KEEPING COOL

These are the days when keeping cool calls for the expenditure of a little thought and will power. The rules are simple, and they work to a surprising degree for any who follow them faithfully.

1. Don't talk heat Sceptics who doubt the efficacy of that one ought to try it anyhow. They'll be astonished.

2. Eat temperately of foods that are not themselves heating. A green vegetable served hot is less heating than a dish of ice cream. Fruits and salads are good summer foods.

Wear clothes that do not constrict, of colors and materials that look cool and are as cool as possible.

4. Take daily baths, using tepid water rather than cold water.

5. See to it that the waste products of the body are regularly eliminated. Some doctors say that there can be no case of heat prostration when there is proper elimination.

7. Get a sensible amount of exercise in the open air and sunshine. This is a better aid against heat prostration than darkened rooms and iced drinks.

GUNS

The round-up with which President Coolidge was entertained recently in the Black Hills brought one great disillusionment to the public, if not to the president. When a steer was lassoed and thrown so violently as to have its leg broken, and it became necessary to shoot the animal, no cowboy had the necessary gun. There was confusion and embarassment until finally somebody succeeded in borrowing a shooting iron from a deputy sheriff. How he happened to have one is not explained. Alas! Where are the picturesque "bad men" of the Black Hills? And be it remembered that "them hills" are supposed to be the last stand of lawlessness in the west-the ultimate frontier. Consider the decadence of the once noble art of self-defense. Guns have gone into the hands of hijackers-who really represent romance of a sort -but mainly into the hands of a degenerate city breed. The "gunman" now has the morals and romance of a rat. And the modern representatives of the noble cow-punching art, lacking the broad sweep of their elders, are content to drive "dude ranchers" around in flivvers and, for all we know, use those same flivvers for their ordinary round-ups, on roads built for that purpose. Not that any of us want to see anybody going around shooting up everybody else, no matter how dramatically and colorfully. But we miss a certain punch of verisimilitude in these Black Hills functions.


