SHERIFF STAGES BOOZE DRIVE

Byrd Expects to Hop Off Wednesday Dawn

OLD HOME TOWN

W. S. Cooper, secretary of the Breckenridge chapter of commerce, has announced today that he expects to hop off at dawn tomorrow for Europe in his three-motored plane. Byrd also announced the fourth member of his crew who will accompany him. He is Lieut. Bert Balchen, who for the last seven years has been a test pilot for the Fokker company. Balchen is 28, unmarried, and a Norwegian who has just taken out his American naturalization papers. All four flyers are experienced aviators. Bert Avosta was with Clarence Chamberlin when the latter established a world endurance record several months ago.

Byrd indicated he is eager to get away. If he does not get off at 5 a. m. tomorrow, he will probably wait for sunset, which will allow him to land in Europe in the day time. However, it has no longer become a matter of personal preference, and Byrd's hop off depends on clearing of storms. He is going to take a route somewhat farther south than the great circle route taken by Lindbergh and Chamberlin.

WORK ON LAKE CISCO BEACH NEARING END

Completion of the first section of the Lake Cisco bathing beach is drawing rapidly to a close. When quitting time came Monday evening, only about 50 cubic yards of concrete remained to be poured before the pool will be ready for opening. Three slabs of the floor, several sets of steps, footings for the huge roller coaster, slide, and the dam on the north side were yet to be poured, although the forms for practically all were in place. A force of men have been employed cleaning off and sweeping the floor of the pool before the water is turned in, and they are expected to complete their task Wednesday.

DISARMAMENT PROPOSAL UP TO EXPERTS

GENEVA, June 21.—Proposals for extension of naval disarmament as set forth at the three-power naval conference of Great Britain, United States and Japan were today turned over to technicians for study. The executive committee of technicians will meet Monday. Admiral Viscount Sato, head of the Japanese delegation, was very outspoken today in declaring Japan will never accept a 5-5-3 ratio for auxiliary ships, a proposal which France and Italy already had rejected at a Washington conference. Admiral Sato said he saw many difficulties ahead, particularly for the British proposal increasing the age of battleships, which Japan opposes and on which the U. S. is more or less neutral. The conference, finding the Japanese proposals somewhat vague, today asked the Japanese for explanations. Pending receipt of more details, the Americans are loathe to form any opinion on the Japanese proposals.

EL PASO, June 21.—More than 1,000 delegates to the national convention of the Disabled American Veterans' association march in review today before John V. Clinin, national commander of the Disabled American Veterans, Congressman Royal C. Johnson, chairman of the veterans' committee in Congress and Mrs. B. H. Brown, national president of the Women's Auxiliary and their staffs. A pathetic feature of the parade was the blind section, numbering about 200 men, and headed by Charles Kemp of Indianapolis. An invitation was extended Col. Charles A. Lindbergh, noted trans-Atlantic flyer, to stop at El Paso this week on his way to San Diego and visit the convention as its guest.

GREAT BRITAIN GIVES PROPOSALS WELCOME LONDON, June 21.—The disarmament proposals set forth at the conference in Geneva, all received a favorable reception in London. There is no excess optimism prevalent, however, for it is realized there is a wide divergence of views which may easily lead to difficulties making an agreement impossible. Great Britain's interest in the conference is based largely on economics, in so far as the man in the street is concerned. The Daily News expresses disappointment that the British proposal may pave the way for cruiser competition that may prove as disastrous as the old race for battleships.

Oil Barber Shop Flood Costs Four Hundred Million

WASHINGTON, June 21.—Flood damage approximately \$400,000,000, Secretary of Commerce Hoover estimated today. Hoover said the loss in crops, railroads and highways will reach \$200,000,000. With the flood rapidly receding, Hoover said arrangements have been completed for a health campaign to protect the south from malaria and typhoid fever. A month's clean up campaign will start immediately. It will cost half a million dollars and will be financed by the Red Cross.

CHICAGO, June 21.—The Chicago board of trade ought to be abolished if the farmer is to get an equitable price for his grain, Judge Gough of Amarillo, president of the Texas Wheat Growers' association, said here today. "It is the height of folly to talk of farm relief and not eliminate the cause. The Chicago board of trade is the dominant exchange and has the power to fix prices of every grain of wheat. Five men on that board determine what the farmer shall get for his grain. The board ought to be abolished, and it can be done by cooperation."

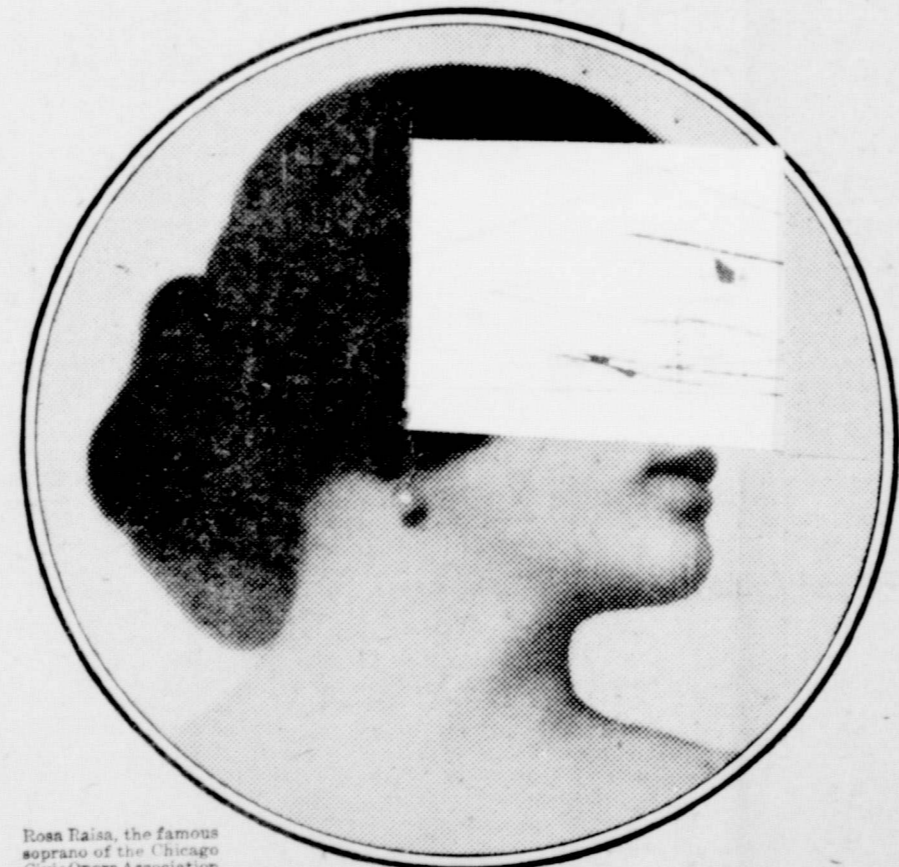

CLEVELAND GOES AHEAD BOTH MEETS

CLEVELAND, June 21.—This city wants one, or both of the big political conventions, and nothing is being left undone toward that end.

Local committees have been selected by leaders of both the Republican and Democratic parties, respectively, to formulate plans for collecting necessary funds and do other work necessary before a formal invitation can be presented to the national committee which will decide where its party convention will be held.

Send Questionnaires
Response to questionnaires sent to members of the G. O. P. national committee, by Carl A. Thompson, Republican state chairman, indicate that Cleveland is acceptable to the majority of the committee but most of those interrogated declined to finally commit themselves as to their actual vote when the question of selecting the convention site arises.

Unless a decision is reached in the national committee to hold the Republican convention in the far west, the Cleveland committee feels that this city has better than an even chance to land the meeting.

Waiting For Butler
William A. Butler, of Boston, Republican national chairman, is scheduled to visit Cleveland in the very near future and local party leaders are hoping to get from him a line on the city's chances for the convention.

Minneapolis and Detroit are also in the limelight for the G. O. P. conclave.

A Democratic committee recently held a state meeting here at which plans were made toward bringing the Democratic convention here in 1928. The "demies"

expressed the opinion that the chances to land the Democratic convention "looked more favorable on the Republican."
