M. E. Walker field are moving a machine to the southeast corner of the T. E. Baum lease to test the outside territory of this property the greatest possible distance from the producing well in the extreme northwest corner.

In the same section of the area

#### Outside Drilling

In outside territory more than a mile to the southwest of these wells, Brannon and Murray are at 200 feet on a new test at the south line of the Bennett & Booth property and between this well and the group of producers around the Brown & Co. discovery of the south end of the field, Brown & Co. have a completed rig on location No. 3 leading to the west from former drilling.

#### ABILENE BREAKS DIET FOR WATER RESERVOIR

ABILENE, June 18.—Ground has been broken for the dam on Cedar Creek near the south city limits, where the city is constructing a new 3,000,000-gallon water reservoir. Mayor Thomas E. Hayden, Jr., conducted the ceremony and several city officials took part. The Womack Construction company has the contract for the dam, which will cost about \$210,000. The entire project is taken care of in a \$900,000 bond issue.

Late reports from the wildcat test of the Milban Corporation, on the Warren land eight miles northwest of Cross Plains, indicate that some progress is now being made with the fishing job that has delayed drilling on this test over a period of almost two months.

This test now down 3300 feet is to be drilled to a probable 3800 if further sands are not developed prior to that depth, and should no further sands show oil in paying quantities it is understood the well will be plugged back to the 2900 foot level and given a shot to test out a sand that shows a probable 15 barrels at that depth.

# GULF LINE TO MIDLAND NOW READY

PORT WORTH, June 18.—The ten inch pipe line of the Gulf Pipe Line company, which runs from the Ranger district to the Gulf's Midland tank farm, has been completed, and is being tested with water preparatory to being put into active use, announcement was made Thursday.

The 265-mile line, begun on April 25, was built in what is believed to have been record time for a project of the size in the territory. The extraordinary speed was possible, officials said here, because of the large organization built up and the laying of advanced plans by company engineers.

Completion of the line, which is the second trunk line into the Edwards plateau and the trans-Pecos section of the state, will enable the Gulf to handle about twice its present production and will lead to much development in the Cross, Ector and Wichita county fields, it was said here. Transportation facilities heretofore have consisted chiefly in short field lines to leading trucks on railroads.

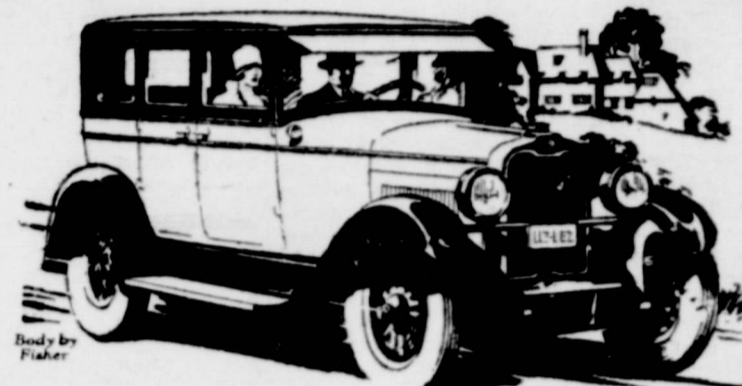
### Negro At Colorado Put Under Guard

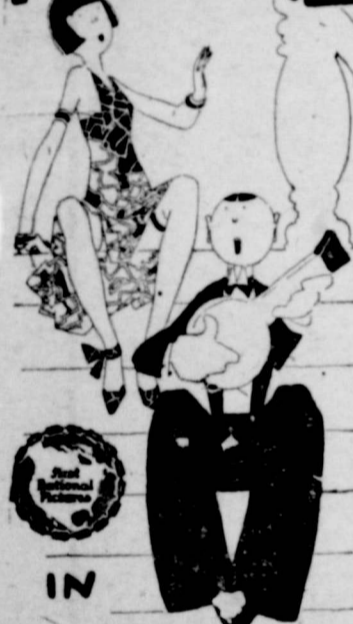
