Quality Products Swell Farmer's Bank Account

C. H. Ward Also Tries to Get Early Melons and Cantaloupes on Market Before Others Can Compete With Him

C. H. Ward helps his bank account by raising quality cantaloupes and watermelons. A few years ago, Mr. Ward, who lives southeast of Cisco, found that he, like most farmers of the hill weevil district, must raise something else besides cotton. He had never tried gardening or trucking, but decided that he would try melons as a side line. He had been accustomed to raising a few melons each year for home use and had never made a failure so it seemed to him that if he could raise a small patch successfully there should be no good reason why he could not raise a larger patch for the market.

He plants his melons early, always having a number of hills planted extra early in small pasteboard boxes, which are protected from frosts until danger is over. Then he sets the boxes in the ground after tearing out the bottom to let the roots go into the soil. Thus he has large plants growing before others have much more than thought of planting the seeds. Just here, Mr. Ward refused to say that a matter of two weeks in the time of marketing melons is a big item. The first melons bring much better prices than those coming on later when they must meet competition of everybody's melons, the early ones bringing two or three times as much as later ones. He said he had noticed that the unusual time always commands the most attention and so he tried to attract attention to his products by having them extra early and of fine quality.

He finds that a little extra cultivation and careful selection of seed gives him a little higher quality cantaloupe and he always calls his customer's attention to the quality of these he sells. In this way, he is able to establish a rather permanent demand for his produce. Marketing is the big item in gardening, says Mr. Ward. It is easy for any farmer to raise plenty of produce during the ordinary year to keep his family in good circumstances, but the trouble is finding a steady demand—a demand that will pay a profit on production. During a good season everyone has plenty and the ordinary markets are flooded with an indifferent quality of produce and the farmer finds himself with plenty to sell but no takers. The only solution he has been able to find is a quality product that will stand so far above competition that consumers will discern the difference very readily. He says his wife raises chickens and turkeys in great numbers. She, also, believes in quality, handling only pure bred birds, which command good prices for all eggs sold during the hatching season as well as fancy prices for the birds themselves when offered on the market. He says a good looking fowl, if only bought to be eaten, finds a much readier market than a shabby looking bird, and this fact is one to be considered by anyone who seeks a market for any kind of commodity. The matter of cultivation, too, comes in for its share of importance. Proper cultivation makes plant food readily digestible. Just as proper breaking up of food makes it easier of assimilation by the human body, a strong, healthy vine will naturally produce a finer quality of fruit and mature it much earlier. Mr. Ward begins his cultivation before the seeds are planted. A seed bed is thrown up and is kept moist by means of a protecting dust mulch. Each week this land is stirred, the cultivation becoming more and more shallow as the roots spread. Weeds are never allowed in his melon patches. They drink up too much of his precious moisture, which must be conserved until such time as a full crop of fruit will make heavy demands upon the amount in store.

Pioneer Jurist of Texas Dies at Waco

WACO, July 13.—Judge John C. West, 94, pioneer jurist of this section died at his home here late last night. Judge West was born in Camden, S. C. April 12, 1834. He came to Texas later and was appointed district attorney by Jefferson Davis, president of the Confederacy. He served through the Civil War, and is said to have witnessed the death of General "Stonewall" Jackson.

\$25,000 Fire in South Texas Town

SUTHERLAND SPRINGS, Texas, July 13.—Between \$25,000 and \$30,000 fire loss was suffered by this city yesterday when the Baptist church with several residences was destroyed. The fire is believed to have originated in an oil stove. A bucket brigade kept the flames from spreading until arrival of the San Antonio fire department.

CISCOAN IN TENNESSEE BADLY HURT

Asa Skiles, Cisco groceryman, left at noon Saturday for Memphis, Tenn., in response to a telephone call from there stating that his father, L. W. Skiles, 68, had been found on the N. C. & St. L. railway tracks there with his skull fractured. Details of how he came by the injury were not given, but investigation indicated he had been hurt in a fall, the telephone message said. Last reports received stated that he was resting well. Mr. Skiles had been in Trenton, Tenn., on a visit to a brother, Jim Skiles, who had just died and was buried before the Ciscoan left for home. He had planned to change trains at Memphis and take a through train to Cisco, and his ticket was found in a pocket of his coat. He was picked up early Friday morning by a train crew. A letter written him by his sons here was found in his coat, together with \$10 in currency. He regained consciousness after being taken to the hospital and told attendants his name. Other details of the accident were lacking. Mr. Skiles has four sons living here. Asa, I. H., J. O. and Alvin.

DR. ROBERTS SAILS HOME FROM EUROPE

Dr. T. T. Roberts, president of Randolph college, sailed from South Hampton, England, on Saturday, on his way home, according to a cablegram received from him Monday by Dean Powell of the college. He expects to arrive in New York next Sunday and in Cisco next Wednesday or Thursday, the message stated. Dr. Roberts went to Europe to attend the Rotary International convention at Ostend, Belgium, and has been touring Europe since.

CITY COUNCIL BACKS NEW BUS LINE PROPOSAL

The city council Tuesday passed a resolution in which the proposal of the West Texas Coaches to operate a bus line from Cisco to Brownwood was approved. The company expects to ask the state railroad commission for a permit to operate such a line in conjunction with its other lines which radiate in all other directions from Cisco.

Comanche County Stirred Up By Discovery of Infant Covered Up With Insects Early Tuesday Morn

Considerable excitement was reported in Comanche county Tuesday following the finding in DeLeon early that morning of a five-day old baby girl, abandoned in a corn field, according to G. B. Milner, Katy railroad brakeman, who brought the news to Cisco. According to Milner, an 18-year-old youth named Denny discovered the baby between 6 and 7 o'clock Tuesday morning as he was going to work in DeLeon. He was attracted into a corn field when he heard the cries of a baby, and there found the infant covered with ants. One eye was badly swollen, and the other entirely closed by stings from the insects. The child, weighing about 19 pounds and apparently only five or six days old, was clothed in a gown and was lying on a quilt. The baby is now in the care of Mrs. W. S. Sneed, wife of a Katy conductor, who is taking care of it until a home is found. The Comanche county sheriff was notified of the discovery, and he began investigation at once with the hope of finding the mother of the infant and learning the cause of its abandonment.

CRUDE OIL PRODUCTION SHOWS DROP IN LONG SWIM

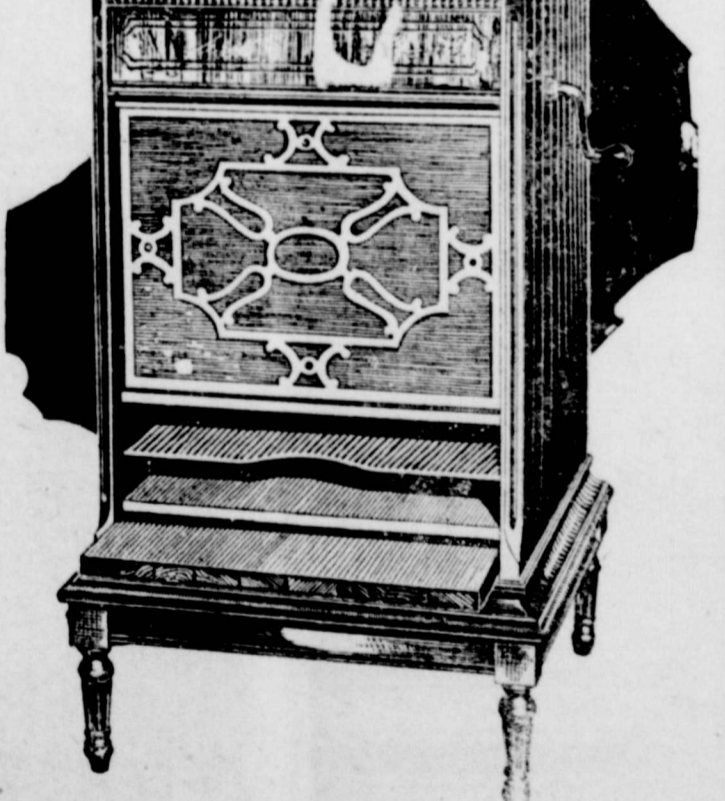

WEST TEXAS COACHES PLAN NEW ROUTES

The West Texas Coaches will operate two busses between Cisco and Lake Cisco next week when the big celebration dedicating the Lake Cisco bridge and other projects at the lake will be held. This announcement was made by Temple Bowen, manager of the bus line, while he was in Cisco Tuesday. A station will be operated at the lake, as well as in town, and a nominal round trip fare will be charged. While here, Mr. Bowen made known his company's plan for completing its service in all directions from Cisco. At present, the company operates east and west out of Cisco over the Bankhead highway, southwest to San Angelo, north to Albany and connecting with Stamford, and northeast to Breckenridge. It is now planned to operate from Cisco to Brownwood, and a permit from the state railroad commission is to be asked for this line. The Brownwood line will make Cisco the hub of a territory served by the West Texas Coaches, with "spokes" extending in all directions. At a recent meeting of the chamber of commerce here, resolutions were passed approving the West Texas Coaches' application for permit to operate between Fort Worth and Dallas, which would give Cisco direct bus service into Dallas.

Two Million Federal Aid Given to Texas

Conference in Brownwood With State Highway Commissioner To Seek Connection With Cisco Road

BROWNWOOD, July 14.—W. P. Murphy, Hilton Burks, F. W. Greber and C. Y. Early, representing the Brownwood chamber of commerce, met with Brown county commissioners court Monday afternoon for the purpose of discussing plans for the construction and maintenance of a first class highway between Brownwood and Rising Star, with especial reference to the strip of road between May and Rising Star.

Mr. Burks, secretary of the chamber of commerce, told of the condition of state highway No. 10, between Brownwood and Fort Worth, and according to his statement, the highway is not only rough, but is impassable at several places on account of condemned bridges. One bridge near Granbury has been condemned and it is necessary to make a detour of several miles there. Tourists out of Dallas and Fort Worth are being routed west on highway No. 1, through Cisco to Brownwood. Mr. Burks stated, Cisco and Rising Star people are interested in improving the road from Brownwood to Rising Star, in view of the fact that traffic from Cisco is heavy. Cisco people are anxious to establish a bus line from their city to San Antonio via Brownwood and Brady, and in addition to this there is much oil traffic between that city and Brownwood, according to the statement of Mr. Burks, who gave as his source of information, the secretary of the Cisco chamber of commerce.

\$23,000 Spent on Road
E. M. Davis, county judge of Brown county, then related the history of the highway between here and Rising Star and stated that he and the commissioners court felt that the county had spent all the money on this road that could well be spent and keep within the bounds of reason and fairness to other precincts of the county. Judge Davis stated that the county had issued warrants for \$16,000 to pay for the right of way, fencing and grubbing of same, as a part of their contract or agreement with the state highway department that promised to build and maintain that strip of road if the county would do what it has already been done. Judge Davis told the court and delegates from the chamber of commerce that he had gone to J. B. Early, district engineer, several months ago in interest of this strip of road and Mr. Early in turn had promised help, but asked that he be given about 90 days time, after which he would recommend to the highway commission that this road be taken over and completed. Judge Davis did this but still no action was taken, and later he went before the highway commission in interest of the road but did not deem it advisable to broach the question. Instead he called Judge Ely of Abilene to one side and discussed the situation with him. Judge Ely gave Judge Davis much encouragement but no action has been taken. Later Mr. Early was seen again by Judge Davis and Mr. Early told Judge Davis that he was ready to recommend that the Brownwood-Rising Star road be fixed, but Judge Davis stated that it was a matter of record that Mr. Early and another highway engineer had filed a written request with the highway commission that the road be abandoned.

More Warrants
In addition to the \$16,000 in warrants spent by the county another \$1,000 had to be issued to care for some overlooked expenses. Brown county loaned two tractors to the state to be used on this road with the agreement that the state would pay all expenses of running the tractors and further agreed that they would be returned to the county in as good condition as they were when borrowed, Judge Davis stated. This the state did not do, but on the other hand, wrecked both machines, and the county lost about \$6,000 on this account, according to the statements of Judge Davis, which was confirmed by members of the commissioners court.

W. P. Murphy, president of the Brownwood chamber of commerce, told of seeing Judge Ely recently in Austin and that the judge had promised to come to Brownwood and look the situation over here. It was suggested by Mr. Greber that a letter be written to Judge Ely inviting him to come here at an early date and that the commissioners court, a committee from the chamber of commerce, representatives from Rising Star, May and Cisco, meet with the judge and see what action can be taken in regard to the highway between Brownwood and Rising Star. This suggestion was agreed upon by the commissioners court and the delegates from the chamber of commerce, and according to present plans a meeting of this nature will be held at Judge Ely's convenience.

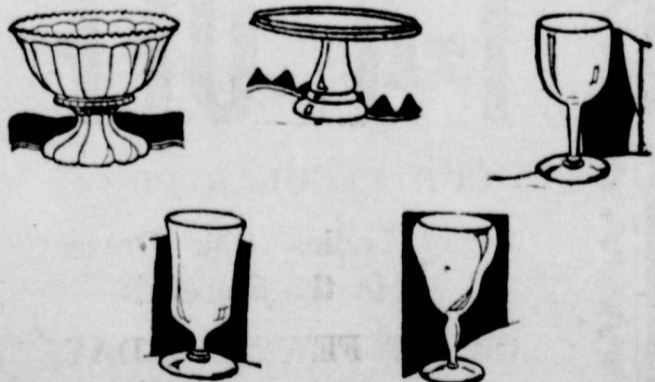

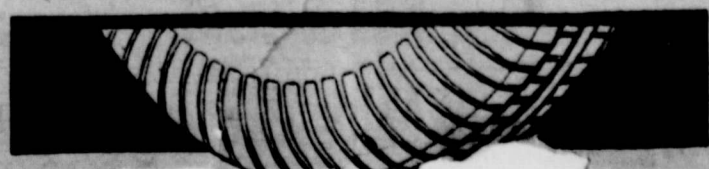

\$25,000 Ruby, Once Pride of Great Indian Mogul, Plaything for Child

LONDON, Eng., July 11.—A huge uncut ruby valued at \$25,000 has been restored to its owner after being the plaything for two weeks of the children of a Leicester railroad track employee. Of great sentimental value to India owing to its romantic associations with Shah Jehan, builder of the wondrous Taj Mahal, the ruby weighs 61 carats and was lost by Mrs. Kraham Polo, its present owner, during a railroad journey to the north of England. It was picked up by Joseph H. Wade, a railroad employe, on the track near Leicester, who, not realising its worth, gave it to his twin children. It was not until Wade picked up a newspaper containing an advertisement describing the missing ruby that he recognized it, almost two weeks afterwards, as the "piece of red glass" he had found. With considerable difficulty the ruby was found in a corner of a

room where it had been flung by the children, and restored to Mrs. Polo. The ruby belonged originally to the great Mogul Emperor Jahangir, whose fondness for rubies is proverbial in India. It then passed into the hands of his wife, the famous Queen Nurjehan, the "Light of the World," later passing into the hands of the builder of the Taj Mahal. NEW CALLAHAN TEST MAKING 1000 BARRELS

Empire Gas and Fuel company's deep well on the Will Johnson farm, in southwest Callahan county, is a 1,000 barrel producer from 4,140 feet, the deepest test in this section. It was said by Empire officials. With two strings of tools lodged in the hole, the test was opened and allowed to flow nine hours. It filled two 400 barrel tanks and showed a heavy gas flow, estimated by the crew at 23,500,000 cubic feet daily. The rock pressure of the gas is 1,410 pounds, it is said. The test tapped a heavy gas and oil flow at 4,140 feet several weeks ago. Tools became lost in the hole, but did not shut off the gas. A second string of tools became lodged in the hole. Despite the tools which obstructed the hole, the gas flow reached 49,000,000 cubic feet before the well was finally capped. The well is in virgin without territory, nearly 15 miles from the Cross Plains field. The Hanger field is the closest deep production to the new discovery. The Empire company has blocked all of the land in the vicinity of the well and is planning extensive developments. Additional storage is being constructed. Empire officials believe that if the tools are removed and the well turned loose its production will be more than 1,500 barrels daily.
