**TO STOP DRUNKEN DRIVERS**

An inquiry, directed by the secretary of an automobile club to authorities in several cities, sought to discover the average penalty and sentence given for driving an automobile while intoxicated. Some of the answers follow:

Cincinnati—Depending on circumstances, average penalty for first offense runs from 5 to 30 days in jail, plus \$25 to \$100 fine, and three months or more driving suspension.

St. Louis—\$100 fine and 30 days in workhouse.

Chicago—Average fine, driving while intoxicated, \$100; average sentence ten days.

New York—Fine averages \$25 to \$50; three to ten days in jail; mandatory revocation of license; no reinstatement less than eight months.

Philadelphia—Average penalty, minimum fine \$200; imprisonment three months; revocation drivers license one year, always upon conviction; penalties higher according to seriousness of offense and damage done; maximum fine \$500; maximum sentence three years.

The jail or workhouse sentences and the revocation of licenses and driving privilege look like valuable punishments, more effective than mere fines and so more likely to lessen drunken driving. If more cities had the backbone to impose and enforce such penalties this particular menace to traffic safety would, in all likelihood, show a prompt and definite decrease.

**BUDDIES FOR SWIMMERS**

A 13-year-old boy was drowned the other day at a large municipal swimming pool in Cleveland, just a few days after the opening of the pool. There were 2,000 bathers in the pool at the time and seven lifeguards in attendance. No one saw the boy go down, no one noticed any struggle or missed him. The only person with him was his younger brother who had stayed in the shallow water while the older boy went out near the diving platforms. The fact of the lad's being alone is probably one of the reasons why he could slip out of sight so easily. His tragic end brings to mind once more the familiar injunction against going swimming alone. In spite of the 2,000 bathers in the pool, that boy was alone because there was no one near him who would be shouting in fun at him, watching him do stunts or calling to be watched. This unfortunate incident emphasizes the value of the "buddy system" for swimming, in use in many camps. Under this system, bathers go into the water in pairs. No one is allowed to go in before reporting to the guard or instructor that he is going in and that he has a buddy. Then, while in the water, buddies must call to each other and look for each other at frequent intervals. If the boy who drowned in a crowded pool had had a buddy he would have been missed promptly and help summoned. As it was, the first warning of the accident came when some swimmer observed the dead body floating near by. Hours of resuscitation work were then of no avail.

work. Moreover, none of our twelve courts of civil appeals would ever be abolished, which a proper re-organization should demand. Oil, gas, pipe lines and mineral laws have now become determined and stabilized, which should eliminate much litigation that caused the last five of these intermediate courts to be created.

### Raise for Governor

Raising the governor's salary from \$4,000 to \$10,000 should not be in the same amendment that raises the salary of legislators. They should be presented and passed upon separately. The proposed raise in legislators' salary will not change the personnel of a single legislator. Our forefathers had in mind an industrious, working legislature that would expedite business and pass all needed supply bills within thirty days and then go home. It is expedition we need more than anything else. The states which now pay their governors the largest salaries have lately been cursed with some of their worst governors. It is not the salary that induces worthy men to run for governor. When properly filled, it is an office of the highest honor. The prestige that comes with it is most valuable. It surrounds one with homage and adulation. Flowers come in beribboned baskets and fragrant bouquets. The press worships at its shrine. Trivial accomplishments are emphasized in heroic deeds. It gives a junkie special open sesame even into Wall Street and Tammany. Like Jack's beanstalk, it grows ambitious overnight until one, though until recently obscure, confidently aspires to the vice presidency—aye even to

the president's white house itself. And when retiring, it makes possible the formation of big partnerships in big law firms, where there are big fees paid, for handling big business. The salary after all is unimportant. It is the valuable prestige which lasts forever that counts most. And this the people give their governor with the salary.

### Upholds Fee System

The third proposal is to abolish the fee system, which is pay pro tanto for services rendered. It has abuses, but they can be rectified under existing laws without destroying the system. Unfortunately, when some public officers receive fixed salaries, regardless of what they do, they become careless, indifferent, and even lazy, and the people who pay the bills receive inattention and indifference service. The justice of the peace, whose pay is conditioned upon conviction of defendants, which

condition the governor held out in argument as reason for passing the amendment, is not even mentioned in the amendment, and will in no way be affected by its passage. Concerning his tax amendment, it is most dangerous. I challenge the governor to find any substantial number of posted farmers or stockmen in West Texas who will vote for same when they fully understand just what may happen under it. They feel that the few leaders who always run legislatures, and the few tax authorities in Austin who will do the classifying, might be more sympathetic towards interests conflicting with their own, than would their own commissioners court at home. I shall vote against all four amendments. In my judgment they are dangerous, and should be defeated. THOMAS L. BLANTON. Abilene, Texas.

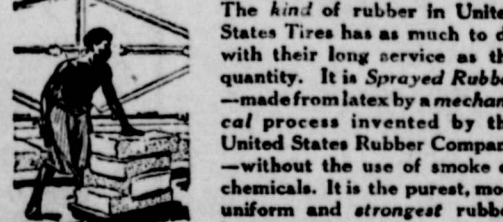

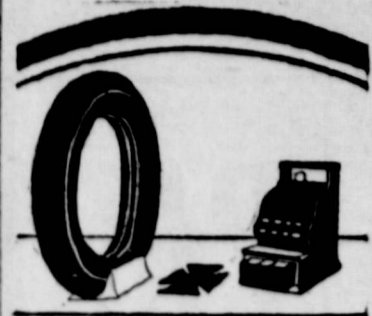
