CONGRESS FOR TAX CUT DUE NEXT YEAR

Congress stands in favor of tax reduction, but differs on how to accomplish it. With senate leaders already on record as favoring tax reduction, legislation, Rep. Willis R. Green, republican of Iowa, chairman of the house ways and means committee, and Rep. John N. Garner, democrat, Texas, ranking minority member, today declared they favored giving part of the treasury surplus back to the taxpayers. They differed, however, on the amount and the details. Green declared he favored cutting relief for incomes under \$20,000 and came out strongly against repeal of federal estate inheritance taxes. Garner asked repeal of all nuisance taxes and adjustment of income taxes. The Texas democrat who will be come floor leader of his party in the house next January, took a pot shot at the treasury estimates. He said Coolidge and Mellon predicted a \$183,000,000 surplus for the past surplus year, while his own estimate was \$400,000,000. The actual surplus was near the half million mark.

Champion, Jr., navy flyer, failed by more than 2000 feet to break the world's altitude record in his flight last Monday when he made a forced descent of seven miles after his motor disintegrated and caught fire. The National Aeronautical association announced. The record is 40,820 feet held by Jean Batten, a Frenchman.

DEMPESEY'S POPULARITY

The changeableness of public opinion, its sudden and unreasonable discarding of heroes and its equally erratic raising of one formerly despised to a position of honor, have long been recognized and explained. A striking example of this is the present popularity of Jack Dempsey. Before the fight on July 21 the betting favored Sharkey, but sports writers, fight fans and general public were pulling for Dempsey. The New York World described this odd situation as follows. "But a few short years ago he was one of the most unpopular men who ever wore gloves. There seemed to be no way in which he could please us; the veterans passed resolutions against him because he had shirked his war duty; the rest of us damned him in season and out, for any reason at all or for no reason. Then the defeat at Philadelphia, and all of a sudden Dempsey was the most popular fighter in the country. One could speculate for a long time and probably never arrive at a satisfactory explanation for this shift of sentiment." Somebody suggests it is the eternal human sympathy for the under dog. Some one else credits Dempsey with having "it," but this should have helped him in popular favor before Philadelphia, we should think. Still another newspaper writer claims that it is man's heartfelt desire to retain or regain his youth that made Dempsey's try for a come-back so appealing. Whatever the reason, or how unreasonable it is, the fact remains that the recently unpopular Mr. Dempsey is now the idol of the fight fans, and the aloof Mr. Tunney has his popularity to maintain as well as his title.

HUMAN BROTHERHOOD

Soloman de la Selva, Nicaraguan soldier-poet, now in Washington attending the Pan-American Labor Congress, is quoted as saying, with tears in his eyes: "I cannot feel a hatred for America and its institutions because of this (the recent battle of Oco-tal). But I do hate, and hate bitterly, the militaristic policy which sent the marines to Nicaragua to put my countrymen to death. "For, after all, despite our different climate and different traditions and the different grandfathers of the race, my people and your people are the same; folks with their worries and their hopes about them, toiling for bread and a something more that no one could name." That looks like a self-evident fact. Yet it seems to be one of the hardest facts the human race has to learn. In families, in nations, it only every individual could think of all other human beings, of whatever race or group as like himself in worries and hopes and the need of daily bread and higher aspirations! The idea hasn't been "put across" as yet, but we still believe it will be some day.

"New Evidence Sought by Sacco Committee." And so it goes, year after year. Life to Sacco and Vanzetti is one long trial.

DRUGGISTS AND ALCOHOL

The druggists have joined the paint, oil and varnish handlers in protesting against "interference with their trade by means of regulations that cannot be enforced." The secretary of the National Association of Retail Druggists tells the prohibition administrators that he doesn't think a prohibition officer has any right to tell a druggist how much alcohol he needs in running his store. A druggist handles 7,000 other things besides alcohol, he argues, and cannot devote all his time to keeping books for prohibition agents. Legal counsel for the druggists maintain that "if the

American people can trust retail druggists with their health and lives in the compounding and dispensing of medicines generally, prohibition officers might trust them to dispense medicinal spirits." It is a natural protest, from men who are mostly honorable and trustworthy, and who find present prohibition rules which apply to them rather burdensome. Any fair-minded citizen, or dry officer for that matter, can appreciate how they feel about it. But the fact remains that there has been alcohol leakage through some drug stores, in defiance of the prohibition amendment act, and that the administrators of the law are obliged to use all legitimate means to stop that leak. Nine druggists out of ten, or even 99 out of 100, are obliged to suffer for the misdeeds of the tenth or hundredth law-breaker. Unreasonably burdensome requirements should be eliminated, of course. On the other hand, it might be better all around if the organized druggists would use against the black sheep in their profession a little more of the energy they are using against the enforcement officers. When honest druggists unite to expose dishonest druggists, it will be easier to lighten the alcohol rules affecting them.

TULSA TO HOLD WORLD FAIR OF OIL INDUSTRY

TULSA, Okla., July 27.—Tulsa is preparing for its fourth annual International Petroleum Exposition, which has been called the "world's fair of the oil industry." The exposition this year will be held from September 24 to October 1.

Oil men from all parts of the United States and from most foreign countries where oil is produced will be here for the exposition. Exhibits worth between eight and ten million dollars will be on display, being brought here by supply companies for the petroleum industry, oil companies, scientific instrument companies and foreign nations. Approximately 200 firms have already contracted for space for displays, while the total will probably exceed 250.

The exposition will be entirely a scientific, technical and educational display this year, all pageants and side attractions being eliminated. Oil producing and refining companies have indicated their intentions of sending their chief technical men and executives to the show.

Show Latest Equipment.
All the latest equipment of every department of the petroleum industry will be on display, as in previous years, and oil executives will be able to view the latest developments at first hand. Many companies which will have displays declare that their exhibits will be entirely different from those of previous years. More advance in technical equipment has been made in the last two years. It is claimed that in the preceding ten years.

Included in the new scientific equipment to be shown at the exposition will be the Torsion balance, a very delicate instrument made in Germany, and the seismographic now used in locating oil pools. One manufacturer will show the actual operations of drilling an oil well, having a standard oil drilling rig in charge of an experienced driller on the exposition grounds. In contrast to this the exposition is erecting the rig and equipment of the Drake Well, the first oil well to be brought in in Pennsylvania.

The exposition this year will cover 20 acres of space on a tract recently leased. Two huge buildings have been erected to house the exhibits and a third may have to be built to accommodate all who want inside space. A large part of the grounds has also been set aside for huge pieces of machinery, such as engines, tank cars, rigs, and pumping outfits.

Coolidge Presses Button
Two of the big features of the exposition are the opening of the gates of the exposition grounds by President Coolidge, who will press a button connected with the grounds, in his office at Washington, and the coming of Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh the latter part of the exposition. The latter event has stirred the management of the show to stress the relationship between aviation and the petroleum industry and invitations have been sent out to all companies and oil men owning airplanes asking them to bring their machines to the exposition and several have already indicated that they would.

Another big affair which will take place during the exposition will be the annual banquet of the Mid-Continent Oil and Gas association, which will be held the evening of September 30. Herbert Hoover has been invited to be the principal speaker and the governors of all oil-producing states have been invited to attend. The state department at Washington has also invited all foreign embassies to send representatives.

Thousands of visitors are expected in Tulsa for the exposition this year. The Tulsa State Fair will be held simultaneously and will be held north of the exposition grounds. Officials of the two shows predict a crowd of 100,000 to welcome Colonel Lindbergh when he arrives.

PROSPERITY FORCES DOWN MONEY RATES

NEW YORK, July 27.—Interest rates are on a slight dip downward. That is the consensus of opinion of delegates gathered at the meeting of the United States League of Building and Loans associations in Asheville, N. C. The delegates who are in the most intimate touch with business, industrial and banking conditions throughout the nation declare that industry and financial are in a sound and stable condition.

"National prosperity and an easy money market are tending to force interest rates downward," H. F. Cellarius, secretary of the league, said today. "There has been but little unemployment and wages have been high. These facts, in conjunction with the decline in the cost of living, have placed the wage earners of the country in a very comfortable situation."

Savings Increased.
"In the last year, they have been able to increase their savings accounts materially. This has provided the building and loans associations with ample funds to meet all demands made on them for loans. This easy condition of the money market is tending to force interest rates lower, although the situation may be counterbalanced by increasing requirements for loans."

"In some sections of the country where building and loans associations have built up heavy cash balances, a better demand for money is anticipated." There are in the United States, according to the official figures of the league, 12,426 building and loan associations. These have a membership of 10,963,705 investors. Their assets total the enormous sum of \$6,344,163,807. This total represents a gain in assets of \$824,927,653 for the year, or approximately 15 per cent. The increase in memberships in the last year has been 778,708 or eight per cent. The gain recorded in the last year was \$81,688,696 larger than the gain in 1926 over 1925.

Building Conditions.
Delegates report they have noted a slight decrease in residential building throughout the whole country so far this year. This is confirmed by the league records. But the total volume of housing construction continues very high. The more acute building shortages have been relieved but there is still under way an extensive program of construction. Activity under that program is only eight per cent lower than last year, which unquestionably was the banner year of the building industry for all time.

Not a few of the delegates predict that there will be another increase in dwelling construction next year which will amount to fully 10 per cent. Some of this work will represent replacement demand which in the construction business is usually reckoned as amounting to approximately \$2,000,000,000 a year. The volume of

public, municipal and state construction, according to the delegates, now is on the increase and the activity in this work is aiding to hold the earning power of the various communities and maintain savings and interest rates at stable levels.
