STATE INDICTMENTS LOOM

Carbon May Need Two-Thirds Majority

Assistant Attorney General Says He May Send Former Well Known State Official to Penitentiary

The "old heads" who have been in the club for several years have been lavish in their praise of the younger men's efforts.

Suit Over Relief Fund Thrown Out

SAN ANGELO, July 29.—The district court sustained the demurrer of the defendant in the case of E. A. Aiken vs. the Rock Springs relief committee in opinion handed down this morning by Judge Joseph Jones, presiding. The demurrer contended the court had no jurisdiction over the matter in that a committee had expended money from elsewhere in a tornado which killed caused a loss of \$1,000. The grand jury brought any action against the plaintiff.

EASTLAND IN 5-MILE ZONE, WIRE ASSERTS

Unless estimates made by the state land commissioner are in error, a two-thirds majority of all votes cast in the proposed election would be necessary to change the county seat from Eastland to Carbon. It became known Friday on receipt of a telegram from the state land office at Austin. Residents of Carbon, in mass meeting Thursday afternoon at the Methodist tabernacle at Carbon, decided to wire the state land commissioner for the exact location of the geographical center of the county, in an effort to determine on what basis they should proceed. It had been believed that Eastland was not within the five-mile radius of the geographical center of the county, while Carbon is within that radius. Under the law, only a simple majority would be necessary to move the county seat from a point outside the five-mile radius to one within the radius. However, the land commissioner wired the Daily News that his maps showed the center of the county to be near the center of the west half of section 23, block 2, H. & T. C. railroad survey. He added that according to his map, both Eastland and Carbon appear to be in the five-mile zone. It was declared that in event the land commissioner is correct in stating that Eastland is within the five-mile radius, then a two-thirds majority will be necessary to make the change.

However, the land commissioner's ruling will have no effect on the number of freeholders required to sign a petition for the election. Signatures of a majority of bona fide residents of the county who own real estate and are qualified to vote being necessary to call the election in any event.

Whether Carbon will continue its efforts to obtain the court house in the face of the new circumstances is not known, although at the meeting Thursday afternoon, attended by 150 Carbon men, it was voted to go ahead with organizing, for a whirlwind campaign to get petitions signed in every voting box in the county. A committee was named by Mayor W. S. Abbott, presiding, to divide the county into districts and assign committees to circulate the petitions in each district. A call for volunteers was made, and three-fourths of those present stood, signifying their willingness to serve. Just what inducement Carbon will offer for location of the court house there has not yet been decided upon. It was said Thursday, however, that a site would be offered, and possibly a site of 20 to 50 acres for erection of a county park. Other inducements may be offered in event it is decided to go ahead with the plans for the election.

CATFISH PUT IN HATCHERY PONDS HERE

Joe Dixon Thursday placed a dozen large brood channel catfish in the state fish hatchery here with the expectation of producing numerous catfish next year. The channel cat were brought from the Llano river. The shipment of fingerlings from the hatchery has ended until cooler weather in the fall when crappie and bream hatched here will be distributed to the lakes and streams in this section. Already the hatchery here has produced more fish this year than all the other fish hatcheries at Dallas, Tyler and Kerrville, combined, according to reports from the state game, fish and commission. Many thousands of bass have been distributed to various parts of the state, with the longest distance being covered by a shipment to Amarillo. Some were sent to Fort Worth and others to points nearer Cisco.

The course is planned for farmers and farm boys over 14 years of age. Board has been arranged for 10 for the duration of the course, and room at \$1. The course includes field operation, car repair, upkeep and practical instruction in tractors, farm machinery, cars, trucks as well as terminating, poultry and dairy work.

Evidence May Lead To Conviction In Murder of Texan

AUSTIN, July 29.—Assistant Attorney General Galloway Calhoun has evidence which may lead to a conviction for murder in connection with mysterious disappearance of William B. Head, jewelry salesman of Menoah, Texas, while attending a convention near Idaho Springs, Colo. in 1923. It was learned here today, Calhoun was district attorney of South county and carried on a month's investigation with W. C. Head, father of the missing man, at that time. Police of fields of Colorado Wednesday discovered a crushed skull which was identified as that of William Head Calhoun today wrote to Colorado of leads asking if the man held there as a suspect is the man against whom Calhoun's suspicions are directed. Calhoun said the man could be convicted on circumstantial evidence.

FRANKLIN, La., July 29.—The trial of Mrs. Ada LeBoeuf and two others for the murder of her husband was delayed today when Judge Simon discharged another of the qualified jurors. A motion signed by both defense and state alleged A. J. Bourlony told his friends he would like to see Dr. Thomas Fisher, one of the defendants, hang. Bourlony is the second juror to be discharged by the court. Judge Simon immediately ordered the sheriff to summon ten more talsmen.

College On Wheels To Tour 22 States

DAILY NEWS STARTS WORK ON BUILDING

Construction work on a new brick building to become the permanent home of the Cisco Daily News has begun on a lot purchased from Frank Harrell and located on the west side of Main street between Third and Fourth streets. The building will be 50 by 65 feet in dimensions, and is expected to furnish sufficient room to care for expansion of the newspaper plant for some time to come. J. H. Lattson is contractor and expects to have the building ready for use by September 1. An old frame house has been moved from the lot, and digging of the foundation is now under way.

The growth of Cisco and the desire of the publisher of the newspaper to keep abreast of the progress of the town made it necessary to install a new, high speed press to care for the increased circulation. So expensive is the press and its installation it was decided it would be best for the Daily News and Thursday American to own the building in which it is installed. The new press will make it possible to print a larger and more complete newspaper and better serve Cisco and its trade territory.

Ritchie Turns Down Debate With Wheeler

DEROT, July 28.—Gov. Albert C. Ritchie, state rights champion and a potential democratic candidate for the presidency declared here today that Wheelerism "as it is exemplified by Wayne B. Wheeler, generalissimo of the Anti-Saloon league, is 'coming to be a real menace to the country.'" The governor expressed his opinion of Wheeler in a remarkable letter to the State university in which he declined to debate Wheeler.

AUSTIN, July 29.—With three men, L. J. Nachtrab, S. C. Thompson and H. Joskie already indicted by the Travis county grand jury for forgery and diversion of state funds in connection with an alleged padded payroll carried in the highway department in 1926, Assistant Attorney Gen. Galloway Calhoun declared today he had uncovered an "endless chain" of operators involved in the highway forgery. After the grand jury goes back into session August 8, indictments are to be returned against many other persons, he said. After two months' investigation, Calhoun said, "startling information will be revealed before the end of the summer implicating a former well known state government official."

"I know of a \$50,000 deal pulled by this man that will require lots of explaining to prevent him from going to the penitentiary," Calhoun declared, and said he would have to work on the case at least three months longer before he would be able to present all the details of the case.

FOUR PROBES IN DISASTER ARE STARTED

CHICAGO, July 29.—Twenty-eight known dead and many missing was the toll of the Favorite excursion disaster, according to the latest check up. Two additional bodies have been recovered from Lake Michigan since dawn.
Four separate investigations were begun today to fix responsibility for sinking of the boat during a sudden rain and wind squall late yesterday. A coroner's inquest was to convene late today. A check of filed records in the federal building as compared with actual conditions discovered with salvaging of the boat was begun by Captain John Hansen, inspector of hulls. The state's attorney's office gathered information from all eye witnesses of the disaster in an effort to determine any criminal responsibility. A report that the life preservers were incapable of supporting a human body was under investigation, as well as one that the preservers were so securely fastened to the ship they could not be taken loose.

CISCO STORE ROBBED AGAIN IN 3 NIGHTS

The total loss Thursday night was placed at about \$50, although accurate check was possible. It believed the burglars entered store through a rear window which was found open. Since the wind locks on the inside, it is thought the burglars might have been ed in the store when the bolt was closed for the night.
Police continued their investigation and it was believed evidence they have obtained will be given the grand jury at once, in case and the robbery of the five cleaners where about \$1,000 worth of men's clothing was stolen Wednesday night. A prowler seen behind the Tullos Bros. tail shop was frightened away about 5 o'clock this morning, police reported, although the suspected burglar had escaped when officers arrived.

Indianapolis Mayor Now in Spotlight

INDIANAPOLIS, July 29.—Spotlights in the Indiana political scandal today shifted from Gov. Jackson to Mayor Dural of Indianapolis where the city council threatened impeachment proceedings against the mayor. Meeting in secret session, the city legislators frankly discussed impeachment procedure. Charges of political corruption have been filed against Dural. There is a report that Special Prosecutor Emery W. Johnson, discoverer of Stephenson's black boxes, was in Columbus, O., on a mysterious mission. The former grand dragon of the Klan had his offices in Columbus.

Marland Warns West Of Gasoline Shortage

DEL MONTE, Calif., July 29.—E. W. Marland, Oklahoma oil magnate, today warned that if California oil continues to be sent east at the present rate, the west will soon be importing oil from the east. "California is now lavishly furnishing the world with one of its greatest resources. Oil is not replaceable."

Sacco and Vanzetti May Appeal Higher

BOSTON, July 29.—While final pleas for Sacco and Vanzetti were being made to Gov. Fuller today, it became known that in event of an adverse finding by the executive a new move was being planned by their defense. At a secret conference said to be attended by "three internationally known legal minds," decision was made to appeal to the U. S. Supreme court. The two continued their hunger strike today.

British Cabinet In Special Meet

LONDON, July 29.—A special cabinet conference was called for this afternoon to discuss the Geneva conference. A new situation arising at Geneva was given as the reason. Members of the cabinet en route for week end holidays were recalled.

The fact remains that the pro-

posed amendment to it to the courts as to when they shall sit. The amendment provides that the supreme court and court of criminal appeals shall sit for the transaction of business "at such times as may be designated by the court." That does not remedy the present situation. Passing such amendment will not require such courts "to sit for the transaction of business during the three summer months" unless they so decree themselves. The legislature did not submit these amendments until the governor went before it in person and urged such submission. If he wanted to compel these courts to sit through the summer months, he should have had the amendment so framed as to bring about the desired result, and not have left it to the court themselves to decide.

With respect to salaries paid by other states to their governors, the states of Delaware and Tennessee pay \$4,000. New Hampshire, South Dakota and Vermont pay only \$3,000. Maryland and Oklahoma pay \$4,500. Alabama, Arkansas, Colorado, Connecticut, Georgia, Idaho, Kansas, Maine, Michigan, Mississippi, Missouri, New Mexico, North Carolina, North Dakota, South Carolina, Virginia and Wisconsin all pay \$5,000. And the people of Texas might not object to paying the governor the proposed



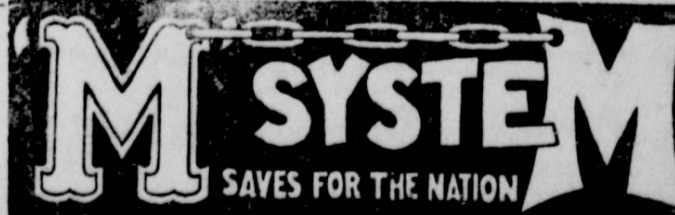
