# AMENDMENT VOTE VERY LIGHT

## Cisco Polls Only 188 Votes to 2:30 This Afternoon; Other Points Over Texas Report Little Interest Shown

Voting on the four proposed amendments to the state constitution in a special election being held Monday was exceedingly light both in Cisco and over the state, a check up revealed. In Cisco, at total of only 188 votes had been cast up to 2:30 o'clock when the east ward had polled 62 votes and the west ward 126. A larger vote was expected during the late afternoon. Over the state the voting was just about as light, in spite of the fact that Governor Dan Moody had stumped the state in favor of the amendments and numerous other political leaders had raised their voice either on the platform or in the public print against the proposals. In Fort Worth, many voting boxes reported only three or four ballots cast in the first hour, and other points sent in similar reports. The amendments being voted upon would increase the salary of the governor, remove county officers from the fee system, separate the objects of taxation, and increase the number of supreme court justices from three to nine.

## NEW FARMER RELIEF BILL NOW WRITTEN

RAPID CITY, S. D., Aug. 1.—The administration's latest attempt to satisfy the west, was all ready today, it was reported, for criticism of republican farm leaders. A new bill just written would provide a \$300,000,000 revolving fund, \$250,000,000 of which would be loaned to co-operatives for price stabilization, \$25,000,000 to build warehouses, and the remaining \$25,000,000 for operating expenses. Senators Capper and Fess were due to arrive in Rapid City this week to discuss the merits of the measure with the president.

## ANNUAL FIGHT FOR U. S. CASH SOON BEGINS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.—With a limitation of \$3,300,000,000 for the appropriations to be recommended to congress in the 1929 budget, Director H. M. Lord today set machinery in motion to allocate this huge sum to the various government departments. Lord notified all department heads that final estimates of their financial demands must be in the hands of the budget bureau September 15. Shortly thereafter the annual cut and dog fight for money will begin. The major items will go to the national defense. It was anticipated in the 1929 budget it probably would fall under two billion. The government in 1929 will spend something over four billion dollars, including operation of the postoffice, tax refunds and emergency appropriations.

## NOTED SHIP'S PICTURES ON DISPLAY HERE

More than 10 prints of the noted U. S. warship Constitution, otherwise known as "Old Ironsides," saved from destruction once before by the pennies of American children, are now on display at the Walton Studio here. Proceeds from sale of the prints will go into a fund to maintain the famous vessel and keep it from threatened destruction. The prints are very attractive, and sell for a small sum each.

## Commutation Refused Doomed Texas Negro

AUSTIN, Aug. 1.—The board of pardon advisers today refused to recommend commutation of the death sentence of Ed. Joshlin, Victoria negro, sentenced to be executed August 22, for criminal assault. Governor Moody has not yet acted on recommendation of the board. Joshlin filed application for commutation on the grounds that he was not guilty of assault but should have been charged with attempted assault. Governor Moody recently granted the negro a 15-day reprieve.

## LENOX ARGUES CASE, CHURCH VERSUS WORLD

Much interest was manifested yesterday at the First Christian church, at all of the services. Large audiences were present. The Bible school hour was opened with a devotional program by the young people of the church. Mrs. Henry House sang at the 11 o'clock service, and Rev. Thomas Lenox spoke upon the subject, "The Church versus the World." He said, "The church was opposed by something that Jesus denominated (the world). He often spoke of it as though some awful significance were involved in it. Not only did Jesus meet this opposition but taught his disciples they would have to encounter this opposition. The friendship of this world is enmity with God. Be not fashioned according to this world. Keep yourself unspotted from the world. 'The word "world" refers to something set in order. A kingdom in itself, with its "prince of this world," embracing under its dominion, all that part of our race which lives merely natural, voluntary, intellectual, sensuous, but not consecrated. This world spirit is seen and felt today in all of the walks of life, politically, commercially, intellectually. "Jesus said my kingdom is not of this world. It is not of the same nature as earthly kingdoms, not maintained as they are. His dominion is over the heart subduing the evil passions and corrupt desires, bringing joy, peace, purity and holiness. "A world that is sinful enough to corrupt the church but not hostile to excite antagonism; which adopts much that is christian in sentiment and culture and injects into the church much that is carnal and sensuous, as the price of such adoption, is really a more dangerous foe to deal with than a world of open hostility. "Christ did not adopt the worldly method. The power of the church resides in her faith in Christ, in her consecrated spirit, and unswerving devotion to Him. Not by might nor by power but by my spirit saith the Lord." "Next Sunday night Mr. Lenox will use as his subject, "A Midnight Raid on the Leading Social Function of the Day." Mrs. House will sing the "Holy City." The song will be illustrated with twelve slides on the canvas.

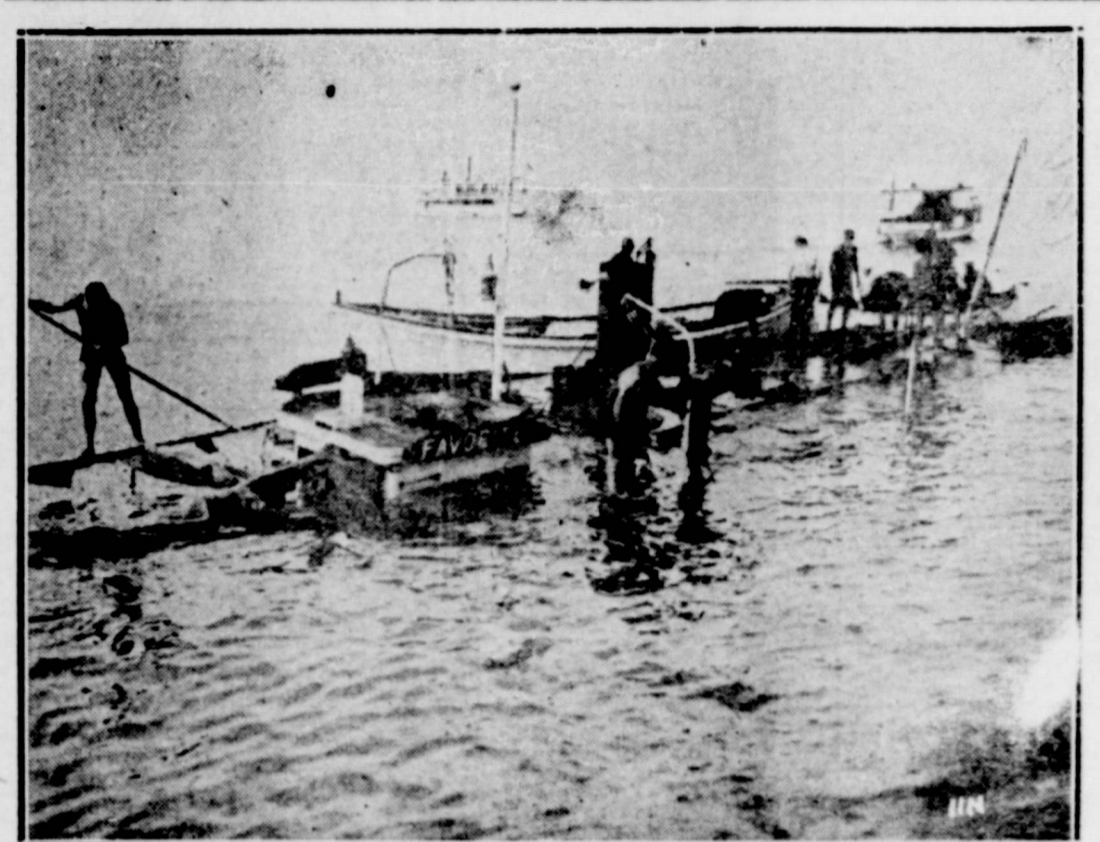
## Accident to Plane Holds Up Williams

## LANCASTER INSPECTING C & N E LINE

J. L. Lancaster, president of the Texas & Pacific railroad, together with members of legal counsel of the Texas & Pacific and Cisco and Northeastern railroads and engineers left Cisco Monday morning for Breckenridge and Throckmorton for an inspection of the proposed route of the extension of the C. & N. E. through Woodson to Throckmorton. It is understood this is the final inspection to be made, in event all titles to right-of-way are found to be clear. Work on constructing the extension is then to begin in full blast, it is said, and reports have indicated the line will be completed within 90 days of actual construction.

## GOD AND MAN WORK TOGETHER PASTOR AVERTS

MINNEAPOLIS, Aug. 1.—Nine persons were drowned in Minnesota lakes Sunday. At Clear lake, five persons were drowned, four of them while attempting to save the life of a young girl. The dead include two mothers and their three daughters. Four were drowned in Minneapolis city lake.

## Three Cisco Burglaries Cleared Up When Parker County Grocer Routs Two Robbers in Gun Fight; Loot Recovered

Recovery of all the clothing stolen from the DeLuxe Cleaners here last Wednesday night and part of the loot taken from the Elliott Drug store Thursday night was effected at Springtown, north of Weatherford, after a gun battle with two robbers, it was announced Monday. The gun battle took place early Saturday and details of the affair were learned by Constable C. S. Looney who went to Weatherford to investigate. According to the story told the constable, a grocer at Springtown found the two men attempting to break open his safe early Saturday morning. He ran to a neighbor's and borrowed a shotgun, and then opened fire on the two men. They ran off, but soon returned to the Chrysler 60 coupe in which they had driven to the town. The merchant again opened fire on them, shooting out the windshield and the lights. The men then fired six times at the merchant, but missed, and as he kept up the fire, they abandoned the car and escaped on foot. Examination of the car revealed the men's clothing taken from the cleaning shop here, as well as part of the Elliott drug store loot. Some barber supplies taken from the Shirley barber shop were found also. Whether these men burglarized the Elliott drug store on Tuesday night, when a quantity of jewelry, cutlery, and fountain pens were stolen was not known. The articles recovered were stolen on Thursday night. Among the drug store loot recovered were some kodaks, one of which had been used to take some pictures. Officers are having the films developed with the hope that the burglars' own pictures will show up. The grocer at Springtown gave officers a good description of the men, saying one was about five feet four inches tall and the other about five feet six. Officers here believe the pair had been seen at a local hotel for about a week preceding the burglaries. These men were believed to be from Oklahoma, and the captured coupe bore an Oklahoma license plate.

### TEXAS LEADS IN FARMER'S AUTOMOBILES

WICHITA, Kans., Aug. 1.—Texas leads all the other states in the number of farm-owned automobiles with 285,276, according to a report made public by the research bureau of the Coleman Lamp and Stove company here. Illinois ranks second in farm cars with 233,166, the report sets forth. Ohio is third, with 231,977. Then comes Iowa with 229,000, Pennsylvania with 219,288, New York with 204,391, and Wisconsin with 204,182. Number of farm-owned automobiles in the United States has doubled in the last six years, the report points out. There are now 4,528,422 cars on American farms, compared with 2,100,000 in 1921. "Widespread use of automobiles for farm work has greatly increased agricultural efficiency in recent years," says the report. "Adoption of other labor saving devices including milking machines, tractors, safety pressure gasoline lanterns providing ade-

quate lighting, and cultivators have enabled farmers to meet their earnings by accomplishing more work. Household drudgery of farmers' wives has been greatly lightened by introduction of gasoline pressure stoves providing quick clean heat, washing machines, and running water." Seven states have more than 200,000 farm-owned automobiles, the report points out, while nine more record more than 100,000 cars in operation on farms.

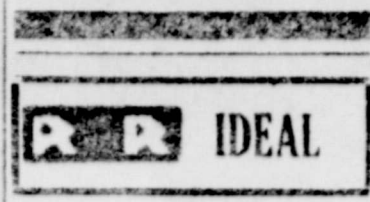
### Sweetwater Woman Killed by T. P. Train

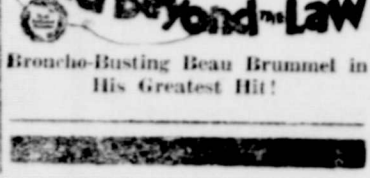
