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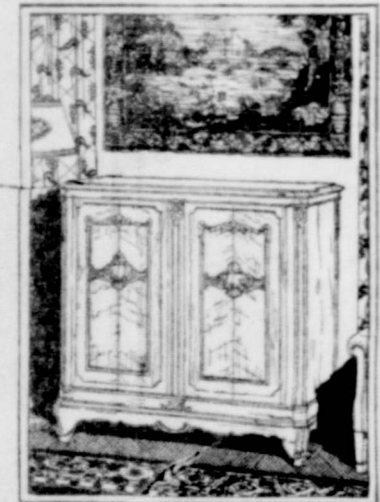

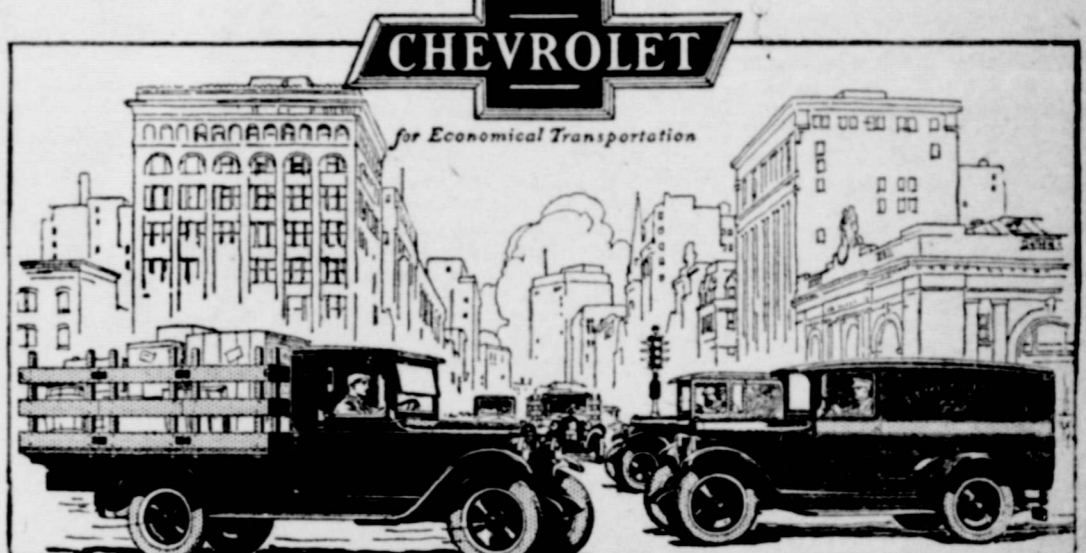

TUCKER BREAKS RECORDS IN FISH WORK

AUSTIN, July 23.—All records were broken in administering the fishing laws during April, May and June, according to figures of the game, fish and oyster commission which show that \$2,707.10 was collected for fines as compared to \$390 for the same months in 1926.

During these months there were 261 fines paid out of the total of 381 since last September. Under-size fish, mostly bass and crappie from interior fishermen, account for 181 fines since September 1. The total number of coast fines for all offenses since September 1 is 37 and 21 of these were in April, May and June.

The total fish fines from September 1 was \$4,318.90 as compared to \$2,414.50 for the preceding fiscal year. The total fishing receipts including licenses, taxes and fines for April, May and June is \$12,487.83, as compared to \$7,553.23 for the same months last year. Total fish receipts were \$38,104.28 as compared to \$26,789.89 for the previous fiscal year.

"I am fairly well pleased with what has been done since reorganizing the department in March," Commissioner Will T. Tucker said.

Virtually all day Thursday was consumed by the court and

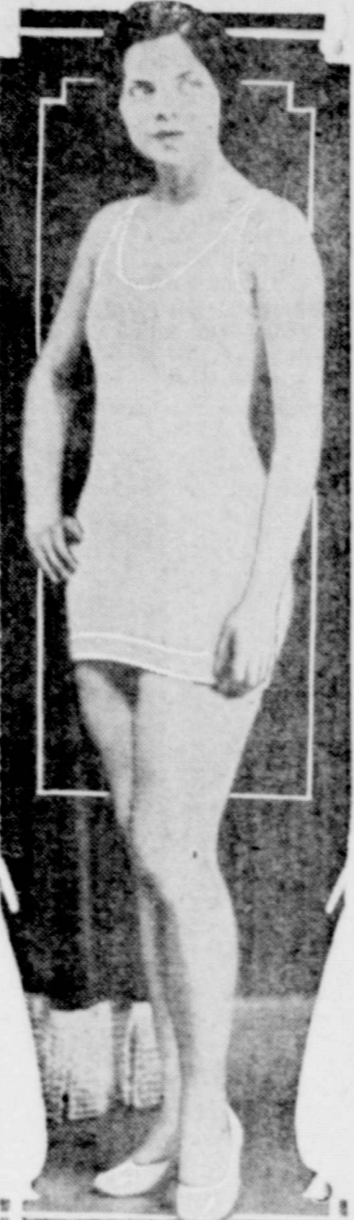
its attaches in an effort to get into the trial of the case. The jury was kept waiting for practically the entire day, but was discharged when it was seen that the case would not be tried at this time.

Blanton and Moody in Near Debate On Proposed Amendments; Governor Praises Beauty of Cisco Section

Ciscoans and the visitors gathered here from all parts of West Texas Friday afternoon heard what amounted almost to a debate between a United States Congressman and the governor of their state on the question of adoption of the four proposed amendments to the state constitution. Congressman Thomas L. Blanton of Abilene, taking the stump at the Lake Cisco celebration before the arrival of Governor Dan Moody, made a vigorous plea for defeat of the proposed amendments, urging as the principal point the fact that the constitution was adopted by the pioneers of Texas and has brought this state to its present high state of development. He expressed the hope that the hearers would vote against all the amendments.

When Gov. Moody arrived, he was apprised of the fact that the congressman had spoken against the amendments, and he asked and was given permission of the committee in charge to speak in favor of the amendments. Time and again he hit back at the idea that the constitution, because it was adopted many years ago, should be kept free from change. He pointed out that had the people of the United States adopted this viewpoint, there could have been no prohibition and suffrage amendments with their resulting benefits. He pointed out that Thomas Jefferson, praised by many as the original democrat, had himself declared that the constitution should be changed to meet changing conditions.

Praises Beauty of West
The governor, in beginning his address, mentioned the beauties of this section of West Texas, declaring that so far as he knew there is no spot in Texas or the United States more beautiful than could be seen from the very spot on which he stood. He also praised Cisco for its courage and ability to put things over in constructing the huge dam and related projects, and lauded Mayor J. M. Williamson for his vision that prompted the construction program.

Favoring the amendment which abolishes the fee system because, he said, it would mean a saving in expenditures of the government. Governor Moody urged that the present fee system encouraged the public official to undertake prosecutions because fees for his income were obtained by convictions.

Court System Is Hit
The present judicial system in Texas is antiquated, he said, encouraged litigation because of the length of time required in adjudicating cases; is expensive when compared with efficiency which would result in a Supreme court of nine members, and can best be improved by the adoption of the Supreme court amendment.

Farms and ranch lands of Texas, he declared in supporting the tax amendment, are now bearing a disproportionate part of the State taxes and he appealed for the amendment on behalf of the "small farmer and the small livestock producer."

He stated that recently a meeting had been called to make plans for the defeat of the amendment and to procure secrecy, although the conferees met in Houston, they went over to Rosenberg "to avoid publicity."

To Aid Small Farmer
While some are speaking against the amendment, which he declared is being opposed by the corporations, no one has been heard to "speak for the small farmer and the small producer of livestock who will be benefited if the amendment is passed."

"Opponents of these amendments are asking their defeat on the ground that the Constitution is time honored, and ought not to be changed," Governor Moody said. "Because the Constitution of Texas was written in 1876, and because the Constitution of the United States was written more than 100 years ago, they tell us that 'it ought not to be changed.' Our forefathers wisely built, but they could not foresee the changes which have been wrought in our political, industrial and material life."

Supreme Court Cited
"Our forefathers did not foresee that that dam would stand yonder impounding millions of gallons of water. They did not foresee that Eastland county would be a large producer of oil. "Some men pose as disciples of Thomas Jefferson. They speak of his principles, but they are either ignorant or ignore, his declaration that as times change, and new conditions arise, constitutions must be rearranged. It is a mistake to assume that all of the wisdom of the world is tied up in one generation. It is impossible to see the changes which might come about in 50 or 100 years."

R. Q. Lee, former president of the West Texas chamber of commerce and of the Cisco chamber of commerce, was major of ceremonies during the day. Besides Governor Moody many State officials were present, among them being Game, Fish and Oyster Commissioner Tucker; Insurance Commissioner R. L. Daniel; Railroad Commissioners Lon Smith and C. V. Terrell; Senators Walter Woodward and Jesse Smith, and Representatives Gilbert of Putnam and Hazaman of Ranger. Mrs. J. U. Fields of Haskell, state president of the Federation of Women's clubs, was one of the

Knightlinger and Ollie Webb, all of them officials of the Texas and Pacific; J. W. Evans, Katy official, were among the railroad men who were present.

William E. Easterwood of Dallas, prize poster of the Dallas to Hong-Kong flight, also was present, but declined to speak when a light shower began falling.

The state receives 5 per cent, or \$54,176.48;

Dempsey gets 27 1/2 per cent, or \$297,275.00;

Sharkey gets 22 1/2 per cent, or \$241,225.00.

HOUSTON, July 23.—Babies in this vicinity have developed strange and almost fatal appetites. One child, Leroy Beecker, who lives near Brenham, was given a nickel a few days ago. Later he complained of feeling badly, and refused to eat. Thinking he had spent the nickel for candy and thus "spoiled" his appetite, the mother asked the child, four, where the nickel had gone.

"I ate it," he replied. He was rushed to a local hospital, where, by means of the bronchoscope, the nickel was removed sans surgery.

The same day another child, H. A. Thomas, Jr., 19 months old Houston baby, swallowed a peanut that lodged in his lung. Again the bronchoscope, new to doctors here, was brought into play and saved a childish life.

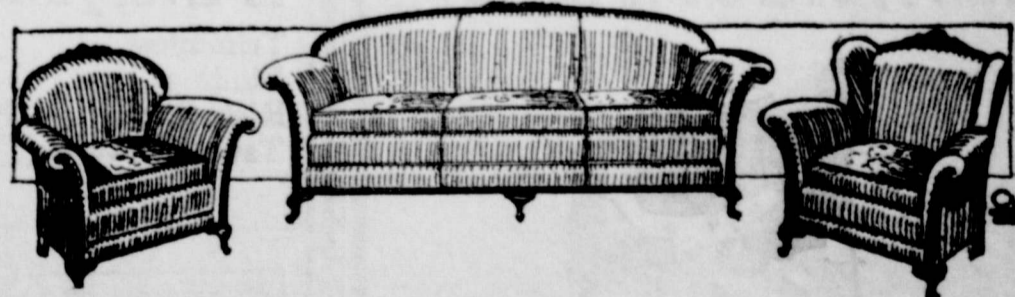

Nethoven, the great composer. In a trip along the Rhine, I saw ancient castles built on the mountain tops, some of them rebuilt and in use. Among them was one held by the Knights Templar, where the last of the knights died in defense of the faith. The Rhine is a constant stream of commerce, piled by boats of all description and carrying everything on the European market. At Worms I saw a monument to Martin Luther and at Mainz there was one to John Calvin.

From Germany, my journey took me to Switzerland where I viewed the glorious Alps, glistening in their pure snow white in a brilliant sun. I visited Interlaken where marvelous wood carvings were in view. At Geneva, I visited the Hall of Nations, where the League of Nations sits, and there saw a slab placed in memory of Woodrow Wilson.

From Switzerland my path lay to Paris where I reveled in visiting the palaces and other spots famous in French and world history. At Versailles I visited the Palace of Mirrors where President Wilson signed the peace treaty, and also viewed the Tuilleries. From the Eiffel Tower, 984 feet in the air, I got a birdseye view of Paris. The famous old Bastille is gone, but I square where the prison once stood was pointed out to me. I visited the Louvre and other museums, where paintings and statuary made by the masters of all time are on view.

Sees Paris Night Life
"Yes, I saw Paris at night, too. I found the opera house a magnificent piece of architecture, but the interior of their shows in the main is inferior to ours. At the Folies, I saw Paris' greatest spectacle. The scenery for the evening must have cost no less than \$100,000, and one single costume had at least \$10,000 worth of ostrich feathers. Costumes of some of the actresses formed part of the stage effect. Some of the women in the back ground wore only a ribbon or two, but there was nothing of a suggestive nature. While I consider the show immoral, of course, they called it art; and as a whole it was, as for their women, they are beautiful, but no more so than ours. Nor was their dress more beautiful.

"The battlefields of the past in-

terested me, and I viewed the field of the Battle of Waterloo, where a panorama of the noted conflict has been arranged. A concrete road now runs along the ditch which once ran red with blood, but I could readily see how it could have been filled with the dead and the dying. Everywhere I saw monuments—monuments to every event of the past. At the field of the battle of Chateau Thierry, fought during the world war, I found a little

Methodist mission doing a wonderful work in caring for the babies of soldiers in the French army who receive but a penny a day as their pay. At this hospital is the airplane in which Kermit Roosevelt lost his life during the war. Nurses told me that they still find helmets, pieces of uniforms and even bones of soldiers killed during the late war along the Marne.

"I went back from France to London on my way to Scotland to visit the father of Prof. Reid of Randolph college. At London I was made an honorary member of the automobile association and given the privileges of the club house. I attended church where Lloyd George had attended flower day services for 30 years, but the veteran statesman was absent this day, and was represented by his daughter.

RECORD
I found London a city of squares, each with its own mayor, police force, etc. I saw London bridge, the Tower of London and the other attractions of the city, and in the tower viewed the crown jewels of British monarchs of the past, placed under glass and heavily guarded. Oxford I found to be a city of schools, and Stratford-on-Avon I found a most pleasing spot, and could well see where Shakespeare got his inspiration. Then to Scotland I went, and visited the home of Robert Burns along with other interesting spots.

Dr. Roberts said he was amazed at the amount of drinking of intoxicating liquor he found in Europe. In England he said one Englishman told him nobody got drunk over there but Americans. "I replied, however, that they were all drunk in Europe and just didn't know it," Dr. Roberts declared.

The trip over was made on the Corinthia, flagship for the Rotary fleet and most elaborately equipped. The return was aboard the Carmania, less lavish in its appointments, but more easy riding, the Ciscoan said.
