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LET'S PREPARE FOR A BIG DAY

Cisco this week faces the strenuous task of playing host to the greatest crowd in the history of this city and possibly in the annals of West Texas. The widespread interest that has been evident since announcement of plans for the July 22 celebration at Lake Cisco has led those in charge of the event to anticipate a crowd of no less than 50,000 persons. This is something more than double the size of the crowds that have attended bathing girl revues here in the past, and about three and a half times the size of the largest crowd that ever saw a football game here. The crowd will be here most of the day and far into the night, with the greatest crowds due in mid-afternoon when Governor Dan Moody speaks, and at night when West Texas' fairest daughters will pass in revue beneath the spotlight. Among all that vast assemblage of people will be many who will be in Cisco for the first time. Others who have been here occasionally will have their eyes opened as to just what Cisco can do. It is obviously up to Cisco to do its best in accommodating and entertaining this vast crowd in the prescribed Cisco way. It's going to take a lot of money to pay the expenses involved. But it's going to take far greater effort on the part of those whose services money could not buy, to put the celebration over as it should be. The committee meeting Saturday morning showed the spirit of the workers, some of whom appeared to have visualized for the first time the magnitude of the undertaking. Those citizens serving on official committees are going to have to have the loyal support of every man, woman and child in Cisco if their task is to be accomplished in the most satisfactory way. They will need the help of many citizens, either directly to perform some task, or indirectly, such as making sure there is enough foodstuff in their stock to supply the hungry thousands who will be here, or making ample preparations to supply plenty of ice cream and cold drinks to the crowd. These thousands will be our guests on that day, and it is obviously impolite to invite a guest and then let him go hungry. Every merchant in Cisco should be glad to contribute to the expense fund without stint, and should even go so far as to hunt up the committee to make donations, rather than be hunted up. Next Friday should see a turning point in the history of Cisco—the realization of many fond dreams and the beginning of others—and it is up to our citizens to make that an auspicious day.

CAMPING PERILS AND JOYS

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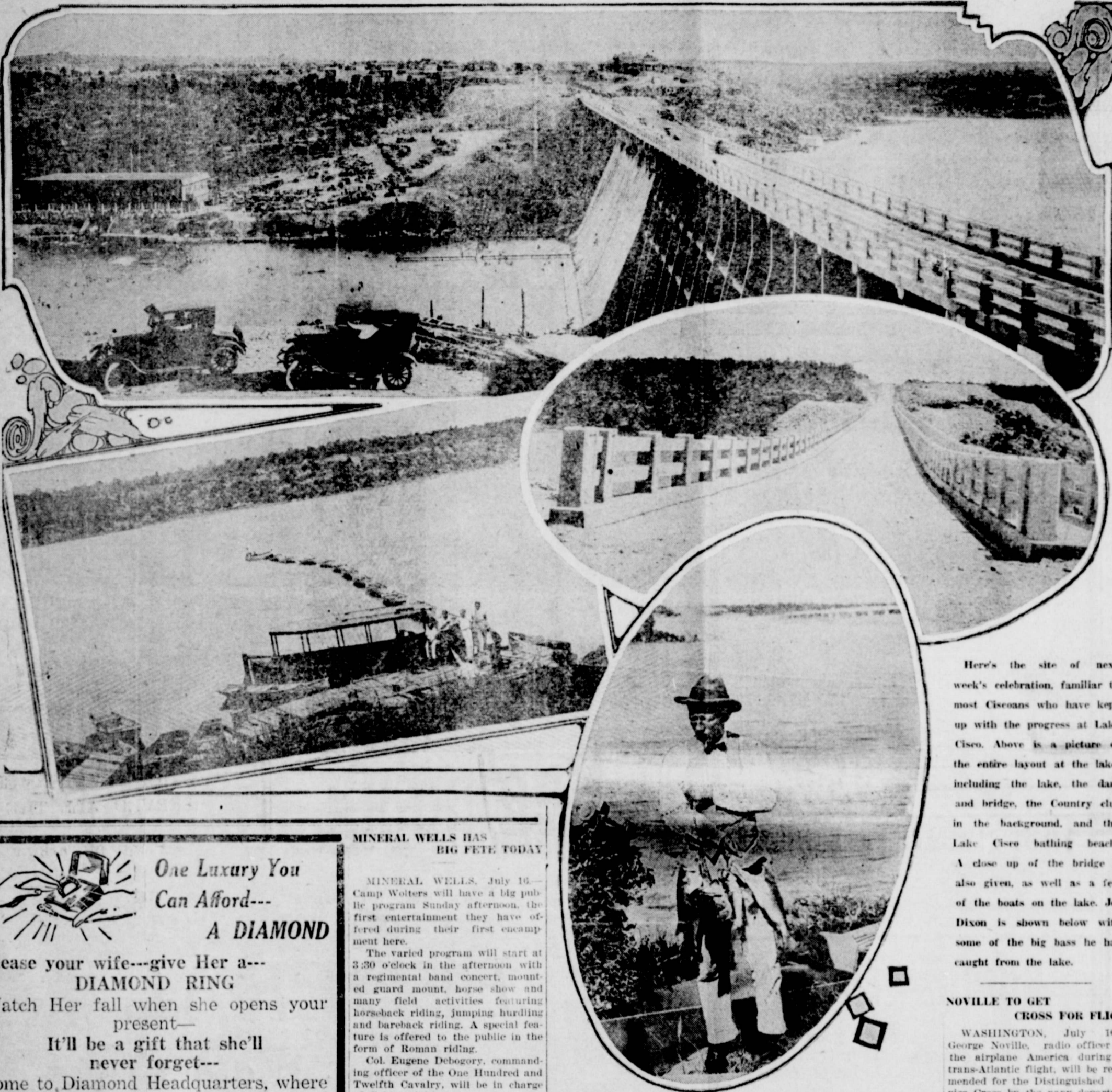
SWIMMING CONTESTS TO BE BIG EVENTS JULY 22

Many to Take Part in Events During Afternoon of Big Celebration; Stunts To Be Both Interesting and Amusing

Miss Eulalia Gavit and her committee, comprised of Miss Bengon and Mrs. Charles Renaud, Saturday gave out the outline of swimming contests to be held here next Friday as a part of the Lake Cisco celebration. Her recommendations were adopted at a meeting of the general committee Saturday morning and those who intend to enter any of the various contests should register with Miss Gavit at Lake Cisco Bathing beach where she is chief life guard.

The program calls for the following contests in the morning, with a prize of \$3 for first place, \$2 for second and \$1 for third in each event:

50-yard dash for girls over 15.
25-yard dash for girls over 15.
100-yard dash for girls over 15.
150-yard dash for girls over 15.
In the evening before the bathing girls' revue, a demonstration of a few perfect strokes will be given by the Red Cross Life Saving examiner and his assistant. These will include the breast stroke, overhand stroke, back-hand stroke, side stroke, scissors kick, and Australian crawl. Following this event a prize will be awarded the individual or team performing the most original stunt in the water. For a candle race, prizes of \$3, \$2 and \$1 are offered, and for an egg relay race, a \$10 prize is put up for the winning team of five.
Practice for the events is to start at once, so that the contestants will be thoroughly familiar with the rules and requirements.

THE STATE PRESS TURNS DOWN BEAUTY JOB

State Press of the Dallas News has shied away from the offer of the Cisco Daily News to get him a job as judge of the bathing beauties to parade here on the evening of July 22. Answering an article appearing in this newspaper, the Dallas scribe has referred the job to Dan Moody, who will be here on that date, declaring the governor took on that responsibility when he let the state elect him governor.

Here's what State Press has to say: "The end of this column may be naive and glib and unsophisticated. He may even be boorish. But he can't be inveigled. The inveiglers might as well try to spoof a lawyer or beguile a fiddler or deceive a decoy duck as endeavor to reduce State Press to the office of scapegoat. What makes him say so is the effort of the Cisco Daily News to tell him from the security of his atelier on July 22 and make him a judge on behalf of the bathing beauty parade. Cisco claims the largest artificial swimmer in the world, and to hear the Ciscoans tell it, their astoriums crowd some of the third-rate lakes for size—Lake Erie, Salt Lake, Lake Dallas and so forth. If S. P. will come to the bathing beautiful on July 22, local influence will be exerted to obtain him a seat beside Governor Moody on the judge's bench, the Cisco News says. The answer is, yes, but, no, nah! When D. Moody asked for the office he now adorns, he obligated himself to assume all the responsibilities of the governorship. The electors of this imperial Commonwealth took him at his word and gave him their highest office. Nothing was said in the campaign about his qualifications for umpiring a bathing beauty parade, but the unvoiced assumption was that he was qualified. Equally presumptive, he has the courage of his office. There is nothing in the record to indicate that he has asked to be relieved of any portion of his responsibility at the Cisco pageant of beauty. Should the local committee propose to take any of the governor's authority away from him, it would be his duty to protest. He can not constitutionally delegate to another any portion of his gubernatorial prerogatives. But even if he could do so without violence to the constitution or his oath of office—even if he should beseech State Press to sit beside him in the seat of judgment, S. P. would decline. It would be pleasant to be seen in the governor's company, and he photographed with him, and seem to share in the official aureole. Even so, S. P. would fall

and refuse to help His Excellency pick the winner at a beauty parade. This declination is not based upon experience, but observation. The decliner has observed that the judges of such contests are joyous and glib among themselves, setting the rules to one another and pointing out defects in the candidates they don't individually favor. It is not generally known to the heterogeneous crowd at such a festival that there are written rules for the judges to go by. They must appraise the curves and angles of the contestants. They must figure the probable pounds, estimate the height in proportion to the width, consider the circumference and guess at the thickness. Governor Moody may be quick of eye and prompt in decision, but State Press would falter, blink, blush and otherwise manifest the novice's confusion. He simply couldn't bring himself to discuss the value of any lady's knees in an inventory of her beauty. He simply would not have any entrant called back and required to pose or prouette in order that he might determine whether her calves were set too low or too high in proportion to her vertical measure. Governor Moody may have a flare for such diagnosis. He may be as good at that sort of thing as Paris, son of Priam, who bestowed the golden apple upon Aphrodite in the first beauty show ever held on earth. But State Press has no such aptitude. Neither does he wish to risk incurring the enmity of the disappointed contestees and their mammas. He will not be inveigled. He will not serve. Mr. Moody wanted to be governor. Now let him take the consequences."

DENVER STARTS FIGHT UPON LOAN SHARKS

DENVER, July 16.—The death knell of the "loan shark" in Colorado is believed to have been sounded in a decision handed down by the Colorado supreme court here recently. The decision upholds a provision in the state's money lenders law which makes void any note when illegal rates of interest have been charged. The legal rate of interest under the law on loans of \$500 or less is 1 per cent per month. The purpose of the money lenders law, enacted in 1919, the decision says, is to prevent charging of excessive rates of interest on small loans. Statewide Action This decision is expected to bring statewide action against the illegal money lender. The enforcement of the money lenders act is said to have been lax in Colorado

because of lack of funds to regulate the work. The case which evoked the decision was that of Bert Rice against the Rice of Denver against the Loan and Finance Co., of Denver, for the charging of excessive interest rates on a small loan. Loan companies have denied recent complaints that they not only charge excessive rates of interest, but also practice numerous methods of circumventing the law in a manner that increases the interest burden of the small borrower.

Stiff Penalties According to the money lenders law, no loan for which a greater rate of interest shall be charged than is allowed in the act, shall be valid in this state.

Violation of provisions of the act referring to the legal rate of interest shall be a misdemeanor punishable by \$300 fine or six months imprisonment.

Safety Film To Be Shown

A free motion picture illustrating safety rules as applied to the oil industry is scheduled to be shown at the city hall in Eastland next Thursday, July 21, according to announcement by C. C. Clifton and J. O. Sue of the Humble Co., in charge of safety first work for the Humble in this district. The Mid-Continent Oil & Gas association is sponsoring the picture, and Mr. Clifton and Mr. Sue are assisting in creating interest in the film, which is said to contain much

comedy as well as instruction. Beginning Monday, the two will visit the entire division.

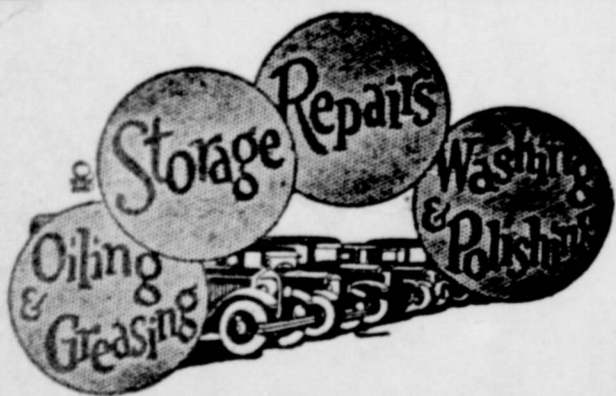

Pipeline Will Be Built to Big Empire Gusher

1,000-Barrel Well in Callahan Co. Turns Attention to Area West of Cross Plains; Many Tests Drilling

CROSS PLAINS, July 16.—A pipeline, probably to extend from the new Cross Plains field to the big wildcat well of the Empire Gas & Fuel Co. on the Johnson land in survey 14d, south Callahan county, according to information coming from the offices of the Prairie Pipe Line company this week. About fifteen miles of line will be required to make the connection.

This is but one of a number of interesting side lights dealing with this important strike that has come to light since the brief test given this well early in the week.

The test given, though of too short a duration to give absolutely accurate information on the possibilities of this wildcat, has proven beyond a doubt that the production is of the gusher type and with its present inadequate equipment it looks safe for 1000 barrels, and with additional separators, even at its present stage of completion, this might be considerably increased.

The test covered only a 10 hour period, being all that was required to fill the 400 barrels of storage that had been provided, and the well was then again shut in.

Workmen at the well state that the oil apparently increased over the period of the test, probably further drilling itself in, as the test followed a three weeks' period since it was first shut in against a tested rock pressure of 1440 pounds to the square inch. The oil is being separated from a gas volume that has tested 23,450,000, now estimated to have slightly declined since the increase in the oil output.

Several hundred feet of open hole, with two strings of lost tools in the bottom, is probably holding up a part of the natural pressure, and when drilling was suspended at about seven feet in the pay, several weeks ago, the output was almost dry gas of tremendous volume, with but a slight trace of oil.

Highest Test Oil

A hydrometer test of the oil in the tanks taken a few hours after the last tank was filled gave the Baume gravity as 52 at 79 temperature, which with correction gives a pipe line basis of slightly above 50 gravity. This is the highest test oil ever discovered in this section of the state, and is also deeper than former drilling in Callahan county fields, the top of the sand being logged at 4135 feet.

A number of new locations are now being made in that section and drilling will start immediately in some instances, as pipe line connections seem assured at an earlier date than possible for future completions.

Another bright spot in outside development was also recorded during the week, in the completion by Culbertson Bros. of a substantial producer, located on the Gray ranch about 15 miles southwest of Cross Plains in north Callahan county. This well has topped the sand at 2475 feet and at a total depth of 2480 feet is swabbing about 40 barrels of oil.

This location is on a lease recently acquired by these owners from Andy Urban, veteran west Texas operator, and is located one location west and a like distance north of the discovery well of that locality, drilled several months ago by the former owner.

An additional interest is now being evidenced in that territory, and a new test is now rigging up approximately one mile southwest of the Culbertson wells on land of the same fee ownership.

This test will be drilled by Andy Urban and will test for both the 1000

forts are now being made to swedge this ten inch casing and continue the hole to a deep test probably to the Empire pay.

The other of these interesting tests is being drilled by the White Eagle corporation on the Hall ranch an approximate two miles to the east and in the direction of the new Cross Plains field. This test is drilling at 1550 feet and is said to be logging very similar to the Cross Plains field.

Milham Has Bad Luck

About seven miles still farther to the east and but a short distance to the northwest of the new Cross Plains field, the Milham corporation continue their efforts to overcome a bad fishing job at 4800 feet and test the deep pay.

This well lost two strings of tools at 3370 about three months ago and after several days spent in fishing, drilled by both strings and set pipe at the depth of the bottom of the original hole when drilling was resumed. After drilling about forty feet of hole another string of tools was lost and fishing is again in progress.

Drilling in the new Cross Plains field continues at a steady stride with two wells on the pay at the close of the week, being the first of the group that started with the revival of drilling in that section, to reach the expected depth of the sand. One of these wells is the important outside test of Brannon & Murray on the Bennett & Booth land to the west of former drilling and at a depth of 1670 feet has not yet touched the top of the expected sand. Calculations based on surface elevation and logs of the nearer wells indicate that the sand should be found within the next 20 feet of drilling.

East of this well and leading one location to the north of former

drilling the Miller No. 6 of Shaw & Rathke has topped the pay at 1616 feet and is reported standing 1000 feet in fluid, showing for a nice producer when drilled in. Preparations are now being made to take care of this well's production and the sand will be drilled within the next two or three days.

Offsetting this well to the north the same owners are down 1150 feet on No. 7 of the same lease, and about a half mile to the northeast in virgin territory between these wells and the group in the vicinity of the original discovery gasser on

the Baum tract, The Mook-Texas Co. and M. E. Wakefield are drilling at 800 feet on the T. E. Baum tract.

Two outside tests about a quarter of a mile to the east of this original group of wells are now forging toward pay depth. One of these wells now being drilled by Hill & West on the Waller land, is at 1120 feet and the other, also on the same Waller tract, being drilled by L. G. Bradstreet, is now completing an underreaming job at 870 feet.

Due to the outside location of these wells they are sharing inter-

est in almost an equal degree with the most favorably located wildcats.

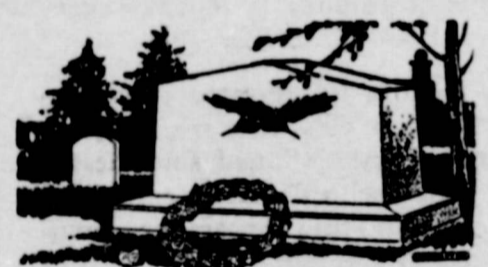

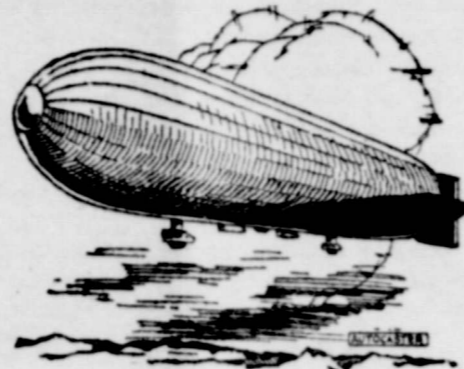

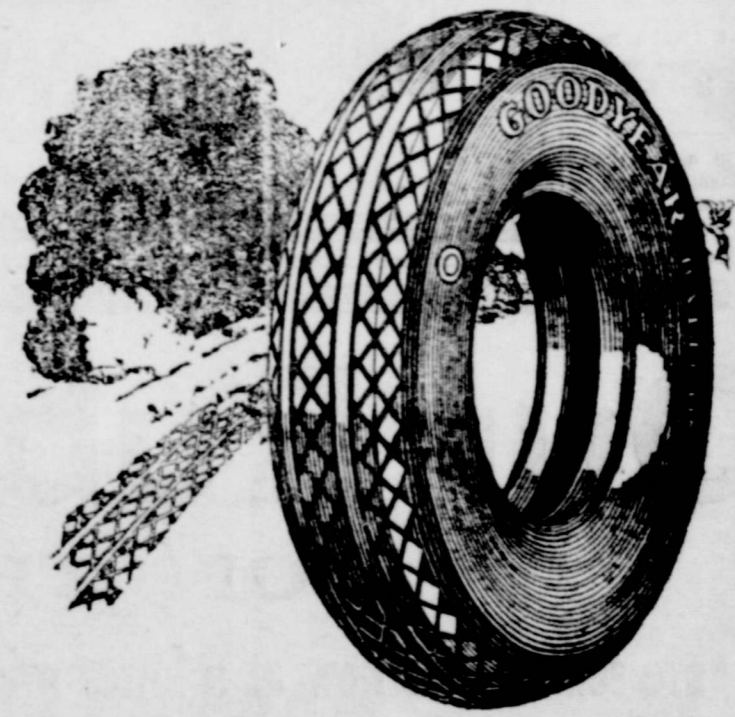
