## COWARDICE CHARGED TO BOAT CREW

CHICAGO, July 30.—New horror was added today to the sinking of the launch Favorite which cost the lives of 28 women and children when charges of cowardice were hurled at two members of the crew at investigation into the disaster. Whole women and babies were being dragged downward in the maelstrom of water, two members of the crew rowed away in a lifeboat, according to the story told by Charles E. Abernathy, a survivor, whose two children perished in the tragedy.

## CARBON WILL DROP COUNTY SEAT EFFORT

Decision to drop its efforts to obtain the county courthouse was reached by Carbon at a conference of its citizens, according to a telephone call to Carbon Saturday. Leaders of the town declared they had decided it would be too great a task to get a two-thirds majority declared necessary to move the courthouse from Eastland, which was held to be within five miles of the geographical center of the county.

At a meeting held late Friday, the following resolution was adopted by citizens of the town: "Carbon, Texas, July 29, 1927.—At a mass meeting of citizens of Carbon and community held July 29, a resolution was passed to withdraw Carbon from the race for the county seat, it being the opinion of those present that it was to the best interests of Eastland county that no courthouse fight be had."

## Airplane Filling Station is Planned

DALLAS, July 30.—A model airplane service station equipped with all modern plane service appliances will be built by the Magnolia Petroleum company at Love field here. One of the features of the new station, said to be the first modern airplane service station in the southwest, will be a special attachment for refueling planes.

## Newman and Hyland Leave for Prison

BENSON, Ill., July 30.—Art Newman and Ray Hyland, convicted of conspiring to kill Mayor Joe Adams of West City, left here today for the southern Illinois state penitentiary to serve their life term. Newman, sentenced for the murder of a woman, and Hyland, sentenced for the murder of a man, were the only prisoners to leave here today.

RAPID CITY, S. D., July 30.—President Coolidge today considered with obvious disappointment the probability that the naval disarmament conference will end in failure. The final word has gone to Geneva under signature of the chief executive stating that unless Great Britain recedes from its stand, the conference will be allowed to fail. The statement will be read at Monday's session.

### BRITISH PRIME MINISTER SHIFTS BLAME FOR FAILURE

QUEBEC, July 30.—"If the disarmament conference at Geneva fail it will be no fault of the British government," Prime Minister Baldwin declared today while aboard the Empress of Australia shortly before going ashore with the Prince of Wales. He denied he would confer with President Coolidge on the disarmament conference while on this side of the water.

### JAPANESE ALARMED OVER PARLEY FAILURE

TOKIO, July 30.—Japanese statesmen expressed great alarm today over the probable failure of the tri-partite conference. "Japan is willing to make almost any concessions to insure success of the parley," declared Premier Tanaka. "If the United States and Great Britain begin a naval race, our conscience is clear."

### NATIONS PASS BUCK ON NAVAL CONFERENCE

GENEVA, July 30.—While peace delegates were today drafting their speeches for the plenary session of the naval tri-partite session, which may be the last, spokesmen for the various delegations were busy shifting the blame. "Responsibility for the fate of the conference now rests on American shoulders and we can not be blamed," said the British spokesman. The American spokesman was just as sure the blame did not lie with the Americans but with the British.

### Weather Continues To Delay Flight

SOUTHAMPTON, Eng., July 30.—According to meteorological forecasters had weather off the British coast and over the eastern Atlantic will last over the week end, preventing Captain Frank Courtney, British air ace, from starting his flight to New York for at least two days. Courtney said he is ready to hop off just as soon as the storms abate.

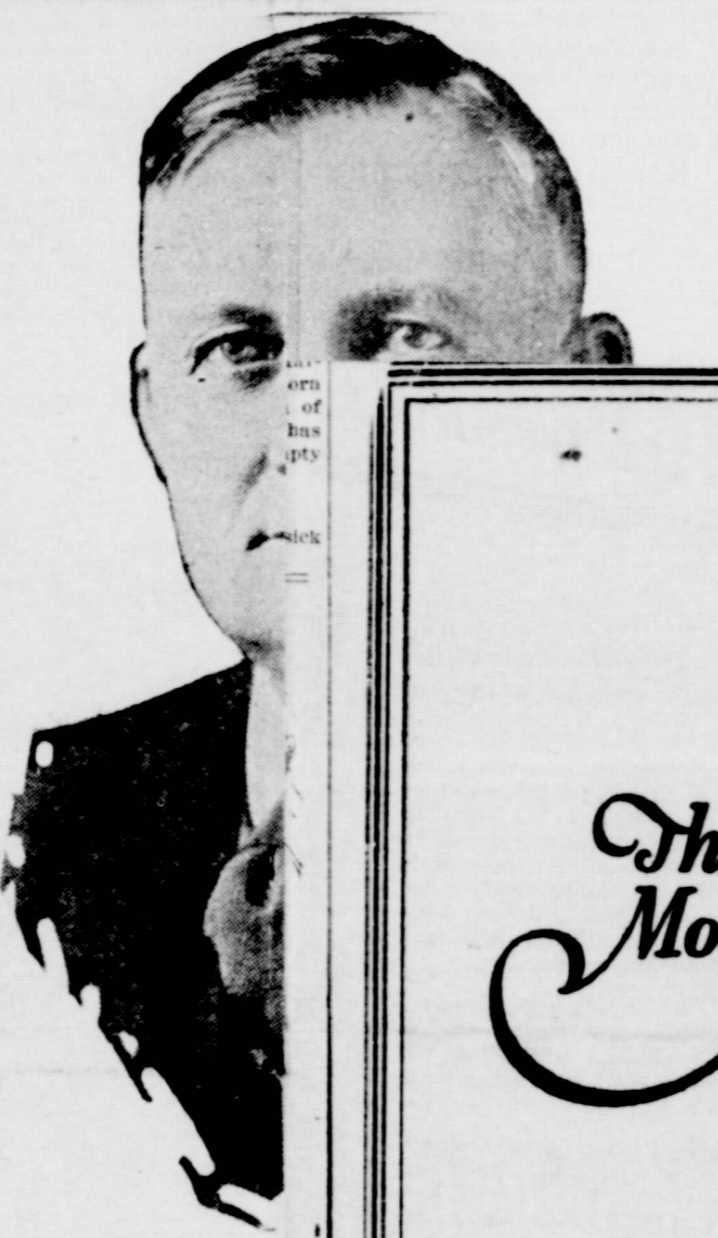
## Decision Date Set On State's Big Suit

## Ranger Begins Work on Big \$6,000 Swimming Pool; Island in Center To Contain One Tree; Import Sand

RANGER, July 30.—Actual work has been started on a bathing pool and park on West Main street here that will have for its initial expenditure \$6,000 and be ready to open August 25. The pool and park, within six blocks of the business district, has all advantages as regards beauty and accessibility. The tract, which was leased by J. L. Johnson, Erath county, from the Hodges estate, is a natural playground and lies between four streets, just at the base of the Eastland Hill Road.

Excavation has been begun on the pool which will be of concrete 100x200 feet, with water varying from two to nine feet in depth. A native oak tree will be in the center of an island near the middle of the pool. Sand will be imported from Galveston and a day-labender will beautify the grounds.

SAN DIEGO, July 30.—"Before the end of the next year, we will have built the world's first air Pullman. It will carry 100 passengers and be driven by six engines. In two years our airplane factory will be turning out these leviathans in quantity."

## MOODY URGES VICTORY FOR TAX PROPOSAL

AUSTIN, July 30.—Declaring he has no personal interest in the proposed tax amendment to be voted on Monday, "except as it affects the welfare of the state," Gov. Dan Moody today released a 2,500 word statement explaining why the amendment should be adopted. The governor declared that some of the forces opposing the amendment were keeping their identity secret. He declared corporate interests are fighting the amendment for selfish reasons. "The farmers have been told to vote against the amendment, but they have not been told why," he said, "yet they are the ones who will be benefited."

The governor pointed out that the development of the state has aggravated the inequality of taxes, and that as the result only six states collect a greater per cent of property tax than Texas. "Agriculture has been penalized by the inequality of our tax system," the governor said. "It is taxed 83 per cent of net profits."

## Forgery Charged Against 2 Boys

Charges of forgery were filed Saturday by Constable C. S. Leamer against Leonard Wright and Melton Preston, Cisco youths, who are alleged to have forged the name of C. E. Mouton of Cisco to several checks of \$10 or less each. Wright faces two charges and Preston four, and both were said to have confessed to County Attorney J. Frank Sparks and his assistant, Sterling Holloway, before going before the grand jury Saturday.

## Grand Jury Hits Manufacture in Presence of Any Indictments Voted

The Eastland county grand jury finally adjourned Saturday afternoon at Eastland following an extended session, and as its closing act made a report to the court in which the unsanitary condition of the courthouse and the county jail was scored, with the suggestion that the buildings had been neglected in the past, and a warning against making of home brew was voiced.

Many parents in Eastland county have developed the habit of making home brew in the presence of their own children, the report stated, and attention to the fact that such practice is in violation of the law was called.

Davenport, Judge of the 91st district court: We, your grand jury, duly empaneled for the June term, 1927, of said court, respectfully submit to your honor the following report: We have been in session 18 days during which time we have examined 273 witnesses and upon their testimony have returned 92 true bills of indictment, of which ninety were felonies and two were misdemeanors.

We have used our best judgment in returning bills, seeking to indict people whom we believed to have been criminally inclined. We may have erred in our judgment in some instances. ## FRIENDS ASK CISCOAN TO TAKE HONOR

It was learned Saturday through reliable sources that in case Hon. Thomas L. Blanton does not offer for re-election as congressman from this district, that the friends of R. Q. Lee will offer him as a candidate. In fact, it is said that Mr. Lee has already received numerous letters from friends over the seventeenth congressional district urging him to become a candidate.

Congressman Blanton recently sent out feelers over the state which indicated he is contemplating entering the race for the United States senate next year, following his long, useful and vigorous service in the lower house of congress.

Mr. Lee has long been prominent in the affairs of West Texas. For many years he operated a general merchandise store at Caddo in Stephens county, where even now he owns and operates a large farm. Later he came to Cisco where he is now president of the Cisco Banking company. He promoted and built the model Cisco & Northeastern railroad from Cisco to Breckenridge, and after projecting an extension of the line to Throckmorton, he sold the C. & N. E. to the Texas & Pacific railroad, which will build the extension. The C. & N. E. was always conducted in a practical manner by Mr. Lee, returning a profit ever since it was first put in operation, an unusual thing for a short line railroad. Still more remarkable is the fact that every stockholder who stayed with Mr. Lee got every dollar back that he put into the railroad, through the sale negotiated with the T. & P.

Mr. Lee has long been a practical farmer. His sympathies have always been with the agriculturalist, and the greatest single accomplishment of his tenure as president of the great West Texas Chamber of Commerce was a strenuous tour which took him into every part of West Texas to deliver addresses emphasizing the importance of diversified farming. Since his recent retirement as president of the railroad, the Ciscoan has devoted most of his time to development of a model diversified farm in the sandy land southeast of Cisco which he hopes will show West Texans just what can be done through practical diversification. He has spent many thousands of dollars in erecting a huge barn, a big water storage tank, model chicken houses, and comfortable homes for his employees, and the entire farm has been enclosed with a wolf-proof fence. He has undertaken to demonstrate in concrete manner the ideas he put forward in his speaking tour, and hopes to aid West Texas farmers to better their conditions.

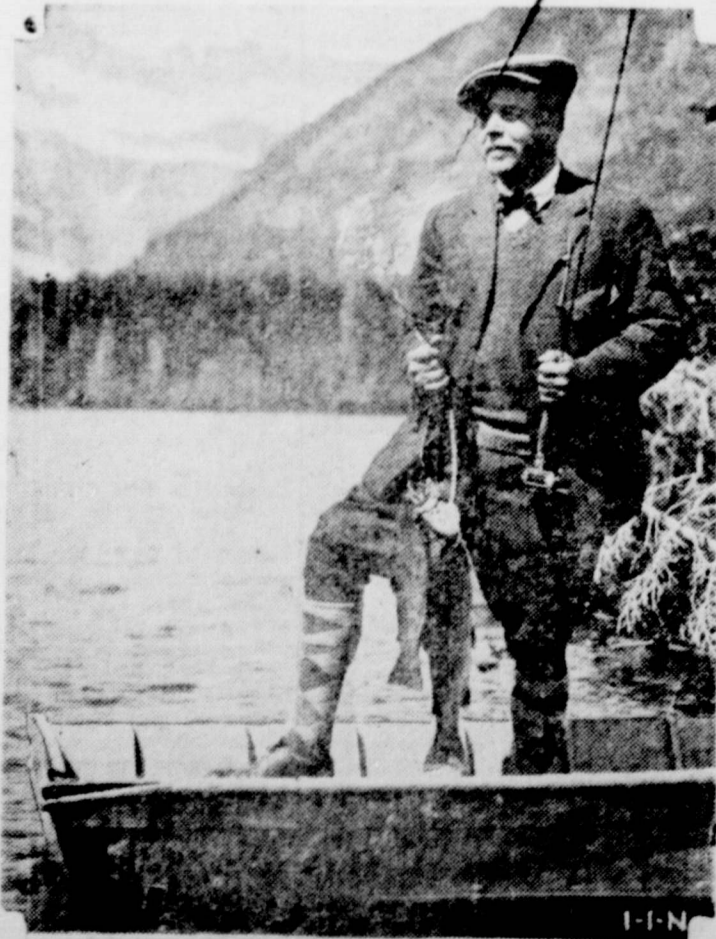
DEFEAT OF AMENDMENTS CERTAIN

## LOBO PROSPECTS FOR THE COMING SEASON BRIGHT

### Quarterback and Tackle Expected To Be Greatest Needs of Eleven; Coaches Leaving for Study Course

#### ALVIN OWSLEY SEEKS PLACE IN SENATE

DALLAS, July 30.—"If the women and young men of Texas will support me, as I expect they will, I will be elected to the United States Senate at the next election," Col. Alvin M. Owsley of Dallas declared in making formal announcement for the office Thursday.

Colonel Owsley, formerly national commander of the American Legion, said he would champion the cause of young men of Texas, and that he will depend largely upon them and the women to place him in office.

"There is a positive demand in the minds of the people of Texas for the youth to represent them in the Senate as well as in other high political offices of the state," Colonel Owsley said.

"Every time I've been a candidate for office, the women of the State have supported me and I will look for their support in this race," he added.

Colonel Owsley is 39 years of age, and if successful in his campaign will be past 40 when inducted into office, his friends say.

#### History of Early Days in West Texas Counties Acquired

AUSTIN, July 30.—A history of early days in Texas, when Brown, Frath, Coryell and Bosque counties were considered the frontier of the state, is contained in a newly acquired collection of papers at the University of Texas. This collection, known as the Barry Papers, consists of the diary of Colonel J. B. (Buck) Barry, about 135 pages of Col. Barry's reminiscences and his personal papers and correspondence on the Mexican War, frontier conditions of Texas, the Civil War and the Reconstruction period.

The papers were presented to the University of Texas library by Kos Barry of Walnut Springs, Texas, through Dr. J. K. Greer, Dr. Greer is at present editing the papers and preparing a biography of Colonel Barry.

### CROSS PLAINS POOL LOOMS

CROSS PLAINS, July 30. — Interesting gauge records of production made by two new wells located on entirely different structures, and producing from sands at wide variance in depth, in territory west of Cross Plains bordering the south line of Callahan county, has eclipsed in interest all other development over a wide area in that section.

Additional interest is added to this development by the fact that about 13 miles of practically unexplored, intervening territory divides these wells.

The later of these strikes was drilled by L. G. Bradstreet on the Walker land, a half mile to the east of former scattered development in the northeast part of the new Cross Plains field, and aside from adding this half mile of new territory, also promises when fully completed to add a new high mark for big production from the Cross Plains sand in the new field.

This section is proven by former drilling to carry three sands over at least the part of the structure nearest this well and aside from the fact that the sands so far drilled appear to be thickening, there is little difference between the log of the new well and the nearer former operations.

The new strike found the top of the first sand at 1674 feet with the usual light show of gas and after drilling three feet of shale from 1681 to 1684 topped the second sand. This sand, usually only about ten feet in thickness, has been drilled to 1703 and the well is gauging 250 barrels with the deeper stratum usually the rich pay as yet untouched. Pipe line connections with the Prairie Pipe Line station about one mile away were being completed Thursday and the well will later be deepened, and judged by the producers in the range of the older development, about 20 feet of this third stratum remains to be drilled.

**Johnson Well Holds Interest**  
Tests of the big well of the Empire Gas & Fuel company on the Johnson ranch 18 miles west of

to offer tremendous possibilities when eventually opened to its full capacity. The first 24 hour gauge of 716 barrels has shown but little variation according to late reports and the water showing that amounted to about 15 per cent when the well was uncapped for the test continues to diminish and is probably only water that was used in the hole in efforts to mud off the gas prior to the well drilling itself into the big flow. This water is now not considered of any importance to the future of the well.

The amount of production now being recovered represents the capacity of the two small gas separators and the flow operates against 300 pound back pressure pinched to keep within the separating capacity. The gas volume shows no particular variation since the original test was made that gave the volume as 23-250,000 cubic feet.

A pipe line survey is being completed by the Prairie Pipe Line Co. from the new Cross Plains field and work on this line is expected to begin at once, but it appears evident the line cannot reach the well in time to care for the production without the addition of much additional storage to the 2,800 barrels now available.

New work around this strike is now getting under way and a rig is being completed by the Empire Co. on the Sealy tract about 800 feet northeast of the well, and a new location was made during the week by the same owners on the Windham ranch several locations to the south. This new work added to the location of the Manhattan Oil & Gas Co. to the north covers the new development for the week, and intensive development is hardly expected under present crude market conditions. The pay is considered the Ranger series, and is at 4136 feet, the deepest of record in central West Texas, and tests have run as high as 50 gravity from its production.

About four miles northeast of this well the test of L. E. Trout on the McWhorter land has recently overcome a fishing job for collapsed pipe at a depth of 3,750 feet, and with a new string of pipe being landed will resume drilling near the end of the week.

**Water Delays Test**  
Several miles east of this well the White Eagle Co. found a sand at 2-675 feet with a hole full of water that is believed to have been the

Cross Plains sand. Another string of pipe is now being set to shut off this water, and the well will be continued on to the Cross Plains horizon expected at about 2,285 feet. Drilling has also been resumed on the deep test of the Milham corporation on the Warren land 8 miles northwest of Cross Plains, at a present depth of approximately 3,500 feet. This well has shown for probable commercial production if given a shot at about 2,600 feet, but will likely drill on to the depth of the big Empire strike several miles to the southwest.

In the midst of the intervening territory between former scattered drilling in the Cross Plains field, the interesting test of the Mosch-Texas Co. and M. E. Wakefield on the T. E. Baum land is at 1,500 feet, an approximate 100 feet from pay depth and should be completed early the coming week.

An increasing amount of new work now seems assured over a considerable area of the new Cross Plains field, with an intense play promised immediately around the new Bradstreet well, one company having six offset locations on various leases that are due for immediate drilling, and other owners are in a smaller way similarly situated.

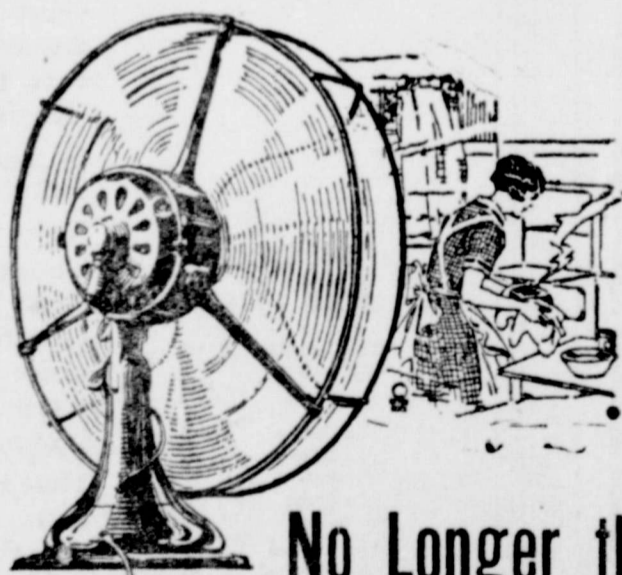

### FAME FLEETING RODGERS FINDS, SO WILL LINDY

PITTSBURG, July 30. — Will the achievement of Captain Chas. A. Lindbergh last long in the minds of those who praise him now?

This question confronts one starkly on visiting the Carnegie Museum here. Within the building is another aeroplane and a picture of its pilot, the achievements of both long since forgotten.

Galbraith Perry Rodgers was the pilot's name. But that stirs no memory in the mind of the average American today, mute testimony to the fickleness of the goddess of fame and fortune.

Rodgers started the world away back in 1911 when he announced he would attempt a flight across the United States. On September 17 of the year he started. The flyer finished his "hop" on November 5, 1911. It took the then daring aviator 3 days, 10 hours and 4 minutes, actual flying time to complete his trip.

**Wonderful Achievement**  
It was a wonderful achievement in that day. And well it might have been, for no aviator today would dare venture into the air in the contraption Rodgers used. The wings of the machine were flimsy. The wooden frame looks like it would crumple at a particularly strong puff of wind, and propellers was made of chain links.

There the machine hangs, high up in the ceiling of the museum. The only clue to its identity is a plaque on a pillar nearby which says:

"Galbraith Perry Rodgers' historic flight across the United States, 4,231 miles, September 17, 1911—November 5, 1911, three days ten hours and four minutes actual flying time. He was one of the first group of martyrs to the science of aviation which since has been developed to such a phenomenal point of efficiency."

**Public Has Forgotten**  
And that is all the public cares about that flight today.

A Sunday afternoon visitor at the museum overhears many amusing and some cryptic comments on the machine and its flyer. The significance, the importance of that early flight falls to register.

One group of high school girls, approaching the spot where the historic plane hangs overhead, were heard to make statements something like this:

"Humph, Lindbergh flew across the United States in two jumps."  
"I don't see what they want with that old thing up there. Why don't they get Lindy's plane and bring it here."

Other comments were similar in nature.

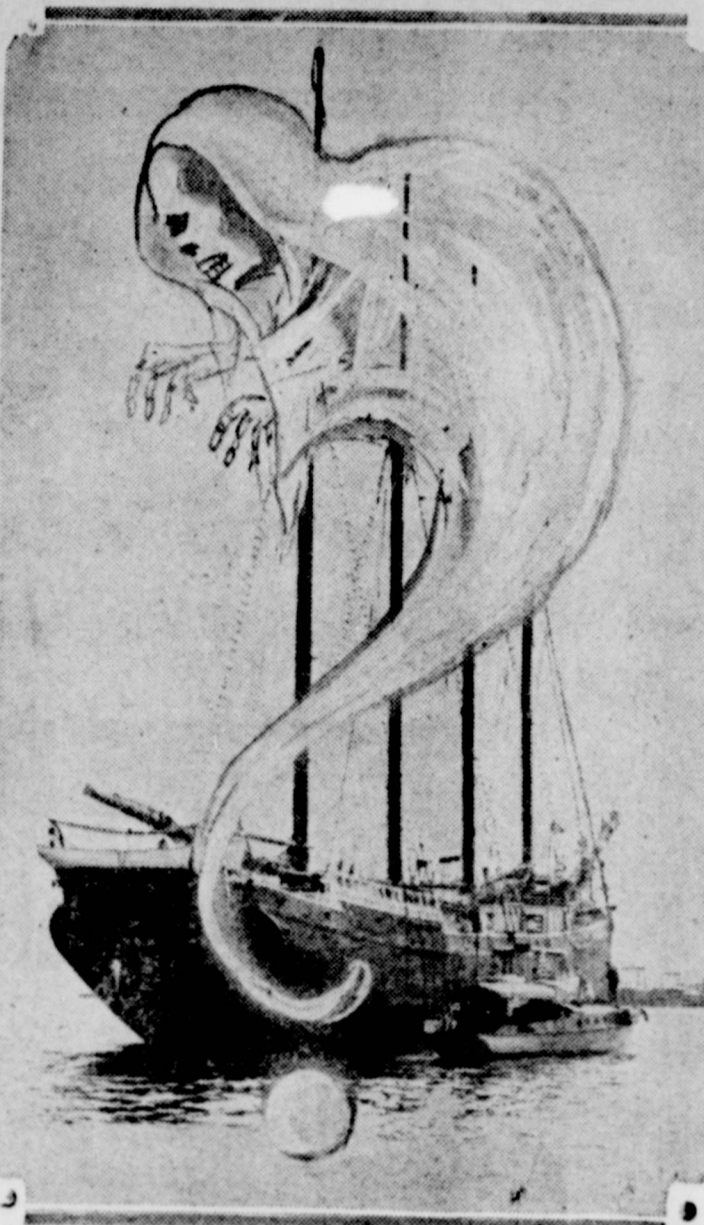

### RANGER PAPER HITS CHANGE OF JRTHOUSE

Views of the Eastland County News, published at Ranger, on the proposal to move the Eastland county seat from Eastland to Carbon, are given in the following article appearing in the current week's issue of the paper:

With Carbon ambitions to be chosen as the county seat instead of Eastland, the latest development is to the effect that calculations show that Eastland is within five miles of the geographical center of the county and it would, therefore, require a two-thirds vote of the people to vote the county seat.

The supporters of Carbon have been figuring that a bare majority was all that was required.

Petitions have been prepared and are being circulated in Carbon, Gorman and perhaps other towns asking the commissioners court to call an election to move the county seat from Eastland to Carbon.

From sentiment expressed in Ranger, the advocates of Carbon cannot muster a simple majority; and, as for two-thirds, that is out of the question.

Whether Eastland is in the exact center of the county geographically or not, it is certainly in the population center and therefore is the most conveniently located for the majority of the people of the county. It is ten miles from Ranger, ten miles from Cisco and only four miles from Olden. Thirty thousand people of the 50,000 in Eastland county live in the four cities of Ranger, Olden, Eastland and Cisco, and are therefore within 20 minutes' drive of the court house.

If the courthouse were moved to Carbon, the hundreds of Ranger citizens who attend court as jurors, witnesses and litigants and who go to the court house to file records would have to travel twice as far as they do now.

What advantage would it be to the people of Ranger to have to make a round trip of 40 miles to get to the county seat instead of going 20 miles on the round trip, as they do now?

Carbon is a small, prosperous community, in good farming territory and with oil activity in progress. It has limited railroad facilities—one train a day each way on a branch railroad.

To select a town of less than a thousand population for a county seat of a county that has 50,000 people, including three cities of approximately 10,000 each would cause laughter throughout the state.

A court house fight can do Eastland county little good. The election would result in the county seat remaining where it now is because that is the common sense location.
