HONOLULU FLYER OUT OF GAS

Eight-Inch Rain Floods North Texas Town

Plane Descends in Ocean and Sends Out Calls for Help; Many Ships Ordered to Begin Search

AUSTIN, July 15.—Demands for a \$940,754 from the Texas Gulf Sulphur Co. and the Freeport Sulphur company as delinquent taxes have been made by State Comptroller S. H. Terrell who claims this amount is due the state because of the differences in the market price of sulphur and the amount given by these companies. Her sentence was commuted to life imprisonment and she was later released.

Sunday morning Mr. Lenox will occupy his pulpit here. The meeting will continue another week.

Bill Mulroy Starts On Big Clean Up

Bill Mulroy, of the West Texas Utilities Co., seems to champion the campaign on Federal Electric Washers scheduled to begin Monday, but Howard Austin, factory representative and his crew of men arrived on Friday before. Instead of waiting for the schedule time, Mulroy assigned them their territory and in less than two hours no less than 10 washing demonstrations had been secured. Mulroy and Austin say they are going to help clean up the town for the July 22 celebration by doing a free washing for everybody in Cisco, who will ask for the demonstration. "A clean town," is their slogan.

Militant Publisher Escapes Jail Term

INDIANAPOLIS, July 15.—George R. Die, militant publisher of the Muncie Democrat will not have to serve a 90-day term on the Indiana state farm imposed on him in 1925 for contempt of court by Judge Duest. Governor E. Jackson announced today he would parole Die immediately upon Die's commitment to the penal farm.

AIRMEN BELIEVED SAFE FOR PRESENT

SAN FRANCISCO, July 15.—The airplane, City of Oakland, carried 308 gallons of gasoline, which Pilot Ernest Smith estimated would be sufficient for 26 hours' flying. Strong headwinds, however, cut in greatly on Smith's speed, slowing him at times to a speed around 75 miles an hour. The City of Oakland is capable of remaining aloft for at least 10 hours, it was estimated. In that time, Smith and Bronte would have time to inflate their rubber boat, if help were not forthcoming. AD VALOREM TAX RATE TO BE 35 CENTS

AUSTIN, July 15.—Tuesday, July 19, today was set as the tentative meeting date for the state automatic tax board which is to fix the ad valorem tax rate for 1928. The board will probably fix the rate at 35 cents on the \$100 tax valuation. This is the state limit, and is based on \$3,650,000 values. The present tax rate is 23 cents on the \$100 valuation. The board is composed of the state comptroller, state treasurer and secretary of state.

FLYING SAFER THAN DRIVING

Bernt Balchen, one of Commander Byrd's companions on the flight across the Atlantic ocean that so nearly ended in tragedy for the four men, has written, among other things, the following striking statement: "The truth is that I do not get that 'thriller' stuff of the people who talk about flying. I never get any 'thrills' out of flying. It is no different to me from driving a motor car, except that personally I prefer flying. I think it is safer."

HIGH PRESSURE SELLING

Addressing the National Association of Industrial Advertisers, Glenn Frank made this sensible comment on salesmanship: "The 'high pressure' salesman is the caricature of the real genius of salesmanship—he is the proof that salesmen, like athletes, may be over-trained. Amid all the clamor and Babbitry of 'supersalesmen,' sanity is reappearing. We know that the salesman or advertising man must know far more than he uses in order to use what he uses effectively. He depends upon information, not upon argument. I have been 'high-pressured' into buying things, but I always have resented it and I believe 'high pressure' methods have their reflection in harming or retarding business."

CULTURE IN A MUSEUM

A museum of natural history does not have all its treasures in plain view. Says Paul M. Rea, of the Cleveland museum, "For every bird or animal on exhibit there are dozens stored away in a steel locker." Rea is no miser who would keep his treasures to himself, examining them in secret. He would like to have the whole public share in the enjoyment of a fine collection. Last winter he hit upon a way to bring about this desirable end. He invited interested members of a local women's club to come to the museum to study ornithology, using many of the resources of the lockers in the course of instruction. A class was formed. The weeks of bird study passed swiftly and when they ended the women asked to be taught something about fossils. Then the big idea was born. Beginning this fall, the museum will conduct adult classes for study of biology, taxidermy, archeology, ornithology, or whatever people ask for. These courses will not aim to make experts of the adults who take them. "We only believe it will add to the sum total of the cultural

# CHEYENNE TO BRING BACK EARLY DAYS

CHEYENNE, Wyo., July 15.—The old West will live again in all the glory of bronco busting, steer-roping, and bulldogging during the annual Frontier-Days celebration which will be held here July 26 to 30.

This annual rodeo, stampee or round-up is not an exhibition. It is a gigantic contest where the champion cowboys and cowgirls of the nation struggle for honors. No event which marked the round-up in the early days is neglected. The riders contend in relay races, wild horse races, and barrel racing. And the boys and girls come in for their share of the fun in the calf riding.

**Military Display**  
One of the spectacular displays of the celebration this year will be that made by the military forces from Fort D. A. Russell. A famous troop from the 13th Cavalry—skilled soldiers upon black horses with white accoutrements—will perform a difficult drill to music, daily. They will be supported by the 4th Cavalry and the 76th Field Artillery.

Equally spectacular will be the part played by a large band of Sioux Indians who will come from their reservation to help revive the old days of the rodeo. The squaws as well as the braves will take part in the races which will form part of the celebration.

Theariat will whirl in the fantastic circles of the stunt ropers to commemorate an art that is fast becoming obsolete. The cowboys will risk life and limb to bring off the trophies which will mark them first in bronco riding, calf roping and the rest.

**Annual Event**  
The first Frontier-Day celebration was held here in 1897 for one day. It has been held every year since then for longer and longer periods until the 1927 celebration will take five days.

The red chiefs of the Sioux Nation hope to be able to greet the white chief of the United States at the stampee this year. President Coolidge has received a special invitation to take in the Frontier-Day celebration this year. It would involve only a comparatively brief trip from the Summer White House in the Black Hills of South Dakota.

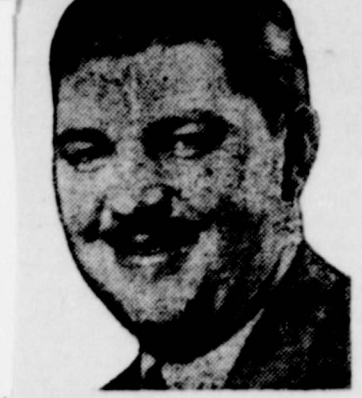

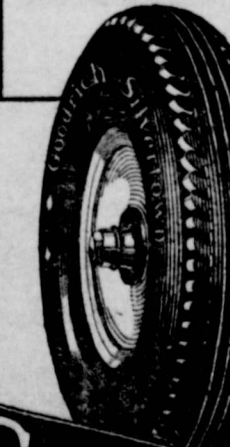

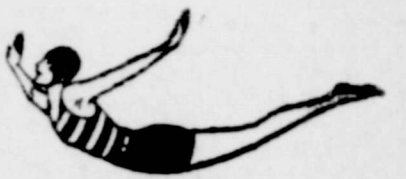

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### MOORE WOULD BAR REPORTERS FROM SCHOOL

FORT WORTH, July 15.—Considerable controversy is being waged among members of the Fort Worth Board of Education, following a recommendation made by Supt. M. H. Moore that measures be passed prohibiting students from taking a course a third time in which they have twice failed.

In giving his plan, Moore declared that repeaters are costing the taxpayers of Fort Worth an enormous sum of money each year, in addition to taking up their own time in attempts to make the grade.

The suggested regulation was opposed by two members of the board when it came up for consideration at a board meeting; the opponents of the measure saying that a student has the right to go to school until 21 years old without payment of tuition. Those against the measure declared that the fault must be with the home or the teachers and that it was the duty of the teachers to find out what was wrong.

Moore's regulation would not have any bearing on the summer school, he pointed out, since the students pay tuition during the summer months.

The board agreed to investigate the plan fully after Moore compiles statistics showing the exact number of "repeaters" and estimates the cost to the taxpayers from this source each year. Moore also will write for a ruling on the proposed regulation from the state department of education.
