FORT WORTH, July 12.—When twenty-five persons one day failed to heed notices to show up in the corporation court, \$125 in fines were assessed the absentees, or \$5 each. Heretofore warrants for failure to appear have been for \$2. The increase, according to F. T. Voight, court officer in the police department, was brought about because of the utter indifference of persons for the police summons.

THREE KILLED AS LIGHTNING HITS PLANE

WINNIPEG, July 12.—Three men in a Canadian Royal Air Force plane were killed yesterday when their plane exploded in mid-air and crashed to the ground near Hiers, Manitoba, it was made known here today. The dead are Flight Officer W. C. Weaver, pilot; A. T. Hardley, photographic mechanic; and E. H. Wong, surveyor of the topographic survey branch, Ottawa. Lightning is believed to have struck the plane while flying at a high altitude.

Lake Cisco Swimming Pool More Popular Than at First Thought; Another Bath House to be Built

The patronage at the Lake Cisco bathing beach has been more than was originally expected for the first year, and indications now are that another and larger bath house will have to be built before the opening of next year's season. President Frank Harrell of the Lake Cisco Amusement company announced Tuesday. The number of swimmers since the pool opened has been most gratifying, he said, and the average number in the pool each day since July 1 has been 700. On July 4, 1900 went in swimming, and last Sunday a total of 1,500 persons were accommodated by the pool. About 500 went in swimming Monday, which is usually a light day. The crowds on holidays and Sundays have taxed the bath house to capacity, despite the fact that additional windows have been provided to facilitate handling of baskets, and with the expected increase in popularity of the pool next season, another bath house will be imperative, it is said.

Comanche County Stirred Up By Discovery of Infant Covered Up With Insects Early Tuesday Morn

Considerable excitement was reported in Comanche county Tuesday following the finding in DeLeon early this morning of a five-day old baby girl, abandoned in a corn field, according to G. B. Milner, Katy railroad brakeman, who brought the news to Cisco. According to Milner, an 18-year-old youth named Denny discovered the baby between 6 and 7 o'clock Tuesday morning as he was going to work in DeLeon. He was attracted into a corn field when he heard the cries of a baby, and there found the infant covered with ants. One eye was badly swollen, and the other entirely closed by stings from the insects. The child, weighing about 10 pounds and apparently only five or six days old, was clothed in a gown and was lying on a quilt. The baby is now in the care of Mrs. W. S. Sneed, wife of a Katy conductor, who is taking care of it until a home is found. The Comanche county sheriff was notified of the discovery, and he began investigation at once with the hope of finding the mother of the infant and learning the cause of its abandonment.

Detectives reported they found his wife almost unconscious and in a drunken stupor in the same room with the dead man. She was unable to give any information regarding the trouble. Police said they found a deep gash on the back of Linwood's head and his body was covered with bruises.

WEST TEXAS COACHES PLAN NEW ROUTES

The West Texas Coaches will operate two buses between Cisco and Lake Cisco next week when the big celebration dedicating the Lake Cisco bridge and other projects at the lake will be held. This announcement was made by Temple Bowen, manager of the bus line, while he was in Cisco Tuesday. A station will be operated at the lake, as well as in town, and a nominal round trip fare will be charged. While here, Mr. Bowen made known his company's plan for completing its service in all directions from Cisco. At present, the company operates east and west out of Cisco over the Bankhead highway, southwest to San Angelo, north to Albany and connecting with Stamford, and northeast to Breckenridge. It is now planned to operate from Cisco to Brownwood, and a permit from the state railroad commission is to be asked for this line. The Brownwood line will make Cisco the hub of a territory served by the West Texas Coaches, with "spokes" extending in all directions. At a recent meeting of the chamber of commerce here, resolutions were passed approving the West Texas Coaches' application for permit to operate between Fort Worth and Dallas, which would give Cisco direct bus service into Dallas.

Fatal Shooting Follows Fight

FORT WORTH, July 12.—Clarence Davis was in custody today, charged with murder in connection with the fatal shooting of Carl Williams, 40, proprietor of a soft drink parlor here last night. Williams was shot twice with a .28 caliber revolver, and Davis has several gashes in his head, caused by his being beaten with a bottle by Williams, according to Davis' story to police. Authorities have been unable to determine what started the argument, but Davis insisted he shot Williams "after he hit me with a bottle."

Two Pro Agents and J. P. Shot Down

BLUEFIELD, W. Va., July 12.—Prohibition officers are searching the mountains for McDowell, Wyoming, Mercer and Raleigh counties for two state prohibition officers and a justice of the peace who were shot down by alleged rshiners last night.

Tiger of France Denies He's Dying

PARIS, July 12.—Former Premier Georges Clemenceau, who has been suffering from influenza for several days, improved Monday and is not considered to be in any danger, it was learned at his home here. The report, "Clemenceau is dying," was spread throughout parliament lobbies Monday and resulted in the quick descent of several deputies and friends of the war premier upon the modest little house in the Rue Franklin, where the Tiger dwells while in Paris. Clemenceau received them himself. He said that he was just recovering from an attack of grip, but declared the report that he was dying as "slightly exaggerated."

City To Build Line To Camp

An agreement has been reached whereby the city of Cisco will lay the necessary water pipe to the site of the Christian encampment to be held here August 20 to September 5, it was announced Tuesday by W. W. Wallace, member of the chamber of commerce committee arranging for the encampment. Under the agreement with the city council, the city will lay the line, but should the revenue from its operation prove insufficient to make the line profitable, the chamber of commerce will bear the expense of putting down and taking up the line.

MRS. ROGERS TRIAL IS SENT TO LA GRANGE

SAN MARCOS, July 12.—By agreement between counsel, the case of Mrs. Rebecca Bradley Rogers, former University of Texas co-ed, charged with robbery with firearms in connection with robbery of the Farmer's National bank of Buda, Hayes county, last December, today was venued to LaGrange, Fayette county, and the trial date set for December 5. Defense attorneys first opposed the motion for change of venue but when it developed it would be practically impossible to secure a jury here, they acquiesced. The motion was made after 19 veniremen had been questioned without securing a single jurymen. All had formed an opinion, Mrs. Rogers technically in the custody of the sheriff this afternoon as the judge ruled she must file a new bond of \$5,000.

Jerusalem Is Rocked by Quake

JERUSALEM, July 12.—Strenuous efforts at relief are being made today following the disastrous earthquake yesterday which hit the Jerusalem area. The death list is fixed at more than 50, with 20 dead here and 30 at Nablus. Property damage is heavy and the Holy Sepulchre is reported to have suffered damage.

State Tax Survey Favors Amendment

AUSTIN, July 12.—Members of the state tax survey committee went on record today as favoring the proposed constitutional amendment to be voted on in August which would separate taxes and eventually abolish the ad valorem tax. "The amendment would aid the legislature to eliminate the present inequality in taxation," the resolution said. "The present tax system is unjust, and as for farms and ranches and homes, the burden is excessive. The owners of great wealth should stand their proportion of the taxes to support the government," former Governor O. B. Colquitt, chairman, said in behalf of the committee.

Arrests Follow Efforts to "Slip In" at Lake Cisco Pool; Mayor To Fine Miscreants Maximum Allowed

Following arrest of two men who admitted being "prominent citizens of Cisco" for attempting to enter the Lake Cisco bathing beach without a ticket, Mayor J. M. Williamson Tuesday issued a statement in which he declared that this offense is a misdemeanor, and that all those caught in the act will be fined the maximum allowed under the law. Extra guards were placed on duty at the beach Monday following reports that a number of persons had been taking advantage of the incomplete state of the pool and "slipping in" without buying tickets. Many of these, it was said, had been putting on their bathing suits at home and then driving to the pool, entering at some point away from the bathhouses, without paying. A high, wire fence is to be built entirely around the pool, but the press of other work has prevented its erection before now. When this fence is constructed it is believed there will be no difficulty encountered from persons attempting to swim without paying for the privilege, but until then, additional guards have been placed about the beach to care for the situation.

California Man Near Death in Juarez

EL PASO, July 12.—Herbert Lord of San Francisco was in a dying condition today in a Juarez hospital from a bullet wound said by police to be self-inflicted. Lord told the American consul in Juarez that his wife is Clara Lord of San Francisco. His mother, Mrs. Laura A. Lord, lives in Chicago. No motive was given for Lord's action.

J. F. Hutson reported to Cisco police Tuesday that his Chrysler roadster had been stolen. It bore state highway license number 222-417 and motor number G01894.

Texas Farmer Gets Life for Murder

CUERO, July 12.—William Knack, wealthy DeWitt county farmer, today was sentenced to life imprisonment for murder of James Johnson in August, 1920, after a trial of two weeks. Knack had admitted killing Johnson, claiming the latter had insulted his wife.

Georgia Man Near Death in Juarez

ATLANTA, Ga., July 12.—Some Georgia delegates may go to the next democratic national convention instructed to vote for Senator Jim Reed, it was stated today. Former Senator Thomas Hardwick of Georgia announced Reed's name will be placed on the ballots for the election of delegates. Reed was here to address the Georgia legislature.

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A CUT THAT FAILED

The movie magnates announced a general salary cut of 10 to 20 per cent throughout the industry, counting on saving millions. The millions were to cover losses, or swell profits, as the case might be. It was a grand scheme, envied by magnates in various other industries. Could they put it over? Apparently they could not. At least, they couldn't without a big fight, and they don't seem to want a fight. Movie producers are not coal operators. The film studios a Hollywood can't stand idle for six months, as the coal mines can. It would wreck the industry, or at least wreck the present producers. The human equator counts for more in making pictures. The employers are dealing not with a lot of rather stolid workmen but with human beings very much alive and immensely sensitive, particularly in their "pocket nerves." Such a "holler" was raised by the actors that the employers have reconsidered the matter. The salary cut may go into effect but not now. Meanwhile the producers will try to "reduce production costs in other ways," and a committee is studying the whole situation. Evidently the stars—human stars—still rule Hollywood.

JOBS

It does mix a fellow's hot weather emotions a little to read that Benjamin C. Crocker of Upton, Mass., has just resigned five jobs in order to give more time to his remaining six. Those, by the way, were all public jobs. Crocker was the Pooh-Bah of Upton. He filled the offices of police chief, fire department chief, sealer of weights and measures, fire warden caretaker of three schools and caretaker of the town hall, the public library and fire department headquarters and one or two more public buildings. He is easing up on his caretaking. It is to be feared that Crocker has made a mistake. He probably won't know what to do with his new leisure. Efficiency is a laudible aim, but beware of boredom.

THE SWIMMING JOKER

A crowd in Central Park recently laughed its fool head off when Ernest Riedel, international canoe champion, capsizing his canoe, struggled frantically in the water like a drowning man. It wasn't so funny to Riedel. Overheated by racing in a rapid succession of contests, he had been seized with cramps, and not being a good swimmer at best, he was in a bad way. Fortunately other athletes, having sense enough to realize his predicament, jumped in and rescued him from death. Too often there have been no level-headed persons at hand to intervene in such a case. Last summer there were several cases of drowning caused by the belief, among the amused spectators, that the victims were merely pretending. That sort of tragedy, in turn, goes back to fool swimmers themselves, too many of whom cried for help when they needed no help, just as a joke on their friends. It is the old, familiar story of crying "Wolf! Wolf!" when there is no wolf. The swimming joker almost deserves to drown. But this particular wolf, when he comes, comes too often to an innocent victim.

PIRATES' CAVES

Tom Fitzgerald, aged 12, and William Murphy, aged 9, were digging a "pirates' cave" in the bank of the Harlem river, just outside of New York City. It was a sandy bank, easily excavated, and they soon had a magnificent cave, fit for holding all kinds of treasure. They decided then that it needed a secret entrance to make it perfect. So they started tunnelling from another spot. As they burrowed deep into the bank, the sand collapsed, burying the Murphy boy. Someone ran for aid, and by the time the police arrived and dug into the place where the lad's head had disappeared, he was dead. It is an old story, all too common. Not all the summer perils of boyhood are in the water. The instinct for going back to the old pirate days, and far beyond that to the days when all of us were cave dwellers, leads boys irresistibly to seek caves, and dig them if they find none ready-made. The stone caves are not so bad. Those of earth, and especially of gravel or sand, are always full of danger.

AKRON TO BUILD DIRIGIBLE FOR N. Y.-PARIS TRIP

AKRON, O., July 12.—A dirigible is to be constructed here soon which will be able to fly from New York to Paris and return without stopping, according to President P. W. Litchfield, of the Goodyear Tire and Rubber company, head of the Goodyear-Zeppelin corporation.

The big airship will be able to make the round-trip carrying a crew of forty-five and a full load, according to predictions. Under test conditions, with a small crew and a maximum fuel load, such a dirigible should be able to fly across the Pacific and back, local airship designers declare.

Pointing out that trans-ocean flights, such as recently have brought recognition of the efficiency of the modern airplane, have been made three times by dirigible airship, Litchfield cited six outstanding dirigible flights as "milestones in the development of lighter-than-air-craft navigation," as follows:

- Big Flights**
- 1917—The L-59 flew from Jambol, Bulgarian to German East Africa and back on a 4,225 mile, non-stop flight, occupying a little less than four days.
 - 1922—The British R-34 flew over the Atlantic to Mitchell Field, L. I., refueled and returned.
 - 1923—The Dixmude made a four-day flight and return over the Mediterranean and North Africa.
 - 1924—The Shenandoah made a trip of 8,000 miles around the rim of the American continent.
 - 1924—The Los Angeles made a 5,100 mile trip from Central Europe to Lakehurst, N. J.
 - 1926—The semi-rigid Norge made the epochal four-leg trip from Rome, Italy to Point Barrow, Alaska, stopping at Pulham, Eng.; Oslo, Norway; Spitzbergen, then over the North Pole covering a distance approximately 7,000 miles.

"With this background, we are ready to consider what difficulties and dangers the airship has to face and to inquire what steps have been made to alleviate them," Litchfield declared.

"The first, of course, is weather. Snow and ice have little effect. The doped cover of the Zeppelin type craft sheds water and snow blows off the airship in flight.

Danger from lightning is practically non-existent. The greatest danger is from storms but storms travel in easily observable paths and with a concentric motion, which will enable pilots to hold that hazard at a minimum. Having adequate information in regard to the storm's course, the airship pilot would not run away, but would steer for, and utilize the drift."

Work Starts Soon

Work on the "super-Zeppelin" is expected to start here within two months. The Goodyear-Zeppelin design has already been accepted by the United States Navy, to take the place of the ill-fated Shenandoah, which broke in two near Calawell, Ohio, two years ago.

The new airship will have a gas capacity of 6,500,000 cubic feet as compared with the 2,400,000 carried by the Los Angeles.

The super-dirigible will be 750 feet long, 134 feet wide and 145 feet in height. With its six 650-horse power motors it will have a speed of approximately 80 miles per hour and a cruising range, with a maximum load, of 8,000 miles.

According to the plans, the ship will be able to ascend five miles

with greater rapidity than most airplanes. Its motors and cabins will be inclosed in a triplex hull and it will be armed with machine guns and light artillery. Specifications call for the carrying of six airplanes as an auxiliary, it was said.

Two Million Federal Aid Given to Texas

AUSTIN, July 12.—Ten checks, totalling \$1,000,000, just received by State Treasurer W. Gregory Hatcher from the department of agriculture of the federal government for federal aid in the construction of highways in Texas, brings the total federal aid received since January 1, 1927, to \$2,064,438.

For several months prior to the installation of the present administration, federal aid was withheld from Texas to a great extent. Each month this year the government has sent in checks ranging from \$100,000 to more than \$400,000.

UNDERTAKER OFFICIATES AT BALLINGER LODGE

BALLINGER, July 12.—For the twenty-sixth consecutive time, C. R. Crews, local undertaker, has been elected secretary of Ballinger Lodge No. 643, A. F. & A. M. Mr. Crews located in Ballinger more than 20 years ago, and has been a leader in the Masonic circles of this section for more than a quarter of a century.

25 FINED WHEN THEY ARE ABSENT AT TRIAL

FORT WORTH, July 12.—When twenty-five persons one day failed to heed notices to show up in the corporation court, \$125 in fines was assessed the absentees, or \$5 each. Heretofore warrants for failure to appear have been for \$2. The increase, according to F. T. Voight, warrant officer in the police department, was brought about because of the utter indifference of persons for the police summons.

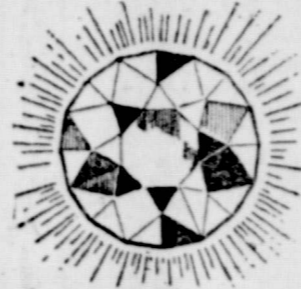
