### Movie Contract Beckons Bathing B

#### OLD HOME TOWN

W. S. Cooper, secretary of the Breckenridge chamber of commerce, and Mrs. Cooper, chaperoned a party of young people from Breckenridge to Lake Cisco Bathing beach Tuesday evening. Mr. Cooper was generous in his praise of the bathing beach, and declared it will be a convenience to the entire Oil Belt, since it is conveniently located within such a distance from all surrounding towns that it is only a pleasant drive from the different towns.

"This is certainly a blessing to the entire Central West Texas Oil Belt," declared Assistant County Attorney Sterling Holloway as he watched the hundreds swimming at Lake Cisco Bathing beach. "The pool, available as it is to all the surrounding cities, will make life more worth living in this section of the state."

"Adversity in Louisiana may be a blessing yet," declared O. B. Webb, assistant to the president of the Texas & Pacific railroad, who was in Cisco Tuesday greeting friends. Mr. Webb is well known here where he has visited several times and made addresses to the Rotary and Lions clubs. "While the great Mississippi flood did almost untold damage to property and caused indescribable suffering among the people, yet it has been so enormous as to bring the section to the attention of the entire nation, with the result that we believe the federal government will take over complete direction of control measures. The industry communities have been unable to control the mighty river in the past, but there is belief that the federal government can put a program that will forever check the mighty Father of Waters. Once the federal government does take over full control of flood prevention work, then Louisiana and the other valley states will become stabilized as to property values, and will be able to go forward rapidly."

Mr. Webb expressed considerable interest in the big celebration scheduled here next week, and promised to return and attend the event, if he is in this section of the country at that time. "I always like to come to Texas, and particularly West Texas," he declared. He commented on the evident prosperity of this section, and was well pleased at the way business is holding up in spite of the oil cut.

#### PRODUCERS TO HAVE MAN HERE TO SEE REVUE

One or more of the contestants in the Cisco Bathing Girls' Revue here next week may get a chance to go into the movies. This announcement was made by J. E. T. Peters, secretary of the Cisco chamber of commerce, on his return from Dallas where he conferred with officials of three motion picture companies who will have cameramen here for the Lake Cisco celebration Friday week. Representatives of the Paramount company, distributors for the Famous Players-Lasky corporation, one of the largest producers in the motion picture industry, agreed to have an expert here to look over the girls in the revue with the idea of offering a movie contract to any of the contestants found suitable for motion picture work.

"The motion picture industry is crying for new stars, new faces to replace many of those which have left the screen for one reason or another," the Paramount manager declared. "For this reason, we are ever on the alert to be present wherever beautiful girls are gathered together. Beauty alone is not the only requirement for a motion picture actor, but wherever we find beauty and personality combined, we are always interested. We shall be glad to give a screening to any girl at the Lake Cisco Bathing Revue whom we believe has the necessary qualifications to become a real motion picture actress."

Everybody in Movies  
However, everybody in West Texas will have ample opportunity to get into the movies. Not only will Paramount News have a cameraman here to take pictures of the big event but Pathe News and Fox News will both have cameras here at work clicking throughout the day. These news reels will be distributed throughout the country, giving Cisco and Lake Cisco wide publicity wherever motion pictures are shown. In addition to these, O. R. Walton, Cisco photographer, will also have a motion picture machine at work on the day of the celebration, creating a film for use particularly in the section 100 miles around Cisco.

That there will be plenty of bathing girls contesting for the honor of being the most beautiful at Lake Cisco the night of the celebration was made certain Wednesday by announcement that in addition to the 30 or more Cisco girls who will participate, many other cities are to send girls here.

#### CITY COUNCIL BACKS NEW BUS LINE PROPOSAL

The city council Tuesday passed a resolution in which the proposal of the West Texas Coaches to operate a bus line from Cisco to Brownwood was approved. The company expects to ask the state railroad commission for a permit to operate such a line in conjunction with its other lines which radiate in all other directions from Cisco.

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#### TELEPHONE FACILITIES DUE AT LAKE

W. P. Prehn, manager in 12 states for the Southwestern Bell Telephone company, has promised to send engineers to Cisco to determine the cost and necessity for constructing a telephone line to serve Lake Cisco and its numerous projects. It was announced Wednesday by the chamber of commerce. At present the lake is served by a rural line with the result that service is unsatisfactory and inadequate to care for the demands at present, to say nothing of the expected growth of projects at the lake. The Christian encampment, due to start here August 28, has been promised telephone service, and Mr. Prehn notified chamber of commerce officials that he would have the survey made at once with a view to installing adequate facilities before August 20.

#### Huge Machinery Contract Now Up

AUSTIN, July 13.—Preparatory to awarding contracts for purchase of \$1,250,000 worth of highway department equipment, the state board of control held an all-morning session attended by Governor Moody and R. A. Thompson, state highway engineer. Bids submitted by 116 companies were considered. Contracts will probably be awarded tomorrow, according to Dr. H. H. Harrington, chairman.

#### Sleeping Beauty May Be Awakened

LOS ANGELES, July 13.—Taking heart from the sleeping beauty's apparent recognition of her husband, Dr. Pencock, chiropractor, today continued his efforts to awaken Mrs. Clara Drummond, 21, from a mental stupor that has lasted 102 days. Mrs. Drummond was unable to talk to her husband, Dr. Pencock explained, but tears came into her eyes and she moaned pitifully. The sleeping beauty's brain cells were deadened when she was overcome with gas three months ago.

#### WEST TEXAS OIL MAN WILL FINANCE FLIGHT

SAN ANGELO, July 13.—West Texas oil money is financing a one-stop flight from San Francisco to Tokyo, via Honolulu, George Hendricks of San Antonio, who sold his Brown county holdings to the Texas company for \$2,000,000, is spending \$200,000 on the flight. Mr. Hendricks, though, will not be in the air other than going to San Francisco to see the start of the trip. He will attempt a non-stop flight from Oklahoma City to San Francisco, there meeting D. W. Griffen, who will attempt the flight. Griffen is a former University of Oklahoma football player.

RAPID CITY, S. D., July 13.—Out of a cloud of dust from a Black Hill trail, a weather-beaten ringer came to the summer white house Tuesday and as the last rider of the revived pony express of Wild West days, delivered to President Coolidge an invitation to attend the Cheyenne, Wyo., rodeo. Dakota Clyde Jones, the ringer, and twenty-six like him had ridden in relay for a full night and day to bring this message encased in buckskin, and when the journey was over the president smiled broadly and thanked him and his companions for their trouble.

#### Survey By Railroads to Find Out If Bonded Warehouse and Storage Plant in Cisco Holds Out Profit

A survey is to begin at once by the traffic and industrial departments of the Missouri-Kansas-Texas and Pacific railroads to determine the need for a bonded warehouse and cold storage facilities at Cisco. This survey is to be made at the request of the chamber of commerce which is seeking to help the Bankhead Poultry Producers' association obtain adequate cold storage facilities and warehouse space for its products. It is believed here that a cold storage plant in connection with a bonded warehouse would be a profitable arrangement and would care for one of the growing needs of Cisco. The railroad companies, through their service departments, will seek to verify this belief through getting in touch with shippers who might be able to use such facilities here.

#### Two-Year-Old Hurts Cause Death Here

As the result of injuries received two years ago in an automobile accident on the Rising Star road, Mrs. Isabella Veliz Perez, 35, wife of Francisco Perez, died at 3:15 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. In the accident, she suffered injuries to her chest which ultimately caused her death. Mrs. Perez was born in 1892, a member of an old and aristocratic family of the republic. She was educated in a Catholic school in Old Mexico and came to this country 15 years ago. She is survived by her husband and one brother, the latter living at Billings, Montana. Funeral services are to be conducted at the Catholic church here at 2 o'clock this afternoon, with burial following in Oakwood cemetery.

#### Car Stolen Here Recovered Unhurt

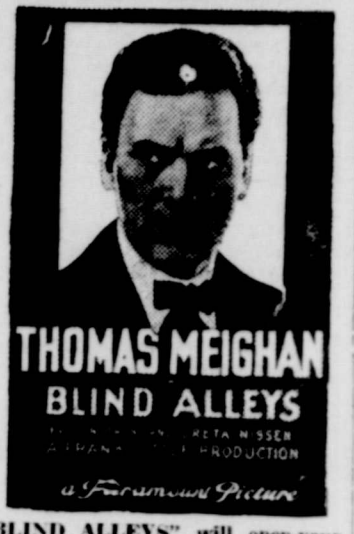

#### Business Men Fight Alcohol Restriction

WASHINGTON, July 13.—American business sounded a warning against undue restrictions in the use of industrial alcohol at the American prohibition conference today. A fight to the last ditch against regulations which would hold the manufacturers responsible for prohibition law violations by employees was promised by E. W. Chatfield of New Jersey, representing the national paint, oil and varnish association. Banks would refuse loans to companies whose permits were placed in jeopardy by such a rule, Chatfield declared.

KANSAS CITY, July 13.—Cleo Williams, 19, negro, was sentenced to hang today when he pleaded guilty to an attack on a 14-year-old high school girl. Zannie Ruffie, 17, negro, was sentenced to life imprisonment for the same offense. The judge indicated that only his age saved him from the extreme penalty which hang August 16.

#### Huge Gusher in Seminole Field Makes 6,185 Barrels in 12 Hours After Brought in By Amerada

TULSA, July 13.—Amerada Petroleum corporation today announced a new oil gusher in the Earlshoro pool of Seminole field. The new well has flowed 6,185 barrels in the first 12 hours. The gusher came in at 4,300 feet where it hit the Wilcox sand, and was shot with 35 quarts after drilling 15 feet in to the sand.

#### U. S. TO SIT BY AND LET OTHERS DO WRANGLING

WASHINGTON, July 13.—The clouds of failure that have been gathering over the Geneva conference grew blacker today. Officials admitted there seems now very little likelihood that the conference will make any advance toward arms limitation. The attitude of the state department today was that this government has gone as far as it can consistently go to meet the British on the cruiser problem, and that no further concessions can be made. American delegates at Geneva have been instructed to take things easy for a few days and let the British and Japanese do the wrangling.

#### YOUTH WINS \$5000 PRIZE IN LONG SWIM

ST. GEORGE'S LAKE, Canada, July 13.—E. F. Keating, a youth, won the St. George's Lake swimming marathon here today after staying in the water 18 hours, during which he swam 25 miles. All other starters in the race had given out and were removed from the water before Keating left the water.  
Apparently in splendid condition, Keating came ashore at the Fort William Henry dock unaided. He showed little sign of strain after the swim, which started at Haguon Lake at 9:45 yesterday morning. Keating won the \$5,000 prize offered by the American Legion for first place.

#### \$25,000 Fire in South Texas Town

SUTHERLAND SPRINGS, Texas, July 13.—Between \$25,000 and \$30,000 fire loss was suffered by this city yesterday when the Baptist church with several residences was destroyed. The fire is believed to have originated in an oil stove. A bucket brigade kept the flames from spreading until arrival of the San Antonio fire department.

#### Pioneer Jurist of Texas Dies at Waco

WACO, July 13.—Judge John C. West, 94, pioneer jurist of the section, died at his home here late last night. Judge West was born in Camden, S. C. April 12, 1834. He came to Texas later and was appointed district attorney by Jefferson Davis, president of the Confederacy. He served through the Civil War, and is said to have witnessed the death of General "Stonewall" Jackson.

#### Moody Will Start Campaign Friday

AUSTIN, July 13.—A statewide speaking campaign in favor of the constitutional amendments will be inaugurated Friday by Gov. Dan Moody when he delivers an address at Liberty. The chief executive's itinerary will include most of the principal cities of the state, according to announcement by Boyd Gatewood, the governor's private secretary. During the closing days of the tour, Gov. Moody will make radio speeches over the largest radio stations in Texas.

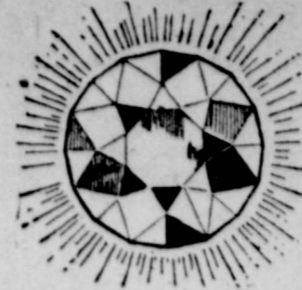

FORD'S SURPRISING SURPRISE

The astonishing thing about Ford's courageous public retraction of all criticisms of the Jewish people appearing in recent years in the Dearborn Independent, is his statement that he did not know about these articles. A good many thoughtful persons have felt that Henry Ford was a little out of his element as a publisher. His genius has never seemed to lie in the direction of journalism. Yet the public has believed that the ideas presented there were held, or at least not disapproved, by Ford. Now, it appears, he not only did not authorize those expressions of opinion, but did not even know of them. He never read "his own" magazine. His apology for the anti-Semitic attacks seems sincere and thorough. Yet it would not have been necessary to apologize if he had been more careful about the use of his money and his name.

INTERNATIONAL INSURANCE

In 1922, Senator Ciruolo, president of the Italian Red Cross, proposed to the League of Nations assembly that the nations unite in a mutual insurance arrangement against adverse "acts of God." On July 5, this year, a conference of twenty nations began at Geneva under the auspices of the league, to discuss such an insurance plan. The idea is to provide immediate help in disasters such as earthquakes, tidal waves, great fires, famines and pestilences, floods or tornadoes, which reach unusually grave proportions. This international insurance would be confined purely to first aid services, to avoid delay while raising public funds. It would be carried out through existing national and international Red Cross organizations, which stand always ready for prompt service. An advisory committee is suggested, composed of one or more experts from each geographical or national areas of the world, residing in the respective areas they represent. There is nothing in this proposal to discredit the generosity of people to each other in times of great disaster. It simply recognizes that greater help can be given, as soon as it is needed, if the funds and organization are prepared before hand. If a suitable plan can be worked out, and the funds raised successfully, it should make human generosity and sympathy constructively effective on a larger scale than ever before.

RED-TAPED JUSTICE

Many times a layman in court matters feels that he could turn the wheels of justice much more satisfactorily than the people in charge. Then he runs across a news story such as the following, and begins to feel humble: "A New York gunman named Izzy was once upon a time given a 12-year sentence for manslaughter. That term expires August 23. In the meantime Izzy wandered away from a road gang and stayed away for four years, during which time he was arrested and served a sentence for some other misdeed in New Jersey. He was tried for escaping from jail, but the jury decided that he had not "escaped" in the legal sense. In the meantime his unauthorized absence from the prison had brought upon him a penalty of 924 more days under guard. Izzy is now contending in a court of law that since he did not "escape legally" the 924-day penalty must not be imposed and should be removed from the record so that he can be paroled. The court says his 12-year sentence has not expired yet, anyhow, so he is eligible for parole in spite of his four-year absence." It would all be perfectly clear, no doubt, to anybody who understood the situation. But nobody does, and the officials of the New York prison system regard Izzy as a plagued nuisance. They do not know precisely what his status is or what to do with him. Technicalities and red

David Wark Griffith has advanced the suggestion that only persons who have been used to wealth since childhood are able to maintain their personalities in the face of movie salaries.

Griffith has just placed A. Barton Hepburn, heir of the late president of the Chase National Bank, of New York, under contract. Hepburn is possessor of a \$20,000,000 fortune and owes his smile to the curve of the silver spoon that was in his mouth on his natal day.

Should Hepburn be a success, it would bode no good for little Mary Jimjam, of Concord, Ia., who has curls just like Mary Pickford, or Tommy Slayson, of West Bend, Mo., who, as you may not have heard, is a dead ringer for Lon Chaney.

It will be the Vanderbilts and Astors who will follow the footsteps of Hepburn and Julia Hoyt, the first member of the 400 to become a film actress.

It will be a reversal of form, because most of the present movie stars started as poor girls. Those that didn't started as poor boys.

Still, some directors think it may be all for the best. Many, as Griffith seems to think, are not able to bear up under affluence. Hollywood's wilderness is often attributed to those who, having big money for the first time, can think of nothing but swathing a wide cut.

Most of the really big stars behave themselves, though magnates have invested millions in promising actors, only to find their money wasted because the actors' chanced mode of living made them unacceptable.

### NEW FORD HAS FOUR BRAKES, 'N EVERYTHING

DETROIT, July 13.—The new Ford car has been seen on test runs on highways bordering Dearborn, and observation makes it practically certain the new product will bear absolutely no resemblance to the old Model T, according to a Dow Jones report. Although viewed while in motion, the radiator of the new car appeared to be distinctly of the Lincoln type, and brake drums were visible on all four wheels, indicating four wheel brakes. It also was observed that gears were shifted by employment of a handle similar to that on other gear-shift cars.

Another notable feature was the smoothness and quietness with which the car rapidly picked up speed after slowing down and shifting gears to cross a rutted sidewalk. The body, mounted on a new car chassis, was of the old type, for obvious reasons, and while it is thought the hood over the motor was purely a make-shift, it furnished a good idea of the probable appearance of the new hood.

### League Urges Dry Law Enforcement

TROUP, July 13.—More rigid enforcement of prohibition laws is sought in a campaign being waged throughout this section by the Good Government League. "Our League," Fred J. Sackett, head of the organization, declared, "wants to arouse the people to a better understanding of the gravity of the situation to the end that better citizenship may prevail. We want them to realize the necessity for qualifying as voters by paying their poll taxes, and thus be prepared to act intelligently and effectively when the time comes to take a decided stand for the enforcement of the prohibition laws of the country."

For nine months ending with May the average was \$23.88. These facts were disclosed in a statement released by the state board of control. 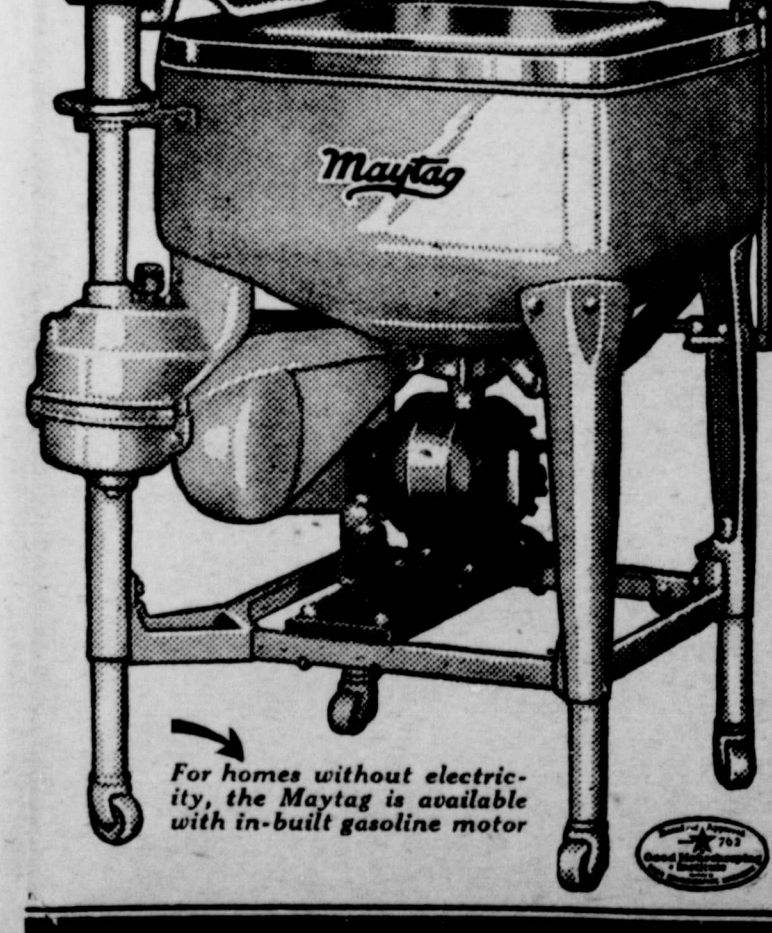
