NEW YORK IS TIRED OUT IN SAYING HELLO

NEW YORK, July 18.—Five of the seven men who have flown from America to Europe in one hop returned today learned that New York has earned its reputation for being blasé. Commander Richard E. Byrd and his three companions and Clarence Chamberlin were received with official pomp and ceremony on their arrival, but the wild spirit and acclaim given Charles Lindbergh on his return was missing. Apparently, trans-Atlantic flying is no longer a feat which elicits great rejoicing. As the official reception began in front of the city hall where Byrd, Acosta, George Noville, Bert Balchen and Chamberlin were greeted by Mayor Walker, a slight rain began to fall, almost completely emptying the stands. Broadway from the Battery to city hall was crowded with admirers of the flyers, but the crowd was by no means as dense as when Lindbergh returned.

WOMAN FLYER ARRIVES IN EL PASO AT NOON

EL PASO, July 18.—The plane bearing Miss Doran and piloted by Augzy Pedlar arrived here at 11:20 a. m. today. According to present plans, Miss Doran and Pedlar will take off for the coast at daylight Tuesday. The monoplane piloted by the pretty school teacher and Pedlar hopped off from Fort Worth at 5 o'clock this morning. Pedlar and Miss Doran are entered in the Dole \$35,000 non-stop flight from California to Hawaii next month.

Sixth, the final and persistent purpose is the building of manhood. No person is educated who knows only Arts and Sciences. To be truly educated one must be schooled in the spiritual. The end of education is well rounded character."

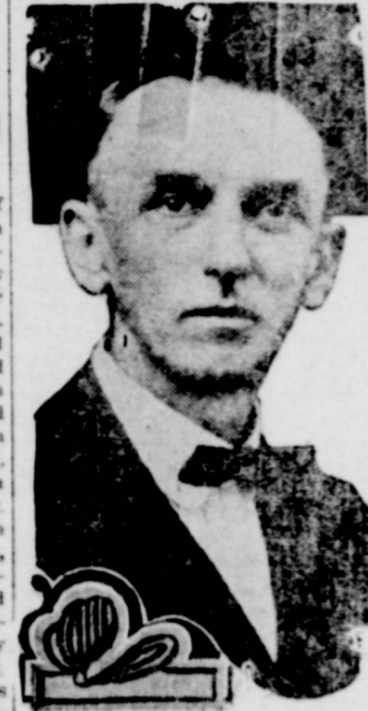
State Highway Bids Opened at Austin

3 TEACHERS ELECTED BY CISCO BOARD

Election of three new teachers to fill vacancies existing in the faculty of Cisco schools was announced Monday by J. J. Youngblood, superintendent. LOS ANGELES, July 18.—Captain George H. Wilkins, polar flyer, plans to explore the Antarctic regions by air, he announced today. He will interest himself in meteorological data, in addition to actual exploration. He leaves in December. The Arctic flyer is considering flying to the South Pole by the way of Seattle, Tokio, Australia and New Zealand.

Cisco High Schedules Two With El Paso Eleven, One This Season and Other Here

Definite acceptance of an offer from El Paso high school for two games of football, one to be played this fall in El Paso and a second to be played in Cisco next year was wired the El Paso of Cisco Monday by Coach W. R. Chapman of Cisco high. The agreement calls for a guarantee of \$1,000 to be paid by the home team in each game.

According to the letter from El Paso, that section of the state is elated over securing a game with the Lobos. Due to El Paso's distance from other cities of size, few outstanding teams have played in the past. However, the El Pasoans have kept up with the record of the Lobos in the past, and they offered October 1 as the date for the game with Cisco high this year. About the same date will be selected for the 1928 battle.

Coach Chapman, likewise, is well pleased over the El Paso offer. The game will afford his team a trip of such magnitude rarely ever attempted by a high school team. The boys will travel more than 1,000 miles in going to and from the border city, and will also get a glimpse of Old Mexico. Recent announcement that such a trip was in prospect has served to stimulate interest in the coming football season, plans for which will soon get under way.

1500 ENTER BEACH HERE ON SUNDAY

Another big day was experienced at the Lake Cisco Bathing Beach here Sunday when approximately 1,500 persons entered the big pool. The hot weather sent most citizens to the open in an effort to find a cool breeze, and hundreds found it at the lake. The crowds were handled with greater despatch than in the past, additional windows for serving bathers having been provided. Crowds at the beach are reported growing daily as the weather warms up, although showers of the last week interfered with outings planned on several days.

MYSTERIOUS TEXAS DEATH UNDER PRO

Jones left here a week ago, telling his wife he was going to see a doctor. He was brought home in a taxi and told his wife he had been tacked in a gambling hall. He lapsed into unconsciousness from which he awakened for brief periods during the week. Jones had several small gashes, but physicians said he might have died from a disease from which he was suffering.

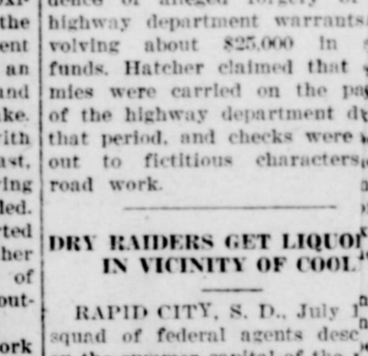
PADDED STATE PAYROLL TO BE INVESTIGATED

AUSTIN, July 18.—An investigation into the alleged padding payrolls during the administration of Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson may be made by the Travis county grand jury now in session. Investigation will be the direct result of discoveries made by Gregory Hatcher, state treasurer and turned over to the attorney general's department. Saturday Hatcher, it was said, found evidence of alleged forgery of highway department warrants involving about \$25,000 in funds. Hatcher claimed that \$100,000 of the highway department debt that period, and checks were set out to fictitious characters on road work.

DRY RAIDERS GET LIQUOR IN VICINITY OF COOL

RAPID CITY, S. D., July 18.—A squad of federal agents descended on the summer capital of the state over the week end, raided eleven illegal bootleggers and seized a quantity of corn liquor. Simultaneous raids were held in other cities of the Black Hills, half a dozen jailed in Deadwood.

Official Shot Down When He Tries To Capture Intruder at Consulate; Wound Serious But May Not Be Fatal

WASHINGTON, July 18.—William Chapman, American consul at Puerto, Mexico, was dangerously wounded by a Mexican assassin, according to a message received at the state department today from the British consul there. Chapman heard a noise in the kitchen, the report stated, and on investigation was met by a Mexican who leveled a gun at him. Chapman backed away and the Mexican followed, firing one shot into his stomach. Physicians summoned found that the consul was very seriously wounded, although they had some hope of saving his life.

Chapman was born at Mount Pisgah, Ark., but his home is listed in state department records as Oklawaha, Okla.

HAYTI LABOR DELEGATION UNDER ARREST

WASHINGTON, July 18.—The Haytian labor delegation en route to the Pan-American Labor conference which opened here today were arrested yesterday as they sought to leave the country, according to a telegram read at the conference here today. The delegation included labor leaders and seven Haytian editors, and they were arrested on orders of the president, who would not let them leave the country.

U. S. Will Submit Counter Proposals

GENEVA, July 18.—American counter proposals will be offered to the Anglo-Japanese suggestion for a naval agreement, it was declared today. Several of the Anglo-Japanese proposals are unacceptable to the United States. It is not planned to reject them entirely, but to make counter proposals.

Police Investigate Railway Accident

FORT WORTH, July 15.—Police were investigating the death of an unidentified youth here late yesterday. The youth, believed struck by a T. & P. train in the yards here, died a few minutes after the accident. Monroe Smith, a company man, said he and the youth were walking along the track when an engine striking train struck his companion. Smith said his companion's name was Schwartz of Little Rock, Ark.

HOUSTON, July 18.—Safeflowers obtained more than \$800 from the safe of the Beacon Shoe company some time during the week end, it became known. The handles had been battered from the safe door.

Governor's Address Will Be Given Here at 3 p. m.; Review of Troops Is Changed to Accommodate Ciscoans

The address of Gov. Dan Moody at the Lake Cisco bridge dedication will be delivered at 3 o'clock Friday afternoon, it was announced Monday. The governor had an engagement to review the Texas National Guard troops at Mineral Wells Friday afternoon, but this was changed to Friday morning so as to allow the governor to come to Cisco for the afternoon address. He will leave Friday evening for Fort Worth en route to Van Zandt county where he has a speaking engagement for Saturday.

T & P Announces Cut Rate to Fete

A letter from George D. Hunter, general passenger agent of the Texas and Pacific railroad, was received Monday by the chamber of commerce announcing excursion rates to Cisco for the Lake Cisco celebration. The rates apply from all points on the line from Dallas to Big Spring, inclusive. The open rate will be one and one-half of the regular adult one-way fare for the round trip, adding sufficient to make the round trip fare end in 0 or 5. Minimum round trip adult fare will be \$1. One-half the adult fare will apply for children, adding enough to make the fare end in 0 or 5. Selling dates will be July 21 and 22, with the final limit July 23, with no stopovers permitted.

Veteran Ranger Shoots Himself At Undertaker's

PALESTINE, Texas, July 18.—Jeff Minnette, 69, veteran Texas ranger and peace officer, shot himself to death here today in the Eszell Undertaking company's establishment. A note tucked inside his shirt read: "I did it myself. Don't blame anyone else." Minnette was born and raised in Anderson county. He had served Texas and Oklahoma as a peace officer in various capacities. Despondency over lack of work and financial pressure were believed responsible.

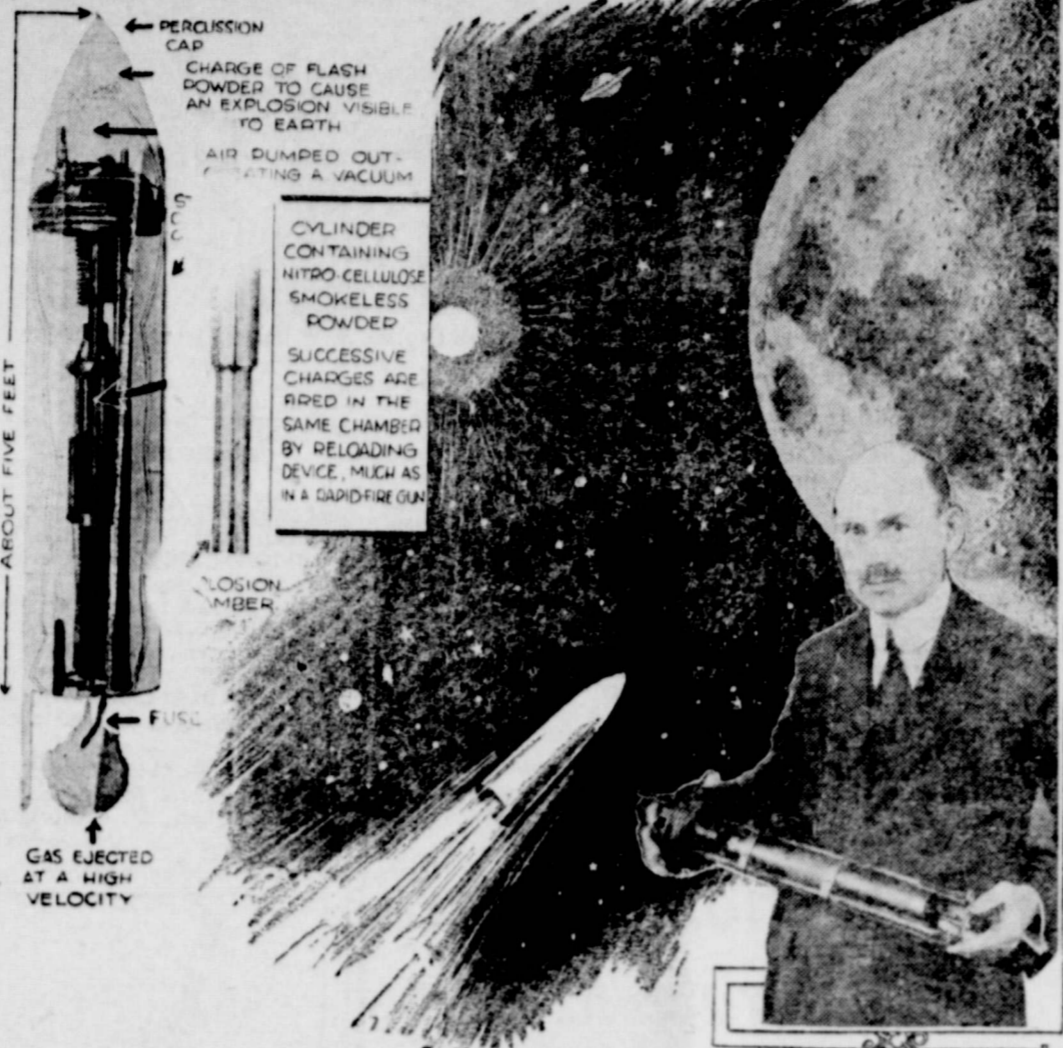

Want to Be First to Visit the Moon. Apply to Robt. H. Goddard, Clark U.

BOSTON (I-N Special).—Men still dream on of touring the solar system.

Professor Robert H. Goddard, of Clark University, is the most vivid and energetic of dreamers. His scheme of sending a rocket to the moon, nursed for years, is now maturing.

Small test rockets have been sent into the air, proving, to Dr. Goddard's satisfaction, the soundness of his theories. Now the professor is working on a larger rocket.

This he will shoot on an exploration tour of the earth's atmosphere. It will shoot upward, propelled by successive charges of nitro-cellulose, to the outer edge of the air, carrying with it a number of instruments to register the density of the atmosphere and the temperatures. It will drop back to the earth, its speed checked by a parachute arrangement invented by Goddard. The test will be made in some locality where the danger of the falling projectile will be at a minimum.

Should this test succeed, Goddard will construct an enormous replica and shoot it at the moon. Attached to it will be a flare that will be

ignited by the rocket's impact with the moon—if it gets there. The flare will be large enough to be visible through telescopes on earth.

And should this second test succeed—it will be a long time yet if it does, as Goddard has spent eight years on his first rocket—the professor will make a new and larger rocket capable of carrying a person inside. By the time the last rocket is made, Goddard hopes to have invented some means of providing for the experimenter's return. The moon is without atmosphere, a de-

cidely unhealthy condition for a human.

Goddard's propulsion device is comparatively simple. The rocket is to kick itself along by a series of explosions, operating in machine gun fashion. Each explosion is to add speed to the projectile until it attains sufficient force to carry it beyond the gravity attraction of the earth. From that point on it will be pulled in by the moon.

The passenger-carrying rocket would make the journey in forty-eight hours, Goddard believes. Use of light metals would increase its range. The voyager would be in a small compartment ahead of the firing chamber. Oxygen, food and water would be available for the person with sufficient courage to make the flight.

Goddard has made no selection of the person who may make the first trip to the moon. A scientific education and a willingness to die are probably the only qualifications, though weight may figure.

Announcement was made from the chamber of commerce here, after a conference between R. H. Jones, assistant to the chief engineer of the Texas and Pacific railroad, and officials of the chamber, that bids for the construction of the Cisco & Northeastern railroad from Breckenridge to Threeforks would be opened at the general offices of the Texas and Pacific at Dallas soon. No definite date for the opening of the bids was set, although it is expected to take place early in the week.

Representatives of six large construction companies recently finished a survey of the route to be followed by the extension during which data was collected and estimates made upon which to base bids.

Barring unforeseen contingencies, a contract for the building of the 40 miles of line will be awarded at

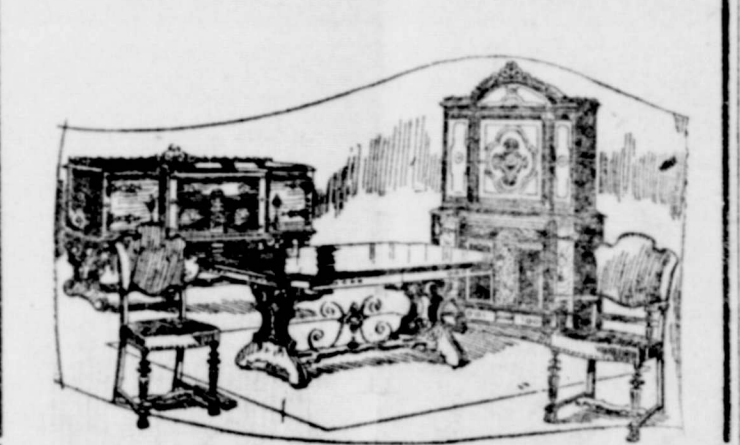

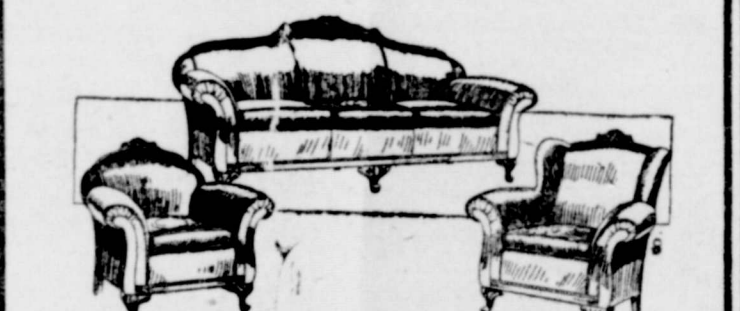
